Preface

This annual report is submitted pursuant to Item 334 M of the 2007 Appropriation Act. Item 334 M requires that child care appropriations be administered on a sliding fee scale to income eligible families. Item 334 M further requires that:

"The Department of Social Services shall report on the sliding fee scale and eligibility criteria adopted by the Board of Social Services by December 15 of each year."

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Executive Summary

Annual Report on Child Care Sliding Fee Scale

Background

Out of the total state and federal appropriation for day care, the 2007 Appropriation Act requires that certain funds support day care programs administered on a sliding scale basis to income eligible families. The General Assembly requires the State Board of Social Services (Board) to establish rules and regulations for the sliding fee scale and eligibility criteria for child care services. These sliding fee scale regulations and eligibility criteria are required to adjust for variations in the local cost of living index by metropolitan statistical areas.

The Board first established rules and regulations governing the sliding fee scale for child care in October 1997. Since 1998, local departments of social services have been assigned to one of three assistance groups based on metropolitan statistical area groupings, in order to reflect statewide cost of living indicators. These three groups, with adjustments for family size, guide the maximum income limits for child care services.

The maximum family income limits for child care services are based on three different percentages of the federal poverty guidelines: 150% of poverty, 160% of poverty and 185% of poverty. Use of the three particular percentages of the federal poverty guidelines to establish income eligibility limits has been in effect since November 1998. Attached is a chart of the localities in each of the three standard groupings.

Two localities, Fairfax and Alexandria, have waivers to use an approved alternate income eligibility scale in which the maximum family income limit is 250% of the federal poverty guidelines.

A priority group for adults acting in loco parentis has been established. This prioritization enables some families to care for children who may otherwise enter the foster care system. The maximum family income limit for this group has been set at 250% of the poverty guidelines.

The Department of Social Services will continue to modify the sliding fee scale to reflect annual adjustments to the federal poverty guidelines. This will assist in facilitating continued delivery of child care assistance to income eligible families throughout the Commonwealth.

Year 2007 Update

The federal poverty guidelines are adjusted annually; therefore, comparable annual adjustments are made to the sliding fee scale for income eligibility thresholds. Effective October 1, 2007, the rules for the sliding fee scale were adjusted to reflect these changes in the federal poverty guidelines for family size.

These changes are outlined in the following chart. Also attached are the charts defining the metropolitan statistical area groupings.
