Authority for the Report

Section 22.1-254 of the *Code of Virginia*, authorizes school boards to allow the fulfillment of compulsory attendance requirements by any student who is 16 years of age and for whom an Individual Student Alternative Education Plan (ISAEP) is developed. As required by the *Code*, the Virginia Board of Education has developed guidelines associated with the ISAEP program. The ISAEP must conform to these guidelines, to include:

- (1) Career guidance counseling;
- (2) Mandatory enrollment and attendance in a General Educational Development (GED) preparatory program or other alternative education program approved by the local school board;
- (3) Counseling on the economic impact of failing to complete high school; and
- (4) Procedures for reenrollment in school.

Item 135 of the Appropriation Act, Chapter 3, 2006 Acts of Assembly, requires the Department of Education to monitor the implementation of this program, now called the Individual Student Alternative Education Plan (ISAEP) program, and to provide annual reports to the General Assembly.

Historical Review of the ISAEP Program

The legislation that created the ISAEP program became law on July 1, 1999. In the months that followed, the Board of Education developed guidelines for the program, and the Department of Education established a process for funding local programs and assisted school divisions in developing program components. The first program year was viewed as successful by school divisions, even though it was only a few months in duration. Year two (2000-2001) involved technical assistance visits and regional training primarily to address the planned changeover to a new series of the Tests of General Educational Development (GED) that occurred in January 2002. During 2001-2002, the ISAEP program was characterized by continued technical assistance site visits and training, with increased emphasis on the career and technical education component. Career and technical education benchmarks were established, and three options for career preparation were added to the 2002-2003 ISAEP application. During 2002-2003, the Board of Education guidelines for ISAEP programs were revised to reflect score requirement changes resulting from the release of the 2002 series of the Tests of General Educational Development (GED). The new career and technical education benchmarks were also included in the revised guidelines.

State Administrative Activities during the Sixth Year of the Program

During 2005-2006, state staff continued conducting technical assistance site visits to selected programs. Technical assistance and monitoring activities focused on increasing the use of technology to support assessment and instructional activities that prepare

students for the 21st century workforce. Professional development focused on strategies for developing effective counseling and transition in programs, effective programs that demonstrated results, and effective strategic instruction for the special needs population.

The following events reflect activities during the sixth year of the ISAEP program (July 1, 2005-June 30, 2006):

- The Department of Education allocated \$2,184,711 in funds to school divisions, ranging from \$7,859 to \$102,162 per grant. Local programs used grant monies to purchase materials and technology for instruction and to secure personnel. The statewide average per-pupil expenditure was \$409, an increase of nine percent over those costs for 2004-2005. See Appendix A for per-pupil costs by school division.
- Three school divisions began ISAEP programs for the first time while seven school divisions chose not to apply for state ISAEP program funds for the 2005-2006 school year. These seven identified one of the following reasons: (1) they had a locally developed alternative education program functioning; (2) the ISAEP program did not meet their needs; or (3) they wanted to explore the ISAEP program at a later date.
- Department of Education staff attended ISAEP student recognition ceremonies and GED graduations (July 2005-June 2006).


Local Program Data, 2005-2006

In May 2006, the Department of Education refined the ISAEP's data collection form completed by participating school divisions. The form redefined survey criteria from "students served" to "students enrolled." In addition, data were requested through a pencil and paper report form issued by the GED Testing Service of the American Council on Education¹. These data were aggregated with other information collected throughout the 2005-2006 school year. The data highlight student participation rates, the number of students earning the GED credential, student demographics, program profiles, and per-pupil costs. Responses were received from all programs that participated in 2005-2006.

In these two surveys the programs were asked to provide quantitative data pertaining to age, gender, and ethnicity of participants. Also, they were asked to describe their respective program in qualitative terms, including information about student/teacher ratios, program selection criteria, career counseling and preparation activities, instructional methodologies, curriculum, enrollment, and completion data.

¹ GED Testing Service requires a completed *GED Option Report* as a condition of approval to allow the GED Tests to be administered to students between the ages of 16 and 18 years. Only nine states in the nation have approved GED Option programs. Virginia was the first state to receive this approval.

Participation in ISAEP



Figure 1 illustrates a 68 percent increase in the number of students with an ISAEP since the first full year of implementation of the program.

Age and Gender of Participants

School divisions reported that 5,345 students between the ages of 16 and 18 years qualified for an ISAEP program. This represents a slight decrease of nine percent from the 2004-2005 school year. The percentage of 16-year-old students with an ISAEP represents 32 percent of the total ISAEP student enrollment, 17-year-old students represent 50 percent, and 18-year-old students represent the remaining 17 percent of the student population.



Figure 2 provides a breakdown of ISAEP participants by age. During the 2005-2006 school year fewer 18-year-olds remained in the program to earn a GED credential.

Gender enrollment in the ISAEP program for 2005-2006 reflects that 58 percent (3,090) of the students were male while 42 percent were female (2,255). See Appendix B for age and gender enrollment by school division.

Ethnicity of Participants



Figure 3 provides a breakdown of participation rates based on ethnicity. The rate of participation by selected ethnic groups in 2005-2006 changed moderately from 2004-2005.

Participation by African-American students decreased by three percent from 30 percent to 27 percent; participation by White students increased from 64 percent to 65 percent; participation by Hispanic students increased by one percent from five percent to six percent; and other ethnicities increased from one percent to two percent. Figure 4 provides a breakdown of ISAEP participants by reason for enrollment. School divisions reported that seventy-nine percent of the students enrolled due to academic reasons. Thirteen percent of the students enrolled due to disciplinary reasons. Five percent of the students enrolled due to being overage, and three percent enrolled due to other reasons. Major Focus for 2006-2007

In the coming school year, the major focus of the Department of Education’s technical assistance will be to:

- Help programs improve academic and career preparation of ISAEP students;
- Provide assistance in developing high quality effective programs that demonstrate results;
- Help programs improve reporting for formative and summative evaluation purposes; and
- Ensure fair and equitable access to the ISAEP program for all students.
