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


A Word from the Director...

The Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) came into existence in 1990 (our original agency name was the Department of Youth and Family Services). Prior to that time, juveniles who were involved in the justice system were served by a division within the Virginia Department of Corrections, whose primary responsibilities were housing and supervising adult offenders. The need to focus on the unique issues presented by juvenile offenders resulted in legislation to create this agency.

Although this agency has had changes in leadership through the years, there has been no change in the commitment of the professionals who manage and provide services to Virginia's youth. It has been through these positions in our institutions, community based units, and support offices, that we have used innovative and creative approaches, and in doing so have been able to make many good things happen and we are often referenced by other states seeking improved ways of serving their juvenile justice constituents.

Many agencies operate innovative programs that are well thought out and address known needs. But many such programs languish, or fail to generate support in the executive and legislative branches of their governments, primarily because there are insufficient data to measure the scope of the needs, or to document the results of the programs. In this area, Virginia excels.

For the past four years, DJJ staff have worked together to generate, validate, and analyze the information reflected in this document. As you can see, we are able to produce detailed depictions of the juveniles we serve, and of the programs that serve them. This could not be accomplished without dedicated staff who developed and maintain the automated systems that allow us to capture, store and analyze large amounts of information. Many members of the DJJ family generate and enter data into our systems and are able to share and use that information to determine the most appropriate services and placements for our youth. We can provide information to the courts, to local agencies that serve the same children, and can document who is served by taxpayer funded programs, and whether those programs are achieving their stated goals.

In the end, we must be held accountable for the jobs we do and the funds that we receive from our citizens. By utilizing the information in this document, we can help ourselves to assess what we do, and can provide the same data to others who want to help address issues surrounding juvenile delinquency. Information is not worth much if it is not seen. This publication helps to clarify the Commonwealth of Virginia's young people.

I would like to thank the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for grant funding that helped us publish this tool and guide. I would also like to recognize the Research and Evaluation Section which put in many hours analyzing and organizing the data, and writing the narratives that appear here.

Terms and Concepts

Adjudicatory Hearing: a hearing on merits where innocence or guilt is determined. Witnesses and testimony are presented, similar to a trial.

Behavioral Services Unit (BSU): located in the juvenile correctional centers (JCCs) and at the Reception and Diagnostic Center (RDC). In addition to traditional psychological evaluations and individual and group therapy, BSU currently operates Sex OffenderTreatment programs in several JCCs, and oversees substance abuse treatment services. Staff consists of psychologists, clinical social workers, and clerical support.

Blended Sentence: the sentencing option of combining a juvenile disposition with an adult sentence for a juvenile convicted as an adult in Circuit Court. For a juvenile convicted of a violent juvenile felony in Circuit Court, *COV* §16.1-272 allows the Circuit Court to impose an adult sentence and allow a portion of that sentence to be served in a juvenile correctional center in accordance with *COV* §16.1-285.1. *COV* §16.1-272 also provides that the adult sentence can be suspended pending successful completion of the juvenile disposition.

Certification: a process for automatically transferring a juvenile 14 years of age or older to be tried as an adult in Circuit Court when there is probable cause that the juvenile committed a violent juvenile felony. There are two types: (1) If a juvenile is accused of certain serious felonies, the case will be automatically certified to the Circuit Court if the Juvenile and Domestic Relations judge finds probable cause that the act was committed; (2) If a juvenile is accused of other serious felonies, the case is certified to the Circuit Court if the Commonwealth's Attorney files a motion for a preliminary hearing on probable cause, and the judge finds probable cause. Any juvenile convicted in Circuit Court after certification will be treated as an adult in all future criminal cases.

CHINS: a Child in Need of Services is a child whose behavior, conduct, or condition presents or results in a serious threat to the well-being and physical safety of that child. A Child in Need of Services may also include a child under the age of 14 who presents a serious threat to the well-being and physical safety of another person. To meet the definition of CHINS, there must be a clear and substantial danger to the life or health of the child or another person.

CHINSup: a Child in Need of Supervision is one who is habitually and without justification absent from school despite opportunity and reasonable efforts to keep him/her in school. CHINSup may also refer to a child who habitually runs away from his or her family or lawful custodian, or who escapes from a residential care court placement.

Commitment: an order by a judge at the dispositional hearing that transfers a delinquent juvenile's legal custody to the Department of

Juvenile Justice (DJJ). To be eligible for commitment, a juvenile must be 11 years of age or older and adjudicated delinquent or convicted of a felony offense, a Class 1 misdemeanor and a prior felony, or four Class 1 misdemeanors. Depending on the circumstances, the court may commit the juvenile for a determinate or an indeterminate period of time. (See *COV* §16.1-278.8).

Commitment versus Admission: a commitment is a court action placing a juvenile in the custody of DJJ for placement in a JCC or a private secure facility. An admission occurs when a juvenile physically arrives at a facility and is officially entered into the facility's rolls. An admission to RDC may occur days or weeks after the juvenile is committed to DJJ (during which time he or she is in secure detention). A single admission could be the result of multiple commitments to DJJ (for example, a juvenile may be committed to DJJ by more than one District Court, prior to admission to RDC). For these reasons, the number of commitments to DJJ in a fiscal year will be slightly different from the number of admissions to RDC.

Court Service Unit (CSU): the Department's major provider of services (intake, investigations and reports, probation, parole, counseling, and other related services) within the community.

Code of Virginia (COV): legal code of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Detention: placement in a secure facility resulting in a loss of physical freedom.

Detention Assessment Instrument (DAI): detention screening tool used by CSU intake officers to guide detention decisions using objective criteria. A copy of the DAI is included in Appendix K.

Detention Hearing: judicial hearing held within 72 hours of initial custody that determines a youth's proper detention status while awaiting an adjudicatory hearing. The court may subpoen witnesses to assist in determining probable cause.

Detention Home: temporary secure holding facility for serious juvenile offenders awaiting an adjudicatory hearing or placement in a community program. Detention homes may incarcerate juveniles both prior to trial and as a dispositional alternative. A juvenile can be held for no longer than 21 days prior to the adjudicatory hearing without good cause. A juvenile can be held no longer than 30 days following the adjudicatory hearing pending the dispositional hearing. A juvenile can be incarcerated in a post-dispositional program for either up to 30 days or up to 6-months.

Detention Placements versus Detention Admissions: a detention placement is based on a decision made by an intake officer or judge to detain a juvenile. A detention admission is when a juvenile enters a facility either through direct placement or through transfer. Therefore, during one detention placement, a juvenile may have several detention admissions.

Determinate Commitment: ruling by a judge, pursuant to *COV*§16.1-285.1, who retains control over the commitment time of a juvenile who



committed a serious offense. The judge specifies an exact time period for commitment. The juvenile comes under judicial review after a two-year period. If not released, the youth then has an annual hearing before the judge who made the initial commitment.

Dispositional Hearing: a hearing in a juvenile case (similar to a sentencing hearing in a criminal court) that determines the proper path for treatment services and sanctions.

Diversion: a juvenile offender is diverted out of the official court process, and the case is handled informally.

Domestic Relations: all references to this term include both domestic relations as well as child welfare.

Fiscal Year: time period measured for this report as FY 2005 (July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005).

Group Home: a program that provides a residential placement in a non-secure environment. Services may include: residential care; group, family, and individual counseling; assessment and anger management; life skills; recreation; educational support; etc. Placements can be pre- or post-dispositional.

Halfway House: transitional residential placement for juveniles on parole that provides services such as independent living skills, employment skills, and work experience.

Indeterminate Commitment: a ruling by a judge giving the Director of DJJ the authority to determine how long the juvenile will remain committed. There are parameters for this commitment such as the juvenile's 21st birthday, a 36-month statutory maximum length of stay (LOS) for all offenses except murder or manslaughter (*COV* §16.1-285), and DJJ's policy.

Informal Diversion: at the time that a complaint is made to an intake officer, the officer must determine whether to act upon the complaint informally or to initiate formal court action. For lesser offenses, the officer may elect informal diversion. With informal diversion, the intake officer's powers are commensurate with those that would be used by the judge. The intake officer must develop a diversion plan that exhausts all community resources including restitution and community service. The juvenile and his/her parents must agree to this plan. Informal supervision is limited to 90 days.

Intake Case: an occurrence of a juvenile being brought before a CSU for one or more alleged violations of law. This process of initial acceptance and screening is used to determine appropriateness of release or referral to formal action via petition. An intake officer at the CSU decides which path the case will follow. One case can involve multiple intake complaints. May be referred to simply as an "intake."

Intake Complaint: the specific violation of law that a juvenile is alleged to have committed.

Juvenile Correctional Center (JCC): a facility for juveniles committed to state care where juveniles receive 24-hour supervision, education, treatment services, recreational services, and a variety of special programs.

Length of Stay Guidelines (LOS): a framework established by the Board of Juvenile Justice, as mandated by law, to determine how long indeterminately committed juveniles will remain in the custody of the Department. Factors that affect a ward's length of stay include the seriousness of the offense, the juvenile's history of offense behavior, the juvenile's behavior while in direct care, and the juvenile's progress toward completing treatment goals. (See Appendix E).

Parole: continued supervision and monitoring of an individual after release from commitment in a JCC or a privately contracted facility.

Petition: a document filed with the court by the intake officer alleging that a juvenile is delinquent, a child in need of services, supervision, or for domestic purposes and asking that the court assume jurisdiction over the juvenile.

Post-disposition (Post-D): the period of time between the final disposition and final release from supervision.

Post-dispositional Detention: the juvenile court's dispositional option of placing a juvenile in a secure local detention facility for up to 30 days or for up to six months. To be eligible for post-dispositional detention, a juvenile must be 14 years of age or older and found to have committed an offense punishable by confinement in a state or local correctional facility as defined in *COV* §53.1-1. Offenses confineable in a local or state correctional facility include felonies and Class 1 and Class 2 misdemeanors. In addition, *COV* §16.1-284.1 and §16.1-292 provide additional statutory criteria that need to be satisfied prior to placement.

Post-dispositional Detention with Programs versus Postdispositional Detention without Programs: post-dispositional detention with programs involves structured programs of treatment and services given to youth who have been sentenced by a judge. Programs are typically designed for 180 days and are intended to maintain and/or build community ties. Post-dispositional detention without programs involves the sentencing of a juvenile by a judge to a detention facility for short periods of time without full services being provided.

Pre-disposition (Pre-D): the period of time from when charges are filed until the court makes a final disposition.

Pre-disposition Report: document prepared by a probation officer in preparation for a dispositional hearing that considers the court history of the juvenile, physical or mental examinations, the juvenile's family, and previous contact with other agencies. It assists the court in selecting the most appropriate dispositional sanctions and services.



Pre-dispositional Detention: confinement in a secure residential placement while a juvenile is awaiting a court disposition. To be eligible to be detained prior to disposition, the judge, intake officer, or a magistrate must find probable cause establishing that the juvenile committed a Class 1 misdemeanor or a felony. In addition, the juvenile must be a clear and substantial threat to another person, the property of others, or to himself. *COV* §16.1-248.1 provides additional circumstances in which a juvenile may be detained.

Private Provider: company or non-state entity that is under contract with DJJ to provide direct-care residential beds and treatment services for committed youth.

Probation: alternative to commitment that requires a specified level of supervision for juveniles who remain in the community.

Reception and Diagnostic Center (RDC): location to which committed juveniles are initially sent after the dispositional hearing and preceding placement in a JCC.

Recidivism: as defined by DJJ, a recidivist is a person who is found by a court to have committed, after being (a) placed on probation or (b) released from confinement, a delinquent or criminal act other than violation of probation or parole. (See also Reoffending).

Region: in order to better manage the use of community resources statewide, the Department divides Virginia into three geographical Regions: Region I (Western), Region II (Northern), and Region III (Eastern). See page 19 for a description of the three Regions.

Reoffending (Measures of): three measures used in this document are: (1) **Rearrest**- a petition filed at intake for a new delinquent complaint or an adult arrest for a new criminal offense; (2) **Reconviction**- a guilty adjudication for a delinquent or criminal offense, which is the only measure of reoffending that meets the Department's definition of recidivism; (3) **Reincarceration**- any return to incarceration in a JCC or adult facility after having been previously released from a JCC.

Risk Assessment Instrument: tool used to identify juveniles at risk for reoffending. (See Appendix H).

Serious Juvenile Offender: a ward who was committed to the Department and given a determinate commitment as a serious offender under *COV* §16.1-285.1.

Shelter Care: detainment option that provides non-secure detention. Juvenile is placed in a group home or under foster care with no form of physical imprisonment.

Status Offense: an act prohibited by law that would not be an offense if committed by an adult. (See also CHINS/CHINSup).

Temporary Detention: transfer to a mental health facility from a JCC. This decision is made by a judge following a recommendation

from the BSU that treatment for an acute mental health condition is needed.

Transfer: a means of moving a case from Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court to Circuit Court. Applicable when a juvenile 14 or older is accused of a felony other than those warranting certification or if the Commonwealth's Attorney decides not to seek certification to Circuit Court and files papers requesting a transfer. In order to transfer a case to the Circuit Court, a transfer hearing must be held during which a judge must determine that the act would be a felony if committed by an adult and must also examine issues of competency and the juvenile's history. Any juvenile convicted in Circuit Court after transfer will be treated as an adult in all future criminal cases.

Violent Juvenile Felony: any of the delinquent acts enumerated in subsection B or C of *COV* §16.1-269.1 when committed by a juvenile 14 years of age or older. The offenses generally fall into the categories of murder, felonious injury by mob, abduction, malicious wounding, malicious wounding of a law enforcement officer, felonious poisoning, adulteration of products, robbery, carjacking, rape, forcible sodomy, or sexual object penetration. (See *COV* §16.1-228 for definition).

Waiver: a request initiated by the juvenile, 14 years or older (and a guardian), prior to the adjudicatory hearing that seeks to waive the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court and have the case transferred to the Circuit Court. (Pursuant to *COV* §16.1-270).

Ward: a juvenile that has been committed to the DJJ to serve a sentence.

Weekender: a juvenile sentenced by a judge to serve a certain number of days in detention, typically served on weekends. The juvenile remains in school during the week and, typically, enters the detention home Friday after school and remains until Sunday.

A Note to Readers

This report uses a number of terms and concepts that may be unfamiliar to the reader or may be defined specifically for DJJ. It is strongly recommended that the reader review the information included in the Terms and Concepts section above, as well as the information included in Appendices D, E, and I. A review of this information should assist the reader in understanding the data reported in this *Data Resource Guide*.

Also, readers should note that data reported for prior years in previous editions of this publication may be slightly different from data reported this year. These slight discrepancies are due to data cleaning and information updates that occur throughout the year.



Introduction to the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice

To accomplish its Mission, the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) provides an integrated approach to juvenile justice. We bring together current research and best practices to better understand and modify delinquent behavior, to meet the needs of offenders, victims, and communities, and to manage our activities and resources in a responsible and proactive manner.

A BALANCED APPROACH

DJJ responds to juvenile offenders through a balanced approach that provides: (1) protection of public safety by control of a juvenile's liberty through secure confinement and/or community supervision; (2) a structured system of incentives and graduated sanctions in both institutional and community settings to ensure accountability for the juvenile's actions; and (3) a variety of services and programs that build skills and competencies (e.g., substance abuse treatment, support for academic and vocational education, anger management classes) to enable the juvenile to become a law-abiding member of the community upon release from DJJ's supervision.

INDIVIDUALIZED, RISK-BASED SERVICES

DJJ is committed to the principle that the greatest impact on juvenile offending can be realized by focusing resources on those juvenile offenders with the highest risk of reoffending and by addressing the individual criminogenic/risk factors that contribute to the initiation and continuation of delinquent behavior. Using a set of research and consensusbased instruments at different decision points within the juvenile justice system, DJJ classifies juveniles into different levels of risk. These points include the initial decision to detain, the assignment to various levels of community probation or parole supervision, and the classification of committed juveniles to guide appropriate placement within the institutional setting.

In addition to the matching of the most intensive resources to those juveniles with the highest risk, DJJ recognizes that successful responses to juvenile crime require tailored, individualized responses to the needs of juveniles, families, and communities. The presence of specific risk factors are assessed and addressed in order to increase the likelihood of successful outcomes. Issues implicated in juvenile offending include gang involvement, substance abuse, anger management, truancy, and other school-related problems. The application of appropriate social control and sanctioning strategies such as electronic monitoring, urine drug testing, and various levels of supervision are also matched to the juvenile's individualized circumstances. Incentives such as early release from supervision, extended curfew, and tangible rewards such as recreational outings with volunteers are used to reward success and improve the chances of long-term behavior change.

DATA-DRIVEN MANAGEMENT

Over the past several years, DJJ has greatly enhanced its ability to effectively plan for and manage juveniles, programs, services, and other resources. DJJ designed functional management information systems and used the data generated and reported from these systems to better understand the

offender population, activities in relation to those offenders, and methods to become more effective and efficient. The Juvenile Tracking System (JTS) is comprised of modules covering the full range of institutional and community-based activities. DJJ's philosophy is that sound management of public resources and adherence to our core Mission cannot be accomplished without input provided from comprehensive data-based practices.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS


While DJJ has the primary responsibility for many aspects of Virginia's juvenile justice system, collaborative partnerships with state and local agencies and programs, as well as with private sector service providers, are the cornerstone of the DJJ approach. Local governments operate a network of secure detention facilities and an array of services addressing each aspect of the balanced approach. Within each community DJJ works with law enforcement, behavioral health providers, schools, social services, and other agencies. Securing services from private providers assists DJJ in meeting the needs of juvenile offenders, their families, and communities. At the state level, DJJ works with other executive, legislative, and judicial branch agencies in a similar manner.

Through the application of the integrated approach to juvenile justice, DJJ continues to make a difference in the lives of citizens and communities across the Commonwealth. Through responsible resource management, performance accountability, and sound intervention strategies, DJJ strives to improve and meet the changing demands of juvenile justice practice.

Agency Organization

The Department of Juvenile Justice serves the entire Commonwealth by providing support for community programs and services, community supervision and case management, and custody and care of committed juveniles.

The Central Office in Richmond and three Regional Offices in Roanoke, Fairfax, and Hampton coordinate the functions and funding for the court service units, community programs, community facilities, state facilities, volunteers, and private providers.

Administered by the Director, agency functions are divided among the following:

- The Director, Barry Green, oversees the Inspector General Office, Human Resources, Policy Development, Public Relations, Gang Initiatives, and Disproportionate Minority Contact functions.
- The Deputy Director for Administration and Finance, Steve Pullen, manages support functions that include fiscal operations, purchasing, capital outlay, information services, research and evaluation, and budgeting.
- The Deputy Director for Community Programs, Tim Howard, oversees operations that provide community-based services to youth and families. Functionally, this division includes community-based services, probation and parole services, regional offices, court service units, detention, interstate compact, Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA), and diversion efforts.
- The Deputy Director for Institutions, Ed Murray, oversees juvenile correctional center operations that include residential treatment programs and health services for committed youth as well as facility support services including maintenance and food service operations.

Agency Vision

The Department of Juvenile Justice will reduce delinquency and rehabilitate youth through a comprehensive system of communitylevel and institutional programs. The innovation, quality, and effectiveness of those programs will establish us as a national leader in juvenile justice. The integrity, dedication, and expertise of our staff will earn them professional recognition, and will demonstrate our commitment to the health, welfare, and safety of the youth we serve and the public we protect.

Guiding Principles

With our continuum of services, we are committed to . . .

- promoting the attitude that all juveniles, regardless of their offenses, are worthy of the Department's very best efforts;
- designing and providing services that meet the individual needs of each youth and focus on reducing a youth's risk of offending;
- confining juvenile offenders who are a danger to themselves or the community;
- maintaining a system of institutions conducive to positive growth by providing programs that meet the physical, emotional, and educational needs of the youth in their care;
- promoting prevention services that address delinquency risk factors such as truancy, poor school performance, family problems, and negative peer association;
- ensuring that community-based services provided by the Department support community crime prevention, address concerns of crime victims, and encourage family involvement;
- maintaining a balance of individualized services to ensure offender accountability and public protection and develop competencybased skills so that juveniles have the opportunity to become productive members of society;
- recruiting, supporting, and maintaining a competent and diverse work force; and
- working as a partner with other agencies and localities to promote crime prevention and a seamless system of program services.

1989

• §66-1 creates the Department of Youth Services and schedules separation from the Department of Corrections

1990

• §66-1 is amended. The new agency opens under the name "Department of Youth and Family Services"

1994

- §16.1-269.1 Transfer and Waiver is amended to lower the age at which juveniles can be tried as adults for violent crimes from 15 to 14 years
- §16.1-285.1 Commitment of Serious Offender Statute stipulates conditions for certification of juvenile as adult for purposes of trial and sentencing and allows court to commit juveniles for a determinate length of time
- The Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) releases the first study on CSUs

1995

- JLARC releases study on JCCs and Treatment Services
- §16.1-309.2 establishes the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA) to provide funding for local programs and services for low-level juvenile offenders, who are before the court or at intake, and provides community-based services for juveniles and their families, holding the juveniles responsible for their actions





Fiscal Years 1989-2006



STEPS IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

- 1. The juvenile enters the system when an offense is committed and reported by a parent, citizen, agency complaint, or the police.
- 2. If the juvenile entered the system through police contact, a decision is made to either counsel and release the youth back to the community or to arrest. If a parent, citizen, or agency made the complaint, the complaint goes to intake.
- 3. An intake officer at the court service unit makes the decision whether to take informal action such as crisis-shelter care, detention outreach, or counseling; to take no action; or to file a petition. In some cases, a police officer or the original complainant will appeal to the magistrate if they disagree with the intake officer's decision. The magistrate must certify the charge, and the matter is returned to intake to file a petition.
- 4. Once a petition has been filed, an intake officer decides if the juvenile should be detained or released to his or her parents/ guardians. The decision is based on the juvenile's risk to self, community, or flight and is guided by completion of the Detention Assessment Instrument.
- 5. If the decision is made to detain the juvenile, a detention hearing is held within 72 hours in the Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court to determine the need for further detention and examine the merits of the charges.
- 6. A preliminary hearing is held to ensure that the case has enough merit to carry it to trial. Issues of competency, insanity, subpoenas, and witnesses are addressed also. If no probable cause exists, the case is dismissed. If cause is determined, the case moves to the adjudicatory hearing. Also during this phase, issues of transfers and waivers are addressed by the court. If certification is ordered or a direct indictment issued, the case goes to the Circuit Court (see sections 12-13).
- Innocence or guilt is determined at the adjudicatory hearing. Witnesses and testimony are presented similar to an adult trial. If found not guilty, the case is dismissed. If found guilty, a dispositional hearing is held.
- 8. At the dispositional hearing, the pre-disposition report (social history) is used to assist in selecting appropriate sanctions and services. The court decides if the juvenile will be committed to DJJ or face community sanctions such as warnings, restitutions, or fines. A conditional disposition may be imposed such as

probation, which includes participation in CSU programs, referral to local services or facilities, to other agencies, to private placement, or to post-dispositional detention. Once the requirements have been met, the juvenile is released by the court.

- **9.** If committed to DJJ, the juvenile must undergo psychological, educational, social, and medical evaluations conducted at RDC.
- **10.** From RDC, the juvenile may go to a privately operated residential facility or a juvenile correctional center (JCC). At the JCC, a committed juvenile receives 24-hour supervision, education, treatment services, recreational services, and a variety of special programs.
- 11. After completion of the commitment period, a juvenile may be placed on parole or directly released. During parole, the juvenile transitions to the community through agency program efforts and is afforded local services. Some juveniles may need 24-hour residential care and treatment services provided by a halfway house. Upon completion of parole or entry into the adult criminal justice system, the youth is discharged from the juvenile system.
- 12. A case may be sent into the appeals process following the dispositional hearing. After presentation to the Circuit Court, the case is reconsidered and the issue of guilt is examined. If the juvenile is found not guilty, the case is dismissed. If found guilty, the Circuit Court judge administers an appropriate juvenile disposition.
- **13.** If the Circuit Court received the case through a direct indictment, a trial will take place. If found not guilty, the case is dismissed. If found guilty, the judge will decide whether to render a juvenile disposition or an adult sentence.



During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2005, the Department expended a total of \$197.5 million. Of this amount, 25% was in transfer payments to localities for VJCCCA, local detention, and locally run court service units.

DJJ Training Unit

The DJJTraining Unit is responsible for providing or facilitating training for the 3,100+ employees and affiliates of the Department. The unit's mission is to provide quality training that addresses specific job functions and duties, matches the experience level of the participants, responds to current topics and trends, and assists individuals in meeting their annual training requirements. Organized as a centralized unit, training is delivered in each of the three geographical regions, as well as in Richmond where the main training facility, Cedar Lodge, is located. On average, each biannual calendar offers 300 training dates in 62 topical areas. The unit supports the agency vision by implementing, supporting, or facilitating programs for each division of the agency.

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Introduction to Community Programs

The Division of Community Programs is responsible for providing a continuum of community-based services to juvenile offenders. The following briefly describes these services:

COURT SERVICE UNIT FUNCTIONS

Juvenile Intake

Intake services are provided 24 hours a day at each of the 35 court service units (CSUs) across the state. The intake officer on duty, or CSU staff on call after business hours, has the authority to receive, review, and process complaints. This may involve diversion and referral to other community resources for first-time, low-level offenders.

Based on the information gathered, a determination is made whether or not a petition should be filed with the Juvenile Court and, if so, whether or not the juvenile should be released to a parent or another responsible adult, placed in a detention alternative, or detained pending a court hearing. Decisions by DJJ intake officers concerning detention are guided by the completion of the Detention Assessment Instrument (DAI). Implemented in November 2002, the DAI is expected to make detention decisions more consistent by using standard criteria. An evaluation of the initial implementation of this instrument was completed in 2004. See Appendix K for a copy of the instrument.

Investigations and Reports

Social histories make up the majority of the reports that CSU personnel complete. These court-ordered investigations describe

the social adjustment of the youth before the court or receiving services. A risk assessment instrument is completed at the same time as the social history, letting the court know the juvenile's relative risk of reoffending. See Appendix H for a copy of this instrument. The information in the social history and risk assessment provides the basis for the CSU to develop appropriate services for the juvenile and the family, determine the level of supervision needed based on risk classification, and make recommendations to the court regarding the most appropriate disposition for the case.

Other reports and investigations completed by CSU personnel may include substance abuse evaluations, case summaries to the Family Assessment and Planning Teams, commitment packets for the Reception and Diagnostic Center, interstate compact reports, transfer reports, and ongoing case documentation.

Domestic Relations

In addition to handling delinquency and Child in Need of Service/Supervision complaints, CSUs provide intake services for domestic relations complaints. These include non-support, family abuse, adjudication of custody (permanent and temporary), abuse and neglect, termination of parental rights, visitation rights, paternity, and emancipation. In some CSUs, services such as treatment referral, supervision, and counseling are provided in adult cases of domestic violence.

Custody Investigations

Although the majority of custody investigations for the court are performed by the local Department of Social Services, some CSUs perform investigations to provide recommendations to the court on parental custody and visitation based on the best interests of the child and defined criteria in the *COV*. The investigation includes an extensive review of the home environment and background of the child's parents or caretakers, including any individuals living in the home, and the role and relationship of the parents and caretakers of the child.

Probation

The most frequently used disposition for those juveniles adjudicated guilty is probation supervision. Juvenile probation



in Virginia strives to achieve a balanced approach, focusing on the principles of community protection (public safety), accountability, and competency development.

Parole Services

Upon release from state commitment, offenders are provided parole services, initiated when a juvenile is committed to DJJ, to assist in the transition back to the community. Parole services build on the programs that the juvenile received during the period of secure confinement in the JCCs. Parole supervision focuses upon the balanced approach. Protection of public safety is emphasized through a level system of supervision based on the juvenile's assessed risk of reoffending and adjustment to rules and expectations. The period of parole varies according to the juvenile's needs, level of risk, offense history, and adjustment. Supervision may last until the juvenile's 21st birthday.

Parole officers are assigned to offenders to provide case management services, facilitate appropriate transitional services, and monitor adjustment to the community. Juveniles may receive family and individual counseling, referral to other community services, vocational services, or specialized educational services. These services are provided statewide by a network of approved vendors from which the local CSUs purchase programs and services for paroled juveniles and their families.

INTERSTATE COMPACT ON JUVENILES (ICJ)

The ICJ unit provides for the cooperative supervision of probationers and parolees moving from state to state and the return of runaways, absconders, and escapees. All 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Virgin Islands, and Guam are participants of the Compact. The ICJ mandates each state to provide services per the Compact requirements. Probation and parole services for ICJ cases are to be provided in the same manner and at the same level as provided to residents of that state.

VIRGINIA JUVENILE COMMUNITY CRIME CONTROL Act (VJCCCA)

Funding is provided to local governments through the VJCCCA to design and implement services to meet the needs of juveniles before the court in their localities.

With a plan approved by the Board of Juvenile Justice, localities may purchase or develop and operate programs and services that are pre- or post-dispositional, diversionary, residential, or non-residential.

COMPREHENSIVE SERVICES ACT (CSA)

Developed to help at-risk youth and families, the CSA is a childcentered, community-based, collaborative system of services and funding. CSUs may refer juveniles to local, interdisciplinary Family Assessment and Planning Teams (FAPT). Representatives from DJJ, by law, are members of the local FAPT. When local funding is available, the FAPT may assess a youth's strengths and needs in order to develop and implement a service plan to meet those needs.

DETENTION

Most secure detention facilities are operated by local governments or multi-jurisdictional commissions. DJJ provides partial funding for construction and operations and serves as the regulatory agency for these facilities. The only state-operated secure detention facility is located in Culpeper, adjacent to Culpeper Juvenile Correctional Center. These physically secure residential programs provide temporary care for delinquents and alleged delinquents who require secure custody pending a court appearance. Educational instruction (including remedial services) is mandatory within 24 hours of any youth being detained and is provided by the locality in which the detention facility is located (funded by the Department of Education). Program components include medical and mental health screening, recreational and religious activities, and parental or guardian visitation.

Many detention programs provide secure custody and services for post-dispositional delinquents as an alternative to state commitment as an option for judges pursuant to §16.1-284.1 of the *COV*. In a postdispositional "program," secure beds are designated for juveniles for up to 180 days. In these post-dispositional programs, treatment services are coordinated by the detention facility, the CSU, local mental health and social service agencies, and the juvenile's family. These services are tailored to meet the specific needs of that juvenile. Examples of facility-based and community-based services for post-




dispositional youth include anger management, substance abuse education and treatment, life skills, vocational education, community service, restitution, and victim empathy. During FY 2005, 15 facilities had post-dispositional programs: Blue Ridge, Chesterfield, Fairfax, James River, Loudoun, Lynchburg, Merrimac, New River Valley, Norfolk, Northern Virginia, Northwestern, Prince William, Roanoke, W.W. Moore, and Virginia Beach. Out of 1,456 licensed secure detention beds in FY 2005, 149 beds were dedicated to postdispositional programs. Recidivism rates for post-dispositional programs are provided in the Reoffense Rates section.

HALFWAY HOUSES

The Department operates three halfway houses and contracts for one privately-operated independent living program. These facilities are designed to provide transitional skills to juveniles released from the JCCs.

Each halfway house program is designed to take advantage of the unique resources available in its community to meet the needs of the residents. Upon completion of the program, the resident will have gained additional skills to promote a continued positive adjustment and reduce the risk of recidivism.



INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*



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





INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005

















INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005













PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005



















INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005











INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*





















PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005

















INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005

















INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS, FY 2005









PRE-DISPOSITIONAL DETENTION LOS DISTRIBUTION, FY 2005 RELEASES*









INTAKE DISPOSITION OF JUVENILE COMPLAINTS. FY 2005























Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA)

A legislative study on the lack of alternatives to detention and substantial revisions to the juvenile code led the 1995 Virginia General Assembly to pass the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA) "to establish a community-based system of progressive intensive sanctions and services that correspond to the severity of offense and treatment needs" (*COV* §16.1-309.2). The purpose of the VJCCCA is "to deter crime by providing immediate, effective punishment that emphasizes accountability of the juvenile offender for his actions as well as reduces the pattern of repeat offending" (*COV* §16.1-309.2).

Since January 1996, funding has been allocated to each local governing body (an independent city or county) through a formula based on factors including the number and types of arrests in a locality and the average daily cost for serving a child. In order to maintain their commitment to youth, participating localities must maintain the same level of contribution to these programs that they made in 1995.

LOCALITIES DEVELOP PLANS

To participate in VJCCCA, each jurisdiction must develop a plan for how it will use the funding and have that plan approved by the Board of Juvenile Justice. Some localities have combined programs and funding across jurisdictions. Communities are given substantial autonomy and flexibility to address local juvenile crime patterns. Development of the plan requires consultation with judges, court service unit directors, and Comprehensive ServicesAct Community Policy and Management Teams (an interagency body that manages the expenditure of state funding to serve children and families). The local governing body designates who will be responsible for developing and managing the plan. In over one-half of the localities, this responsibility has been delegated to the court service unit.

All funding must be used to serve "juveniles before intake on complaints or the court on petitions alleging that the juvenile is a child in need of services, child in need of supervision or delinquent" (*COV*§16.1-309.2). Local governing bodies may provide services directly or purchase them from other public or private agencies. No specific types of programs or services are required, although a menu of permissible activities is in place. The intent is for programs and services to be developed to fit the needs of each locality.

PROGRAMS INCLUDED

In FY 2005, VJCCCA served almost 13,000 youth through residential and non-residential programs and services including less secure detention; group homes; family-oriented group homes; crisis intervention and shelter care; outreach detention and electronic monitoring; intensive supervision; substance abuse assessment and treatment; sex offender assessment and treatment; mental health assessments; individual, group and family counseling; home-based, inhome, or family preservation services; mentoring; community service; restitution/restorative justice; after-school or extended day services; academic improvement; truancy programs; employment/vocational programs; shoplifting programs; law-related education; anger management; parenting skills; life skills; recreation and wilderness programs; and individually purchased services to meet specific needs.



- VJCCCA Funding (FY 2005):
 - These data are preliminary, based on budget appropriations of FY 2005. They do not reflect final actual expenditures as these data were not fully reconciled at the time of printing. It is not anticipated, however, that these preliminary figures will vary significantly.
 - The State and Localities were expected to spend a combined total of \$26,540,860 on services.
 - Nearly one-half of funding expended on VJCCCA was local funding.
- Placements by Status (FY 2005):
 - Residential program placements typically provide more intensive public safety and/or competency services than non-residential programming; 12% of placements fell into this category in FY 2005. Non-residential program placements accounted for 88%.
 - Almost half of the program placements were post-dispositional.
- Placements by Type of Service (FY 2005):
 - 43% of VJCCCA program placements focused on public safety through electronic monitoring, outreach detention, surveillance and intensive supervision, less secure detention, and crisis intervention.
 - Competency services accounted for 28% of program placements.
 - Accountability programs (e.g., community service, restitution, and
 - restorative justice) provided services to 24% of VJCCCA placements.

• Program Placement Completions (FY 2005) as reported by VJCCCA Programs:

- 78% completed the programs satisfactorily. The specific criteria for satisfactory completion are determined by each program.
- 14% were unsatisfactory completions.
- 8% left the programs due to unrelated reasons such as status changes, program closures, or juvenile relocation.



In FY 2005, there were 25 secure detention facilities throughout the Commonwealth. These community-based, residential facilities provide temporary care for delinquents and alleged delinquents requiring secure custody pending court disposition or placement. Twelve of these facilities are locally operated and 12 are run by commissions; political entities comprised of three or more localities. Culpeper Detention Home is the only state-operated detention facility in the Commonwealth.




Average Daily Population (June) vs Capacity, FY 2003-2009*

In FY 2002, the Department of Juvenile Justice, in conjunction with the Governor's Inmate Population Forecast Committee, began producing a projection of local juvenile detention homes' average daily population. The most recent forecast projects the detention home population to decrease by 6% from FY 2005 to FY 2009. This decrease is based on an expected decline in detainable intake cases coupled with the increased use of Post-D detention.




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005


ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005


ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005



Average Daily Population vs Capacity, FY 2003-2005










ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005


ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005



Average Daily Population vs Capacity, FY 2003-2005










ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005






ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005




ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005


ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2005

Admissions by Dispositional Status, FY 2005





Halfway Houses

In FY 2005, the Department of Juvenile Justice operated three state-run halfway houses to meet the transitional needs of juveniles released from juvenile correctional centers. DJJ operated Hampton Place located in Norfolk, Abraxas House in Staunton, and Discovery House in Roanoke. Discovery House is the only facility that houses both male and female residents. The Department also oversees the Apartment Living Program, a 10 bed contract for halfway house placements with the Tidewater Regional Group Home Commission located in Virginia Beach.

The purpose of a halfway house is to provide transitional living for juveniles who are unable to return home or whose service needs make this type of placement beneficial. Residents learn independent living skills and are required to enroll in school, work towards a GED, and/or be gainfully employed. Residents are placed on parole supervision during their stay at the halfway house. Supportive services such as substance abuse relapse services and sex offender relapse treatment are provided by public or private service providers with the use of transitional service funds. Upon completion of residence at a halfway house, juveniles may return to their families or live independently.



CAPACITY VS AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP), FY 2005





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Introduction to Institutional Programs

The Division of Institutional Programs has direct responsibility for juvenile offenders who have been committed to the state. It operates the Reception and Diagnostic Center (RDC), juvenile correctional centers (JCCs), and contracts with private providers to house these juveniles and ensure that they receive treatment and educational services while in a safe and secure setting.

The six JCCs (not including Barrett) and RDC had a combined operating capacity of 1,045 in FY 2005. The Behavioral Services Unit, Central Infirmary, and Food Services Unit provide support to the correctional centers. The Department of Correctional Education (DCE) also helps by meeting educational needs of the committed juveniles. To supplement the number of JCC beds, DJJ contracts with private providers. These contractors provide direct-care community residential beds and treatment services for committed youth.

In December 2004, DJJ began placing juveniles into the Community Placement Program (CPP) at Chesapeake Juvenile Services (formerly the Tidewater Detention Home). This program is the second of its kind for DJJ, the first opening in April 2004 at Shenandoah Valley Juvenile Detention Home. Both programs operate in a secure residential setting offering community reintegration and specialized services.

In FY 2005, DJJ was mandated by the General Assembly to develop a utilization plan in order to maximize the use of the Department's resources. As a result of a comprehensive review of all JCCs and their assets, Barrett JCC was chosen for closing by June 30, 2005. The basis for the Barrett selection was the proximity to other Richmond area facilities allowing the reassignment of staff; and identified Barrett physical plant renovation requirements in comparison to other centers. The self assessment and plans for the closure were outlined in a utilization report



presented to the 2005 General Assembly. In January 2005, in anticipation of the General Assembly approving the Department's utilization plan, DJJ began the planning process for the removal of wards from Barrett JCC and for the closure of the facility. The utilization plan called for movement of wards to other facilities; reassignment of staff; and physical mothballing of the facility. Once the utilization plan was approved, the planned process was implemented and achieved ahead of schedule. By April 30, 2005 Barrett JCC was vacated and staff assigned to new facilities. The physical plant was mothballed with only small portions of the facility allowed to remain in use.



Statewide Commitments, FY 2005



Over half (57%) of the juveniles admitted to the JCCs have a history of prescription psychotropic medication use. At admission, 41% of juveniles have a diagnosed mental health disorder (other than a DSM-IV diagnosis of CD or ODD).

RDC, the central intake facility for committed youth. It was established in 1968 and currently consists of seven housing units; six for males and one for females. The juveniles range in age from 11 to 20, and the average length of stay at RDC is slightly less than seven weeks. The primary function of RDC is the orientation, evaluation, and classification of juveniles. All youth receive medical and dental examinations in addition to a psychological screening and evaluation. Sex offender evaluations are also performed at RDC. Each juvenile receives a battery of tests from the DCE staff to identify the appropriate educational level, vocational aptitude, and any special educational needs. RDC counselors are responsible for coordination of the evaluation process, individual and crisis counseling, completion of social history, and case management.




RDC operates a highly structured orientation and behavioral management program emphasizing development in areas of leadership, education, achievement, discipline, empowerment, and responsibility. The program is designed to have juveniles take responsibility for their own actions and allows their behavior to determine quality of life, in terms of privileges. At the conclusion of the evaluation process, individual evaluators meet to discuss each case to determine treatment needs, length of stay, classification, and placement recommendations. From RDC, juveniles are sent to their designated correctional facilities.


BEHAVIORAL SERVICES UNIT (BSU)

BSU is the organizational treatment component of the JCCs, responsible for directing and providing relevant clinical services to youth housed at RDC and the JCCs. The primary services provided by the BSU staff include mental health, substance abuse and sex offender treatment. In addition, BSU oversees the implementation of anger management services.

Organizational Structure: BSU is a legislatively mandated organizational unit within DJJ to provide assessment and treatment for incarcerated youth. All supervisory staff within the unit are licensed professionals in their respective fields. There are three BSU staff located in the Central Office: the Psychology Director who serves as the chief administrator of the unit, the Program Manager for Substance Abuse Services, and the Program Manager for Sex Offender Services. All of the JCCs, except for Oak Ridge, have a supervisory psychologist on site who is responsible for the clinical treatment services at that facility.

Female offenders consistently test at higher reading, writing, and math grade levels. The difference is greatest for reading.

In addition to the supervisory clinicians, BSU employs doctoral and masters level psychologists, clinical social workers, certified substance abuse counselors, psychological test technicians, and clerical staff. Currently, the 88 BSU positions are distributed across the facilities based on the number of youth and services offered. BSU strongly supports the recruitment and retention of licensed staff and encourages existing staff to pursue licensing. All staff are required to get certifications in their respective practice (e.g., Sex Offender Treatment Provider). Psychiatric services are provided through a memorandum of agreement with the Virginia Commonwealth University Health System and contracts with individual board certified psychiatrists from the private sector.

Mental Health Treatment: The following services are provided at each of the facilities: individual, group and family therapy, crisis intervention services, psychological assessment, case consultation, psychiatric services and psychotropic medication management, suicide assessment and intervention, development and implementation of behavioral protocols for suicidal and self-injurious youth, 24/7 on-call services, and relevant staff training in treatment issues.

Substance Abuse Treatment: During assessment at RDC, youth are evaluated as to the severity of their substance use, and from this evaluation, treatment level determinations can be made at each facility. Youth are then placed in substance abuse treatment services based on the severity of treatment need. Substance abuse treatment services are currently provided within a two-tiered approach. The first tier is psycho-educational services. These services consist of sixteen sessions of didactic and experiential groups. These groups generally meet twice per week. The second tier of substance abuse treatment services is therapy process groups. These groups consist of more detailed objectives to be completed by the youth and presented to their group. This group

is not time limited; movement through the program to completion is based on successful completion of each objective. Each youth is encouraged to work on and present each of their objectives in a timely manner. Generally, each objective can be completed within a month.

A relapse prevention curriculum is also available as an ancillary service. This curriculum takes the basic treatment process a step further and is available for those youth who have an extended length of stay, wish to continue with clinical services,

and for those who could benefit from additional treatment services. This group focuses on issues relating to relapse prevention, recovery, recidivism, problem solving, and criminal and addictive thinking. It is designed to be an eight session curriculum.

Sex Offender Treatment: DJJ opened its first state-operated juvenile sex offender treatment unit in January 1990. The program has significantly expanded since that time in order to provide services to all juvenile sex offenders in the system. DJJ currently has 11 self-contained sex offender treatment units across five JCCs. Beaumont and Culpeper offer treatment to older juveniles; Hanover and Bon Air offer services to younger high school and middle school juveniles; and Oak Ridge provides treatment to developmentally delayed juveniles of all ages. The overall sex offender program is managed by the Program Supervisor of sex offender services.

Most juvenile sex offenders are placed in self-contained units. These units offer intensive milieu-based treatment where juveniles reside in housing units with other sex offenders. The units offer a range of treatment modalities that include individual and group psychotherapy, psycho-educational groups, and family psychotherapy. They are typically staffed by a psychologist senior, clinical social worker, institutional counselor, and juvenile correctional officers (JCOs). The clinical staff at JCCs are either licensed or certified as a sex offender treatment provider.

Juvenile sex offenders are a heterogeneous population, and treatment is individualized by the therapists' "Individualized Treatment Plan" protocol. All juveniles work toward ten general goals by completing a minimum of eight designated core treatment activities, and any necessary individualized treatment activities.

HEALTH SERVICES

All medical, dental, nursing, and related health services are provided to youth confined within the ICCs. These youth typically have a wide range of medical and dental care needs that result from being medically underserved prior to admission. To meet the needs of confined youth, DJJ maintains a staff of board-certified physicians, dentists, and nurses. Services are provided at all JCCs to ensure that the medical, psychiatric and dental care needs of youth are met during confinement. Additionally, DJ has a contract with Anthem to process medical invoices and provide access to community health care providers for juveniles confined to detention centers and JCCs. This contract ensures all health care services provided to confined youth, exterior to these confinement facilities, are delivered in a cost-effective fashion by qualified practitioners. The contract exemplifies the efforts of Health Services to provide quality care using the most efficient and economical service delivery models available.

SECURITY AND OPERATIONS

The Security and Operations section of the Division of Institutional Programs incorporates functions that support the facilities and allow them to operate properly. Operations include food service, maintenance, and business office responsibilities that involve all personnel, families of the juveniles, volunteers, and the public. Operations staff handles all routine and emergency issues that arise within the JCCs and ensure that all operations are in proper order. Security handles the facilities in a paramilitary style, utilizing the military ranking and title system. Security involves both public safety and the safety of the juveniles themselves, and is facilitated by the correctional officers in the field. Correctional officers operate under standard operating procedures that set forth proper techniques for dealing with various situations.

TREATMENT AND PROGRAMS

The Treatment and Programs section serves in an advisory and monitoring capacity in conjunction with the Security and Operations section. This section monitors how treatment and programs are operated, assesses progress made in programs, sets parameters for the programs, and deals with broad regulations on classifications as well as the residential location of juveniles from different classifications. They are responsible for establishing and updating the length of stay for each ward and the ward's custody classification. They follow the case management practices that will eventually justify the release of a ward back to the community and work with the community to provide a transition and parole plan for re-entry. They ensure that all needed services are available and operational at the facilities. They also serve as a liaison from the field to the administrative offices, and vice versa, for procedures and resources. Treatment services in the JCCs include mental health, substance abuse, sex offender, anger management, and independent living skills

development. Rearrest, reconviction, and reincarceration information for juveniles who received substance abuse or sex offender treatment while in the JCCs are provided in the Reoffense Rates section.

YOUTH INDUSTRIES

Recognizing that many youth released to the community from the JCCs are not prepared to enter the work force, the Youth Industries Program was designed to help participants overcome barriers to employment. The program was designed as a partnership with DCE and the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL).

Older wards are selected for Youth Industries based on institutional adjustment, satisfactory progress toward service plan objectives, and demonstrated ability to work independently with limited supervision. Selected youth receive one or more of the following: vocational and academic instruction, hands-on work-based training, ongoing counseling services, transitional skills and services, and follow-up. If warranted, participating wards are modestly compensated based on work-training hours completed or receive an established piecework rate.

Fields of study may also be integrated with an apprenticeship program. Such fields of study include horticulture, silk screening, offset printing, food service, immediate assembly, woodworking, electrical, barbering, embroidery, vinyl signmaking, advertising and design, and computer repair. Each year, creative arts and crafts works produced by wards throughout DJJ are collected for exhibit and sale at the General Assembly Building when the legislative session begins.

In the program, youth can develop positive work habits and pro-work values while receiving guidance on using newly acquired skills when entering the job market. DJJ has initiated an on-going evaluation of the Youth Industries Program beginning with juveniles released in FY 2001. These findings indicate that:

- Juveniles who participated in the program were likely to be older, have more serious committing offenses, and stay longer in the JCCs than juveniles in the general JCC population.
- Juveniles who participated in Youth Industries had lower reoffense rates within 12 months after release than juveniles from the general JCC population. Additional information on rearrest, reconviction, and reincarceration rates for Youth Industries juveniles may be found in the Reoffense Rates section.
- Previous evaluation results noted that program expenditures are well below the budget allocated by DJJ.

In collaboration with DCE, DJJ received a DOL grant during FY 2004 to fund additional work programs for DJJ wards. This

grant allowed for juveniles at Beaumont JCC to receive academic instruction as well as vocational training in barbering, printing, or electrical work. It also provided extensive transitional services for juveniles that included assistance in the search for gainful employment upon release to their communities. In fact, there has been one juvenile who received his barbering license through this program and three others who have passed the practical portion of the barbering exam and should be eligible to re-take the theory portion in the near future. During FY 2005, 80% of juveniles who received transitional services were employed, in school, or actively seeking employment. Juveniles from the barbering and electrical programs have also completed numerous jobs around the Beaumont facility, including electrical wiring and barbering work.

Throughout FY 2005, DJJ and DCE have continued to operate these programs under the auspices of the Youth Industries Program. Near the end of the fiscal year, the two agencies applied for and received a new DOL grant that will, in FY 2006, expand the vocational program offerings at Culpeper JCC and provide a pilot-site for the Work Release Program at Natural Bridge JCC. The new grant will also allow for the expansion of aftercare services to include juveniles released from these additional facilities.

CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

The Board of Juvenile Justice Policy 19-00 states, "the Department has no higher duty than to provide for the safety of juveniles in its facilities and of the staff who supervise and care

for them. Classification is essential to the operation of an orderly and safe juvenile correctional system. Classification enables the Department to gauge the proper custody level of a juvenile, to identify the juvenile's educational, vocational and psychological needs, and to separate violent and non-violent juveniles."

In 2001, the Department implemented an objective classification system to enable staff to assess wards' appropriate security and custody levels, determine the most appropriate services and programs for all wards, assign juveniles to appropriate housing placements within a facility, and assess wards for placement in community transition programs and for special needs. The classification system also provides for periodic reviews of security, custody, and program placement in light of juveniles' needs and progress and for the re-classification of wards as appropriate.

Wards are classified according to their need for structure:


Level I - low structure Level II - medium structure Level III - high structure Level IV - intensive structure

Facilities are classified according to the level of security they provide:

Level I - low security, structure, and supervision Level II - medium security, structure, and supervision Level III - high security, structure, and supervision Level IV - intensive security, structure, and supervision


Wards are assigned to facilities based on these classification levels, age, sex, and certain other factors identified in Appendix D.

64% of wards admitted to the JCCs in FY 2005 had a low or medium initial classification level.

13% of wards admitted to the JCCs in FY 2005 had a determinate or blended sentence. Of those with an indeterminate sentence, 21% were assigned a minimum LOS range of 18 or more months.

LENGTH OF STAY (LOS)

Using guidelines issued by the Board of Juvenile Justice, the Department establishes the length of stay for indeterminately committed juveniles based on the severity of a juvenile's offense(s), chronicity of criminal behavior, and any aggravating or mitigating factors associated with the criminal behavior, with due consideration given to the youth's treatment needs and demonstrated behavior while under the Department's supervision. LOS categories are defined by an anticipated minimum and maximum number of months that the ward will remain with DJJ. For example, the LOS category 3-6 indicates a ward is expected to stay between 3 and 6 months. The actual length of stay may vary from this range due to institutional offenses or failure to complete mandatory treatment. The guidelines and LOS categories can be found in Appendix E.



PROJECTION FOR THE INSTITUTIONAL POPULATION

Each year the Department of Juvenile Justice, in conjunction with the Governor's Inmate Population Forecasting Committee, produces a projection of the state responsible juvenile average daily population. The most recent forecast projects the institutional population to decrease by 4% between FY 2005 and FY 2009. It is important to note that the values shown in the table are the June values for each fiscal year.



The state responsible juvenile offender population (including private provider programs) is expected to decrease by 4% between FY 2005 - 2009. The historical ADP and forecast numbers shown in the table are the June values for each FY.



Shenandoah Community Placement Program (CPP)

The Community Placement Program (CPP) at Shenandoah Valley Juvenile Center serves committed male offenders through a contractual partnership between DJJ and the detention center. The program allows for placement of state-committed juveniles in a smaller, community-based setting by providing them with a secure 10-bed pod separate from the detention population. CPP utilizes a positive-based, incentive-earning, behavior management program and offers services including anger management, substance abuse, life and employability skills, vocational education, and other facility-specific programs. Residents are enrolled in accredited local school programs and may work toward a high school diploma or GED. The aftercare component involves mentoring, job placement services, and providing for individual needs. A second CPP began accepting juveniles at Chesapeake Juvenile Services in December 2004, thus expanding total CPP beds to 20.


Virginia Wilderness Institute (VWI)

The Virginia Wilderness Institute (VWI) is a 32-bed facility that serves committed offenders. Remotely located in Grundy, Virginia, VWI is a highly structured, disciplined, residential program for males. The program focuses on accountability and competency. VWI emphasizes work ethics, education, self-discipline, responsibility, and accountability through participation in rigorous work and daily structure. VWI offers a full range of academic and vocational instruction. A community coordinator works with each ward, both before and after release from the facility, to assist in transition to the community. The community coordination includes assistance with job search, school re-enrollment, and locating other support services in the community. Information on rearrest, reconviction, and reincarceration rates for juveniles placed at VWI may be found in the Reoffense Rates section.




Substance Abuse Treatment and Anger Management Programs

The Substance Abuse Program at Barrett, operated by the Gateway Foundation, provided comprehensive services to males experiencing significant life problems related to drug and alcohol use. As a result of a comprehensive review of all JCCs, mandated by the General Assembly, Barrett was selected for mothballing in FY 2005. By April 30, 2005 Barrett JCC was vacated and staff assigned to other facilities. The physical plant was mothballed with only small portions of the facility allowed to remain in use. Hanover JCC has taken over the role of physical plant caretaker while Barrett remains in the mothballed state. Plans to assimilate the substance abuse programming to other JCCs were developed and are currently being implemented. Long term substance abuse treatment programming similar to what was historically delivered at Barrett has been incorporated at several JCCs.


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


Anger Management, Sex Offender, Life Skills, and Substance Abuse Treatment Programs

The Beaumont facility provides specialized programs such as sex offender treatment, substance abuse treatment, and anger management, as well as individual and group mental health therapy. Beaumont houses the older, more aggressive male offenders in a close custody facility. The Virginia Department of Correctional Education (DCE) offers a comprehensive high school education program via the Paul S. Blandford School and Annex. DCE provides academic, business, career and technical, apprenticeship programs, GED classes and testing, a College Bound Program, and SAT testing.






PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2005


Anger Management, Sex Offender, and Substance Abuse Treatment Programs

During FY 2004, the Bon Air facility housed males ages 11 to 20. In FY 2005, females were transferred from Culpeper JCC to Bon Air making it the only co-ed correctional center housing both males and all females committed to DJJ. All programming for females has been transferred to Bon Air and DJJ is working with DCE to provide enhanced academic and vocational experiences for the females. Gender specific programs and approaches have also been implemented. DCE continues to offer a full high school curriculum for all wards including: GED preparation and testing, Reading Program, Tutorial Program, Distance Learning for future college courses, and Cognitive Skills Training. Specialized programs include sex offender, substance abuse, anger management, and an intensive services program for wards with severe emotional problems. Individual, group, and family therapy services are provided by social workers and psychologists. A consulting psychiatrist monitors the needs of wards requiring psychotropic medication.






PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2005


Anger Management, Sex Offender, Substance Abuse Treatment, and Independent Living Programs

In June 2002, Culpeper JCC was converted to a female-only facility to serve juveniles ages 11 to 20. During FY 2005, Culpeper JCC was converted back to an all male facility with a major emphasis on Circuit Court committed wards who are 18.6 years of age or older. This decision was made in order to meet a federal mandate requiring sight and sound separation for such wards. Several opportunities for work are available to qualified wards. DJJ is working with DCE to provide enhanced academic and vocational experiences for this population of older males. The Department has also received a new U.S. Department of Labor grant that will help to address some of the issues presented by this population and will specifically target vocational training, employability, and reentry.






PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2005


JROTC, Anger Management, Sex Offender, and Substance Abuse Treatment Programs

The Hanover facility houses male offenders with moderate to serious committing offenses. Specialized programs include JROTC, anger management, sex offender treatment, and substance abuse treatment. To participate in JROTC, wards must be at least in the 9th grade and on a GED or high school diploma track. Participants can be 18 if they are working toward their GED or high school diploma. Recidivism rates for released juveniles who participated in JROTC while at Hanover JCC are provided in the Reoffense Rates section. Due to a renovation project affecting several cottages, Hanover's population had to be reduced. Beginning in May 2005, the Department systematically lowered the population from 154 to 96 wards. Renovations are expected to be completed in 8-12 months, at which time Hanover's population will be increased.






PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2005


Anger Management and Substance Abuse Treatment






PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2005


Behavioral, Life Skills, Sex Offender, Anger Management, and Substance Abuse Treatment Programs

The Oak Ridge facility houses male offenders that range in age from 11 to 20 with developmental disabilities and behavior disorders. The population has measured intelligence scores in the borderline to moderately retarded range with Woodcock-Johnson academic achievement scores at or below the fourth grade level. Offenders typically have a history of maladaptive behavior and problems adjusting in school. The facility operates a behavioral "token economy" program and offers mental health services, sex offender, anger management, and substance abuse treatment programs.


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

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Measuring Reoffense Rates

Recidivism, or reoffending, is an important concept for juvenile and adult criminal justice systems because it provides a measure of outcome success. In terms of public awareness, this concept is usually the primary measure of interest when evaluating program effectiveness. Use of a standardized measure of recidivism allows evaluation across different types of programs and facilitates comparison to program outcomes from other states.

While there are many studies on offender recidivism, comparison of results is often difficult because the evaluation methodologies used vary widely. Definitions of recidivism differ from study to study. Characteristics of the juveniles studied may not be adequately identified. These issues, as well as others surrounding reoffense analysis, were discussed in DJJ's research quarterly on juvenile recidivism in Virginia (available on the DJJ website at http://www.djj.virginia.gov/about/recidivism_RQ.pdf)

METHODS FOR STUDYING REOFFENDING

One of the methods used to evaluate reoffending is the longitudinal cohort study. A cohort is simply a group of individuals who share some common characteristic, such as release from incarceration during a specific year. This method may use the entire population of interest or a sample from that population. The chosen cohort is then followed over a period of time so that any trends for that group may be identified. For reoffense rates, a cohort is tracked for a specific follow-up period and any reoffenses are counted.

Most recidivism studies use the longitudinal cohort method, including the recent Florida Department of Corrections report on adult recidivism (2003) and Virginia's annual evaluations of juvenile reoffending (see previous *Data Resource Guides*). This method provides a better picture of long-term trends and allows public safety agencies to see patterns in offending.

The diagram shows a typical path for a longitudinal cohort analysis. First, the cohort is chosen (for example, all juveniles released from juvenile correctional centers during FY 2004). At the end of a specified follow-up period (for this example, 12 months after release) all instances of reoffending are identified. The cohort is then divided into two groups – those who did or did not reoffend.

DEFINITIONS OF **R**EOFFENDING

The American Correctional Association (ACA) has stated that the definition of recidivism is one of the primary issues for juvenile and adult correctional organizations. According to the ACA, "... there are numerous ways to measure recidivism...[d]epending on what perspective is taken, statistical outcomes may vary."

There are three commonly accepted definitions used to measure reoffending:


• *Rearrest* refers to a petitioned juvenile complaint for a new criminal offense made at intake or an adult arrest for a new criminal offense. Rearrest is an important measure of reoffending because it represents the initial official contact with the criminal justice system. Uses of rearrest rates are limited as a gauge of reoffending because rearrest

measures police activity, and juveniles may be rearrested for offenses they did not actually commit.

- *Reconviction* refers to a guilty adjudication for a delinquent or criminal offense. This measure represents a more stringent way to measure reoffending. Because reconviction rates are based on the final disposition for an offense, only cases with an admission of guilt or a court adjudication of guilty are counted. Only reconviction meets the definition of recidivism used by DJJ.
- *Reincarceration* refers to a return to incarceration (after having been previously released from incarceration in a juvenile or adult facility) subsequent to rearrest and reconviction on a new criminal offense. This measure indicates that the new offense is serious enough to warrant a return to incarceration.

A recent report on offender risk assessment in Virginia (Ostrom et al., 2002) emphasized that the way recidivism is defined influences the interpretation of study results. According to their report, there are strengths and weaknesses associated with each measure of recidivism. Use of rearrest as a measure of recidivism has the advantage of not being influenced by court proceedings (offense reduction, plea bargaining, diversion) but may overestimate the level of reoffending because arrest criteria are less stringent than conviction criteria. Rearrest rates represent the *maximum* rate for reoffending as captured in official records.

Use of reconviction as a measure of recidivism lessens the likelihood of overinflating reoffending rates. It should be noted that time to reconviction is best measured as the "number of days until a new arrest for which the offender will be subsequently convicted," so that any discrepancies in court procedures will not influence the measurement of time to reoffense. Therefore, reconvictions represent a subset of rearrests.

Reincarceration rates offer the most stringent measure of reoffending. Juveniles recommitted to a juvenile correctional center or sentenced to an adult facility have been considered by a judge to have committed offenses serious enough to justify return to a correctional facility. The measure represents a further subset of rearrests – reoffending that has been adjudicated guilty and resulted in reentry into a juvenile correctional facility or sentence for incarceration into an adult facility.

ISSUES WITH THE STUDY OF REOFFENDING

Ostrom et al. (2002) note that studies of reoffending (recidivism) differ in terms of the length of time used for follow-up. Length of follow-up in these studies has ranged anywhere from three months to five years. Most studies use a one year follow-up period to assess reoffending. While reoffending rates are often highest within the first year after release or judicial action, the limitation of follow-up to one year does not allow for a comprehensive analysis of reoffending patterns. Studies of reoffending should use longer follow-up periods in order to get a better idea of the recidivism process. Ostrom et al. (2002) recommend the use of a follow-up period of at least one to three years.

There are other issues relevant to the examination of reoffending, particularly for juveniles. First, most studies have focused on offenders who have been released from correctional centers. Focusing on this group limits the understanding of reoffending rates because it does not allow for examination of all individuals who have contact with the justice system and eliminates the possibility of comparison between individuals who have been incarcerated in secure facilities versus individuals who may have been sent to diversion programs or placed on probation.

Also, few studies have tracked offenses through both the juvenile and adult justice systems. A complete examination of juvenile reoffending is not possible unless all juvenile and adult contacts with the justice system are included.

Additionally, studies of reoffending should include information on gender and age differences when presenting reoffense data, particularly evaluations of juvenile reoffending. There are well documented normal developmental differences between males and females, as well as juveniles in early adolescence versus late adolescence. Therefore, reoffending patterns should not be *assumed* to be the same for all juveniles. For example, a 2002 study by DJJ found that female offenders admitted to JCCs were more likely than male offenders to have been admitted for a non-felony. A recent study by Oregon (2004) on juvenile recidivism found that juveniles ages 13-16 were most likely to reoffend within the Oregon juvenile justice system.

DJJ'S STUDY OF JUVENILE REOFFENDING

Data on juvenile offenders in Virginia are contained in the DJJ Juvenile Tracking System (JTS). The JTS contains information on juvenile intakes, detention placements, commitments to juvenile correctional centers or other incarceration alternatives, and probation placements for all localities within Virginia. This information allows for the examination of juvenile reoffending patterns in a standardized way. DJJ also obtains statewide adult arrest and conviction information from the Virginia State Police. In addition, DJJ acquires information on subsequent incarcerations from the Department of Corrections (DOC) and the State Compensation Board. Information from these sources enables the study of statewide juvenile reoffending patterns with long-term follow-up periods.

Juvenile reoffending patterns for FY 1999 through FY 2004 were examined for this *Data Resource Guide*. Juvenile and adult arrest data on juveniles released from Virginia juvenile correctional centers or placed on probation during these years were examined. The followup period ranged from a minimum of one year to a maximum of three years, depending on the date the juvenile was released or placed. Demographic information for reoffenses was also included.

Although all three measures of reoffending were included in this *Data Resource Guide*, it is important to note that the official DJJ recidivism definition is based on measures of reconviction. In February 2000, the Director of the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice issued an administrative directive (07-710) that established an official definition for recidivism to be used by the Department (this directive was updated in December 2004).

For the purposes of reporting recidivism rates of juveniles as required by Code of Virginia §2.2-222, the Department will use the following definition:

A recidivist is a person who is found by a court to have committed, after being (a) placed on probation or (b) released from confinement, a delinquent or criminal act other than violation of probation or parole.

As the recidivism definition currently stands, all instances of petitioned delinquent intakes and adult arrests for criminal activity (for which a juvenile has been adjudicated guilty) that occur after a juvenile is released from a JCC or is placed on probation are collected by DJJ. Technical violations are not included in this definition of reoffending. Tracking information on *all* subsequent offenses provides a better measure of reoffending than simply gathering information from the juvenile justice system alone.



Reoffense Rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements

Reoffense data were examined for FY 1999 through FY 2004 for the following cohorts:

- JCC Releases all juveniles released from juvenile correctional centers;
- **Probation Placements** juveniles placed on probation for the first time (the **entire** population was used for FY 2002 through FY 2004; randomly selected, representative samples for each year were used for FY 1999 through FY 2001); and
- Juveniles in DJJ Programs all juveniles who were in various treatment programs (including juveniles served by VJCCCA) or incarceration alternatives (including post-dispositional detention programs) between FY 2002 and FY 2004.

Tables on the next few pages include the following data:

- **Rearrest rates** are presented for each year, for both JCC Releases and Probation Placement cohorts;
- **Reconviction rates** are presented for each year for the JCC Release cohorts, and from FY 2001-2004 for the Probation Placement cohorts; and
- Reincarceration rates are presented for FY 1999 through FY 2003 JCC Releases. These rates represent recommitment back into a JCC, incarceration in a penitentiary (not including blended sentences), or a jail sentence imposed by a judge. Data on any commitment to a JCC or an adult incarceration are also included for the post-dispositional detention program cohorts. *Please note that reincarceration rates for FY 2004 are not included in this Data Resource Guide*. Examination of the initial reincarceration analysis for FY 2004 indicated that additional research on the adult incarceration data was needed to ensure that all reincarcerations were measured (see page 186 for additional information). Areas on the following tables for FY 2004 reincarceration rates are shaded in gray.

Reoffense data did not include the following offenses: violation of probation or parole, contempt of court, failure to appear, noncriminal domestic relations/child welfare complaints, or noncriminal traffic violations. Also, only petitioned delinquent intakes were used for the analysis.

When the length of time to rearrest or reconviction is reported, it indicates the time between the date the juvenile was released from a JCC or placed on probation, and the date of a new arrest. For reincarceration length of time, the difference between the release date from a JCC and the reincarceration date was used.

An analysis of reoffenses and risk assessment scores was added this year. Also, the examination of reoffense rates for DJJ programs and commitment alternatives was expanded to three years (FY 2002 through FY 2004).

There is a slight discrepancy between the total number of JCC Releases/Probation Placements in the reoffense analysis when compared with the total number of juveniles released from the JCCs or placed on probation reported in other sections of this *Data Resource Guide*. This slight discrepancy is due to the following methodological criteria used to establish the cohorts:

- Probation Placement cohorts did not include those few juveniles with missing date of birth data. This information is required to match cases in different state data systems (such as the DJJ JTS and the Virginia Criminal Information Network used by the Virginia State Police).
- Juveniles released from the JCCs under the following conditions were not included in the reoffense analysis: juveniles placed into RDC pre-dispositionally but not committed to the JCCs, juveniles sent directly to DOC upon release from the JCCs, or juveniles released from the JCCs on appeal (these juveniles were included in the analysis for any *subsequent* admissions and releases once the appeal process was completed and the juveniles were found guilty).

Twelve-Month Reoffense Rates, FY 1999-2004

- Recidivism rates for FY 2004 (defined as reconviction rates by DJJ) at 12-months were:
 - 37.6% for juveniles released from the JCCs;
 - 24.2% for juveniles placed on probation.
- JCC Releases had higher 12-month rearrest rates than Probation Placements between FY 1999 and FY 2004, and higher reconviction rates between FY 2001 and FY 2004.
- The following reoffending patterns were noted at 12-months comparing FY 2003 and FY 2004:
- For JCC Releases, the rearrest rate increased while the reconviction rate decreased.
- For Probation Placements, the rearrest rate increased while the reconviction rate decreased.

As mentioned earlier, DJJ does not use rearrest rates for the official definition for recidivism. Examining rearrest rates is helpful, however, because these rates reflect the level of additional official contact juveniles have with the justice system after release or placement. Also, analysis of rearrest allows for comparison to other studies that use rearrest as their measure of recidivism. Evaluation of rearrest rates provides a sense of the *maximum rate* of known reoffending that occurs over time.

- Rearrest rates for Probation Placements have been consistently lower than rearrest rates for JCC Releases since FY 1999 (with the exception of the 3-month rearrest rates in FY 1999, FY 2000, and FY 2003).
- The 12-month rearrest rate for JCC Releases increased from 49.5% in FY 2003 to 52.1% in FY 2004. For Probation Placements, the 12-month rearrest rate increased from 34.9% in FY 2003 to 35.6% in FY 2004 (the first increase since FY 1999).
- Rearrest rates by time to reoffense are listed in the table above.
 - For JCC Releases, rearrest rates at most time intervals increased between FY 1999 and FY 2002 (except 36-months for FY 2001 and 6-months for FY 2002). Rearrest rates decreased for all measurement intervals in FY 2003, then increased in FY 2004.
 - For Probation Placements, rearrest rates at all measurement intervals decreased between FY 1999 and FY 2001. In FY 2002, rearrest rates continued to decline at the 12- and 36-month intervals but increased at the 3-, 6-, and 24-month intervals. The rearrest rates again decreased for all time intervals in FY 2003, then increased in FY 2004.

- Males had higher rearrest rates than females for both JCC Releases and Probation Placements.
- Black juveniles had higher rearrest rates for both JCC Releases and Probation Placements.
- Juveniles who were 14- or 15-years-old at the time of their release from the JCCs (in FY 2004) had higher rearrest rates than most other age groups.
 - Less than one percent (8 juveniles) in FY 2004 were age 13 or younger when they were released from the JCCs. Because this number is small, the rearrest of only a few juveniles strongly influences the rearrest rate.
- For Probation Placements, juveniles who were 15- or 16-years-old at the time of probation placement in FY 2004 had the highest rearrest rates.

RECONVICTION RATES, FY 1999-2004

The official DJJ definition of recidivism requires a new conviction. This rate is preferred because it considers the final adjudication of guilt, rather than the level of arrest activity. Only offenses for which there has been a clear final disposition of guilt are counted as reconvictions. Reconviction rates will increase slightly when reexamined next year because of updated final case dispositions. The large size of the probation placement samples made it impractical to retrieve reconviction data for years prior to FY 2001.

- Reconviction rates for Probation Placements have been consistently lower than the reconviction rates for JCC Releases.
- The 12-month reconviction rate for JCC Releases decreased from 40.1% in FY 2003 to 37.6% in FY 2004. The 12-month reconviction rate for Probation Placements decreased from 25.5% in FY 2003 to 24.2% in FY 2004.
- Reconviction rates by time to reoffense are listed in the table above.
 - For JCC Releases, reconviction rates increased at all time intervals between FY 1999 and FY 2001. In FY 2002, the 6- and 36month reconviction rates declined while the 3-, 12-, and 24-month rates continued to increase. Rates at all time intervals declined in FY 2003. In FY 2004, the reconviction rate at 12-months continued to decrease while the 3-month rate increased.
 - For Probation Placements, reconviction rates increased for the 3-, 6-, 12-, and 24-month intervals between FY 2001 and FY 2002. The reconviction rates of Probation Placements declined for all measurement intervals in FY 2003. In FY 2004 the 12-month reconviction rate continued to decline while the 3- and 6-month rates increased slightly.

- Juveniles who were 15-years-old at the time of their release from the JCCs (in FY 2004) had higher reconviction rates than most other age groups.
 - Less than one percent (8 juveniles) in FY 2004 were age 13 or younger when they were released from the JCCs. Because this number is small, the reconviction of only a few juveniles strongly influences the rate.
- For Probation Placements, juveniles who were 13-years-old at the time of probation placement in FY 2004 had the highest reconviction rates.

REINCARCERATION RATES, FY 1999-2004

DJJ now tracks both juvenile and adult reincarceration. Reincarceration rates are based on any new commitment to a JCC, DOC, or a sentence for time in a local jail. The addition of adult reincarceration data allows for a complete comparison of reoffense rates for all former DJJ wards, from rearrest to possible reincarceration. The inclusion of adult incarceration information, for both the prisons and jails, is especially useful because DJJ retains custody of some wards until age 21.

Reincarceration rates presented in this *Data Resource Guide* may differ from rates presented in previous years because of updated information obtained from DOC and from the Virginia Compensation Board (local jail sentence information) for FY 1999 through FY 2003 JCC Releases.

- Reincarceration rates increased for most follow-up intervals between FY 1999 and FY 2002, except for a decline in the 3-month rate in FY 2001 and the 6-month rate for FY 2002. Rates declined for the 3-, 12-, and 24-month intervals in FY 2003.
- Each year about 8% of JCC Releases are recommitted to the JCCs within 12-months of release. The remaining reincarcerations are into adult facilities.

As mentioned earlier (page 183), the reincarceration rates for FY 2004 are not reported in this *Data Resource Guide*. During a review of the reincarceration analysis, it appeared that results for FY 2004 were not consistent with reincarceration trends noted for previous years. Rather than report these results this year, DJJ will do additional research on the reincarceration data to verify results for inclusion in the next *Data Resource Guide*.

The Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice Risk Assessment Instrument (see Appendix H) is completed by CSU staff to determine a juvenile's relative risk of reoffending. The risk assessment instrument classifies reoffense risk as low, moderate, or high. The risk assessment is completed as part of a social history report, and is therefore not completed for all juveniles. A juvenile's risk assessment score is one of the factors examined when parole supervision level is established. Juveniles with high risk assessment scores usually receive higher levels of parole supervision when first released from the JCCs.

The table above presents the reoffense rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements with completed risk assessment scores. For both JCC Releases and Probation Placements, juveniles with low risk levels had the lowest reoffense rates and juveniles with high risk levels had the highest reoffense rates. These rates are consistent with probable reoffense risk (according to risk score levels). In FY 2004, 6% of JCC Releases and 19% of Probation Placements were missing risk assessment scores.

- Rearrest rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements were essentially the same at the low risk level. JCC Releases had higher reconviction rates than Probation Placements at the low risk level, however.
- For the moderate and high risk levels, both rearrest and reconviction rates for JCC Releases were higher than the rates for Probation Placements.
- The rearrest and reconviction rates for JCC Releases with high risk levels were more than double the rates for those with low risk levels. This was also true for reconviction rates for Probation Placements and the rearrest rate was nearly double.

REARREST RATE COMPARISON FOR JUVENILES PLACED IN VJCCCA PROGRAMS, FY 2002-2004*

VJCCCA programs serve thousands of juveniles each year, with a variety of programs in each locality. One of the outcome measures chosen for evaluation of VJCCCA programs is rearrest (defined as a new petitioned intake or adult arrest). The rearrest rates at 3-, 6- and 12-months follow-up intervals for juveniles who were placed in VJCCCA programs are provided in the table above. For comparative purposes, the rearrest rates for Probation Placements and JCC Releases for these years are also listed.

- The 12-month rearrest rate for VJCCCA Placements decreased from 36.9% in FY 2003 to 36.1% in FY 2004.
- Rearrest rates for VJCCCA Placements for all intervals increased between FY 2002 and FY 2003, then decreased in FY 2004. JCC Releases and Probation Placements rearrest rates showed the opposite pattern (decreasing between FY 2002 and FY 2003, then increasing in FY 2004).
- For FY 2002 through FY 2004, VJCCCA Placements had the highest 3-month rearrest rates when compared to JCC Releases and Probation Placements. The 6- and 12-month rearrest rates for VJCCCA Placements were lower than the rearrest rates for JCC Releases but higher than the rates for Probation Placements.

Twelve-Month Reoffense Rates for Agency Programs and Commitment Alternatives, FY 2002-2004

Many juveniles committed to DJJ participate in programs designed to meet their treatment needs. There are also various programmatic opportunities to assist in the successful return of these committed juveniles to the community. Not all juveniles who are adjudicated guilty are placed in the JCCs, however. There are commitment alternatives available to judges for placement of juveniles who may be better served in non-JCC residential facilities. The table above presents the 12-month reoffense rates for juveniles in these programs who were released from the JCCs or placed in post-dispositional detention programs between FY 2002 to FY 2004.

The table is not intended to provoke a comparison between the different programs – these programs often serve vastly different groups of juveniles with varying offense histories, treatment needs, and skills. Also, some programs serve a small number of youth each year – in such instances the reoffenses of a only few juveniles may result in a seemingly "high" overall reoffense rate. The information in this table may be useful as DJJ evaluates these programs and commitment alternatives over time. Also, these data may serve as a source of comparison for similar programs in other states. The total reoffense rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements are provided to illustrate how individual program and commitment alternative rates contrast with the total reoffense rates. It should be noted that all programs in the table *except post-dispositional detention* are subsets of the overall JCC population; no comparisons are made between program reoffense rates and the overall JCC Releases rates for that reason.

- Substance Abuse Treatment Need all reoffense rates declined between FY 2002 and FY 2003; in FY 2004 the rearrest rate increased but the reconviction rates continued to decline.
- Sex OffenderTreatment Need between FY 2002 and FY 2003 the rearrest and reconviction rates increased, and continued to increase in FY 2004. These rates include only males with a sex offender treatment need (see pages 184 and 185 for the reoffense rates for male JCC Releases).
- Youth Industries Programs all reoffense rates decreased between FY 2002 and FY 2003, and continued to decline in FY 2004. It is notable that for both FY 2003 and FY 2004 the reoffense rates for juveniles who had participated in Youth Industries programs were below the reoffense rates of Probation Placements.
- Hanover JCC Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) all reoffense rates increased between FY 2002 and FY 2003; in FY 2004 all reoffense rates decreased. It is notable that each year the reoffense rates for juveniles who had participated in JROTC at Hanover JCC were below the reoffense rates of Probation Placements.
- **Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) Program** the rearrest rates increased between FY 2002 and FY 2003 while the reconviction rate remained the same; in FY 2004 all reoffense rates declined. It is notable that each year the reoffense rates for juveniles who had participated in the RSAT program were below the reoffense rates of Probation Placements. The RSAT program only serves females in the JCCs (see pages 184 and 185 for the reoffense rates for female JCC Releases).
- Virginia Wilderness Institute (VWI) all reoffense rates increased between FY 2002 and FY 2003, then decreased in FY 2004.
- **Post-Dispositional Detention (with programs)** all reoffense rates decreased between FY 2002 and FY 2003; in FY 2004 the rearrest rate increased while the reconviction rate continued to decline. Although juveniles placed into post-dispositional programs were not in the JCCs, a "reincarceration" rate is reported for FY 2002 and FY 2003 to illustrate the rate of their return to a secure setting.



Appendix J Code of Virginia: Citations Pertaining to DJJ

Title 66 Creation of the Department of Juvenile Justice Creates the Department of Juvenile Justice and provides the authority to establish and operate juvenile correctional centers. §16.1-222 Established powers of Director (Virginia Juvenile Justice Information System) Establishes a separate information system for collecting and maintaining information on juveniles who have had contact with the juvenile justice system. **§16.1-228** General definitions pertaining to Virginia family and juvenile laws Provides the definitions for terms and concepts unique to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. **§16.1-241** Jurisdiction of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court Describes the physical jurisdiction for the Juvenile and Domestic Relations (J&DR) Court and the types of cases, matters, and proceedings for which the court has exclusive jurisdiction. When and how child may be taken into immediate custody §16.1-246 Explains when and how a child may be taken into immediate custody and outlines the acceptable offense classifications and scenarios. §16.1-247 Duties of person taking child into custody Dictates the duties of an official taking a child into custody. It provides specific release options, mandates for parties to notify, and timeframes for judicial review. It differentiates between instances when the court is open and the court is closed. This statute also indicates how long a juvenile that is not being transferred to a facility or institution may be held in custody and where that juvenile may be held.

§16.1-248.1 Criteria for detention or shelter care

Specifies the criteria for placement in secure detention and shelter care, outlining the acceptable offense classifications and scenarios. §16.1-250 Procedures for detention hearing Presents the guidelines followed when a juvenile appears before a judge for a pending charge. 




