PAYMENTS INTO GENERAL FUND

Section 180.

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- Except for proceeds from the sale of surplus property as provided by § 2.1-291 of the Code of Virginia, where applicable, but otherwise notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, all of the following shall be paid directly and promptly into the general fund of the State treasury:
- a. All monies, fees, charges and revenues, excluding donations, gifts and Federal grants, heretofore accumulated or hereafter collected by or on behalf of the agencies listed below:

Department of Agriculture and Commerce, from whatever sources and notwithstanding any other provisions of law, not including, however, the funds collected under the cited sections of the Code of Virginia for meat inspection (§ 3.1-883), for sale of liming materials (§ 3.1-128), for auditing cooperative associations, weights and measures services (§§ 3.1-930 and 3.1-931), for certification of agricultural products (§§ 3.1-28 and 3.1-29), for use of the Virginia Quality Label (§§ 3.1-353 and 3.1-356), for products testing service (§§ 3.1-15 and 3.1-16), for commodity distribution penalties and for issuing permits for feeding garbage to swine (§ 3.1-761); and for regulating the sale of economic poisons (§ 3.1-227);

Department of Conservation and Economic Development, by, from, or through the operation of the State parks, including entrance and concession fees and any and all other funds derived from the operation or use of such parks;

Marine Resources Commission, all revenues, fees and charges collected by the Marine Resources Commission, provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to any such revenues which under the Constitution and laws of Virginia are payable into the literary fund; provided, further, that this provision shall not apply to any such revenues collected and paid into the Special Public Oyster Rock Replenishment Fund established by § 28.1-94.1 of the Code of Virginia;

Department of Taxation, all monies derived from licenses issued under § 58-402 of the Code of Virginia;

Department of Labor and Industry, or other agency, under the provisions of Title 40.1 of the Code of Virginia.

- b. All fees or per diem collected by any superintendent of a State hospital for treatment of the mentally afflicted, or by any member of his staff, for the performance of services for which a fee or per diem is provided or paid; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to any fee or per diem allowed by statute to any such superintendent or member of his staff when summoned as a witness in any court.
- c. All fees and other charges hereafter collected by or on behalf or on account of the State Corporation Commission, or any division or bureau thereof, in pursuance of law, for regulating the sale of securities.
- d. All monies, fees, taxes and charges hereafter collected by: any (except the Virginia State Bar) of the state agencies established pursuant to Title 54 of the Code of Virginia or on their behalf by the Department of Professional and Oe eupational Registration, agencies designated in Items 773, 774, 775, 776, 777, 778 and 781 Virginia State Library (micro-film charges).
- e. All monies, fees and revenues, except any donations, gifts and Federal grants for specific projects, which are required by law to be paid into the State treasury when collected by any of the following institutions:
- Virginia Truck and Ornamentals Research StationBlue Ridge Sanatorium

- The Penitentiary (not including the Industrial Department)
- 55 State Industrial Farm for Women
- 56 State Penitentiary Farm and State Prison Farm for Defective Misdemeanants
- 57 Southampton Correctional Farm
- 58 Bland Correctional Farm (not including the Lime Grinding Plant)
- 59 Beaumont School for Boys
- 60 Bon Air School for Girls
- 61 Janie Porter Barrett School for Girls
- 62 Hanover School for Boys
- 63 Natural Bridge Forestry Camp
- 64 Reception and Diagnostic Center for Children
- 55 Juvenile Vocational Institute
- 66 Halfway Houses
- 67 Pre-Release Centers
- 68 Jamestown Foundation
- f. All monies paid into the State treasury as reimbursement to the State for the cost of any examination or audit by the Auditor of Public Accounts of the books or records of any county, city, or other political subdivision, or any officer or agency thereof, of this State, the cost of which audit or examination is required by law to be borne by such county, city or political subdivision.
- g. All revenues received by an institution from sales of its farm and dairy products (except pure-bred livestock) whether for its consumption or to other institutions or agencies.
- h. All revenues received from grantors/contractors as reimbursement to the State for agency and Statewide indirect costs of grant/contract administration, excepting such revenues as are designated in this act to be appropriated to an agency or, subject to rules and regulation prescribed by the Governor, as are received because of research and instructional grants or contracts to institutions of higher education.

Section 205.

During the current biennium, the compensation of all kinds and from all sources of 83 each officer and employee who enters the service of the Commonwealth or who is 84 promoted to a vacant position shall be fixed at such rate as shall be approved by the 85 Governor in writing or as is in accordance with rules and regulations established by the 86 Governor. No increase shall be made in such compensation except with the Governor's 87 written approval first obtained or in accordance with rules and regulations established by 88 the Governor. In all cases where any officer or employee is employed or promoted to fill a 89 vacancy in a position for which a salary is specified by this act, the Governor may fix the 90 salary of such officer or employee at a lower rate or amount than is specified; in order to 91 enable him to carry out the recommendations of the Governor's Management Study 92 Implementation Commission and employ or retain a qualified appointee in a position for 93 which a salary is specified in this act, the Governor, notwithstanding any contrary provi-94 sion of law, is hereby authorized to increase or supplement such salary to the extent of fif-95 teen percent (15%). However, when special qualifications for such an officer are required 96 by the Constitution of Virginia and the Governor is of the opinion that a larger increase 97 is essential to employ or retain a qualified appointee, the Governor is hereby authorized 98 instead to increase or supplement such salary to the extent of twenty-five percent (25%). 99 Unless exceptional circumstances are found by the Governor, salaries for newly employed or promoted officers and employees shall be established at the entrance rates provided by the compensation and classification plans established by the Governor.

- 3 No lump sum appropriation for personal service shall be regarded as advisory or 4 suggestive of individual salary rates or of salary schedules to be fixed under law by the
- 5 Governor payable from the lump sum appropriation.

- 6 For his assistance in carrying out the provisions of this section the Governor may re-7 quire information in writing from the head of any State agency or from any employee
- 8 thereof, upon any subject relating to the duties of any office or position in such agency.

REVERSION OF APPROPRIATIONS

Section 209.

- All the appropriations herein made out of the general fund of the State treasury for the current biennium, which have not actually been disbursed by warrants drawn by the Comptroller on the State Treasurer and are thus unexpended on the books of the Department of Accounts at the close of business on the last day of the current biennium shall, except as may be subsequently provided by the General Assembly, revert to and become a
- 14 part of the general fund of the State treasury of the Commonwealth of Virginia, and shall
- 15 not thereafter be paid by the Comptroller and the same shall be charged off upon the
- 16 books in his office.
- Further, the unexpended balance in any appropriation or reappropriation for a capital outlay project made out of the general fund of the State treasury shall revert to and become part of the general fund surplus during the current biennium as of the date the Governor certifies to the State Comptroller that the project has been completed in accordance with the intent of the appropriation or reappropriation and there are no known unpaid obligations related to the project; however, the Governor may direct the restoration of any portion of the reverted amount if an unpaid obligation or a requirement for completion is subsequently verified by the Director of the Budget.
- 25 2. There is hereby appropriated from the general fund and from special funds, respec-26 tively, of the State treasury the sums specifically set forth and so identified as "Addi-27 tional Appropriation" in § 1 of this act, to be expended for the purposes of, in the manner
- 28 prescribed by and subject to all conditions stated in this act and Chapter 681 of the Acts
- 29 of Assembly of 1974.
- 30 3. An emergency exists and this act shall be in force from its passage.
