The report contained herein is pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 157 and House Joint Resolution 260, agreed to by the 2000 General Assembly.

This report provides an update on the creation of the Virginia Center for Community Health (Center). The development of the Center was a primary recommendation from the Virginia Turning Point initiative, a strategic planning effort aimed at strengthening public health in the 21st century.

Turning Point brought together representatives from a variety of sectors essential to improving the health of Virginians. Their vision was the creation of an autonomous not-for-profit organization that could sustain the public-private partnership gains made through Turning Point and seeks to support and strengthen community health improvement efforts around the Commonwealth.

Enclosed, please find a short summary of the efforts to formulate a vision, mission and values as well as specific projects we hope to accomplish in the first year. In addition, we have engaged pro bono legal counsel to guide the Center through the incorporation process at the state and federal level.

Networking, Coordinating, Cooperating, Collaborating

Senate Joint Resolution 157 and House Joint Resolution 260 requested that the Governor, with the support and assistance from participants in the Virginia Turning Point initiative, to encourage and facilitate the development of a Virginia Center for Community Health between the public and private sector.

Membership

Purpose

The following statements capsulate the Board members' opinions regarding the role of the Virginia Center for Community Health.

Draft Vision

Communities exercising abundant opportunities to create a healthier Commonwealth.

Draft Mission

Facilitating practical solutions for today's and tomorrow's health problems in the Commonwealth.

Draft Values

- 1. Quality The Virginia Center for Community Health will strive for excellence in all we do.
- 2. Prevention We will focus on deliverables/activities that maximize our potential to avert health problems.
- 3. Leadership We recognize that the acceleration of change demands strong vision and resolve to impact health.
- 4. Efficiency We believe that health care resources must be allocated and applied effectively.
- 5. Community We will foster innovation by connecting grass roots initiatives.
- 6. Collaboration We consider broad participation across sectors crucial.
- 7. Resources We will identify diverse sources of funding to sustain community health improvement initiatives.

Incorporation

The Virginia Center for Community Health initially obtained legal counsel from a member organization, the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association. It was determined that the services of an attorney who specialized in incorporation would be beneficial to the interests of the organization. Pro bono legal counsel was secured from a major Richmond-area law firm. The Center and its agent are currently in the process of preparing the necessary state and federal documents to register as a not-for-profit corporation within the Commonwealth of Virginia. Because there is no guarantee that the name Virginia Center for Community Health is currently available, the Board of Trustees has indicated a willingness to look at other possibilities for a formal name for the organization.

Projects

Board members agreed that the development of a website to provide technical assistance and link community health improvement initiatives was a critical first step for the organization. A consultant has been retained to conduct a comprehensive survey to identify existing community health improvement efforts as well as level of interest for technical assistance topics. This information will be used to focus the development of a website. Implementation is expected Summer 2001.

The Center also agreed to participate in the Healthy Virginians 2010, linked to Healthy People 2010, the national health improvement initiative. A committee has been formed to assist the State Health Commissioner in articulating a vision for the Commonwealth.

Administrative

The Board of Trustees is in the process of developing a set of by-laws and has agreed to meet quarterly. Co-Chairs have been identified that are reflective of the public-private partnership that the Center hopes to promote. Currently, the Turning Point Coordinator and Turning Point Assistant as well as officials from the Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association and the Virginia Department of Health staff the Board. Initial funding has been earmarked from the Turning Point implementation budget, supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. The Board of Trustees has set sustainability for the organization as a priority and stable funding is a key element of that strategy.
