Preface

Item 140 (c.11.d.3b) of Chapter 879, 2008 Acts of Assembly, requires school divisions to submit data to the Department of Education in order to receive funding from the Lottery Proceeds Fund for add-on services related to educationally at-risk students.

The language in Item 140 reads as follows, with the language specific to this report underlined:

11. Remedial Education Payments

a. An additional payment estimated at \$69,725,259 the first year and \$69,542,608 the second year from the general fund shall be disbursed by the Department of Education to support the Board of Education's Standards of Quality prevention, intervention, and remediation program adopted in June 2003.

b. The payment shall be calculated based on one hour of additional instruction per day for identified students, using the three year average percent of students eligible for the federal Free Lunch program as a proxy for students needing such services. Fall membership shall be multiplied by the three year average divisionlevel Free Lunch eligibility percentage to determine the estimated number of students eligible for services. Pupil-teacher ratios shall be applied to the estimated number of eligible students to determine the number of instructional positions needed for each school division. The pupil-teacher ratio applied for each school division shall range from 10:1 for those divisions with the most severe combined three year average failure rates for English and math Standards of Learning test scores to 18:1 for those divisions with the lowest combined three year average failure rates for English and math Standards scores.

c. Funding shall be matched by the local government based on the composite index of local ability-to-pay.

d. An additional state payment estimated at \$67,028,394 the first year and \$66,581,683 the second year from the Lottery Proceeds Fund shall be disbursed based on the estimated number of federal Free Lunch participants, in support of programs for students who are educationally at risk. The additional payment shall be based on the state share of:

1) A minimum one percent add-on, as a percent of the per pupil basic aid cost, for each child who qualifies for the federal Free Lunch Program; and

2) An addition to the add-on, based on the concentration of children qualifying for the federal Free Lunch Program. Based on its percentage of Free Lunch participants, each school division will receive between 1 and 12 percent in additional basic aid per Free Lunch participant. These funds shall be matched by the local government, based on the composite index of local ability-to-pay.

3a) Local school divisions are required to spend the established at-risk payment (state and local share) on approved programs for students who are educationally at risk.

b) To receive these funds, each school division shall certify to the Department of Education that the state and local shares of the at-risk payment will be used to support approved programs for students who are educationally at risk and shall submit, in a format specified by the Department of Education, the school division's comprehensive strategy for intervention, prevention, and remediation, including the number of students served and review of available data. These programs may include: Dropout Prevention, community and school-based truancy officer programs, Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), Project Discovery, Reading Recovery, programs for students who speak English as a second language, or programs related to increasing the success of disadvantaged students in completing a high school degree and providing opportunities to encourage further education and training. Further, any new funds a school division receives in excess of the amounts received in fiscal year 2008 may be used first to provide data coordinators or to purchase similar services for schools that have not met Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under the federal No Child Left Behind Act or are not fully accredited under the Standards of Accreditation. The data coordinator position is intended to provide schools with needed support in the area of data analysis and interpretation for instructional purposes, as well as overall data management and the administration of state assessments. The position would primarily focus on data related to instruction and school improvement, including: student assessment, student attendance, student/teacher engagement, behavior referrals, suspensions, retention, and graduation rates.

In August of 2008, the Superintendent of Public Instruction distributed a memorandum to school divisions that included a survey instrument to be completed by school divisions. This memo is located at http://www.doe.virginia.gov/info_centers/superintendents_memos/2008/08_aug/ad

 $\underline{m031.html}$. The survey instrument was due back to the Department in October of 2008. As of the date of this report, all school divisions have responded to the survey.

The survey instrument administered to school divisions included a list of potential uses of at-risk funds as well as the inclusion of an additional category to capture and describe any uses that were not part of the list provided.

This report summarizes the data submitted by local school divisions and provides detailed information on the uses of funds by all reporting school divisions.

Actual and Planned Uses of At-Risk Funds for 2007-2008 and 2008-2009

All reporting school divisions plan to participate in the at-risk program and have certified that they will meet the corresponding required local match for fiscal year 2009. The five most frequently cited actual uses of these funds for fiscal year 2008 and planned uses of these funds for fiscal year 2009 include, in order of significance, the following:

- grades K-8 Standards of Learning (SOL) remediation during the school day or before or after school;
- SOL remediation at the secondary level during the school day or before- or after-school;
- alternative educational programs for suspended or expelled students;
- dropout prevention; and
- programs for English as a Second Language (ESL) students.

Across all reporting school divisions, nine divisions (or seven percent) reported other planned uses of at-risk funds. The other uses of these funds include:

- additional mathematics programs for grades 4 8; and
- consultant for data analysis training.

The statewide totals of actual and planned uses of at-risk funds for 2007-2008 and 2008-2009 are indicated in Table 1. Appendix A includes the actual uses of at-risk funds for 2007-2008 by division, and Appendix B includes the planned uses of at-risk funds for 2008-2009 by division.

Budget for Actual and Planned Uses of At-Risk Programs of Prevention, Intervention and Remediation for 2007-2008 and 2008-2009

Table 2 shows the actual expenditures for 2007-2008 and the planned expenditures for 2008-2009 by funding stream for the programs paid for with At-risk funds as indicated in Table 1. In many cases school divisions used funds from other state and federal sources to supplement the At-risk funds in paying for those programs.

Item 140, Paragraph C.11.d.3.b, Chapter 879, 2008 Acts of Assembly states that any new funds a school division receives in excess of the amounts received in fiscal year 2008 may be used first to provide data coordinators or to purchase similar services for schools that have not met Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) under the federal No Child Left Behind Act or are not fully accredited under the Standards of Accreditation. The data coordinator position is intended to provide schools with needed support in the area of data analysis and interpretation for instructional purposes, as well as overall data management and the administration of state assessments. The position would primarily focus on data related to instruction and school improvement, including: student assessment, student attendance, student/teacher engagement, behavior referrals, suspensions, retention, and graduation rates. In 2007-2008, eight percent of the divisions used this additional funding for this purpose and in 2008-2009, twelve percent of the divisions plan to use this additional funding for this purpose.

Data for Programs of Prevention, Intervention, and Remediation for 2007-2008 Paid for with At-Risk Funds

Table 3 displays information reported by school divisions regarding the number of students enrolled in at-risk programs in the 2007-2008 school year. It is important to note that not all students enrolled in these programs were assessed under the Virginia Assessment Program because these students were not enrolled in tested grades or courses. (Students in grades K-2 are not assessed nor are students in grades 9-12 who are enrolled in non SOL courses such as 9-10th grade English.)

To further evaluate the efficacy of the programs paid for with At-risk funds, the Department of Education analyzed data on the pass rates of students identified as disadvantaged or non-disadvantaged in 2003-2004, the first year of SOL test data used for the SOQ Programs of Prevention, Intervention and Remediation, and compared it to the pass rates of students identified as disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged in 2007-2008 for reading and mathematics. Appendix E provides the achievement gap data by division for reading and Appendix F provides achievement gap data by division for mathematics.
