




Our Mission

"The Commission is established for the purposes of determining the appropriate recipients of moneys in the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Fund and causing distribution of such moneys for the purposes provided in this chapter, including using moneys in the Fund to (i) provide payments to tobacco farmers as compensation for the adverse economic effects resulting from loss of investment in specialized tobacco equipment and barns and lost tobacco production opportunities associated with a decline in quota and (ii) revitalize tobacco dependent communities."

To the Governor and Members of the General Assembly of Virginia:

The close of fiscal year 2008 marks the Commission's 9th year of promoting economic growth in the Commonwealth's most challenging economic region. Thanks to your vision and continued support, our long-term objectives of indemnification and revitalization are steadily being realized. On behalf of the Commission, I am pleased to report our progress to you in this Annual Report.

Tobacco growers and quota owners in Virginia sustained cataclysmic losses since the Master Settlement Agreement was reached in 1998. The monetary loss was determined to be \$479 million and to date, the Commission, together with other sources, has redeemed 87.1% of that loss and is on course to reach 100% by 2011. This effort has stabilized and supported significant improvements in the economy of Virginia's tobacco-dependent regions.

The Commission's efforts to revitalize tobacco communities have taken many forms, as you will see in the pages that follow. This year, under the leadership of Delegate Kathy Byron, Chairman of the Strategic Planning Committee, the Commission undertook a comprehensive review of its structure and objectives. That effort was enhanced by the Blue Ribbon Advisory Panel, a group of non-Commission members led by former Governor Gerald Balliles to give the Committee impartial advice about Commission practices. The Commission remains indebted to the Blue Ribbon Panel and Delegate Byron's Committee for continuous improvement brought to the Commission through their efforts.

On behalf of the Commission, I am grateful for your continued support and understanding of our mission and look forward to another year of partnership with you in bringing renewed prosperity to this area of the Commonwealth that we are privileged to serve.

Fund Descriptions and Commission Priorities

Using the earnings and corpus from the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Endowment established from securitization proceeds, the Commission made available \$20.2 million for indemnification and \$91.9 million for economic revitalization in the tobacco-growing region in fiscal year 2008. Revitalization is accomplished through seven grant programs that make awards to local governments, government entities (such as Planning District Commissions and Industrial Development Authorities), and non-profit organizations. Awards are guided by the Commission's Strategic Plan, recommended by a committee for each program, and monitored by Commission staff. The Plan's Funding Policies call for projects that maximize leveraging from applicants and other partner organizations, and give preference to projects that have regional participation and generate the most significant outcomes for the residents, businesses and localities in the tobacco region.

Regional Economic Development

Regional economic development funds for Southside and Southwest are designated for projects that will expand and diversify the economic base in the tobacco-dependent region, creating new employment opportunities and reducing dependence on tobacco-related activities. The funds are used to develop industrial sites and business/technology parks, improve water, sewer and other utility infrastructure, establish workforce training facilities, and develop tourism infrastructure. Southside localities and organizations received grants totaling \$20.7 million, and Southwest received grants totaling \$15.9 million.

Education

Education funds are awarded for projects designed to create a world-class workforce in the tobacco region, including scholarships, community college programs, workforce training, and vocational and adult education programs. Grants totaling \$14.0 million were awarded this fiscal year for educational projects, including \$3.9 million to the tobacco region's eight community colleges and \$3.8 million in scholarships and loans for tobacco region residents who are attending four-year degree-granting institutions.

Technology

Technology grants are awarded to develop regional networks that provide open access to high-speed, redundant connectivity at an affordable cost to regional users. These networks will allow the tobacco region to grow businesses that require this connectivity and to more effectively market the region as a location for business development. Grants totaling \$19.1 million were awarded to build infrastructure in the tobacco region. To date, nearly 1,700 miles of fiberoptic "backbone" have been constructed in southern and southwestern Virginia.

Innovation

Innovation grants include three areas of funding: Special Projects, Tobacco Region Opportunity Fund (TROF), and Agribusiness.


Grants are awarded under the Special Projects fund for projects that benefit several localities within one region or have the potential to have a significant impact on the economy of the tobacco region as a whole. These funds are provided for projects such as research facilities and regional business development that impact the larger geographic area. Special Projects totaling \$5.5 million were funded this fiscal year for projects such as regional water systems, energy research and development centers, motorsports, e-commerce and regional tourism destinations.

The TROF was created to revitalize the economies of the tobacco region through incentive grants to companies that will create new jobs and bring new private capital investment of at least \$1 million to localities within the region. This fund is successfully assisting communities by diversifying their economic base and reducing dependency on tobacco-related employment. The Commission works closely with the Virginia Economic Development Partnership to leverage the Governor's Opportunity Fund. The Commission made \$15.0 in commitments to help attract 44 new companies, create 4,408 new jobs, and provide \$508 million in capital investment to the tobacco region.

Agribusiness grants are awarded to assist tobacco producers and the tobacco region's agricultural community in diversifying into new production opportunities and developing value-added enterprises. Eleven agribusiness projects received grants totaling \$1.7 million for programs and facilities, including regional programs for beef cattle incentives, aquaculture development, bioenergy and cooperatively marketing locally-grown produce.

Indemnification

Total quota losses for a given year are calculated to be the difference between that year and the average quota for 1995-98. According to the Code of Virginia, the total value of quota in Virginia is estimated to be \$1.2 billion, and the Commission has adopted a rate of \$12 per pound to compensate for those losses (to be divided between producers and quota owners). Annually, the Commission determines an amount to be made available for indemnification of these losses. From its inception through the end of fiscal year 2008, the Commission has made available for indemnification \$247.1 million, leaving a remaining obligation of \$61.8 million for losses through 2002, the effective year of the federal tobacco quota buyout. Actual amounts paid are determined by verification forms submitted to the Commission by producers and quota owners. Over 46,500 claims were processed in the fiscal year.



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
