A Report on Agency Nomenclature and Classification of Executive Branch Collegial Bodies

TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF VIRGINIA



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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

## Background

Recent reports issued by the Governor and the legislature have pointed out the need to increase public understanding of state government, particularly the purposes and activities of state agencies. In the 1984 and 1985 Sessions of the General Assembly, legislation was enacted to meet this need by establishing a system of standardized nomenclature for state agencies and by defining the powers and authorities granted to executive branch boards, commissions and councils.

## **Purpose**

This study's objectives are to determine the appropriate designation for 14 state agencies that will bring these agencies into conformance with the standardized nomenclature statute (§2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>) and to put into effect a standard classification system for 300 executive branch boards, commissions and councils that will conform with the principles articulated in §9-6.25 of the Code.

## Recommendations

The recommended titles for the 14 agencies are:

The agency's collegial body and administrative structure share an identical title.

The recommendations for the classifications of executive branch boards, commissions and councils are:

Virginia Parole Council

- ° 65 boards, commissions and councils should be exempted from classification.
- ° 116 should be classified as advisory collegial bodies,

Virginia Parole Board

- ° 70 should be designated as policy-making collegial bodies, and
- ° 49 should be classified as supervisory collegial bodies.

The specific classification recommended for each collegial body is found in the section entitled "Principles and Designations".

The agency's collegial body and administrative structure share an identical title.

#### INTRODUCTION

#### BACKGROUND

In 1984, Governor Robb and the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) each submitted reports to the General Assembly on managing the Executive Department. Among the concerns both reports discussed was the need to increase public understanding about state government, particularly the purposes and activities of state agencies. The reports concluded that standardized nomenclature and classification of the powers and duties of agencies and collegial bodies (defined in the <u>Commonwealth Planning and Budgeting System</u> manual as a multi-member body organized for a common purpose, including boards, commissions and councils) were needed.

In responding to the recommendations contained in the two reports, the General Assembly enacted legislation during the 1984 Session (§2.1-1.2, <u>Code of Virginia</u>) to define five classes of titles. "Office" is defined as an administrative office of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General or a Governor's Secretary. "Department" means an independent administrative agency within the executive branch. "Board" refers to a permanent collegial body affiliated with an agency. "Council" means a permanent collegial body either affiliated with more than one agency or independent of an agency within the executive branch. A "Commission" is defined as a temporary collegial body established within the executive branch for a specified purpose and a specified period of time. The legislation also included criteria to exempt agencies from standard nomenclature.

In the 1985 Session, Governor Robb introduced a legislative package to implement the new nomenclature classifications. The legislation was passed by the General Assembly (§§2.1-1.3 through 2.1-1.9, Code of Virginia) and took effect on July 1, 1985. However, 14 executive agencies and collegial bodies did not readily conform with the nomenclature criteria. As a consequence, the General Assembly directed the Governor to study these agencies and their collegial bodies and to submit a report and proposed legislation to the 1986 Session.

Also during the 1985 Session, the General Assembly enacted legislation (§9-6.25, <u>Code of Virginia</u>) that defined three classes of collegial bodies: advisory, policy and supervisory. The General Assembly also requested the Governor to submit legislation in 1986 assigning each executive collegial body to one of the three classes.

#### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this study is to: 1) determine the appropriate designation for each of the 14 agencies in conformance with the standard nomenclature provision of  $\S 2.1-1.2$  of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, and 2) to implement a standard classification system for executive collegial bodies that conforms with the principles contained in  $\S 9-6.25$  of the <u>Code</u>.

## SCOPE

The 14 agencies to be studied for consistency with standard nomenclature are identified in Chapter 447 of the 1985 Acts of Assembly. They are:

Transportation and Public Safety

Concerning the classification of collegial bodies, every executive board, council and commission established by state law or executive order was examined.

## METHODOLOGY

For agency nomenclature, there were two data gathering steps. The first step was a literature search of each agency's enabling legislation, 1984-86 Program Proposal, and description in relevant reports such as <u>Virginia Government in Brief (1982 to 1986)</u> published by the Department of Planning and Budget and <u>Information Papers on the Agencies of State Government</u> issued by the Commission on State Governmental Management.

In the second step, each agency submitted a position paper to the Department of Planning and Budget. The paper addressed:

- the major purpose of the collegial body and of the administrative unit;
- o the advantages and disadvantages of naming the agency in conformance with the nomenclature statute, amending the statute to add a distinct designation for the agency, and creating a distinct collegial body and administrative structure for the agency; and
- o the reason(s) for determining the agency's position. (See Appendix A)

At the conclusion of the data gathering phase, the information was analyzed in order to determine the most appropriate designation for each of the agencies. As part of the analysis, the agencies' purposes, activities and legal authorities were compared to the nomenclature criteria established in §2.1-1.2, Code of Virginia.

For the classification of collegial bodies, a listing of all executive collegial bodies was prepared by reviewing pertinent sections of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, the 1983-84 edition of the <u>Report of the Secretary of the Commonwealth</u> ("Blue Book"), executive orders, and legislation enacted by the 1985 General Assembly.

After the data were collected, the focus was on classification. Each collegial body was examined in terms of the powers and duties contained in its enabling authority. As part of the analysis, the information collected was compared to the Attorney General's opinions, the findings from a 1982 survey of state agencies done by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, and other executive and legislative studies.

#### STRUCTURE OF REPORT

The report is organized by subject areas: agency nomenclature and classification of executive branch collegial bodies. Agency nomenclature has two sections. The first section reports major findings, including the summary of each agency's legal authorities, a brief description of each agency's purpose and activities, and the study's analyses and recommendations. The second section contains the actions for effecting the recommendations.

Three sections comprise the classification of executive branch collegial bodies. The first section addresses the need for exempting certain collegial bodies from the classification process. A description of the principles used in the exemption process and the identification of the affected boards, councils and commissions are included. The second section discusses the criteria used in classifying the collegial bodies and includes the study's recommendations. The third section contains the actions needed to implement the recommendations.



## OVERVIEWS, ANALYSES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### COMMISSION ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the Commission on Local Government is contained in Title 15.1, Chapter 19.1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The Commission meets at least once every two months. Its general powers and duties are stipulated in §15.1-945.3 of the <u>Code</u>. The Commission is to:

- investigate, analyze, and make findings of fact as to the probable effect on people residing in localities affected by annexation, boundary disputes, town or city incorporations, or interlocal agreements;
- odevelop fiscal impact statements on state legislative proposals that mandate the provision of new services or expanded services by local governments.
- oprovide technical assistance to local governments upon appropriate request;
- serve as a mediator between local governments; and
- conduct hearings on matters pertaining to the purpose of the Commission.

#### Analysis

An Executive Director is appointed by the Governor to serve the five-member Commission. The Executive Director is responsible for entering into contracts, accepting grants, administering the Commission's affairs, and preparing and submitting a budget.

The enabling legislation does not formally establish an independent administrative structure. However, the Commission's administrative unit consists of five full-time employees. The staff assist the Commission in carrying out its legislative duties. The administrative structure is not highly organized, and does not have any internal units.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. The Commission pointed out that members and staff work closely and are in constant contact. This is supported by the facts that:

o the administrative unit does not have any subunits;

- o the Commission meets on a regular and frequent basis; and
- \* the collegial body members take an active role in fulfilling the Commission's legislative responsibilities.

Because of this working relationship, the Commission indicated that there would be no advantage in formally separating the administrative unit from the collegial body.

Still, the Commission's operations fit the definition provided for "Council" in §2.1-1.2, <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Consequently, the Commission's recommendation to retain its current designation is not appropriate.

### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to change the agency's designation to conform with the statute. The agency should be titled the Council on Local Government.

#### COMPENSATION BOARD

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the three-member Compensation Board is contained in Title 14.1, Chapters 1 and 2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The Board's general powers are found in §14.1-51 of the <u>Code</u>. Its responsibilities include setting the salaries and expenses of local constitutional officers performing services for the state, determining the salaries and expenses to be paid to the assistants of local constitutional officers, and certifying all state payments to local constitutional officers.

Under the provisions of §14.1-49 of the <u>Code</u>, the Chairman of the Board is charged with specific responsibilities. He is to:

- call the meetings of the Board and provide the information necessary for the Board to make decisions;
- supervise the administrative work of the Board;
- maintain and classify the files and information provided by the constitutional officers required to report to the Board; and
- record all salaries, expenses and other allowances fixed by the Board.

## **Analysis**

The enabling legislation does not formally establish an independent administrative agency. However, the distribution of funds is carried out by nine full-time employees. There are no subunits in the organization. The staff operates under the direction of an Executive Secretary.

The Board's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. The Board pointed out that its primary clients, the constitutional officers and localities, already know the Board's name, and thus a change would not be useful.

However, the Board's operations fit the definition provided for "Council" in §2.1-1.2, <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Consequently, the Board's recommendation to retain its current designation is not appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to change the agency's designation to conform with the statute. The agency should be titled the Compensation Council.

#### STATE BOARD OF ELECTIONS

## Overview

Enabling legislation for the State Board of Elections is contained in Title 24.1, Chapter 2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The general powers of the Board are stated in §§24.1-19 and 24.1-23. The Board is to:

- implement the Fair Elections Practices Act;
- maintain and operate a central registration roster to include names of all registered voters as reported by local electoral boards and registrars;
- o direct the periodic purging of registration books;
- supervise and coordinate the work of individual local registrars and electoral boards;
- o prepare and distribute records for registration; and
- operation prescribe and require the use of standard forms throughout the state.

#### Analysis

The Governor appoints the three members who serve on the State Board of Elections. He also designates one of the three members to serve as Secretary. Under the provisions of §24.1-18 of the <u>Code</u>, the Secretary may employ such clerical help, other assistants and personnel as may be required to carry out the Board's legislative duties.

The Secretary supervises a distinct administrative structure made up of 13 full-time employees. The structure is subdivided into two major units: 1) Election and Administrative Services and 2) Central Registration Services. In addition, there are a fiscal officer and an equipment supervisor. All staff members, except a confidential secretary, report through a director of

operations to the Secretary. The law is silent on whether the Board or the Secretary reviews and approves the agency's budget request. According to the Secretary, the Board actually approves the agency's budget requests. The administrative structure is not specified in the enabling legislation, although it carries out most of the Board's legislative responsibilities.

The Board's general position is that it retain its current nomenclature because of its unique characteristics. The Board stated that:

- of the <u>Code</u> to adopt its own bylaws;
- o its members (including the Secretary) are appointed for a set term and do not serve at the pleasure of the Governor; and
- o its enabling legislation exempts the Board and Secretary from the general provision (§2.1-41.2 of the <u>Code</u>) on gubernatorial appointments of agency heads.

Although the Board makes a strong argument, the agency does not have compelling characteristics requiring a unique descriptive title as provided in §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code</u>. For example, the authority to adopt bylaws is common to other collegial bodies such as the Board of Health and the State Water Control Board. Many collegial body appointments are for set terms that carry over to succeeding administrations. The State Highways and Transportation Board is an example. Also, the size of the agency's administrative staff is larger than that of several independent administrative agencies, such as the Department for Children and the Department of Volunteerism. Finally, there are other agencies where the Governor does not appoint the agency head. These include the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia, the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries, and the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System.

Consequently, the Board's recommendation to retain its current designation is not appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a separate collegial body and administrative structure. The collegial body should be titled the Virginia Board of Elections. The administrative structure should be named the Virginia Department of Elections.

## COMMISSION OF GAME AND INLAND FISHERIES

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries is contained in Title 29, Chapter 2 and Title 62, Chapter 17 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are delineated in §29-11, <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The Commission is vested with powers to make policies and regulations regarding the agency's operations.

## <u>Analysis</u>

The ten-member Commission appoints the Executive Director to administer the legislation for which the Commission is responsible (e.g., managing wildlife and freshwater fish, and enforcing state boating laws). The Director is not a member of the Commission, but acts as its administrative officer. The enabling legislation does not provide for an independent administrative agency (i.e. department) to carry out administrative or regulatory functions.

However, a review of the Commission's organization and operations indicates that it functions as a supervisory collegial body supported by an extensive and well-organized administrative structure. It is the administrative structure (comprised of five major divisions with over 300 full-time employees) that carries out the Commission's legislative responsibilities.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. In its response, the Commission noted that a title change would necessitate extensive statutory and regulatory revisions. However, this should not prove burdensome because the revisions would be "housekeeping" changes.

In addition, the Commission stated that changing its name would require the replacement of informational signs on property it owns and manages. Also, the name on Commission vehicles, publications, and uniforms would have to be revised. The Commission's estimates for the transition costs ranged from \$150,000-\$175,000. Because the Commission does not receive general fund appropriations, the money would have to come from dedicated special revenues.

Although the Commission's point concerning the expense of a name change is well taken, such transition costs prove to be inconsequential over a period of time. There have been periodic reorganizations in this century dating from Governor Byrd's reorganization of 1928. Agencies have handled such changes without service disruptions. Most recently in 1984, the General Assembly approved the Governor's realignment package. Indeed, the intent of the nomenclature changes is not to divert resources from an agency's program services to its administrative services. Rather, its purpose is to alleviate any public confusion over the size, responsibility and activities of an agency. Because the current title does not address this purpose, the agency's recommendation to retain it is not appropriate.

## Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. The administrative unit should be titled the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. The collegial body should be called the Game and Inland Fisheries Board.

#### COUNCIL ON THE ENVIRONMENT

## Overview

Enabling legislation for the Council on the Environment is contained in Title 10, Chapter 17, Article 2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are stated in §10-186, <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The duties and responsibilities of the Council's administrator are found in §§10-184.1 through 10-185, <u>Code of Virginia</u>. There is no authority for an independent administrative structure.

## <u>Analysis</u>

The Council is composed of ten members (the majority representing agencies with strong interest in environmental affairs) and an Administrator who is appointed by the Governor. The Council meets quarterly to review and discuss environmental issues, to provide guidance to the administrator on selected issues and to make recommendations to the Secretaries, the Governor and the General Assembly. The Council also holds biennial public hearings to gather information about citizen concerns on Virginia's environment.

The Administrator and staff are responsible on a daily basis for:

- advising the Governor, the Secretary of Commerce and Resources and the General Assembly on environmental and resource-related issues.
- coordinating, consolidating and expediting the environmental permit review process;
- monitoring outer continental shelf oil and gas exploration plans and activities by federal agencies, state agencies or private entities, and developing appropriate responses and necessary actions for the Commonwealth; and
- o initiating and supervising programs designed to educate citizens on issues concerning environmental quality and to assure cooperation with federal, interstate, state, regional and local organizations, both private and public.

The Council's position is that the collegial body should retain its current title. Since the collegial body's operations fit the definition provided for "Board" in §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code</u>, the agency's recommendation is not appropriate.

Also, the Council appropriately recommended that the administrator and staff function as an independent administrative unit providing support and assistance to the Council and other parties. The Council stated the administrative unit should be named the Department on the Environment. However, the recommended title is too vague and could be misconstrued by the public to mean that the administrative agency possesses programmatic and regulatory functions beyond its legal authority.

### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. The collegial body should be titled the Environmental Policy Board. The administrative structure should be called the Department of Environmental Policy.

## MARINE RESOURCES COMMISSION

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the Marine Resources Commission is contained in Titles 28.1 and 62.1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are included in Title 28.1, Chapters 1 and 2 of the Code.

## Analysis

The seven-member Commission is headed by a Commissioner who is appointed by the Governor. The Commission functions as a regulation-making body as well as a quasi-judicial body in hearing and deciding cases. Its jurisdiction covers marine fisheries and habitat permits for projects on state-owned bottomlands, wetlands, and coastal sand dunes.

The Commissioner serves as a full-time agency head. Sole authority for directing, appointing and controlling employees of the Commission is vested in the Commissioner under §§28.1-9, 28.1-12, 28.1-13, 28.1-15, and 28.1-39, Code of Virginia.

The enabling legislation does not provide for an independent administrative unit. However, it is the administrative unit that operates the Commission's programs. The administrative unit employs 127 staff and is highly organized in that there are six subunits.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. The Commission stated that a new title would require corresponding changes in the Code. In addition, the Commission indicated that a change in nomenclature would require revisions to Wetlands Zoning Ordinances adopted by localities because the model ordinance in §62.1-13.5 Code of Virginia refers to both the Virginia Marine Resources Commission and the Commissioner of Marine Resources. However, the statutory and regulatory changes that would be required are "housekeeping" in nature, and would not substantially affect a locality's ordinance.

Also, the Commission believes that its present title is well recognized by the public. However, public recognition of the Commission's name is not the same as public understanding of the Commission's duties and responsibilities. Consequently, the Commission's recommendation to retain its current title is not appropriate.

## Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. The collegial body should be titled the Marine Resources Board. The administrative unit should be called the Department of Marine Resources.

#### MILK COMMISSION

## Overview

Enabling legislation for the Milk Commission is contained in Title 3.1, Chapter 21, Article 2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are stipulated in §3.1-430 of the <u>Code</u>.

The Commission consists of an Administrator and seven members, all of whom are appointed by the Governor. The Milk Commission's purposes and responsibilities are as follows:

- supervise, regulate and control the production, transportation, processing, storage, distribution, delivery, and sale of milk for consumption within Virginia;
- opposite rules and regulations and orders dealing with the dairy industry;
- examine books and records of licensed producers, distributors, and associations of producers and issue subpoenas to persons from whom information is needed;
- act as a mediator among or between milk producers and distributors;
- conduct investigations: and
- cooperate with other authorities at the state and federal levels.

#### Analysis

The Administrator serves in an ex officio capacity without a vote. The Administrator is authorized to hire and supervise employees; prepare, approve and submit all budget requests; and expend monies pursuant to the Appropriation Act. The administrative unit of the Commission, which is not authorized in the enabling legislation, carries out policy decisions of the Commission and enforces the Commission's rules and regulations and orders. The 13 full-time employees are assigned to internal subunits within the administrative structure.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. The Commission reported that a title change would require the reprinting of rules and regulations, licenses, publications, forms, stationary, and other documents.

However, these transition costs are not a significant portion of the agency's budget and can be easily absorbed over a period of time.

The Commission also stated that a name change would confuse the dairy industry. However, it does not seem likely that a nomenclature change would substantially confuse any agency's primary client group. Moreover, the public's understanding of this specific agency would be improved since the present name may mistakenly imply responsibilities for which the Commission has no legal authority, e.g., ensuring the health and purity of milk. Consequently, the Commission's position is not appropriate.

## Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. The collegial body should be titled the Milk Marketing Board. The administrative unit should be called the Department of Milk Marketing.

STATE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL BOARD

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the State Air Pollution Control Board is contained in Title 10, Chapter 1.2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are delineated in §§10-17.17 and 10-17.18 of the <u>Code</u>.

The five-member Board is generally responsible for:

- exercising the powers and duties contained in the Air Pollution Control Law (§§10-17.9:1 through 10-17.30:1 of the <u>Code</u>);
- o identifying, monitoring and maintaining surveillance of air pollution in the Commonwealth;
- of formulating and enforcing necessary rules and regulations to abate, control and prohibit pollution; and
- ensuring state compliance with the requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act.

## <u>Analysis</u>

The general powers of the Executive Director (who is appointed by the Governor) are found in §10-17.14 of the <u>Code</u>. The Executive Director exercises the administrative powers conferred upon him by the Board; supervises, administers and enforces the provisions of the Air Pollution Control Law including regulations; prepares, approves and submits all budget requests; assumes responsibility for expending monies pursuant to the Appropriation Act; and employs and supervises staff to carry out the functions of the Board.

The enabling legislation does not establish an independent administrative agency. However, the Board is supported by an extensive and well-organized administrative structure comprised of 6 divisions and has 117 full-time employees.

The Board approved a position of separate names for itself and the staff. It recommended that the the collegial body retain the name of State Air Pollution Control Board and that the staff be designated the Department of Air Pollution Control.

In addition, the Board recommended a title change for the State Advisory Board on Air Pollution. This collegial body provides technical and scientific advice to the Board. The Board favors the original name of the collegial body—the State Advisory Committee on Air Pollution.

The Board's recommendation to rename its administrative unit and technical advisory group is logical and appropriate. Such action would clarify a situation where three entities are currently sharing the same or similar name:

- State Air Pollution Control Board (collegial body),
- State Air Pollution Control Board (administrative unit), and
- State Advisory Board on Air Pollution (technical advisory group).

However, reverting the title of the State Advisory Board on Air Pollution to its original name would not be consistent with the provisions of §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code</u>. The technical group is a permanent collegial body affiliated with an agency, and thus is subject to the statute. Consequently, this portion of the agency's recommendation is not appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure and to rename the technical advisory group. The collegial body should be titled the State Air Pollution Control Board. The administrative unit should be called the Department of Air Pollution Control. The technical advisory group should be named the Scientific and Technical Advisory Board on Air Pollution.

#### STATE WATER CONTROL BOARD

## <u>Overview</u>

Enabling legislation for the State Water Control Board is contained in Titles 62.1 and 15.1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are stated in §§62.1-44.15, 62.1-44.36, and 62.1-112 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Under law,

the Board reserves for itself policy-making activities and the promulgation of rules, standards and orders in the areas of managing and planning of water resources, advising on flood plain management and enforcing laws on water pollution control.

## <u>Analysis</u>

The enabling legislation does not provide for an independent administrative unit to carry out administrative or regulatory functions. However, a review of the Board's organization and operations shows that the collegial body is supported by an extensive and well-organized administrative structure that has 331 full-time employees.

The duties and responsibilities of the Executive Director (who is appointed by the Governor) are articulated in §62.1-44.14 of the <u>Code</u>. He is to:

- exercise such administrative powers as conferred upon him by the Board;
- employ and supervise staff;
- o prepare, approve and submit all budget requests;
- expend monies pursuant to the Appropriation Act; and
- exercise general supervision and control over the quality and management of all state waters and administer and enforce the State Water Control Law and all certificates, standards, policies, rules, regulations, rulings, and special orders promulgated by the Board.

The administrative unit of the Board endorsed the idea of separate names for the collegial body and the administrative structure. It recommended that the administrative unit be called the Department of Water Resources and that the collegial body be titled the State Water Resources Board. This action would strengthen public understanding of the agency's responsibilities concerning water quality and water quantity.

The collegial body did not favor a name change. It stated that a change in nomenclature would jeopardize the public's strong identification with its current name. However, public recognition of the Board's name is not the same as public understanding of the Board's duties and responsibilities. Consequently, the Board's recommendation to retain its current title is not appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative unit. The collegial body should be titled the State Water Resources Board. The administrative unit should be called the Department of Water Resources.

#### VIRGINIA EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the Virginia Employment Commission is contained in Title 60.1, Chapter 2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are found in  $\S 60.1-34$  of the <u>Code</u>.

## Analysis

The Virginia Employment Commission consists of one member called the Commissioner. Appointed by the Governor, he is empowered to:

- administer the Unemployment Compensation laws:
- make rules and regulations;
- employ and supervise staff;
- make expenditures;
- require and issue reports: and
- ° conduct investigations.

Although an independent administrative structure is not provided for in the enabling legislation, it is the administrative unit that carries out the Commission's duties of compiling labor market information; providing testing, counseling and recruitment services; and paying unemployment insurance benefits. The administrative unit is highly-organized and employs 1,248 full-time staff.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. The Commission noted that a title change would mean replacing existing signs and forms. The Commission estimated that replacement costs could run as high as \$755,000. Because the Commission receives limited state funding and because the federal government does not have money available for this purpose, the Commission stated that service reductions and staff cutbacks would be necessary to pay for the replacement items. However, the estimated replacement cost is not significant when compared to the agency's overall budget of more than \$301 million. In addition, the replacement of signs and forms could be a phased process, and thus eliminate the possibility of service cutbacks.

Also, 18 citizens serving on local employment advisory committees expressed their concerns over any name change. They believe that a name change could jeopardize marketing efforts to project the Commission's image as

an employment agency rather than an "unemployment" office. However, a change in nomenclature would improve the agency's image by enhancing public understanding about its responsibilities and activities. The public would know that the agency provided employment services for everyone and not just compensation services for the unemployed. Consequently, the agency's position is not appropriate.

## Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to rename the agency in conformance with standard nomenclature classification. The agency should be titled the Department of Employment Services.

STATE COUNCIL OF HIGHER EDUCATION FOR VIRGINIA

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the State Council of Higher Education is contained in Title 23, Chapter 1.1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers are delineated in §23-9.6:1 of the <u>Code</u>.

#### Analysis

The 11-member Council appoints a Director to serve as chief executive officer of the Council. Also, the Council employs other staff to assist in the exercise and performance of its planning, coordinating and advising duties and powers.

The enabling legislation does not establish an independent administrative structure to carry out administrative or programmatic functions. However, a review of the Council's organization and operations indicates that the administrative structure carries out the Council's legislative responsibilities. It is comprised of four subunits staffed by 55 full-time employees.

The Council favored the creation of a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. In addition, the Council stated that the collegial body's title should reflect the Council's mission to promote the development and operation of an educationally and economically sound, vigorous, progressive, and coordinated system of higher education in Virginia.

Because the collegial body's operations fit the definition provided for "Board" in §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code</u> and the administrative structure executes the collegial body's legislative responsibilities, the agency's position is appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure. The collegial body should be titled the State

Higher Education Coordinating Board. The administrative unit should be called the Department for Higher Education Coordination.

## VIRGINIA COMMISSION FOR THE ARTS

#### Overview

Enabling legislation for the Virginia Commission of the Arts is contained in Title 9, Chapter 9.1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The general duties of the 13-member Commission are stated in §9-84.03 of the <u>Code</u>. The Commission is to:

- stimulate and encourage public interest and participation in the arts and humanities and make recommendations to encourage participation in and appreciation of the arts;
- apply for grants and enter into contracts and agreements;
- accept gifts and contributions to carry out the purpose of the Commission; and
- administer and disburse any funds available to the Commission.

### Analysis

A review of the Commission's organization and operations indicates that it meets four times a year to award grants and to give policy direction to the staff. The administrative structure (comprised of 6 staff members) works closely and regularly with the collegial body and carries out the Commission's directions and legislative duties. The administrative structure does not have legislative authority.

The Commission's Director is appointed by the Governor and is responsible for assisting the Commission in the exercise and performance of its powers and duties; employing and supervising personnel; preparing, approving and submitting all budget requests; and expending monies pursuant to the Appropriation Act.

The Commission's position is that it retain its current title. The Commission stated that a change in nomenclature would:

- require an extensive public relations effort with artists and arts organizations;
- require the Commission to redesign and reprint all agency publications; and
- ° create confusion about the agency's function because most colleges have "departments of art".

The Commission's points concerning the expense of and potential confusion over a name change are recognized. However, printing costs should not be prohibitive when properly planned and phased in. Moreover, standardized nomenclature can strengthen the public's awareness and understanding of the agency, particularly since the definition of a commission is that of a temporary collegial body. Furthermore, the Commission's operations fit the definition provided for "Council" in §2.1-1.2, Code of Virginia. Consequently, the Commission's recommendation to retain its current designation is not appropriate.

#### Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to change the agency's designation to conform with the statute. The agency should be titled the Virginia Council for the Arts.

COMMONWEALTH'S ATTORNEYS' SERVICES AND TRAINING COUNCIL

## Overview

Enabling legislation for the Commonwealth's Attorneys' Services and Training Council is contained in Title 2.1, Chapter 7.3:1 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its powers and duties are articulated in §2.1-64.28:4. The Council is to:

- coordinate training and continuing legal education activities for Commonwealth's Attorneys;
- maintain close contact with the Office of the Attorney General and with all Commonwealth's Attorneys in the discussion of problems or recommendations concerning research, minimum standards, educational needs, and other matters relative to upgrading the professional status of Commonwealth's Attorneys;
- gather and disseminate information and statistical reports to Commonwealth's Attorneys on various topics;
- receive and establish an equitable distribution plan for allocating funds; and
- contract or enter into agreements.

## **Analysis**

None of the 15 Council members are appointed by the Governor. Their selection is determined by election (one representative from each of the congressional districts) or by virtue of being an officer of the Virginia Association of Commonwealth's Attorneys. The Council meets on a monthly basis to carry out its responsibilities and duties.

The Administrative Coordinator for the Council is appointed by the Council with the concurrence of the Governor. He performs such duties and functions as assigned by the Council and serves under their supervision. Two full-time staff are employed to assist the Council.

The Council's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. Because the Council's operations match the definition provided for "Council" in §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code</u>, the recommendation to retain the current designation is appropriate.

## Recommendation

The agency's current title should be retained.

## VIRGINIA PAROLE BOARD

## Overview

Enabling legislation for the five-member Virginia Parole Board is contained in Title 53.1, Chapter 4 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Its general powers and duties are articulated in §53.1-136 of the <u>Code</u>. The Board is to:

- adopt general rules governing the granting of parole;
- release felons from state correctional facilities when those persons become eligible and are found suitable for parole;
- revoke parole and order the reincarceration of any parolee who violates the conditions of his parole;
- \* issue final discharges to persons released by the Board on parole when the Board believes the discharge will not be incompatible with the welfare of the individual and society; and
- make investigations and reports with respect to any commutation of sentence, pardon, reprieve, or remission of fine or penalty when requested by the Governor.

## Analysis

The Chairman of the Virginia Parole Board is appointed by the Governor and serves in an agency director's capacity. He and the other Board members are state employees. His specific powers and duties are delineated in §53.1-139 of the Code. The Chairman's duties are to:

make use of available staff from the Department of Corrections and employ additional staff needed to carry out the Board's duties and responsibilities;

- exercise supervision through probation and parole officers over prisoners released on conditional pardon as the Governor may require;
- coordinate the activities of the Board with the Director of the Department of Corrections; and
- o preside at all meetings of the Board and cause the Secretary to maintain all records required by law or by the Board related to its functions, powers and duties.

The Board's position is that it retain its current nomenclature. However, the Board's operations fit the definition provided for "Council" in §2.1-1.2, Code of Virginia. This is evidenced by the constant and involved working relationship between the collegial body members and the other 22 full-time employees. Consequently, the Board's recommendation to retain its current designation is not appropriate.

## Recommendation

Legislation should be introduced to change the agency's nomenclature to conform with the statute. The agency should be titled the Virginia Parole Council.

#### **IMPLEMENTATION**

To effect the recommendations, legislation (Appendix B) has been prepared to amend §2.1-1.7A of the <u>Code</u> and to "sunset" §§2.1-1.6 B, 2.1-1.7 B, and 2.1-1.9 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, effective July 1, 1987. This action would remove the 14 agencies from the "holding pattern" in which the original nomenclature legislation placed them.

In addition, affected agencies should be responsible for preparing the necessary legislative packages for the 1987 Session, upon passage of the report's recommended legislation. This action will allow the agencies sufficient time to plan and address transition changes. It will also provide the Governor and his Secretaries the opportunity to review and approve the changes in the agencies' enabling legislation prior to General Assembly consideration.

## CLASSIFICATION OF EXECUTIVE BRANCH COLLEGIAL BODIES

# EXEMPTION OF EXECUTIVE BRANCH COLLEGIAL BODIES FROM THE CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

#### Overview

An inventory of executive branch collegial bodies identified 300 boards, commissions and councils. They range from special purpose authorities to policy or supervisory boards (see Appendix C). However, for reasons discussed below, not all of them are related closely to the intent of §9-6.25 of the Code of Virginia. Consequently, criteria were developed to screen and exempt certain collegial bodies from the classification. These criteria are based on the special characteristics of each collegial body. A description of each of these criteria and excluded collegial bodies follows. A total of 65 collegial bodies are affected.

## Criteria and Exemptions

## Criterion 1

Criterion 1 exempts collegial bodies from the standard classification if they are defined as <u>independent</u> political subdivisions, foundations, councils, commissions, and/or corporations in the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. Also exempt are collegial bodies that are not listed in §§2.1-51.9, 2.1-51.15, 2.1-51.18, 2.1-51.21, 2.1-51.27, or 2.1-51.34 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u> as part of any Secretariat. Twenty-three collegial bodies qualify for exemptions under this criterion. They are:

#### Criterion 2

This criterion exempts collegial bodies from the standard classification if they are responsible to political jurisdictions other than Virginia in the areas of finance, policy development or personnel. As such, they are not subject to the exclusive control of Virginia state government. Applying this criterion, a total of 18 collegial bodies are excluded. They are:

#### Criterion 3

This criterion omits collegial bodies from the standard classification if they are created by federal law or regulation or executive discretion (i.e. no executive order). Because of these characteristics, the requirements of  $\S9-6.25$  of the  $\underline{Code}$  do not apply. Using the above criterion, eight collegial bodies are exempt. They are:

#### Criterion 5

This criterion exempts collegial bodies from the standard classification if they are inoperative. Four collegial bodies are exempt under this criterion. Although the enabling legislation for three of these collegial bodies is in the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, their duties and responsibilities have been performed by other entities. In addition, one collegial body has never been officially established. They are:

- 1. Advisory Council on the Virginia Economy
- 2. State Irish Potato Board
- 3. Virginia Fuel Commission
- 4. Virginia Poultry Products Board

#### PRINCIPLES AND DESIGNATIONS

## Overview

The 1984 legislative study of executive branch agencies recommended the development of principles for establishing the responsibilities of executive collegial bodies and the extent of their powers. This recommendation was based on the premise that a collegial body should only be given the powers needed to fulfill its duties.

Consequently, the 1985 General Assembly enacted  $\S9-6.25$  of the <u>Code</u>. This statute contains the principles used to designate the remaining 235 executive branch boards, councils and commissions (65 collegial bodies were excluded after the exemption criteria were applied).

This section discusses the principles used to define advisory, policy and supervisory classes, and assigns each collegial body to one of the three classes.

## Advisory

Under the the provisions of §9-6.25 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, an advisory board, commission or council provides advice and comment to an executive branch agency or office. The most important principle is that an advisory collegial body may recommend policy but cannot promulgate policy. Its major responsibility is to foster communication between the public and an agency. It does not promulgate regulations or make rules. Moreover, it has no management responsibility over any agency. Using this principle, there are 116 advisory collegial bodies. Arranged alphabetically by key word, they are:

#### Policy

Under the provisions of §9-6.25 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>, a policy board, commission or council has the legislative authority to promulgate public policies or regulations. Also, it is charged with adjudicating violations of state policies or regulations and with such functions as rate setting, distributing federal funds, and other activities as specified by law. A policy collegial body is not responsible for supervising agencies or employing personnel, nor is it authorized to review and comment on agency budget requests. Thus, the critical principle is that, although it is empowered to establish policies and rules that affect an agency's actions, it does not have the authority to manage an agency. Using this principle, there are 70 policy-making collegial bodies. Arranged alphabetically by keyword, they are:

# CLASSIFICATION OF EXECUTIVE BRANCH COLLEGIAL BODIES

### **IMPLEMENTATION**

As stated in the standard classification statute, the Governor is required to propose to the 1986 General Assembly implementing legislation. To comply with this requirement, proposed legislation is provided in Appendix D. Also, an executive order for assigning a category of the standard classification system to all collegial bodies established by executive order should be issued later since §9-6.25 of the <u>Code</u> allows the Governor to make those designations by July 1, 1986. This will give the Governor additional time to decide if some of the collegial bodies which will sunset on July 1, 1986 should be retained and classified.

In the 1985 Session, the General Assembly enacted legislation standardizing agency titles (Chapters 447 and 448, 1985 Acts of the Assembly). Because your agency does not readily conform with the standard nomenclature provisions of §2.1-1.2, Code of Virginia, the General Assembly requested the Governor to study your agency (along with 13 other affected state agencies) and to select one of three policy options for consideration in the 1986 Session. The three options are:

- to name your agency in conformance with §2.1-1.2 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>; or
- o to amend §2.1-1.2 to add a distinct nomenclature designation for your agency; or
- to create a distinct collegial body and administrative structure for your agency.

In order to select the most appropriate option for your agency, I am asking for your assistance. Please discuss this issue with your Board and prepare a <u>brief</u> paper addressing the following items:

- 1. Major Purpose of the Board and of the Administrative Unit
- 2. Analysis of Policy Options (short description of the advantages and disadvantages of each option based on your agency's purpose and activities)
- 3. Recommended Policy Option

The Governor's report to the General Assembly will be based on the information you provide. Please send me the briefing paper by Friday, August 2, 1985.
