## Report of The Department of Forestry

## TREE PLANTING OPPORTUNITIES ON STATE LANDS

## TO THE GOVERNOR AND THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF VIRGINIA

House Joint Resolution No. 114

#### INTRODUCTION

The 1990 General Assembly passed HJR 114 requesting "the Department of Forestry to inventory and study all state-owned property to determine the necessity, desirability, and feasibility of planting trees on such properties". State lands have been evaluated with the cooperation of the agencies, institutions and departments owning land. Planting with Department of Forestry seedlings is recommended on a total of 846 acres. In addition, the planting of 18,833 ball and burlap trees (2" to 3" Caliper) is recommended.

## 1. SUMMARY AND FINDINGS

## A. History of Tree Planting on State Lands

Enabling legislation for forest management on state lands was passed by the General Assembly in 1979 entitled the Forest Management of State-Owned Lands Fund (Title 10.1, Chapter 11 in Sections 10.1-1120 through 10.1-1123 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u>). The Fund, administered by the Department of Forestry, is self supporting and is generated from timber sales on state-owned lands. The funds generated are used on state lands to reforest unproductive woodlands, stabilize eroded areas, afforest open or abandoned fields, and provide screening, wildlife habitat and educational and recreational opportunities. Over \$500,000 of timber sale revenues in excess of project costs have been returned to the General Fund over the past 10 years.

Since 1980, 1,046 acres have been planted in trees under the State Lands Fund. An additional 444 acres have been planted by individual agencies, departments, and institutions with Department of Forestry assistance. The Virginia Department of Transportation has planted over 4 million seedlings on highway rights-of-way since the early 1960's. Table 1 in the appendix is a summary of planting accomplished with Department of Forestry assistance. Ninety percent of the tree planting on these properties (excluding highway rights-of-way) has been accomplished since 1980.

## B. Opportunities for Additional Planting on State Lands

Recommendations for additional tree planting were derived from evaluation of the significant land holding agencies/institutions/departments shown in Table 2 in the appendix. Although the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries and the Department of Conservation and Recreation are exempted from the Forest Management of State-Owned Lands Act, they have been included in this study for tree planting opportunities.

The total land ownership of these agencies/institutions/departments is approximately 342,000 acres of which approximately 221,000 acres supports forestland. Table 3 in the appendix shows a breakdown of the total state-owned acreage as obtained from the Fixed Asset Accounting and Control System Report.

Table 4 in the appendix lists the planting opportunities on state lands <u>including</u> planting recommended on the highway rights-of-way. While the area recommended for tree planting is very small compared to the total acreage of state land, it should be noted that 65% of the gross area, or 221,000 acres, is already in forestland. This percent of state-owned forested land is similar to the percent of the Commonwealth that is forested.

There are usually justified reasons for the limited areas available for additional tree planting. On most Department of Corrections (DOC) properties large areas of open space are maintained around the prison sites for security purposes. DOC also maintains about 11,000 acres of open land for cattle grazing and crop production. The new Greensville County Correctional Center includes over 500 acres of open land not needed for the facility. It is estimated that about 50 acres of this area may be planted in loblolly pine with the remaining 450 acres to be used for agriculture. A number of the mental health facilities also require relatively large open areas around the buildings for safety and security reasons. The State Parks have a need to maintain open areas for camper play grounds, view sheds, and parking. Universities and community colleges maintain large open areas for athletic fields and view sheds.

At campuses, offices and other support facilities, landscaping budgets are often slim or non-existent. Planting small seedlings, such as offered by the Department of Forestry, are unsuitable for their purposes due to heavy foot traffic, lawnmowers, etc. These areas require larger ball and burlap (B&B) stock. These trees generally cost about \$300 per tree including delivery and planting. A major benefit of trees at these sites is the energy savings in summertime air conditioning costs where mature hardwoods provide shade for buildings.

The Virginia Department of Transportation has a long history of planting trees along appropriate sections of highway rights-of-way and other land holdings. However, this agency must be concerned with public safety and maintenance requirements. Trees are planted in small open patches and strips in locations that do not interfere with driver safety, sight distance, power lines, and public and private signage. VDOT is also aware of the potential danger of planting trees where they will eventually cast shade on the driving surface which delays the drying process after rain or snow. Driver alertness and appreciation of the landscape is heightened by intermittent tree cover where open view sheds are interspersed with trees. Also, natural seeding of trees has occurred in many areas where mowing was discontinued 10 or more years ago. The right-of-way areas recommended for planting have taken these factors into consideration. These are areas where mowing has been or can be discontinued.

VDOT has entered into cooperative agreements with the Chambers of Commerce in Waynesboro, Staunton, and Lexington to landscape strategic locations on I-64 and I-81. The Waynesboro Chamber of Commerce raised funds to plant a total of 300 four-foot trees in clusters at the I-64 exits in 1989. The Staunton Chamber of Commerce will raise funds over the next several years for tree clusters at its I-64, Rt. 250 and Rt. 275 interchanges with I-81. The Lexington Chamber of Commerce is making similar plans for plantings in the I-64, Rt. 11 interchange.

## II. RECOMMENDATIONS AND/OR ACTIONS

- A. There are 846 acres identified for planting with Department of Forestry seedlings. It is recommended that 569 acres be planted with the State Lands funds, to the extent they are available. The Department of Forestry will provide the seedlings, arrange for contractors and provide supervision as needed.
- B. Of the total, 227 acres will be planted by the Department of Transportation at their expense on rights-of-way and other highway properties. Department of Forestry will provide the seedlings and whatever professional services are requested.
- C. Planting on Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, Department of Conservation and Recreation, and Department of Forestry properties will be completed at each agency's expense with Department of Forestry providing the planting stock.
- D. The expense of acquiring large, ball and burlap stock is preventing tree planting projects around facilities and other selected sites. There are likely some alternative means of

meeting needs; however, the intent of this document was to identify sites in need of tree planting. It is suggested that the Department of Forestry study opportunities to provide large tree planting stock for those sites identified in this report.

## III. SUMMARY

The passage of HJR 114 was timely and welcomed as it introduced a mechanism to review the history of the Forest Management of State-owned Lands and develop opportunities to enhance state properties with additional tree cover. The affected agencies/institutions/departments are to be commended for their support of the Resolution and assistance in identifying areas suitable for tree planting.

The summary of findings are as follows:

- 1. The Commonwealth owns approximately 342,000 acres of land of which 221,000 acres (65%) is forested.
- 2. The 1979 Forest Management of State-owned Lands program has been operated successfully (see summary in Appendix).
- Those agencies included under the program have been cooperative and supportive of the intent of the Act. Their properties have benefitted from the utilization of services offered by the Act.
- 4. The small area of recommended tree planting is an indication of the Commonwealth's and the agencies' awareness of the benefits of trees.
- 5. There is an opportunity to improve the management of existing trees and forestland, consistent with each agency's mission. This improved management could upgrade the species, the quality and general health of the trees thereby supporting the Commonwealth's philosophy of good stewardship, mitigating the possible effects of global warming, and energy conservation.
- 6. The Department of Forestry's tree nurseries can provide the majority of the planting stock needed for the proposed tree planting.
- 7. There are special needs of certain agencies/institutions which are not being met at the present time because of financial constraints. The Commonwealth has an opportunity to meet some of these special needs.
- 8. Surplus funds generated by the Forest Management of State-owned Lands have been transferred to the General Fund. A careful review of present balance will be made to determine how many trees can be planted under this program without cost to the agency. Department of Forestry, Department of Game and Inland Fisheries and Department of Conservation and Recreation are ineligible for these funds and will do the tree planting at their own expense.
- 9. At VA Tech, the removal of trees on campus has far exceeded tree replacement. This is likely happening at other campuses but was not confirmed in this study. VA Tech is attempting to start their own arboretum for tree replacement on campus and a teaching facility for forestry and horticulture students. This is an excellent and creative method to save money, accomplish a purpose, and enhance their educational opportunities.
