Pursuant to Chapter 585 (HB 887) and Chapter 619 (SB 426), enclosed is the quarterly report for the quarter ending June 2005 for children and adolescents not admitted to acute psychiatric inpatient care or residential treatment.

As noted in previous correspondences, the Department would like to seek legislation in FY2006 to remove this requirement from the *Code of Virginia* based on the fact that the information is not beneficial to the system in addressing residential beds for children.
