Item 304.K.1 of the 2011 *Appropriation Act* requires the Commissioner of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS)¹ to convene a state and community planning team and develop a timeline to transition, beginning in fiscal year 2010, 88 individuals living at Southeastern Virginia Training Center (SEVTC) to community services.

You received the first report on July 1, 2009 under Item 315.CC.1. The attached report is an update on the plan and timeline to downsize SEVTC from its current census of 126 individuals beginning on June 1, 2011.

Item 304 K.1-2 1 - Progress Report on the Plan and Timeline for Downsizing Southeastern Virginia Training Center

QUARTERLY UPDATE July 1, 2011

Item 315.CC.1. (now Item 304.K.1-2.) of the 2009 *Appropriation Act* (now Item 304 K.1-2) requires the Commissioner of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS)¹ to convene a state and community planning team and develop a timeline to transition, beginning in fiscal year 2010, 88 individuals living at Southeastern Virginia Training Center (SEVTC) to community services. The language is outlined below:

"The state and community planning team, under the direction of the commissioner, shall develop a timeline to appropriately transition 88 state facility consumers beginning in fiscal year 2010 to community services in the locality of their residence prior to admission or the locality of their choice after discharge or to another state facility if individual assessments and service plans have been completed, appropriate community housing is available and consumer choice has been considered. The commissioner shall provide the preliminary plan and timeline to the Governor and the General Assembly by July 1, 2009 and a progress report regarding the plan for resizing and rebuilding the facility by October 1,2009 and quarterly thereafter until the new facility and community facilities have been constructed and are complete. The final report shall outline the location where patients are discharged and any cost savings associated with the facility resizing and community transition."

This report is an update to the July 1, 2009 preliminary plan and timeline to downsize SEVTC from its census of 154 individuals on July 1, 2009.

The 2009 General Assembly also required DGS with the cooperation and support of DBHDS to rebuild and resize SEVTC to 75 beds beginning in fiscal year 2010:

C-103.05. A. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the following provisions shall be implemented:

- 1. The Department of General Services (DGS), with the cooperation and support of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services (DMHMRSAS), shall rebuild and resize the Southeastern Virginia Training Center to a 75-bed facility to serve profound and severely disabled clients;
- 2. The Director, Department of Planning and Budget, shall transfer \$23,768,000 of the amount appropriated in Chapter 1 and Chapter 2, 2008 Acts of Assembly, Special Session I for project 17458 (Repair/Replace Southeastern Virginia Training Center) for the purpose stated in paragraph A.1. of this item;
- 3. The Department of General Services, with the cooperation and support of the Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Substance Abuse Services (DMHMRSAS), shall build, acquire, or renovate 12 community-based Intermediate Care Facilities (ICF/MR) and 6 MR

Homes in Health Planning Region V. Priority should be given to projects which can be completed on existing state-owned property within Health Planning Region V;
4. The Director, Department of Planning and Budget shall transfer \$8,438,160 of the amount appropriated in Chapter 1 and Chapter 2, 2008 Acts of Assembly, Special Session I for project 17457, (Repair/Replace Central Virginia Training Center) for the purpose stated in paragraph A.3. of this item.

The plan outlined in Appendix A is an update to the original plan submitted on July 1, 2009, and measures the progress in meeting the expectations and goals outlined in the original plan. The plan seeks to reduce the number of individuals living at SEVTC from a census of 154 to 75 or fewer individuals in two fiscal years. This update shows modifications to the original estimated completion timelines. The original plan estimated a completion of community SEVTC construction before September 30, 2011. Due to delays in negotiating Funding Agreements between DBHDS and the CSBs/local governments, construction of the community ICF homes and transition of residents to those homes will not be substantially completed until June 30, 2012.

Appendix A contains an update to the detailed plan and timelines to transition individuals to the community. The components and major milestones of the original plan were developed in consultation with the state and community planning team referenced in Item 315.CC.1 (now Item 304.K.1-2.), known as the SEVTC Advisory Committee. The Advisory Committee met regularly from January 2009 until October 2010 when construction design and planning was completed. The Advisory Committee includes SEVTC facility staff, individuals living at SEVTC, family members, community services board (CSB) representatives, private providers, and other key stakeholders.²

Assessments and Choice:

Every individual living at SEVTC must be assessed to determine their individual support needs and interest in living in the community. CSB intellectual disability (ID) case managers and directors have been working with facility staff, family members, and individuals at SEVTC since January 2009 to determine the individual needs of every person living at SEVTC. Needs are assessed through a variety of tools, including service treatment plans, medical history, and Supports Intensity Scale (SIS) instrument.

The SIS is an assessment scale that measures the level of intensity of supports needed by the individual to maintain a life-style appropriate to his or her age and preferences. It was recently adopted by the Commonwealth as a uniform assessment instrument for all persons living in a state-operated training center or who are being served under the ID Waiver.

SIS assessments have shown that there are very few individuals, if any, being served at SEVTC for whom there cannot be found someone currently living in the community whose needs are just as great. It is also very true that the population of individuals at SEVTC as a whole has far greater needs than the average needs of individuals being supported through community services.

It is especially important that great care be given to find the most appropriate match between each individual and the services provider.

CSB case managers have been providing information to families upon request about the possible options that currently exist in the community system, setting up tours, and providing assistance where needed. The following activities have been completed or are ongoing to date:

- CSB ID directors and case managers engaged with SEVTC families to discuss community options (ongoing).
- Develop criteria to determine which individuals will likely continue to reside at the new 75bed SEVTC and which individuals should explore community placement options (August 2009).
- Initial communication with families about the criteria which will guide decisions about SEVTC and community residence (August 2009).
- Successful transitioning of 28 individuals from SEVTC to community homes and census reduction to 126 (through June 2011). Additional residents are expected to move throughout the summer of 2011 as 5 of 6 waiver homes are ready for occupancy.
- Communication via letter to each family member or authorized representative requesting a meeting with CSB and SEVTC staff to discuss future living options (June 2010).
- Ongoing communication between CSBs and SEVTC staff and families regarding transitions to the community and placement in a waiver group home or an ICF. As of June 2011, 13 individuals have agreed to transition to a waiver group home, 28 individuals have agreed to transition to a community ICF (ongoing).

The following process was piloted and shared with the SEVTC Advisory Committee to assess whether individuals will likely continue to reside at the new 75-bed SEVTC or should explore community options:

- *Clinical Committee:* SEVTC professional staff met and used assessment data and information contained in the resident record to develop "blind" profiles of each individual living at SEVTC and their support needs. These "blind" profiles were stripped of any identifying information and then given to a selection committee.
- Selection Committee: The selection committee was composed of SEVTC staff and ID Directors from four CSBs who rate each person on each of the criteria elements on a five point Likert scale. Those summaries were then arranged into two groups: (1) those likely to reside at the new 75-bed SEVTC; and, (2) those who should consider a community ICF/MR or waiver home. The following criteria was used by the selection committee to determine which of the placement options were most appropriate:

• Those with significant support needs related to behavior

- 1. Intensive behavioral support due to aggression, property destruction, running away, self-injury, sexual behavior, or other individual behavior support considerations
- 2. Safety/security, requirement for mechanical/physical restraint or medication on an emergency basis

- 3. Unique or specialized behavioral considerations.
 - Those with significant support needs related to health and medical issues
 - 1. Extensive support due to impaired functional mobility such as upper and lower extremity involvement, non-ambulatory, or ambulatory/wheelchair.
 - 2. Specialized support for meals and feeding.
 - 3. High risk or specialized medical conditions
 - Those with significant staffing support requirements
 - 1. Support staff (1:1, Continuous, Routine/General)
 - 2. Nursing (Immediate support, within 1 hour, within 1 day, within 1 week and/or continuous nursing treatment, hourly treatment, daily treatment, weekly treatment)
 - Those with additional considerations (Age or other individual factors)
- Oversight Committee: A committee composed of the SEVTC facility director, Region V
 CSB executive directors, another training center director, parents, and Central Office
 representatives met to oversee the work of the clinical and selection committees to ensure the
 process was blind, fair, and updated frequently to ensure the most recent clinical and
 behavioral needs of individuals were included in the assessments.

The pilot process was first conducted in July, updated in October 2009, and again in February, 2010. The process has yielded preliminary information on how many people required more intensive services and those individuals that would have a less complicated transition to the community with appropriate supports and planning at that time. This information is shown below.

A letter was sent to all families and authorized representatives in June 2010 to set up a meeting to discuss future living options. Between June and September 2010, 18 meetings were held and five individuals were discharged. As mentioned previously, as of June 2011, the census at SEVTC is 126 individuals. Thirteen individuals have agreed to transition to a waiver group home and 28 individuals have agreed to transition to a community ICF once construction is completed.

CSBs and SEVTC staff will continue to directly engage each individual who meets community placement criteria and their family members to consider community options in one of the homes under construction.

Construction of SEVTC and Community Homes:

The 2009 General Assembly required the Department of General Services (DGS), in collaboration with DBHDS, to rebuild and resize SEVTC to a 75-bed facility beginning in fiscal year 2010. The General Assembly also requires DGS, in collaboration with DBHDS, to construct or renovate12 community ICFs/MR and six waiver homes in Health Planning Region V for residents of SEVTC. Based on these requirements, DGS accepted an unsolicited Public-Private Education and Infrastructure Act (PPEA) proposal in April 2009 and received one competing proposal in July 2009. The following table outlines the original anticipated timeline for construction and the updated timeline:

DBHDS is working closely with local CSB executive directors to ensure the assessment group's work is closely tied to the construction timelines for community homes. In addition, community CSBs and DBHDS are working to ensure:

- Waiver homes and ICFs/MR built within each CSBs' jurisdiction reflect needs of the people currently receiving services at SEVTC who will move to the community.
- ICF/MR certification process and waiver home licensing processes can be completed in a timely manner to ensure no delay for individuals transitioning to community placements once construction is completed.
- In cooperation with DGS, determine how the \$8.4 million in community capital funding will be quickly drawn down for construction, as well as when and how ownership of the community homes will be transferred from the Commonwealth to CSBs.
- Mechanisms are explored for CSBs to address start-up costs and other expenses related to community capacity building that cannot be funded with the \$8.4 million.

Workforce Transition:

Many of the employees currently working at SEVTC can transition to work in the community as the facility downsizes to 75 beds in 2011. DBHDS human resources staff met several times in 2009 with SEVTC staff, CSBs and private providers to discuss training, job skills and other information that will be helpful for staff as they transition to positions in the community. It is anticipated that the majority of staffing reductions, and all Direct Service Assistant (DSA) reductions, will occur through attrition. In FY10, 44 positions were abolished - 4 through the Workforce Transition Act (WTA) process and 40 through attrition. As of November 30, 2010, there are 395 classified positions filled and reductions will continue as resident census declines. As the rate of community transitions increases, further staffing reductions will be made. Because of the high rate of turnover in the DSA positions, reductions can be managed through holding positions vacant and not rehiring. Other career professionals such as social workers, rehabilitation specialists, and occupational therapists will likely remain employed at the facility since there will continue to be individuals living at the new SEVTC.

State and Local Coordination:

Appendix A contains a detailed chart outlining the major milestones in the plan and updates since the plan was first submitted on July 1, 2009. WM Jordan was selected as the developer in December 2009. WM Jordan will provide construction services for both the new 75-bed facility and the community homes. DBHDS has been working closely with the Health Planning Region V CSB executive directors, the SEVTC facility director, and others to determine the criteria that will be used to engage families and individuals at SEVTC who could potentially reside in the community. This work will continue until the completion of construction at SEVTC. At this time, the local CSBs have agreed to the following and are working actively with WM Jordan to identify specific site locations for homes. Three locations for an ICF/MR are outstanding and will be resolved in the coming months.

A technical assistance workgroup has been formed to assist the local CSBs with preparation for community ICF/MR certification. This workgroup convened on March 10, 2010, and is anticipated to continue its work until all community ICFs/MR are certified by Virginia Department of Health.

Another critical partnership is that of DGS and DBHDS. DBHDS continues to work closely with DGS to ensure the bricks and mortar aspects of building and development match the needs of the individuals to be served and the local CSB who will be providing supports to these individuals. DBHDS anticipates maintaining this relationship going forward throughout the construction and downsizing process to ensure completion of the community homes and the new 75-bed facility.

Table 1 shows changes in the census over time. This table includes admissions for emergency stays. Emergency stays are used for stabilization and behavioral consultation; emergency stays are up to 75 days and may cross over months. It was originally anticipated that SEVTC would continue to provide these crisis stabilization services when it was rebuilt and resized. However, the 2011 General Assembly provided \$5 million to develop a crisis management program for individuals with intellectual disabilities in this region of the Commonwealth. Once this system is operational (June 2012), SEVTC will no longer provide these services.
