Preface

Authority Directing the Study

The 1995 Virginia Acts of Assembly, Chapter 853 at page 92, provides:

The Virginia Port Authority shall prepare a report comparing the cost and benefits of continuing to provide an in-house security force with the costs and benefits of security provided by the private sector. The report shall be submitted to the Governor, Secretary of Commerce and Trade, and the Chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees by October 1, 1995.

Staff Assigned

Virginia Port Authority (VPA) staff who worked on the study include the Chief of the Port Police, other senior port police personnel, and VPA's General Counsel/Deputy Executive Director for Operations. In addition, previous studies of the Port Police conducted by the Westinghouse Corporation, Research Management Associates, and the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services were extensively relied upon.

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Executive Summary

The study concludes that there is only one advantage-- short-term cost--of having security on the VPA's marine terminals provided by the private sector as opposed to the security and law enforcement provided by the VPA's certified, sworn police force.

The personnel cost of the VPA Police Department is approximately \$2.6 million annually. It is estimated that private, now-sworn security guards could be employed at a cost of approximately \$2 million annually.

However, there are a number of benefits associated with the VPA Police which are well worth the additional expense inherent is a fully-certified, sworn police agency as opposed to private security guards.

In 1994, general cargo valued at approximately \$24.6 billion crossed the Virginia Port Authority's docks. Losses to thefts were \$10 thousand. It is believed that figure constitutes the lowest pilferage rate of any port in the world and is directly attributable to the presence of a professional, certified police force. In addition, since 1990, VPA Police have seized more than 237 pounds of cocaine (hidden in international containers) with a street value of more than \$6.6 million.

In 1994, the VPA Police responded to and investigated 70 traffic accidents, 200 accidents involving industrial equipment, and 626 reports of damage to property. Without a VPA Police Department, many of those incidents would have to be investigated by the Virginia State Police.

Previous independent studies, cited in the report, have consistently called for a professional police force. The rationale for that view remains persuasive.

Professionalization of the VPA Police Department

As a result of the continued and on-going professionalization¹ of the VPA Police Department, the Commonwealth's port facilities are relatively crime-free. Indeed, it is believed that the Port of Virginia's pilferage rate is the lowest of any port in the world. In 1994, the value of the general cargo passing over the VPA's docks was approximately \$24.6 billion and losses to theft were \$10,000. Such results are not an anomaly. Similar results have been consistently achieved by the VPA Police Department over the past decade. The Port of Virginia's extremely low pilferage rate is highlighted in the port's marketing efforts. Furthermore, since 1990, VPA Police have seized more than 237 pounds of cocaine with a street value of more than \$6.6 million.

Hampton Roads ports came under the umbrella of the Commonwealth of Virginia in 1972, which resulted in a need to merge existing law enforcement agencies into a single police department. Prior to that time, Norfolk International Terminals and Portsmouth Marine Terminal had established police forces; however, they differed in their philosophies toward cargo protection. Lambert's Point Docks and Sewell's Point Docks had private security guards operating at their terminals, and Newport News Marine Terminal had its own security system with its police officers employed by the Railroad and divided internally between patrolmen and watchmen.

In 1973, the Westinghouse Corporation conducted a study which primarily addressed the physical security of the ports. After a careful study of the cargo security needs of the Ports of Hampton Roads, the study strongly recommended that a centralized governmental police force be established by the Virginia Port Authority for improved cargo protection at the terminals surveyed. The study said that a centralized police force would provide:

- Needed flexibility in assignment of officers between the terminals, with a resultant economy over appointing a separate police force for each terminal.
- A central investigative unit.

Among the Department's three Command personnel are a former Captain and Commander of Investigative Operations, Newport News Police Department; a former Captain and Commander of Patrol Operations, New Haven, Connecticut Police Department; and a VPA Police Captain who is one of the highest ranking female police officers in the Commonwealth. The Chief of Police reports to the VPA's General Counsel and Deputy Executive Director for Operations, who is himself a former Richmond Police Lieutenant who holds a Masters Degree in the Administration of Justice and Public Safety in addition to a law degree.

- Uniform police qualifications, procedures and techniques.
- A uniform loss reporting system.

However, into the late 1970's and early 1980's, the VPA Police Department remained little more than a guard service. During that period crime was so rampant on the docks that a grand jury investigation resulted in 50 indictments and newspaper articles referred to a prostitution and drug problem of significant proportions on the Commonwealth's facilities. In response, the General Assembly formed the Ports Security Subcommittee of the Virginia Ports and Port Authority Study Commission and that body called for a restructuring and professionalization of the VPA Police Department. Those recommendations were echoed in a 1982 study conducted by the Virginia Department of Justice and Crime Prevention.

Recognizing the importance of Hampton Roads port facilities to the commercial and defense posture of the country, the study undertook to define the mission of the VPA Police, and to improve management of police operations at Virginia's ports. Further, realizing that the Virginia Port Authority had the responsibility to provide facility users with a level of service and support that promotes and is responsive to the legitimate ends of business, the study recommended joint cooperation and responsibility with other law enforcement agencies in combating waterfront related crime.

The study further recommend centralization of police functions, and stated that the VPA Police were the most visible aspect of the Commonwealth in controlling the port.

In October 1983, a "Manpower and Operational Study of the Virginia Port Authority Police Force" was completed by Research Management Associates of Alexandria, Virginia. This study recommended a centralized communications system for all terminals, monitoring of alarms and other security systems at the terminals, access to state and federal systems for vehicle registration, wanted persons, stolen property and other information. Further, it recommended that the VPA Police Department have complete responsibility for the issuance, suspension, and revocation of terminal decals.

Recognizing that VPA Police Officers have exactly the same training as municipal officers, the study recommended a uniform set of rules and regulations for all terminals, and the clarification of the role of the VPA Police force in terms of a law enforcement orientation. Further, the study recommended development of crime prevention programs which could be carried out by the police force officers.

All studies pointed to the magnitude of the port business in dealing with international trade, and the billions of dollars worth of cargo moving through the ports. Further, the studies pointed to the significance of the cargo handling equipment and the

industrial setting of the terminal operating business. They recognized the importance of police presence in dealing with members of the International Longshoremen's Association, tenants, importers and exporters, stevedoring companies, shipping lines, and management of the terminals. Careful analyses pointed to ways to improve the services of the police department and better ways to utilize manpower, but not one study even hinted at replacing VPA's police force with private sector security guards.

Services Provided by Port Police

The Virginia Port Authority Police Department has a total authorized strength of 71 personnel. This figure represents 66 sworn police officers, three civilian dispatchers and two secretaries. The total FY96 budget for the department is \$2,762,918. (Appendix B.)

The mission of the Virginia Port Authority Police Department is to facilitate the lawful flow of commerce through the Virginia Port Authority marine terminals of Hampton Roads; to safeguard life and protect property, and to maintain law and order at those facilities.

Duties of, and services provided by, the VPA Police include:

- * Check all cargo/documents leaving terminals.
- * Check all access to terminals by visitors, employees, labor, etc.
- * Conduct traffic control of commercial vehicles and POV'S.
- * Provide documentation of vessel movement to minimize losses in reference to pier damage.
- * Provide patrols to prevent thefts, increase safety and respond to incidents.
- * Respond to investigate crime, accidents and HAZMAT incidents.
- * Enforce traffic rules and regulations.
- * Provide escorts in industrial complex so as to prevent accidents.
- * Provide security for special cargo shipments, i.e., nuclear for DOE, NRC, missiles for DOD.
- * Provide security and traffic control at cruise vessel operations.
- * Provide First Aid/CPR as first responders to accidents/injuries. (Trained and certified annually).
- * Provide emergency transport of sick and injured.
- * Provide crowd control and enforcement during Teamsters, Longshore (ILA), Railroad and other organized labor disputes and strikes.
- * Establish and maintain port community relations providing a professional image which enhances agency's marketing objective.
- * Interact/provide investigative assistance to local police departments (Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Newport News), U. S. Customs, Immigration and other federal and state agencies.
- * Provide 24-hour communications services to port community for business purposes, emergencies.
- * Recovery of stolen vehicles from port facilities.
- * Stowaways (illegal immigrants), located and detained, and turned over to U. S. Immigration.

- * Assault investigation/prosecution.
- * Drug interdiction recoveries made.
- * DUI arrests/prosecution.
- * Shootings.
- * Criminal Information Network capabilities to assist personnel in investigations of all types.
- * Proper handling of juveniles.
- * Provide computerized incident report information to several aspects of the port community to help in detecting patterns and developing leads that would aid investigations and increase safety within the port community.
- * Respond to and investigate the following:

Accidents and motor vehicle violations

Alcohol related incidents

Animal related incidents

Assaults

Bomb threats

Bribery Burglary Deaths

Fire/Arson related incidents

Forgery Fraud

Gambling Hazards

Industrial Equipment Accidents

Injuries/Illnesses

Larcenies

Missing Persons Narcotics and Drugs Property Damage

Robbery Sex offenses

Thefts

Traffic warnings

Vandalism

Vessel movements Wanted persons Weapons/Firearms

VPA Police Efficiency

The VPA Police Department has achieved its remarkable record of success while undergoing a significant downsizing. The result is a cost-effective force.

In 1981, general cargo tonnage through the Port of Virginia totaled 3,355,768 tons. In FY 1995, that tonnage had increased dramatically to 8,735,924 tons. Yet, Police Authorized Strength was, and is, as follows:

Survey of Other Port Authorities

The 15 largest ports in the United States were surveyed in order to determine whether or not sworn police officers were utilized:

- 1. Port of Los Angeles Sworn Port Authority Police Officers
- 2. Port of Long Beach Sworn Port Authority Police Officers

Comparison-VPA Police vs. Private Security Guards

The VPA Police Department's FY-96 Budget is at Appendix B. As can be seen, of the total \$2,762,918 budget, personnel costs account for \$2,590,268. or 94%³.

Private security guards could be employed at a lower cost. Two entities (those in the area with operations most similar to VPA's, although still very different) were contacted to arrive at an estimated cost of private security guards. Those entities were the Norfolk Naval Shipyard and NASA.

The annual cost of 70 private security guards at NSS is approximately \$2,000,000. (However, it should be noted that NSS employs some 90 sworn police officers as well.)

The annual cost of 40 unionized contract security guards at NASA is approximately \$1,000,000.

The Norfolk Naval Shipvard

Bill Kieran, Security Management, Norfolk Naval Shipyard, Portsmouth, Virginia, was interviewed regarding NNS' use of contract security guards in lieu of police personnel.

The Naval Shipyard currently employees 90 Department of Defense Police Officers. They are full-time federal government employees with GS ratings 4 and 5. They receive four weeks basic training and 40 hours annual in-service training. The police officers are armed. Their duties include traffic control within the facility and immediately outside the facility, mobile patrol, gate duty at controlled industrial areas within the shipyard and special security duties such as nuclear shipments, hazardous materials etc.

The shipyard also contracts for 70 security guards, currently through MDM Security. Contracts for these individuals are bid with the federal government. The security guards are supervised by a site manager employed by MDM Security and it is his/her responsibility to ensure that the shipyard's manpower requirements are met. The contract guards' duties include manning the shipyards' perimeter gates and screening persons desiring entrance to the facility. The current annual contract cost for the security guards is \$2 million.

³ Through the downsizing which has been noted, VPA has reduced its police personnel costs (between 1981 and July 1995 and calculated in constant '95 dollars) by almost \$1 million.

NASA

NASA Deputy Security Director, Mike Rammel, was interviewed regarding their use of contract security personnel at the NASA facility in Hampton, Virginia. He advised the following:

NASA utilizes 40 contract security personnel that perform various functions. They are employees of Mason and Hanger Services, Inc. The current contract with NASA is for \$1,000,000.00 per year.

Security guards' duties include gate duty, mobile patrol and responding to alarms. There are 120 alarm circuits at the NASA facility which are monitored by dispatchers. All security personnel are unionized and members of the United Plant Guard Workers of America. Security guards also issue parking tickets. This is an in-house program that uses a point system rather than charging fines. Hampton Police Department responds when it becomes necessary to make arrests.

There are of course differences in the type of operations existing at NSS, NASA, and the facilities of the Virginia Port Authority.

As previously noted, \$24.6 billion in general cargo passed through the Port of Virginia in 1994. Much of that cargo is the form of consumer goods such as, for example, electronic equipment. Indeed, it is not unusual for a single container (and more than 500,000 containers a year transit VPA facilities) to hold merchandise valued in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. Those goods are better safeguarded by sworn, dedicated police officers rather than private security guards who are being paid little more than the minimum page. (Certainly, there are competent, dedicated security professionals in the private sector. However, to obtain personnel of that quality requires compensation and benefits approaching those paid to sworn police officers.)

VPA Police monitored almost 5,000 vessel movements.

The services performed by the VPA Police have been previously noted in the "Services Provided by Port Police Section" of this report. Many of those functions simply cannot be performed by private security guards. Without a VPA Police Department, many of those duties would have to be performed by the Virginia State Police. For example, in 1994 the VPA Police investigated 70 traffic accidents, 200 accidents involving industrial equipment, and 626 reports of damage to property.

Conclusion

While short term savings in the neighborhood of \$600,000 annually could be realized by replacing VPA Police Officers with private security guards, such a step would be the antithesis of the recommendations of a number of previous studies conducted by independent entities.

The success of the Port of Virginia rests in no small part on its well-earned reputation as a crime-free port with a pilferage rate so low that it cannot be articulated.

In addition, the VPA Police perform a number of functions that simply <u>require</u> sworn police officers. If the Port Police are eliminated, those burdens will have to be borne by the Virginia State Police. Thus, any short-term savings may quickly evaporate.

Addendum

VPA Police Study Prepared Pursuant to Chapter 853 at page 92, 1995 Virginia Acts of Assembly

October 25, 1995

Although it is believed that the Port of Virginia has the lowest pilferage rate of any port in the world, direct comparisons are difficult because of the reluctance of competing ports to release negative information since in large ports other than Virginia, losses to theft constitute a major problem. However, a report on maritime security undertaken by the Maritime Administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation which was distributed after the date for submission of this study contained the following information:

"The Port of Miami has incurred cargo-theft-related losses in excess of \$150 million during some years."

"Among its various forms, theft through fraudulent documentation causes the highest loss rate."

The report also estimated that in New York/New Jersey, losses to theft were between \$500,000 and \$8 million per day. Thus, a comparison of the Port of Virginia with those two ports reveals the following:
