# Improving Access to Pharmacy Services Through Virginia's Community Health Centers, Migrant Health Centers, Health Care for the Homeless Programs and Rural Health Clinics

Section I - The Commonwealth of Virginia General Assembly appropriated funds to the Virginia Primary Care Association (VPCA), dba, Virginia Community Healthcare Association "for the purchase of pharmaceuticals and medically necessary pharmacy supplies, and to provide pharmacy services to low income, uninsured patients of Community and Migrant Health Centers throughout Virginia.

#### Summary of our results for the year ending June 30, 2010 follows:

- > Funds allocated have been expended for the following purposes:
  - Purchase of medications, partnering with local pharmacies, including paying dispensing fees
  - Purchase or upgrade computers to run *The Pharmacy Connection software*, maintain license of product and obtain latest version of TPC
  - Staff and associated office supplies and postage to operate an enhanced patient medication assistance program
- ➤ Virginia's community health centers have leveraged \$433,750 of state funding into more than \$65,581,363 (average wholesale price) worth of medications through accessing corporate indigent pharmaceutical programs to assist some of the Commonwealth's neediest citizens. *This was an increase over the prior year of \$21,943,005 worth of medications* that were distributed to the citizens of the Commonwealth.
- Medications have been made available to over 37,916 low income and uninsured Virginians in over 60 counties/municipalities throughout the Commonwealth.
- > That means that on average, every \$1 invested leveraged over \$159 worth of medications (average wholesale cost).
- > Sixty-three percent of this assistance has helped the poorest of the poor-those under 100 percent of the federal poverty level. The remaining funds assisted those under 200 percent of the federal poverty level.
- > The average per patient cost was \$10.87. The average per patient value of medication received was \$1,729.65. The value of medications received per patient increased during the last fiscal year.

For the twelve months ending June 30, 2010, our centers have provided pharmacy assistance for a total of 37,916 patients with the following characteristics:

**Section III** - The Commonwealth of Virginia General Assembly appropriated \$175,000 in funds to the Virginia Primary Care Association (doing business as the Virginia Community Healthcare Association), "to expand access to care provided through community health centers."

Funds were distributed to the members of the Association for outreach activities with special emphasis on National Health Center Week activities to provide the most exposure for CHCs in the Commonwealth. In 2009, these organizations served an additional 29,729 patients, 15,689 of which were uninsured. These numbers represented an increase of 13.1% overall patients and 19.1% increase in the number of uninsured. From CY2008 to CY2009, the total number of patient visits increased by 133,854 representing an increase of 17.1%. The total number of uninsured patient visits increased from CY2007 to CY2008 by 46,087 which is an 18.3% increase.

A listing of the National Health Center Week activities by center, which are for celebration and outreach purposes, is attached as part of this report.

**Section IV** - The Commonwealth of Virginia General Assembly appropriated \$1,710,000 in funds to the Virginia Primary Care Association (doing business as the Virginia Community Healthcare Association), to "support community health center operating costs for service provided to uninsured clients."

The Virginia Community Healthcare Association distributed funds to all members who have service sites in the Commonwealth. For calendar year 2008, the 105 individual service sites saw 82,232 uninsured patients which accounted for 252,084 encounters with medical providers. In calendar year 2009, the number of uninsured patients increased to 97,921, an increase of 15,689 uninsured patients. Their encounters with medical providers increased 46,087 to 298,171 visits. The cost absorbed per uninsured visit for calendar year 2009 was \$5.74 (\$1.71M/298,171) whereas the CY 2009 average cost per visit for all CHCs in Virginia was \$137.67.

Attached you will find detail of the pharmacy funding and expenses by CHC as well as graphs of uninsured patient trends and cost per encounter in Virginia's CHCs.



## Patient Trends - by Insurance Status


STATEWIDE (VA)
