## A Word from the Director...

Greetings!

Welcome to the 11th publication of the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) *Data Resource Guide* (DRG). The DRG provides a comprehensive look at juvenile justice activity in the Commonwealth of Virginia. This publication contains an overview of the agency; its mission; its vision; and information on community programs, institutional programs, and juvenile reoffense rates. Sections 2.2-222, 16.1-309.3, and 66-13 of the *Code of Virginia* and Chapters 755 and 914 of the 1996 Acts of the General Assembly require DJJ to produce an annual summation of statistics and trends in Virginia's juvenile justice system. Specifically, DJJ is to report on juvenile offender demographics, including age, offense type, committing court, and recidivism rates of juveniles committed to agencies within the Secretariat of Public Safety. The annual report must also address the progress of Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA) programs. Chapter 890 of the 2011 Virginia Acts of Assembly (The Appropriation Act, Item 399 (G.) (2011)) combines the reporting requirements into one document, and the DRG is the vehicle that consolidates these reporting requirements into a single report.

After 11 editions of the DRG using the current format, it is time to make a critical assessment of its use, its audience, and its purpose. It is time for the DRG to take its next evolutionary step. In doing so, DJJ is looking toward moving from a paper-based document to a web-based product that will offer the reader/user more opportunities to interact with and search the data. We are hoping to develop a web-based application for the DRG that will allow a greater capacity for collecting, organizing, and distributing the data. So, next year, you can anticipate a new look and a new vision for the DRG. We are very excited about the possibilities.

In response to Executive Order No. 11, DJJ developed a four-year re-entry strategic plan in 2010 with the mission to promote public safety and accountability by implementing a seamless plan of services for each offender for a successful transition and reintegration in the community. While some re-entry programs already existed, DJJ expanded upon these and developed several additional re-entry programs to support the Governor's and DJJ's re-entry initiative. Please refer to the following page for additional details on DJJ's re-entry efforts.

I want to conclude this letter with several expressions of gratitude. I wish to thank the Department of Criminal Justice Services and the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention for their role in assisting DJJ with the publishing of the DRG. Additionally, it is imperative that I thank DJJ staff and all staff for their hard work and dedication to serving the Commonwealth's juvenile justice system.

## Re-Entry Initiative

### Executive Order No. 11 (2010)

- Governor McDonnell established the Virginia Prisoner and Juvenile Offender Re-Entry Council.
- Mandates a long-term re-entry strategic plan for achieving the goal of reducing offender recidivism for those released from a secure facility
- Requires the Council to establish work groups and subcommittees to implement the provisions of the strategic plan and other re-entry reforms in the Commonwealth
- Effective May 11, 2010

## Re-Entry Mission

Promoting successful youth, strong families and safe communities through public safety and accountability by implementing a seamless plan of services for each offender for a successful transition and re-integration in the community.

## Re-Entry Goals

- Promote public safety and juvenile offender accountability
- Ensure juvenile offenders have an individualized plan for re-entry from commitment through release from supervision
- Improve re-entry outcomes by enhancing the service delivery system to become more comprehensive, continuous, and evidence-based
- Improve re-entry outcomes by providing opportunities for progressively increased responsibility and freedom
- Develop and nurture existing partnerships and collaborations to support successful re-entry in the community
- Create an organizational culture that supports risk reduction and re-entry work with juvenile offenders
- Conduct ongoing monitoring and evaluation of the re-entry strategic plan
- Engage juvenile offenders and families in successful re-entry

## Re-Entry Highlights

- **Badges for Baseball** – The Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation pairs juveniles with law enforcement officers who serve as mentors in a structured activity-based and curriculum-based program.
- **Family Link Pilot Video Visitation** – The Family Link program allows juveniles and their family members to visit via video in collaborative sites operated by DJJ and non-profit agencies.
- **Mental Health Services Transition Plans** – For those juveniles with mental health needs, DJJ staff, community services providers, and juveniles and their families collaboratively develop a plan for a seamless transition to the community with no lapse in mental health services.
- **Mentoring Project** – DJJ collaborates with the Virginia Mentoring Partnership to create positive relationships between caring adults and juveniles.
- **Second Chance Act Grant for Re-Entry** – The program includes a comprehensive range of services and graduated re-entry options for juveniles to be released on parole in the Tidewater area.
- **Youth Industries** – DJJ partners with the Department of Correctional Education to provide vocational skills training to juveniles.
- **Work/Education Release Program (WERP)** – DJJ partners with the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to prepare eligible juveniles for successful transition to the community by providing life skills training, transitional living arrangements, employability skills and job placements in the community, as appropriate.

## Terms and Concepts

**Admission:** the physical arrival of a juvenile at a facility when he or she is officially entered into the facility's responsible population count.

**Adjudication:** the findings of a court on whether a juvenile is innocent or not innocent based on the evidence presented at the adjudicatory hearing. If the juvenile is found not innocent, he or she is adjudicated delinquent for that offense.

**Adjudicatory Hearing:** a court hearing on the merits of a petition filed (alleging a delinquent act, CHINS, or CHINSup) to determine whether a juvenile is innocent or not innocent.

**Blended Sentence:** the sentencing option for a juvenile convicted in circuit court, which combines a juvenile disposition with an adult sentence. Va. Code §16.1-272 allows the circuit court to impose an adult sentence with a portion of that sentence to be served in a juvenile correctional center (JCC) and provides that the judge may suspend the adult sentence pending successful completion of the juvenile disposition.

**Certification:** when, after a preliminary hearing determines there is probable cause for a juvenile 14 years of age or older charged with a violent juvenile felony, jurisdiction for the case is transferred to circuit court for a trial as an adult. If the juvenile is charged with capital murder, first or second degree murder, lynching, or aggravated malicious wounding, the case is automatically certified to circuit court for trial. If the juvenile is charged with any other violent juvenile felony, the case may be certified to circuit court based on the discretion of the Commonwealth's Attorney. Any juvenile convicted in circuit court after certification will be treated as an adult in all future criminal cases. See Va. Code §16.1-269.1.

**Child in Need of Services (CHINS):** a child whose behavior, conduct, or condition presents or results in a serious threat to (i) the well-being and physical safety of that child or, (ii) if under the age of 14, the well-being and physical safety of another person. To meet the definition of CHINS, there must be a clear and substantial danger to the life or health of the child or another person, and the intervention of the court must be found to be essential to provide the treatment, rehabilitation, or services needed by the child or the child's family. See Va. Code §16.1-228.

**Child in Need of Supervision (CHINSup):** a child who (i) is habitually and without justification absent from school despite opportunity and reasonable efforts to keep him or her in school, (ii) runs away from his or her family or lawful custodian on more than one occasion, or (iii) escapes from or leaves a court-ordered residential placement without permission. See Va. Code §16.1-228.

**Commitment:** a court order at a dispositional hearing placing a juvenile in the custody of DJJ for a determinate or indeterminate period of time. To be eligible for commitment, a juvenile must be 11 years of age or older and adjudicated delinquent or convicted of a felony offense, a Class 1 misdemeanor and a prior felony, or

four Class 1 misdemeanors that were not part of the same incident. See Va. Code §16.1-278.8. A commitment to DJJ differs from an admission to the Reception and Diagnostic Center (RDC). An admission to RDC may occur days or weeks after the juvenile is committed to DJJ (during which time he or she is held in secure detention). A single admission to RDC could be the result of multiple commitments to DJJ (for example, a juvenile may be committed to DJJ by more than one court). For these reasons, the number of commitments to DJJ in a fiscal year may be different from the number of admissions to RDC.

**Court Service Unit (CSU):** a locally- or state-operated entity that provides services to a juvenile court, including intake, investigations and reports, probation, parole, counseling, and other related services in the community.

**Delinquent Offense:** an act committed by a juvenile that would be a felony or misdemeanor if committed by an adult, designated under state law, a local ordinance, or federal law. Delinquent offenses do not include status offenses.

**Detention Assessment Instrument (DAI):** a detention screening tool used by CSU intake officers to guide detention decisions using objective criteria. See Appendix K.

**Detention Hearing:** a judicial hearing held pursuant to Va. Code §16.1-250 that determines whether a juvenile should be placed in detention, continue to be held in detention, or be released until an adjudicatory hearing.

**Detention Home:** a local, regional, or state public or private locked residential facility that has construction fixtures designed to prevent escape and to restrict the movement and activities of juveniles held in lawful custody. Detention homes may house juveniles both pre-dispositionally and post-dispositionally. See Va. Code §§16.1-248.1, 16.1-278.8, and 16.1-284.1.

**Detention Placements:** a decision made by an intake officer or judge to detain a juvenile in a detention home. A detention placement differs from a detention admission. A detention admission occurs when a juvenile physically enters a facility either through direct placement or through transfer from another detention home. Therefore, during one detention placement, a juvenile may have several detention admissions.

**Determinate Commitment:** the commitment of a juvenile, 14 years of age or older, to DJJ as a serious juvenile offender. The court specifies the length of the commitment, has continuing jurisdiction over the juvenile, and must conduct periodic reviews if the juvenile remains in direct care for longer than 24 months. A juvenile can be committed to DJJ as a serious juvenile offender for up to seven years, not to exceed the juvenile's 21st birthday. See Va. Code §16.1-285.1.

**Direct Care:** the time during which a resident, who is committed to DJJ pursuant to Va. Code §16.1-272 or subsections A 14 or A 17 of Va. Code §16.1-278.8, is under the supervision of staff in a juvenile residential facility operated or contracted for by DJJ or an alternative

placement.

**Disposition:** a court order determining what will happen to a juvenile adjudicated delinquent.

**Dispositional Hearing:** a hearing in juvenile court which occurs after the juvenile is adjudicated delinquent. During this hearing, the court may impose treatment services and sanctions. The dispositional hearing is similar to a sentencing hearing in a criminal court. See Va. Code §16.1-278.8.

**Diversion:** the handling of a juvenile delinquency intake complaint in an informal manner rather than through the official court process. The intake officer must develop a plan for the juvenile that may include counseling, informal supervision, restitution, community service, and other programs. The juvenile and his parents must agree to the diversion plan. Informal supervision is limited to 90 days for truancy and 120 days for all other offenses. The following complaints may not be diverted: an alleged violent juvenile felony; a complaint after a prior diversion or adjudication on a felony offense; and a second or subsequent truancy complaint. See Va. Code §§16.1-227 and 16.1-260.

**Domestic Relations:** matters before the juvenile court having to do with the family and child welfare, including child custody, visitation, paternity, and other petitions delineated in Va. Code §16.1-241. Criminal and delinquent matters are not included.

**Fiscal Year (FY):** the time period measured from July 1st of one year to June 30th of the following year. For instance, FY 2011 begins July 1, 2010, and ends June 30, 2011.

**Group Home:** a juvenile residential facility that is a community-based, home-like single dwelling or its acceptable equivalent. Placements can be pre-dispositional or post-dispositional.

**Halfway House:** a residential facility housing juveniles in transition from direct care to the community. Services provided include independent living and employment skills.

**Indeterminate Commitment:** the commitment of a juvenile to DJJ in which the juvenile's length of stay (LOS) is calculated based on statutory requirements and the LOS Guidelines. The commitment may not exceed 36 continuous months except in cases of murder or manslaughter or extend past a juvenile's 21st birthday. See Va. Code §§16.1-285 and 16.1-278.8(14).

**Intake Case:** a juvenile with one or more intake complaints involving a delinquent act, a CHINS, or a CHINSup.

**Intake Complaint:** a request for the processing of a petition to initiate court action in a juvenile court. An intake officer at the CSU decides whether to file a petition initiating formal court action.

**Juvenile Correctional Center (JCC):** a secure facility operated by or under contract with DJJ where 24 hour-per-day care is provided to juveniles committed to DJJ after admission to RDC. Services provided during this period include supervision, education, treatment services,

recreational services, and a variety of special programs.

**Juvenile Court:** a juvenile and domestic relations district court.

**Length of Stay (LOS) Guidelines:** a framework established by the Board of Juvenile Justice, as mandated by Va. Code §66-10, to determine the length of time a juvenile indeterminately committed to DJJ will remain in direct care. Factors that affect a resident's LOS include the seriousness of the offense, the juvenile's history of offense behavior, the juvenile's behavior while in direct care, and the juvenile's progress toward completing treatment goals. See Appendix E.

**Major Offender:** a juvenile who is indeterminately committed to DJJ for an offense of murder, attempted murder, voluntary manslaughter, involuntary manslaughter, rape, aggravated sexual battery, forcible sodomy, object sexual penetration, armed robbery, carjacking, malicious wounding of a law enforcement officer, aggravated malicious wounding, felonious injury by mob, abduction, felonious poisoning, adulteration of products, or arson of an occupied dwelling. A major offender requires administrative review before being released.

**Parole:** a period of supervision and monitoring of a juvenile in the community following his or her release from commitment.

**Petition:** a document filed with the juvenile court by the intake officer, initiating formal court action. Petitions may allege that a juvenile is delinquent, a CHINS, a CHINSup, or an abused or neglected child; may be for domestic relations purposes; or may be for other actions over which the juvenile court has jurisdiction (e.g., protective orders, work permits, a minor seeking judicial consent for medical procedures).

**Post-Dispositional (Post-D) Detention with Programs:** the ordering of a juvenile by a judge to a detention home for up to six months with structured programs of treatment and services intended to maintain and build community ties. To be eligible for post-D detention, a juvenile must be 14 years of age or older and found to have committed a nonviolent juvenile felony or a Class 1 or Class 2 misdemeanor offense that is punishable by confinement in a state or local secure facility. See Va. Code §§16.1-278.8(A16) and 16.1-284.1(B).

**Post-Dispositional (Post-D) Detention without Programs:** the ordering of a juvenile by a judge to a detention home for up to 30 days without special programs provided. To be eligible for post-D detention, a juvenile must be 14 years of age or older and found to have committed a nonviolent juvenile felony or a Class 1 or Class 2 misdemeanor offense that is punishable by confinement in a state or local secure facility. Va. Code §§16.1-284.1, 16.1-291, and 16.1-292 provide additional statutory criteria that need to be satisfied prior to placement.

**Pre-Dispositional (Pre-D) Detention:** the confinement in a detention home of a juvenile awaiting a dispositional or adjudicatory hearing. To be eligible for pre-D detention, the judge, intake officer, or magistrate must find probable cause establishing that the juvenile committed a Class 1 misdemeanor or a felony offense. In addition, the juvenile must be a clear and substantial threat to another person, the property of others,

or to himself. Va. Code §16.1-248.1 provides the criteria under which a juvenile may be detained prior to disposition.

**Pre-D and Post-D Reports:** documents prepared (i) within the timelines established by approved procedures when ordered by the court, (ii) for each juvenile placed on probation supervision, (iii) for each juvenile committed to DJJ or placed in post-D detention with programs, or (iv) upon written request from another CSU when accompanied by a court order. The report must include the identifying and demographic information for the juvenile, including current offense and prior court involvement; social, medical, psychological, and educational information about the juvenile; information about the juvenile's family; and dispositional and treatment recommendations if permitted by the court.

**Probation:** the court-ordered disposition placing a juvenile under the supervision of a CSU in the community for a specified length of time and requiring compliance with specified rules and conditions.

**Psychotropic Medication:** drugs that affect the mind, perception, behavior, or mood. Common types include antidepressants, anxiolytics or anti-anxiety agents, antipsychotics, and mood stabilizers.

**REACH:** a behavior modification program instituted in the JCCs that involves concepts of responsibility, empowerment, achievement, change, and hope. The program focuses on identifying desired behaviors, tracking inappropriate behaviors, providing feedback, and using a system of phases through which juveniles can advance.

**Recidivism Rate:** the percentage of individuals who reoffend. DJJ's definition of recidivism is the percentage of individuals who are found by a court to have committed, after being (a) placed on probation or (b) released from confinement, a delinquent or criminal act other than violation of probation or parole within one year. See definition of Reoffense Rates.

**Region:** in order to better manage the use of community resources statewide, DJJ divides Virginia into geographical regions. Prior to FY 2011, there were three Regions: Region I (Western), Region II (Northern), and Region III (Eastern). In FY 2011, the regions were reconfigured into six regions. See page 12 for a description of the regions.

**Reoffense Rates:** the percentage of individuals who commit another offense, measured in this document by (i) Rearrest- a petition filed at intake for a new delinquent complaint or an adult arrest for a new criminal offense, (ii) Reconviction- a delinquent adjudication or guilty conviction for a delinquent or criminal offense, and (iii) Reincarceration- a return to a JCC or an incarceration in an adult facility after having been previously released from a JCC. See definition of Recidivism Rate.

**Resident:** a juvenile residing in a JCC, detention home, or group home on a 24 hour-per-day basis.

**Serious Juvenile Offender:** a resident who is committed to DJJ and given a determinate commitment. See Va. Code §16.1-285.1.

**Shelter Care:** a facility or emergency shelter specifically approved to provide a range of services, as needed, on an individual basis not to exceed 90 days. See Va. Code §16.1-248.1.

**Status Offense:** an act prohibited by law that would not be an offense if committed by an adult, such as truancy, curfew violation, or running away.

**Transfer:** when juvenile court, after consideration of specific statutory factors, determines the juvenile court is not the proper court for the proceedings involving a juvenile 14 years of age or older at the time of the offense who is accused of a felony, other than a violent juvenile felony, and transfers jurisdiction to the circuit court.

**Transfer Hearing:** a hearing in juvenile court wherein the juvenile court judge determines whether the juvenile court should retain jurisdiction or transfer the case for criminal proceedings in circuit court. A transfer hearing is initiated by the attorney for the Commonwealth filing a motion in the juvenile court for a hearing. The judge must determine that the act would be a felony if committed by an adult and examine issues of competency, the juvenile's history, and specific statutory factors. Any juvenile convicted in circuit court after transfer will be treated as an adult in all future criminal cases. See Va. Code §16.1-269.1.

**Violent Juvenile Felony:** any of the delinquent acts enumerated in Va. Code subsection B or C of §16.1-269.1 when committed by a juvenile 14 years of age or older. The offenses include murder, felonious injury by mob, abduction, malicious wounding, malicious wounding of a law enforcement officer, felonious poisoning, adulteration of products, robbery, carjacking, rape, forcible sodomy, and sexual object penetration. See Va. Code §16.1-228.

**Youth Assessment & Screening Instrument (YASI):** a validated tool which provides an objective classification of an individual's risk of reoffending by assessing both static and dynamic risk and protective factors in 10 distinct functional domains. See Appendix H.

## A Note to Readers

This report uses a number of terms and concepts that may be unfamiliar to the reader or may be defined specifically for DJJ. A review of the information included in the Terms and Concepts section above and in Appendices D, E, I, and J should assist in understanding the data reported in this *Data Resource Guide*. Also, it should be noted that data reported for prior years in previous editions of this publication may be slightly different from data reported this year. These discrepancies are due to data cleaning and information updates that occur throughout the year unless otherwise indicated.

## Introduction to the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ)

To accomplish its mission, the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) provides an integrated approach to juvenile justice. It brings together current research and best practices to better understand and modify delinquent behavior; to meet the needs of offenders, victims, and communities; and to manage activities and resources in a responsible and proactive manner.

### A BALANCED APPROACH

DJJ responds to juvenile offenders through a balanced approach that provides (i) protection of public safety by control of a juvenile's liberty through community supervision and secure confinement; (ii) a structured system of incentives and graduated sanctions in both institutional and community settings to ensure accountability for the juvenile's actions; and (iii) a variety of services and programs that build skills and competencies (e.g., substance abuse treatment, support for academic and vocational education, aggression management treatment) to enable the juvenile to become a law-abiding member of the community upon release from DJJ's supervision.

### INDIVIDUALIZED, RISK-BASED SERVICES

DJJ is committed to the principle that the greatest impact on juvenile offending can be realized by focusing resources on those juvenile offenders with the highest risk of reoffending and by addressing the individual criminogenic risk factors that contribute to the initiation and continuation of delinquent behavior. Using a set of research-based and consensus-based instruments at different decision points within the juvenile justice system, DJJ classifies juveniles into different levels of risk. These points include the initial decision to detain, the assignment to various levels of community probation or parole supervision, and the classification of committed juveniles to guide appropriate placement within the institutional setting.

In addition to the matching of the most intensive resources to those juveniles with the highest risk, DJJ recognizes that successful outcomes require services that are individualized to the needs of juveniles, families, and communities. The presence of specific risk factors are assessed and addressed in order to increase the likelihood of successful outcomes. Issues implicated in juvenile offending include gang involvement, substance abuse, aggression management, truancy, and other school-related problems. The application of appropriate social control and sanctioning strategies such as electronic monitoring, urine drug testing, and various levels of supervision are also matched to the juvenile's individualized circumstances. Incentives such as early release from supervision, extended curfew, and recreational outings with volunteers are used to reward success and improve the chances of long-term behavior change.

### DATA-DRIVEN MANAGEMENT

Over the past several years, DJJ has greatly enhanced its ability to effectively plan for and manage juveniles, programs, services, and other resources. DJJ designed functional management information systems and used the data generated and reported from these systems to better understand the juvenile population, activities in relation to those

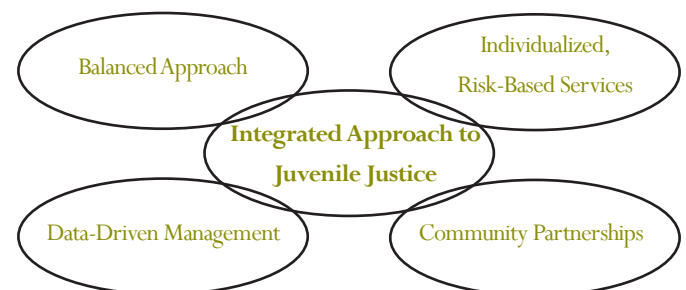

juveniles, and methods to become more effective and efficient. The Department's electronic data collection system is comprised of modules covering the full range of institutional and community-based activities. DJJ's philosophy is that sound management of public resources and adherence to its core mission are enhanced through data-based decision-making.

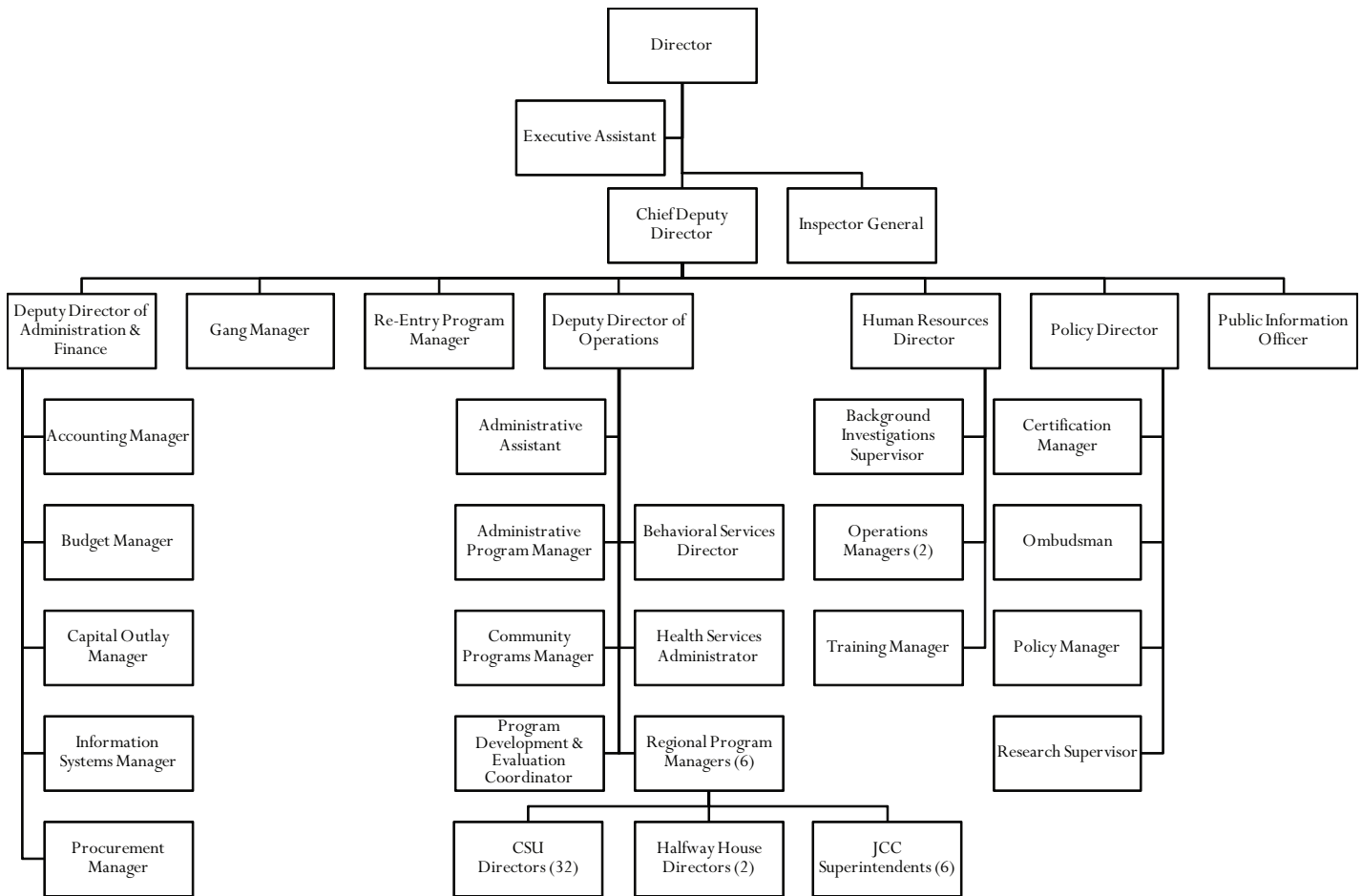
### COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

While DJJ has the primary responsibility for many aspects of Virginia's juvenile justice system, collaborative partnerships with state and local agencies and programs as well as private sector service providers are the cornerstone of the DJJ approach. Local governments and commissions operate a network of secure detention facilities and an array of services addressing each aspect of the balanced approach. Within each community, DJJ works with law enforcement, behavioral health providers, schools, social services, and other agencies. Securing services from private providers assists DJJ in meeting the needs of juvenile offenders, their families, and communities. At the state level, DJJ works with other executive, legislative, and judicial branch agencies in a similar manner.

Through the application of the integrated approach to juvenile justice, DJJ continues to make a difference in the lives of citizens and communities across the Commonwealth. Through responsible resource management, performance accountability, and sound intervention strategies, DJJ strives to improve and meet the changing demands of juvenile justice.

## Agency Organization

DJJ serves the Commonwealth by providing support for community programs and services, community supervision and case management, and the custody and care of committed juveniles.

The Department's central office in Richmond coordinates the functions and funding for the court service units, community programs, community facilities, state facilities, volunteers, and private providers.

Administered by the Director, agency functions are divided among the following:

- The Director oversees the Inspector General's Office and the Chief Deputy Director.
- The Chief Deputy Director oversees the Deputy Director of Administration and Finance, Deputy Director of Operations, Human Resources Director, Policy Director, Gang Manager, Re-Entry Program Manager, and Public Information Officer.
- The Deputy Director of Administration and Finance oversees the Accounting Manager, Budget Manager, Capital Outlay Manager, Information Systems Manager, and Procurement Manager.
- The Deputy Director of Operations oversees the Administrative Program Manager, Behavioral Services Director, Community Programs Manager, Health Services Administrator, Program Development & Evaluation Coordinator, and six Regional Program Managers. The six Regional Program Managers oversee the 32 CSU Directors, two Halfway House Directors, and six JCC Superintendents.
- The Human Resources Director oversees the Background Investigation Supervisor, two Operations Managers, and the Training Manager.
- The Policy Director oversees the Certification Manager, Ombudsman, Policy Manager, and Research Supervisor.

## Board of Juvenile Justice

The State Board of Juvenile Justice (Board) is established by § 66-4 of the *Code of Virginia*. The Board consists of seven members appointed by the Governor of Virginia and confirmed by the Virginia General Assembly.

The term of office for Board members is four years, and no member may be appointed to serve more than two successive terms. Appointments to fill vacancies serve the remainder of the unexpired terms, and then may be eligible for two additional, successive, four-year terms after the term of the vacancy expired.

The Board meets at least four times each year; a majority of the current membership constitutes a quorum. Board meetings are open to the public, and public comment may be received at each meeting.

Section 66-10 of the *Code of Virginia* gives the Board its general powers and duties. Additional powers and duties, both mandatory and discretionary, are provided for in various sections, generally in Titles 16.1 and 66 of the *Code of Virginia*.

**Barbara J. Myers** (*Vice Chair, appointed in 2006*) – Dr. Myers is an Associate Professor of Psychology and the Director of the Developmental Psychology Program at Virginia Commonwealth University. Dr. Myers holds a doctoral degree from Temple University.

**Anthony W. Bailey** (*appointed in 2011*) – Mr. Bailey is a Senior Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney for the City of Harrisonburg and Rockingham County. Mr. Bailey is a graduate of Virginia State University and Creighton University School of Law.

**Kecia N. Brothers** (*appointed in 2008*) – Ms. Brothers is employed with the Department of Defense as the Child and Youth Director for the Norfolk Naval Shipyard and the Naval Medical Center. Ms. Brothers is a graduate of Norfolk State University, where she earned undergraduate and graduate degrees.

**The Honorable Tamara C. Neo** (*appointed in 2011*) – Ms. Neo is an attorney and the former Commonwealth's Attorney for Buchanan County. Ms. Neo is a graduate of Rice University, the University of Colorado School of Law, and the University of Colorado at Denver.

**The Honorable Kenneth W. Stolle** (*appointed in 2010*) – Sheriff Stolle is the sheriff of the City of Virginia Beach. He is a graduate of Berry College and passed the Virginia State Bar in 1983.

**Justin M. Wilson** (*appointed in 2006*) – Mr. Wilson is a Senior System Architect with the National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak). Mr. Wilson is a graduate of Virginia Commonwealth University.

## DJJ Historical Timeline (FY 1989-2011)

### 1989

- § 66-1 is enacted, separating the Department of Youth Services (DYS) from the Department of Corrections (DOC).

### 1990

- The new executive branch agency opens under the name “Department of Youth and Family Services” (DYFS).

### 1994

- § 16.1-269.1 Transfer and waiver is amended to lower the age at which juveniles can be tried as adults for violent crimes from 15 to 14 years.
- § 16.1-285.1 Commitment of Serious Offender Statute allows the court to commit a juvenile for a determinate length of time and stipulates conditions and purposes of such commitments.

### 1995

- § 16.1-309.2 establishes the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA) to provide funding for local programs and services for low-level juvenile offenders who are before the court or at intake and provides community-based services for juveniles and their families, holding the juveniles responsible for their actions.

### 1996

- Chapter 503 of the Acts of the Assembly renames the Agency to “Department of Juvenile Justice” (DJJ).
- Chapter 755 and Chapter 914 of the Acts of the Assembly establish the Juvenile Justice Reform Act.
  - § 16.1-269.1 Transfer and waiver is amended to create provisions for automatic and prosecutorial certification and preliminary hearings for certification as an adult.
  - § 16.1-285 is amended to stipulate that no juvenile committed indeterminately will be held/detained longer than 36 continuous months or beyond the juvenile’s 21<sup>st</sup> birthday.
  - Renames “Learning Centers” to “Juvenile Correctional Centers” (JCCs)
  - § 66-10 (8) establishes Length of Stay (LOS) guidelines for juveniles indeterminately committed to DJJ and requires the Board to make such guidelines available for public comment.
  - § 16.1-285.1 Commitment of Serious Offender Statute is amended.
    - Allows the court to order parole supervision, but total of commitment and parole time cannot exceed seven years or continue past a juvenile’s 21<sup>st</sup> birthday.
    - Criteria added to determine appropriate placement of committed juveniles.

### 1997

- Expansion of Beaumont and Bon Air JCCs.

### 1998

- Virginia Wilderness Institute (VWI) opens as a private placement for committed youth with a 32-bed capacity (Closed December 31, 2008).

### 1999

- Culpeper JCC is opened with a capacity of 112 beds. This is the first new facility for DJJ since Oak Ridge JCC opened in 1982.
- Culpeper Detention Home, Virginia’s only statewide detention home, is opened with a capacity of 50 beds (Closed July 1, 2007).

### 2000

- The classification system is implemented for use in JCCs (See page 160).
- § 16.1-278.8 (14) is amended to raise the criteria for commitment of a juvenile to DJJ to a minimum of four misdemeanor adjudications.

### 2002

- § 16.1-285.1 is amended to expand criteria for court to determinately commit juveniles who have been transferred to and found guilty by a circuit court for any felony offense.

### 2003

- § 16.1-228 is amended to modify the definition of CHINS to include a child under the age of 14 “whose behavior, conduct, or condition presents or results in a serious threat to the well-being and physical safety of another person.”
- §§ 16.1-272 and 16.1-285.2 amended allowing a circuit court to utilize a blended sentence option to include DJJ commitment and an active DOC sentence.
- §§ 16.1-235, 16.1-236.1, and 16.1-236 are amended to delineate the power to hire, fire, and transfer CSU personnel. DJJ will hire probation and probation supervisory staff; judiciary will select the CSU director.

- § 16.1-278.8(14) is amended to require prior misdemeanor offenses to be of separate acts or transactions before becoming eligible for commitment.
- Community Placement Program (CPP) at Shenandoah Valley Juvenile Center opens as a placement alternative for committed youth with a capacity of 10 beds (Closed December 31, 2007).

### 2005

- §§ 66-25.1:1 through 66-25.1:4 are enacted to grant DJJ the authority to establish a juvenile work release program.
- § 16.1-293.1 is enacted to require the development of a mental health transition plan for certain committed juveniles upon release from a JCC.
- Barrett JCC is closed due to population reduction and is mothballed.
- Community Placement Program (CPP) at Chesapeake Juvenile Services opens as a placement alternative for committed youth with a capacity of 10 beds (Closed December 31, 2008).

### 2006

- § 16.1-290 is amended to require child support payments from the date the juvenile is received by DJJ (§§ 20-108.1 and 20-108.2).
- §§ 16.1-249.1, 16.1-278.7:01, and 16.1-278.7:02 are created, requiring DJJ and local secure facilities to notify state police concerning certain juvenile sexual offenders for purposes of registration in the Sex Offender and Crimes Against Minors Registry. DJJ must also inform those juveniles of their obligation to register.
- §§ 16.1-300 and 16.1-301 are amended to allow social history information relating to criminal street gang activity to be shared with state police and local law enforcement for investigatory or prosecutorial purposes.

### 2007

- REACH, the Department's institutional behavior management program, is implemented in the JCCs.
- § 16.1-323 is amended, § 16.1-323.1 is created, and §§ 16.1-324 through 16.1-330 are repealed, adopting the new Interstate Compact Relating to Juveniles.
- §§ 9.1-176.1, 16.1-237, 16.1-299.1, 19.2-303, 19.2-303.3, 19.2-310.2, and 53.1-145 are amended relating to the collection of DNA samples for juveniles convicted for a felony committed at 14 years of age or older and DJJ's role in the collection of those samples.
- § 16.1-271 is amended pertaining to a juvenile certified to be tried as an adult but not convicted. If a juvenile is tried as an adult but is not convicted, jurisdiction over that juvenile for any future alleged delinquent or criminal behavior will be returned to the juvenile court.

### 2008

- §§ 16.1-272, 53.1-202.2, and 53.1-202.3 are amended to allow a juvenile who is convicted as an adult and committed to DJJ followed by an active term with DOC to be eligible to earn sentence credits for the portion of his or her sentence served in a JCC.
- §§ 22.1-323.2, 37.2-408, 63.2-1737, and 66-24 are amended and §37.2-408.1 is added to abolish the interdepartmental regulation of juvenile residential facilities and requires the Departments of Education (DOE), Juvenile Justice (DJJ), Social Services (DSS), and the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) to promulgate separate regulations for the juvenile residential facilities they license and certify.

### 2009

- Virginia State Crime Commission completed its three year study of the juvenile justice system, resulting in changes to §§ 4.1-305 (possession of alcohol by persons underage), 16.1-237 (photographs as part of the juvenile record), 16.1-260 (clarifying diversion requirements), and 18.2-57.2 (petitions in cases of family abuse) of the *Code of Virginia*.

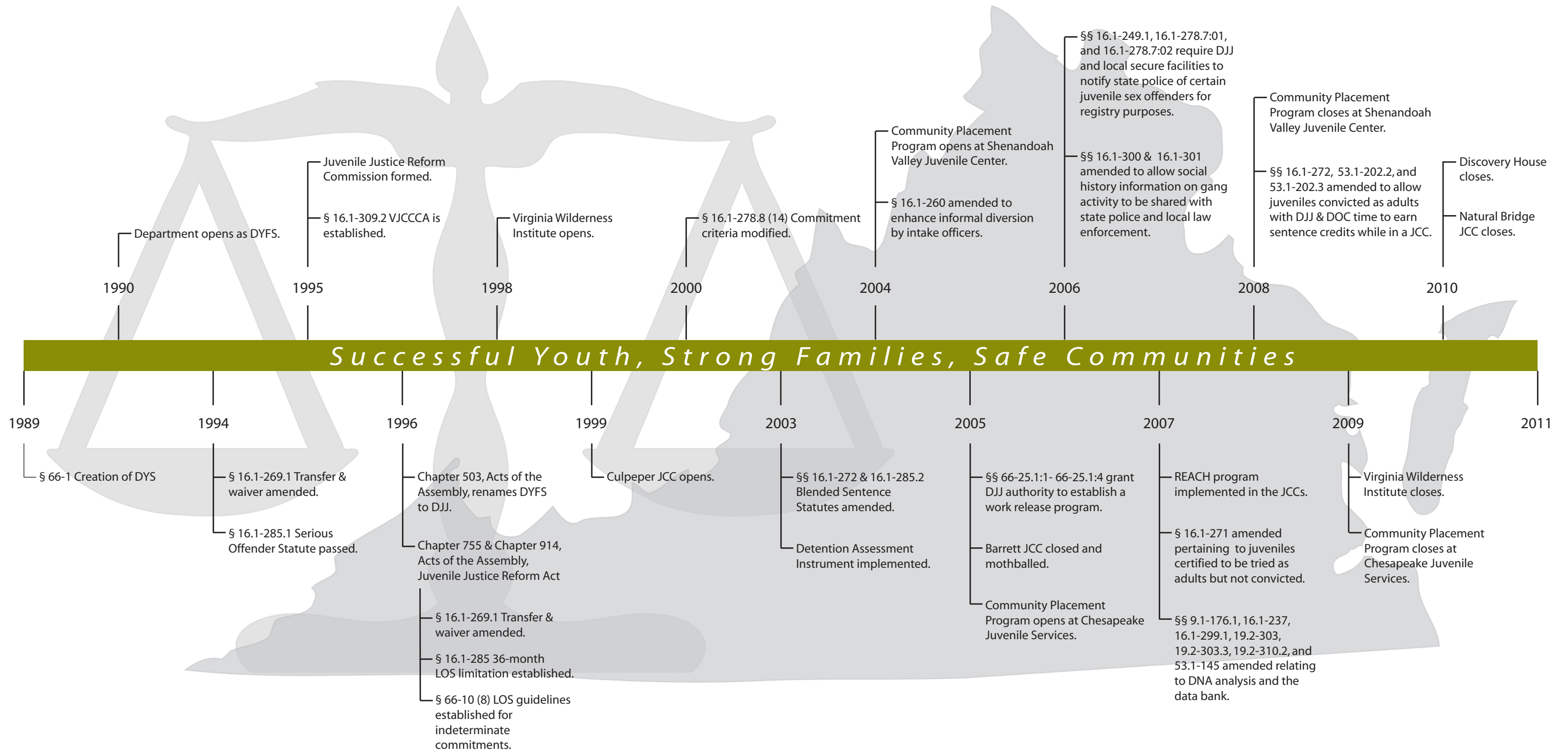

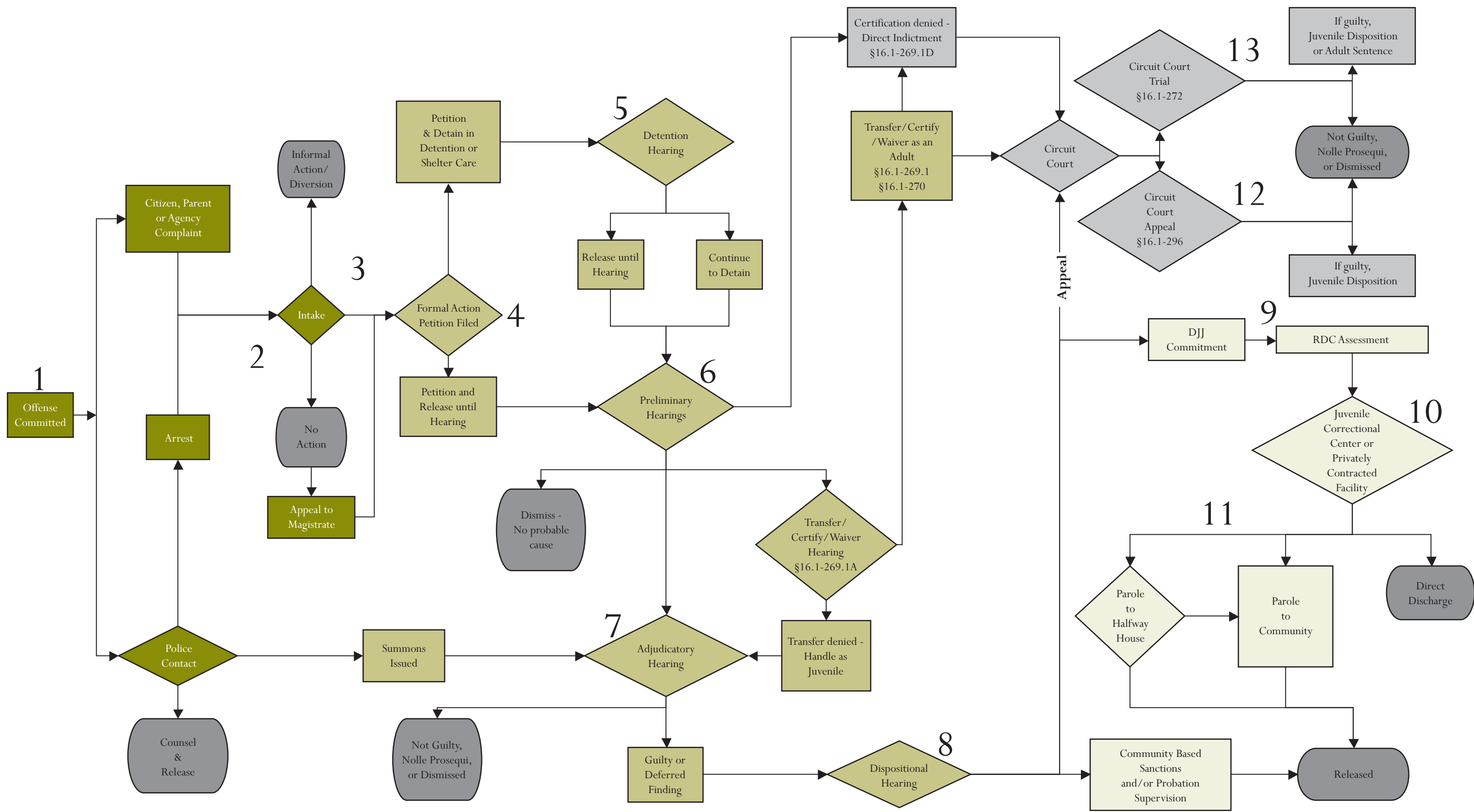

## STEPS IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM

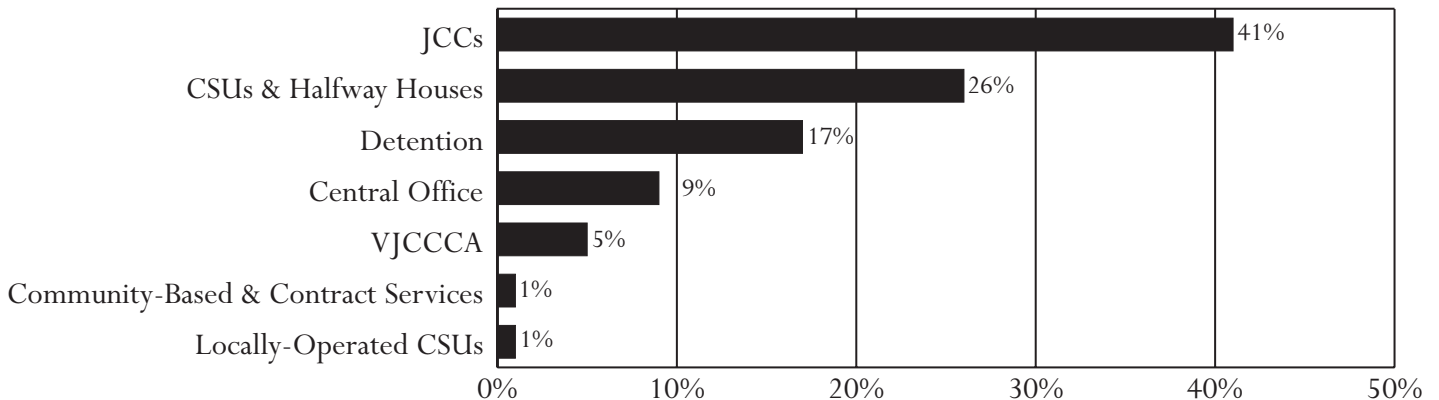
1. The juvenile enters the system when an offense is committed and reported by a parent, citizen, agency, or police.
2. Upon contact with police, a decision is made to either counsel and release the juvenile back to the community or to arrest. If a parent, citizen, or agency made the complaint, the complaint goes to intake.
3. An intake officer at the CSU makes the decision whether to take no action, to take informal action such as diversion, or to file a petition. In some cases, a police officer or the original complainant will appeal to the magistrate if they disagree with the intake officer's decision. The magistrate may certify the charge, and the matter is returned to intake to file a petition.
4. Once a petition has been filed, an intake officer decides if the juvenile should be detained or released to his or her parent/guardian. The decision is based on the juvenile's risk to self, community, or flight and is guided by completion of the Detention Assessment Instrument (see Appendix K).
5. If the decision is made to detain the juvenile, a detention hearing is held within 72 hours in the juvenile and domestic relations district court to determine if there is probable cause that the juvenile committed the alleged act and if further detention is needed.
6. A preliminary hearing is held to ensure that the case has enough merit to carry it to trial. Issues of competency, insanity, subpoenas, and witnesses are also addressed. If no probable cause exists, the case is dismissed. If probable cause is determined, the case moves to the adjudicatory hearing. If the juvenile is transferred for trial as an adult, the case goes to the circuit court (see step 13).
7. Delinquency is determined at the adjudicatory hearing. Witnesses and testimony are presented similar to an adult trial. If found innocent, the case is dismissed. If found not innocent, a dispositional hearing is held.
8. At the dispositional hearing, the pre-dispositional report is used to assist the judge with information to determine the most appropriate options for the case. The court decides if the juvenile will be committed to DJJ or face community sanctions such as warnings, restitutions, or fines. Dispositional alternatives that may be imposed are placement on probation, which includes participation in CSU programs, or referral to local services or facilities, other agencies, private placement, or post-dispositional detention.
9. If committed to DJJ, the juvenile must undergo psychological, educational, social, and medical evaluations at RDC.
10. From RDC, the juvenile is transferred to a JCC, where he or she receives 24-hour supervision, education, treatment services, recreational services, and a variety of special programs.
11. After completion of the commitment, a juvenile may be placed on parole or directly released. During parole, the juvenile transitions to the community through agency program efforts and local services. Some juveniles may need 24-hour residential care and treatment services provided by a halfway house. Upon completion of parole or entry into the adult criminal justice system, the juvenile is released from the DJJ supervision.
12. A case may be sent into the appeals process following the dispositional hearing. After presentation to the circuit court, the case is reconsidered *de novo* (like new). If the juvenile is found innocent, the case is dismissed. If found not innocent, the circuit court judge administers an appropriate juvenile disposition.
13. If the juvenile was transferred for trial as an adult in circuit court, a criminal trial will take place. If found not guilty, the case is dismissed. If found guilty, the judge will decide whether to render a juvenile disposition or an adult sentence.

During FY 2011, the Department expended a total of \$191.7 million. Of that amount, 23% was in transfer payments to localities for VJCCCA, detention, and locally-operated CSUs.

## Operational Regions

DJJ's operations are currently organized in six regions, each overseen by a regional program manager who reports to the Deputy Director of Operations. The regions are geographically divided into Central, Eastern, Northern, Northwestern, Southern, and Western and include CSUs, JCCs, and halfway houses. These regions have been in place since June 2011.

Prior to FY 2010, DJJ operated under two divisions: the Division of Institutions, which managed the juvenile correctional centers, and the Division of Community Programs, which managed the CSUs, halfway houses, and other community-based services. These divisions worked together to facilitate the successful transition of juveniles between the community and juvenile correctional centers. Following a review of operational functionality in FY 2010, DJJ merged the two divisions into a unified Division of Operations in order to streamline communications, operations, procedures, and practices. In FY 2011, the final stage of the merger assigned the CSUs, JCCs, and halfway houses into the six regions as listed below. See page 19 for a map of the regions.

## DJJ Training Unit

The DJJ Training Unit is responsible for providing or facilitating training for the 3,000+ employees and affiliates of the Department. The Training Unit's mission is to provide quality training that addresses specific job functions and duties, matches the experience level of the participants, responds to current topics and trends, and assists individuals in meeting their annual training requirements. Organized as a centralized unit with the main training facility at Cedar Lodge in Richmond, training is also delivered across the Commonwealth. On average, each of the Training Unit's biannual calendar offers 300 training dates in 62 topical areas. The Training Unit supports DJJ's mission by implementing, supporting, or facilitating programs for each division.

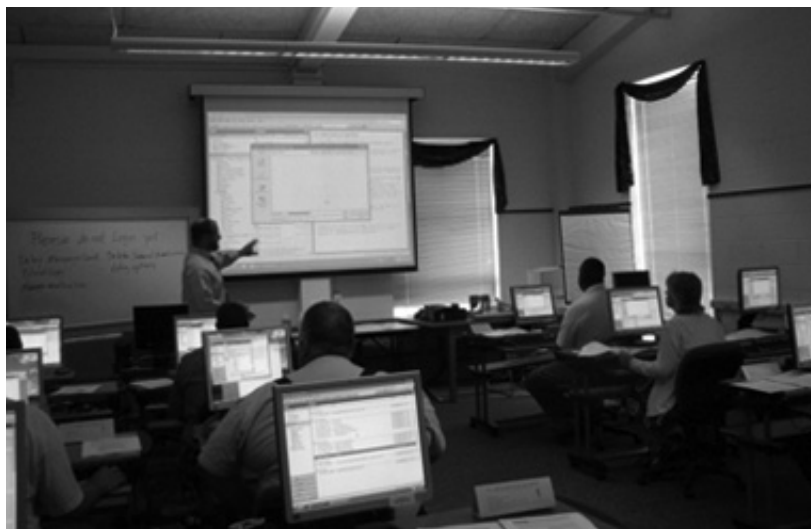

### Statewide Initiatives:

**LMS** – The DJJ Knowledge Center, DJJ's Learning Management System (LMS), manages training through a variety of avenues. It allows the Training Unit to manage classes, instructors, locations, and training records. It provides a streamlined system of measuring performance outcomes and the applicability of classes and resource materials. It allows managers, supervisors, and the Certification Unit to access records and reports to ensure compliance with regulations, policies, and procedures. All employees benefit from this system with the following options available: online registration; directions to training locations; online classes and immediate course credit; immediate online access to student transcripts; online research using juvenile and criminal justice links; access to policies, procedures, regulations, resource material, and "Frequently Asked Questions;" survey assessments; and access to a criminal justice glossary.

**MVP** – The Managing Virginia Program (MVP) is a statewide initiative to standardize training for the Commonwealth's managers and supervisors. DJJ is one of 41 agencies involved in establishing management competencies and criteria and developing a range of training opportunities for managers and supervisors. In order to meet core competencies, DJJ has designed a Toolkit for the Supervisors Program. All newly hired and promoted supervisors have the opportunity to attend this course within the first 90 days of hire or promotion.

## Introduction to Community Programs

The Community Programs Section of the Division of Operations is responsible for providing a continuum of community-based services to juvenile offenders. The following briefly describes these services:

### COURT SERVICE UNIT FUNCTIONS

#### Juvenile Intake

Intake services are provided 24 hours a day at each of the 35 court service units (CSUs) across the state. The intake officer on duty has the authority to receive, review, and process complaints for delinquency cases and status offenses.

Based on the information gathered, a determination is made whether a petition should be filed to initiate proceedings in the juvenile and domestic relations district court. For juveniles determined to be appropriate, the officer may develop a diversion plan with informal supervision for up to 90 days and referrals to community resources. If a petition is filed, the officer must decide whether the juvenile should be released to a parent/guardian or another responsible adult, placed in a detention alternative, or detained pending a court hearing. Decisions by DJJ intake officers concerning detention are guided by the completion of the Detention Assessment Instrument (DAI). Implemented in November 2002, the DAI guides detention decisions using standard criteria (See Appendix K). An evaluation of the initial implementation of this instrument was completed in 2004, and a validation study was completed in 2006.

#### Investigations and Reports

Pre-dispositional reports, also called social histories, constitute the majority of the reports completed by CSU personnel. These reports describe the social adjustment and circumstances of youth. Some are

court-ordered prior to disposition while others are completed following placement on probation as required by DJJ regulations and procedures. A risk assessment instrument is completed at the same time as the social history, classifying the juveniles according to their relative risk of reoffending. Beginning in 2008, DJJ began the process of implementing the Youth Assessment & Screening Instrument (YASI). The YASI is an enhanced risk/needs assessment tool which on July 1, 2010, replaced the previous risk assessment instrument. (See Appendix H for an outline of YASI items.) The information in the social history and risk assessment provides the basis for CSU personnel to develop appropriate services for the juvenile and the family, determine the level of supervision needed based on risk classification, and make recommendations to the court regarding the most appropriate disposition for the case.

Other reports and investigations completed by CSU personnel may include substance abuse evaluations, case summaries to the Family Assessment and Planning Teams under the Comprehensive Services Act, commitment packets for the Reception and Diagnostic Center, interstate compact reports, transfer reports, and ongoing case documentation.

#### Domestic Relations and Custody Investigations

In addition to handling delinquency, CHINS, and CHINSup complaints, CSUs provide intake services for domestic relations complaints. These complaints include support, family abuse, determination of custody (permanent and temporary), abuse and neglect, termination of parental rights, visitation rights, paternity, and emancipation. In some CSUs, services such as treatment referral, supervision, and counseling are provided in adult cases of domestic violence. Although the majority of custody investigations for the court are performed by the local Department of Social Services, some CSUs perform investigations to provide recommendations to the court on parental custody and visitation based on the best interests of the child and defined criteria in the *Code of Virginia*.

#### Probation

The most frequently used disposition for juveniles is probation supervision. Juvenile probation in Virginia strives to achieve a balanced approach, focusing on the principles of community protection (public safety), accountability, and competency

development. DJJ provides a risk-based system of probation, with those juveniles classified as highest risk to reoffend receiving the most intensive supervision levels.

### Parole

Upon release from state commitment, most offenders are placed on parole supervision. With planning initiated when a juvenile is committed to DJJ, parole supervision is designed to assist in the successful transition back to the community. Parole builds on the programs and services the juvenile received during the period of secure confinement. Parole supervision is organized around the balanced approach. Protection of public safety is emphasized through a level system of supervision based on the juvenile's assessed risk of reoffending and adjustment to rules and expectations. The period of parole varies according to the juvenile's needs, risk level, offense history, and adjustment. Supervision may last until the juvenile's 21st birthday.

Parole officers are assigned to offenders to provide case management services, facilitate appropriate transitional services, and monitor adjustment in the community. Juveniles may receive family and individual counseling, other community services, vocational services, or specialized educational services. These services are provided statewide by a network of approved vendors from which the CSUs purchase programs and services for paroled juveniles and their families.

### INTERSTATE COMPACT ON JUVENILES (ICJ)

ICJ provides for the cooperative supervision of probationers and parolees moving from state to state and the return of runaways, absconders, and escapees. In 2008, a new compact was enacted forming the Interstate Commission for Juveniles. Virginia and 41 other states are currently members. ICJ governs each member state as to the provision of proper supervision or return of juveniles on probation or parole who have absconded, escaped, or runaway. It is the responsibility of each member state to provide supervision and services to ICJ cases using the same standards that prevail for its own juveniles placed on probation or parole supervision.

### VIRGINIA JUVENILE COMMUNITY CRIME CONTROL ACT (VJCCCA)

Funding is provided to local governments through VJCCCA to design and implement services to meet the needs of juveniles before the court in their localities. With a plan approved by the Board of Juvenile Justice, localities may purchase or develop and operate an array of programs and services that may be pre-dispositional or post-dispositional and in residential or non-residential settings.

### COMPREHENSIVE SERVICES ACT (CSA)

Developed to help at-risk youth and families, the CSA is a child-centered, community-based, collaborative system of services and funding. CSUs may refer juveniles to local, interdisciplinary Family Assessment and Planning Teams (FAPT). Representatives from DJJ, by law, are members of the local FAPT. When local funding is available, the FAPT will assess a juvenile's strengths and needs in order to develop and implement an individualized service plan.

### DETENTION

The twenty-four secure detention facilities are operated by local governments or multi-jurisdictional commissions. DJJ provides partial funding for construction and operations and serves as the certifying agency for these facilities. These physically secure centers provide temporary care for alleged juvenile delinquents who require secure custody pending a court appearance and for juvenile delinquents for up to 30 days after disposition as ordered by a judge. Educational instruction (including remedial services) is mandatory within 24 hours of any juvenile being detained and is provided by the locality in which the detention facility is located (funded by the Department of Education). Program components include medical and mental health screening, recreational and religious activities, and parental or guardian visitation.

Many detention homes provide secure custody and services for post-dispositional delinquents as an alternative to state commitment pursuant to Va. Code §16.1-284.1. Juveniles may be sentenced to a post-dispositional program for up to 180 days. In these, treatment services are coordinated by the detention facility, the CSU, local mental health and social service agencies, and the juvenile's family. These services are tailored to meet the specific needs of that juvenile.

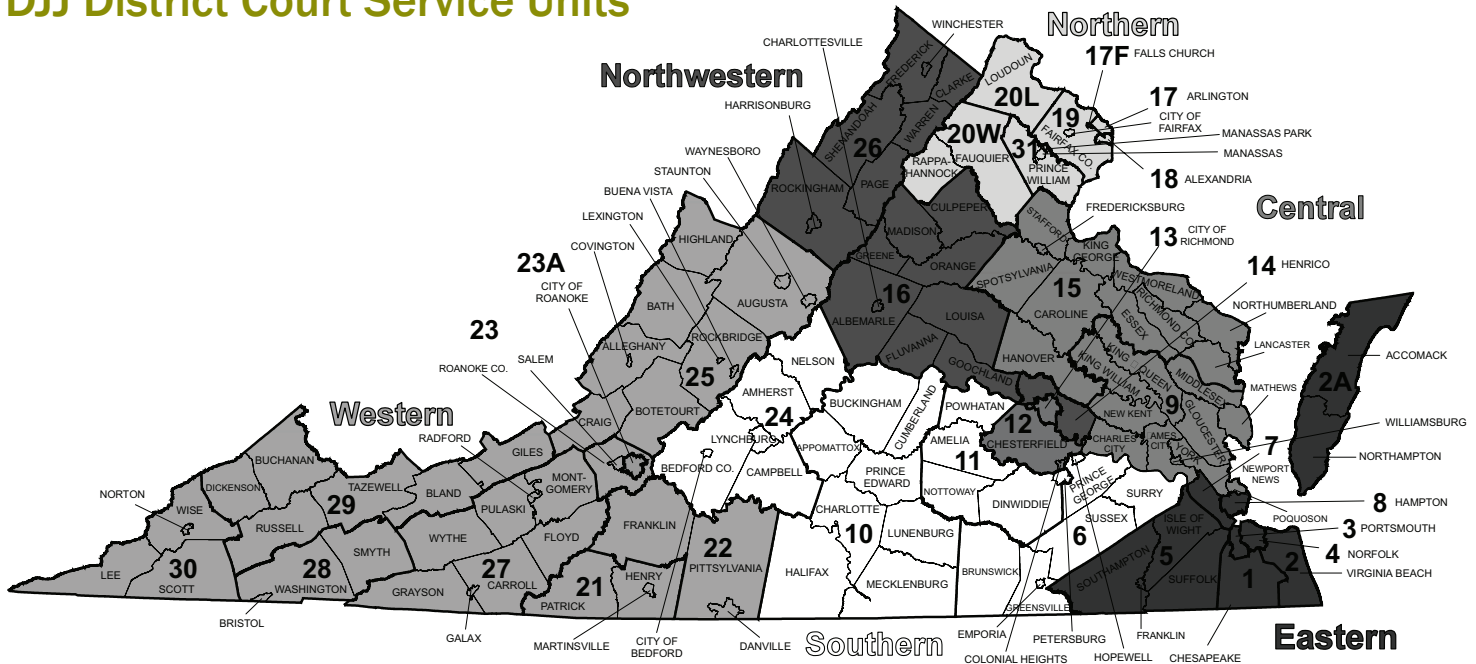
Examples of facility-based and community-based services for post-dispositional youth include anger management, substance abuse education and treatment, life skills, vocational education, community service, restitution, and victim empathy. During FY 2011, 18 facilities had post-dispositional programs: Blue Ridge, Chesapeake, Chesterfield, Fairfax, Highlands, James River, Loudoun, Lynchburg, Merrimac, New River Valley, Newport News, Norfolk, Northern Virginia, Northwestern, Rappahannock, Richmond, Virginia Beach, and W.W. Moore. Out of 1,425 licensed secure detention beds in FY 2011, 226 beds were dedicated to post-dispositional detention programs. Reoffense rates for post-dispositional programs are provided in the Reoffense Rates section.

### HALFWAY HOUSES

During FY 2011, the Department operated two halfway houses. The halfway houses are designed to provide transitional living arrangements and skill development to juveniles released from the JCCs.

Each halfway house program is designed to take advantage of the unique resources available in its community to meet the needs of the juveniles. Upon completion of the program, the juvenile will have gained additional skills to promote a continued positive adjustment and reduce the risk of recidivism. Reoffense rates are provided in the Reoffense Rates section.

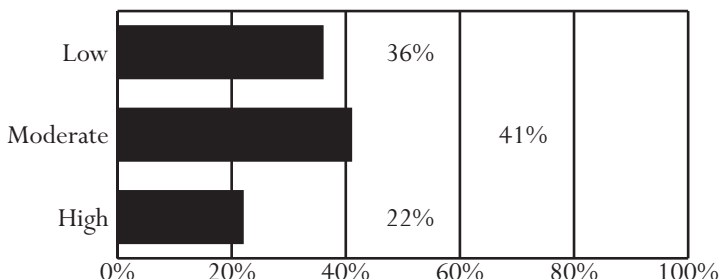

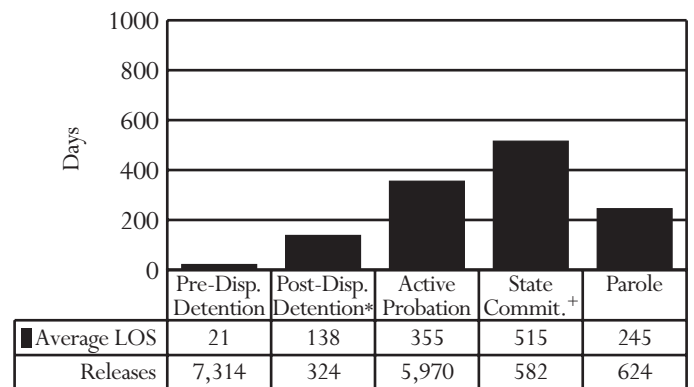

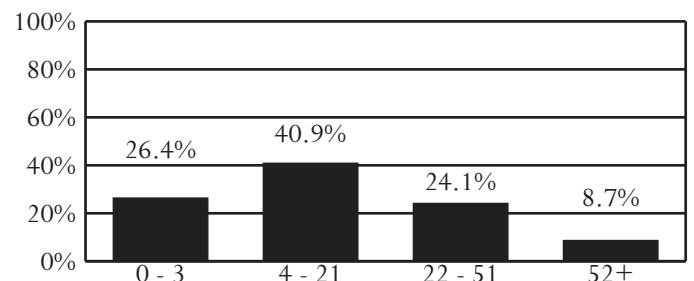
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

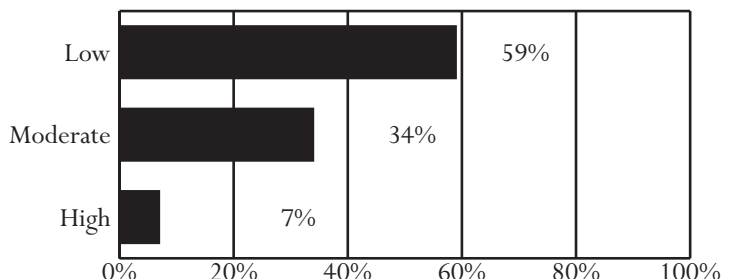

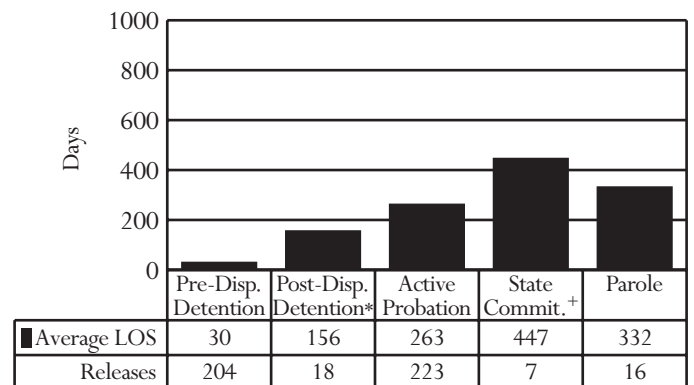

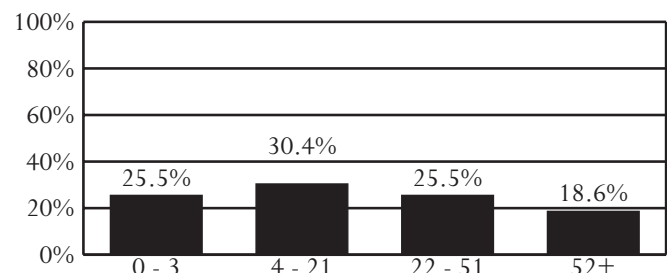
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

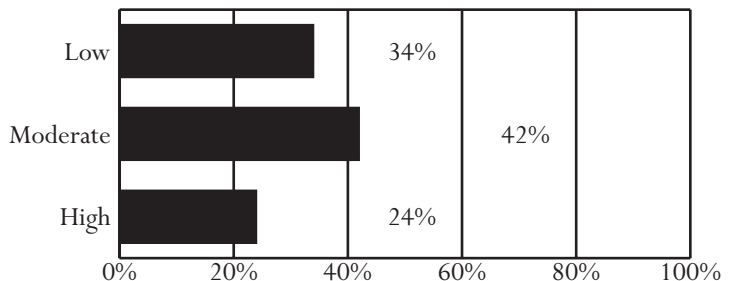

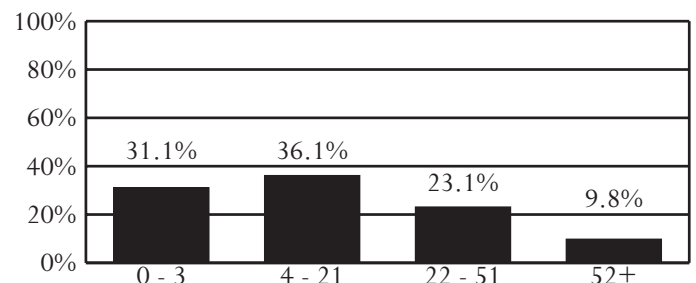

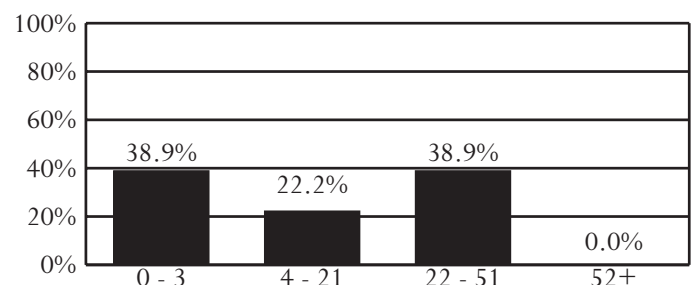
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

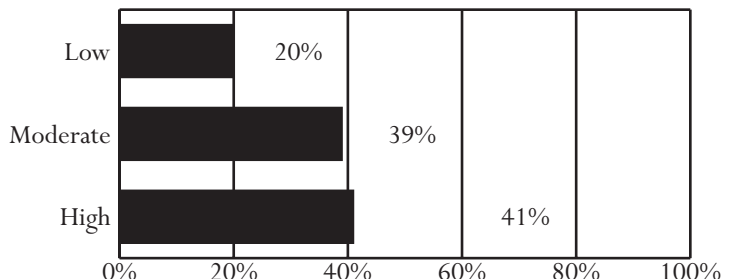

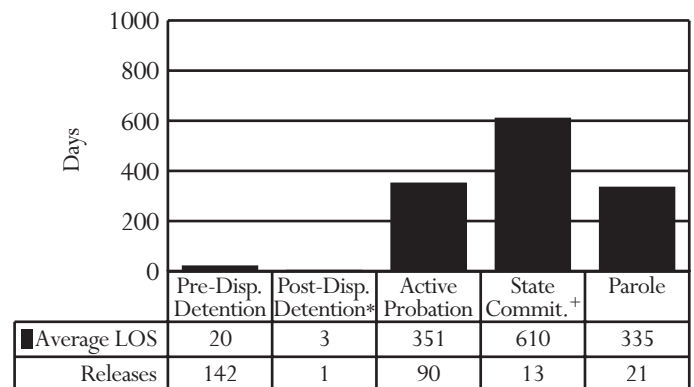

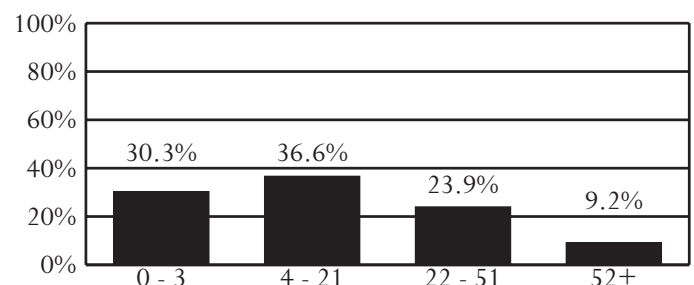
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

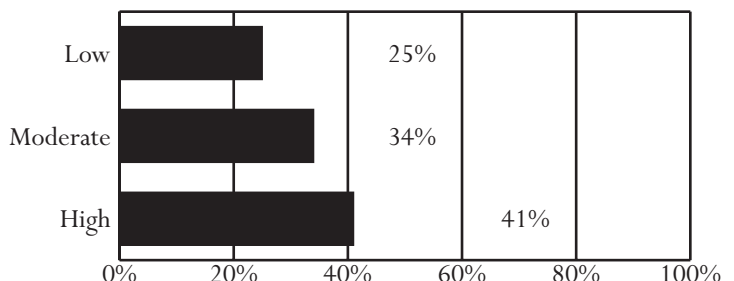

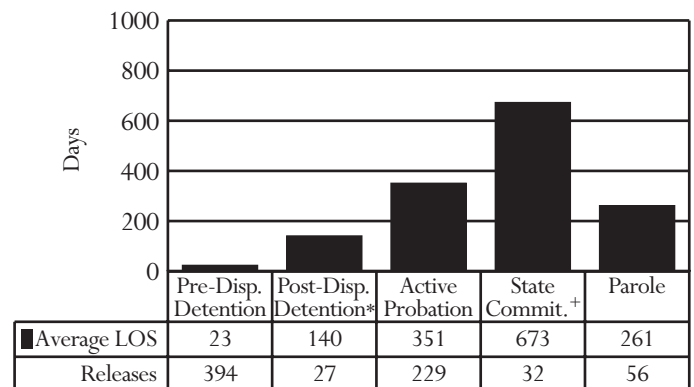

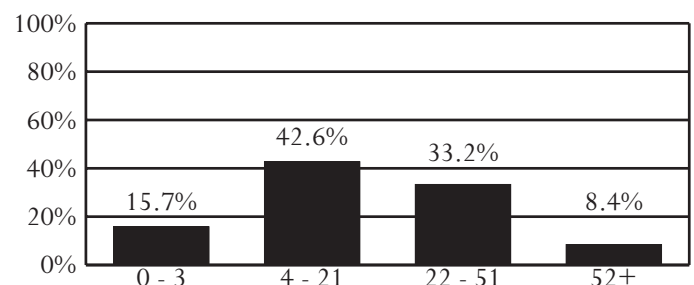
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

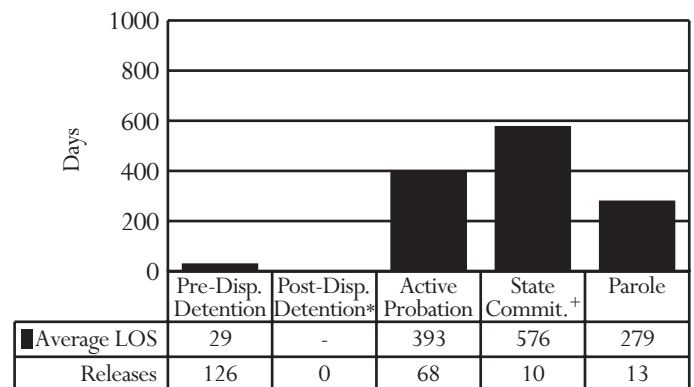

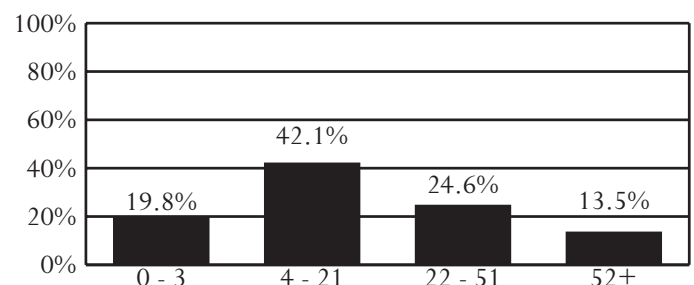

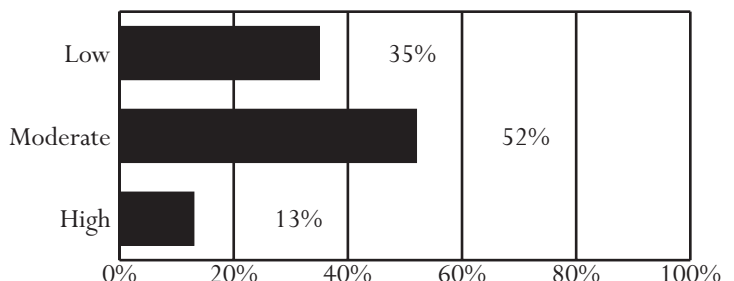

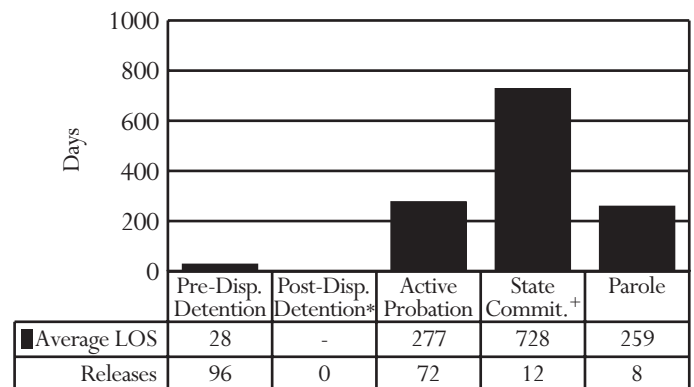

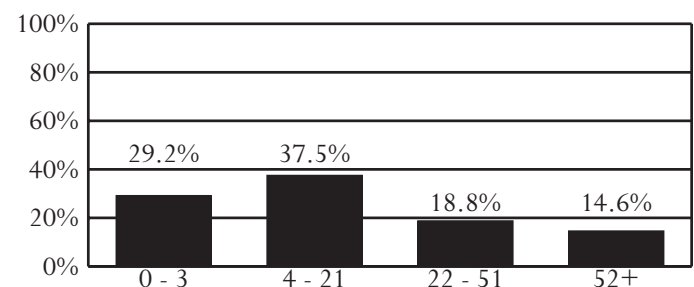
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

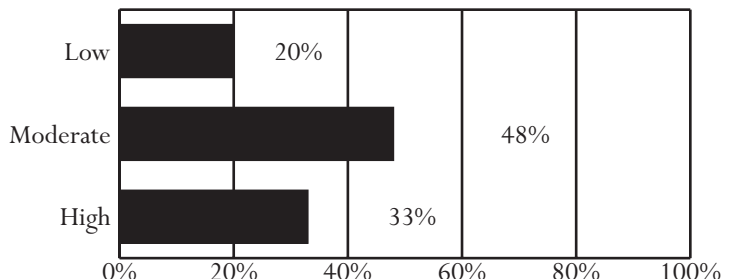

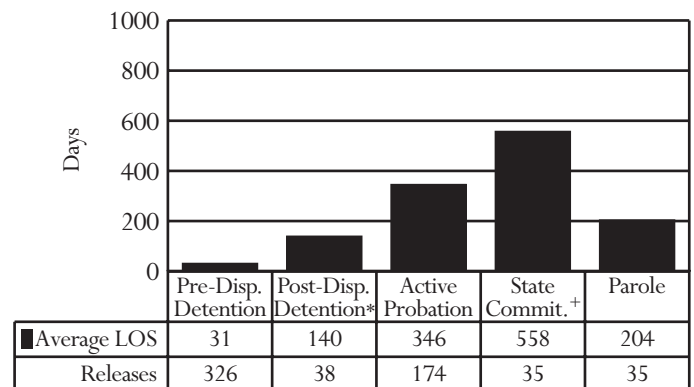

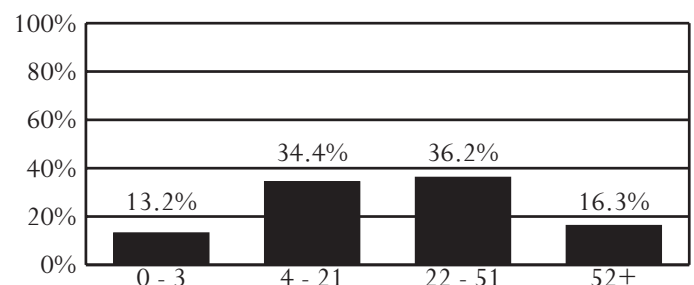
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

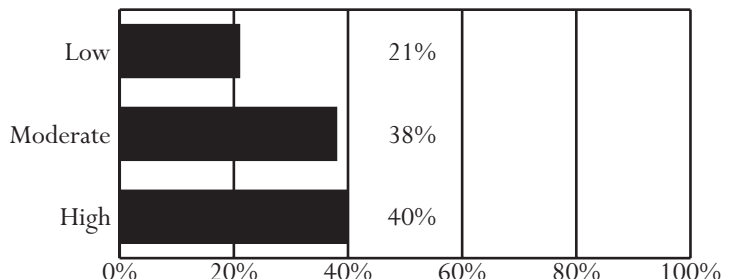

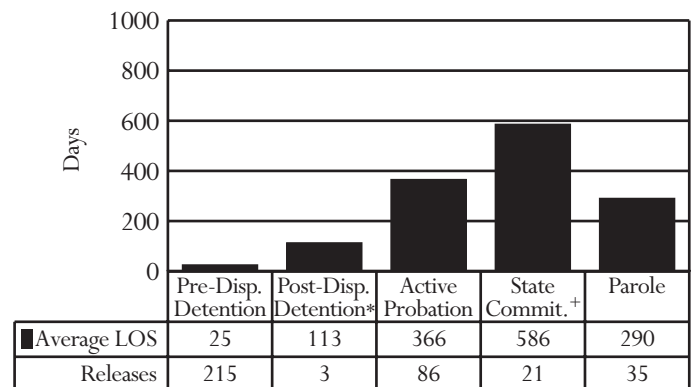

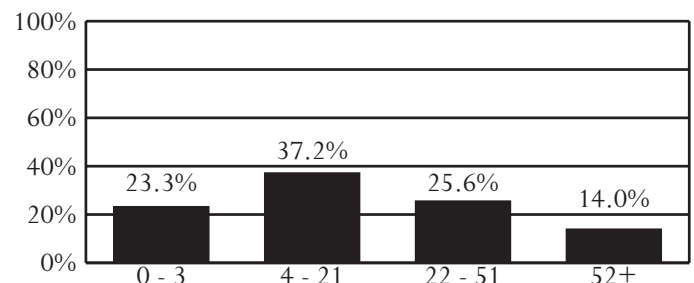
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

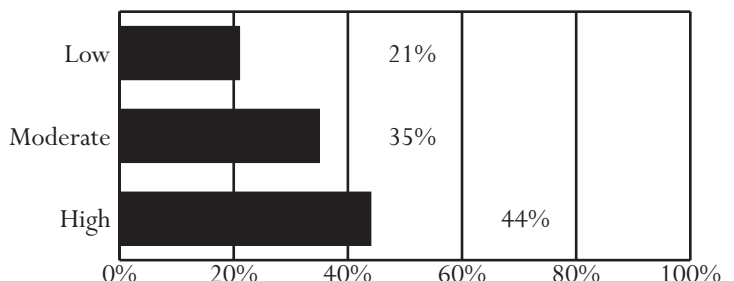

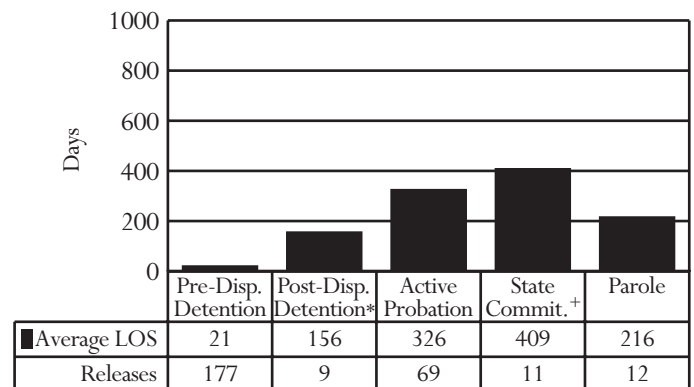

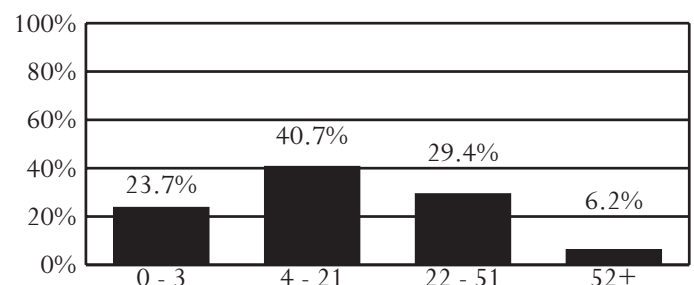
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

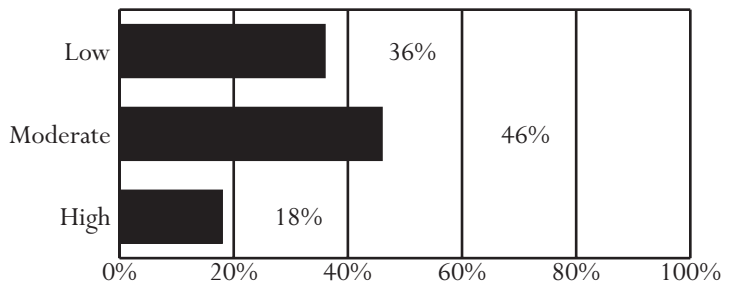

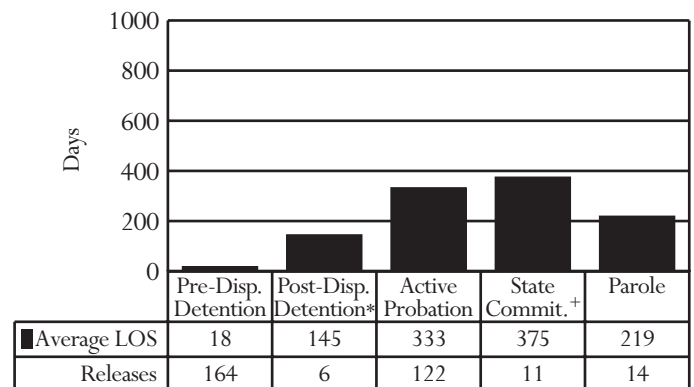

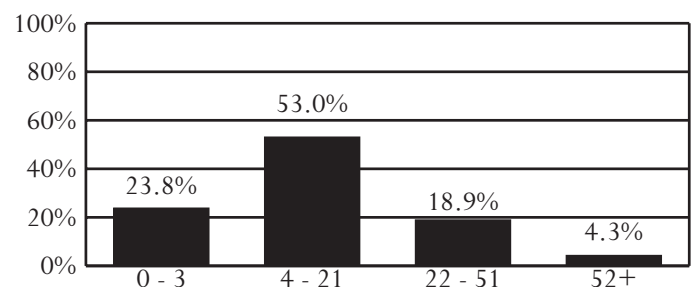
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

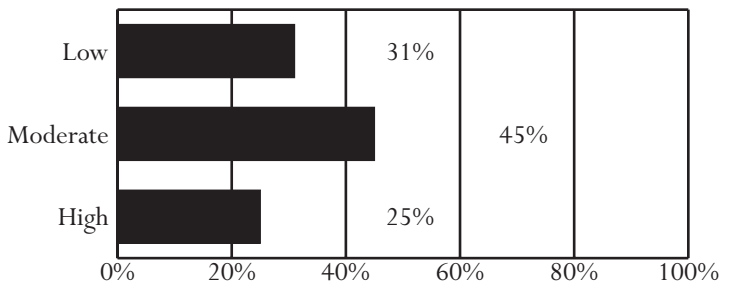

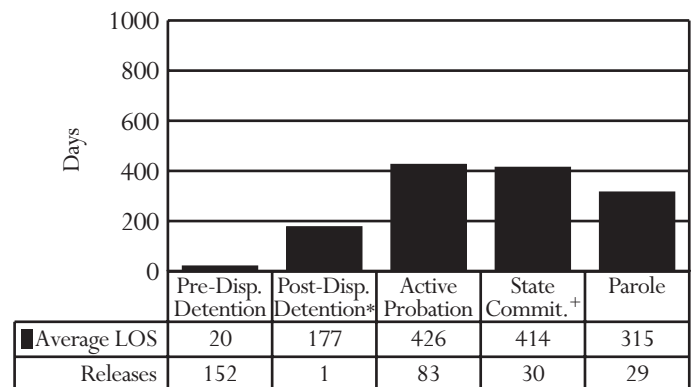

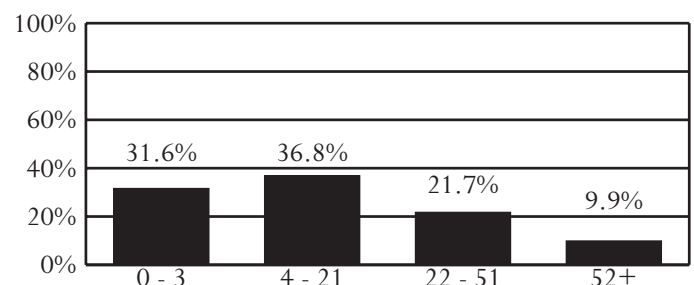
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

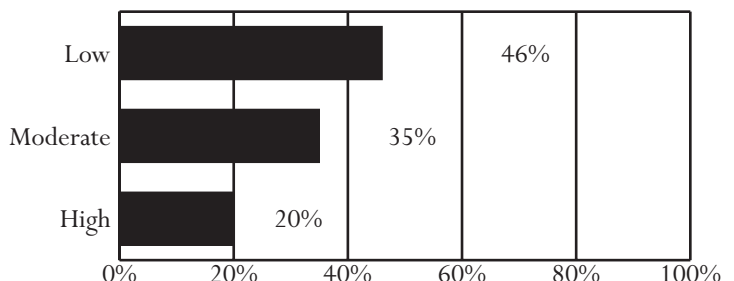

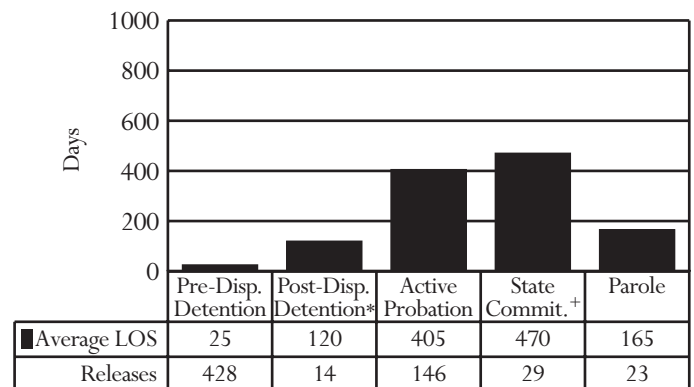

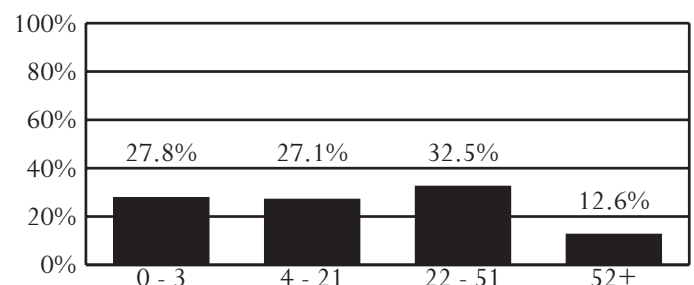
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

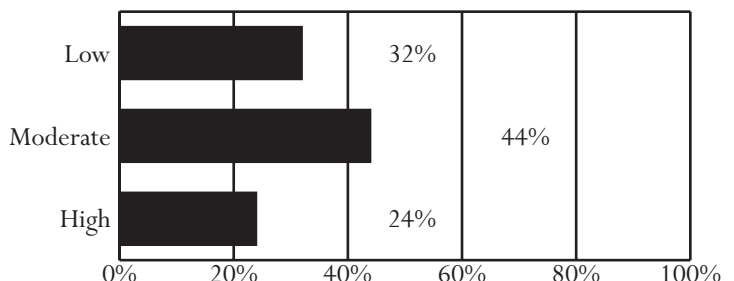

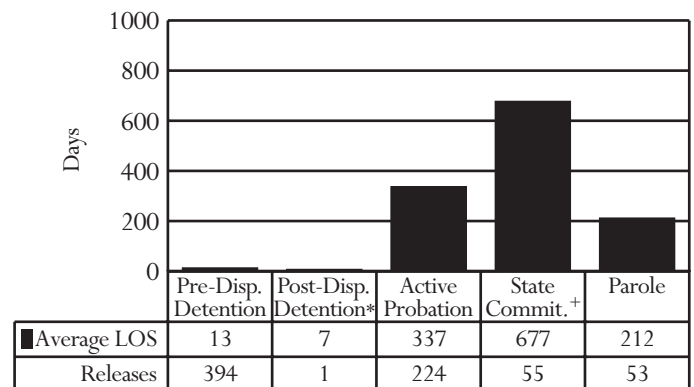

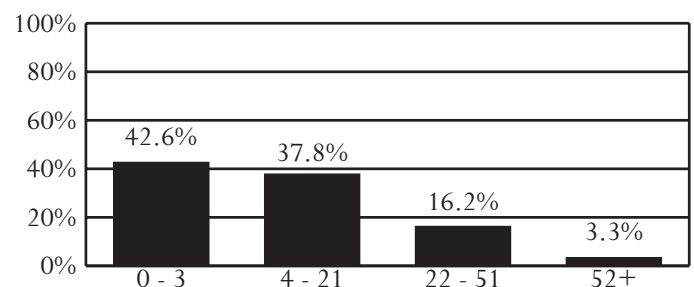
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

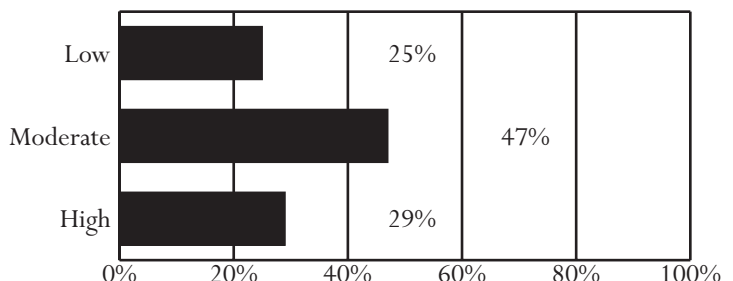

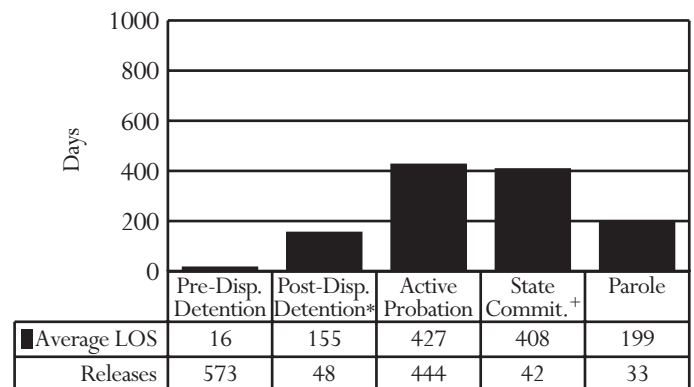

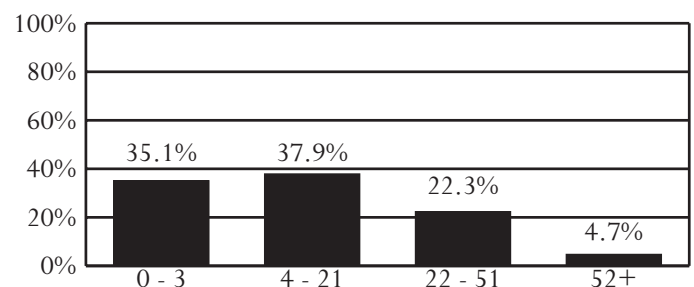
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

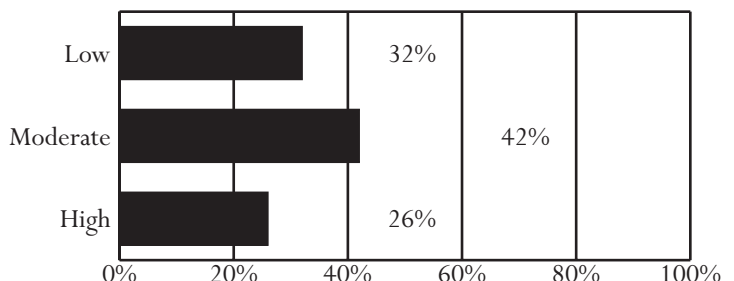

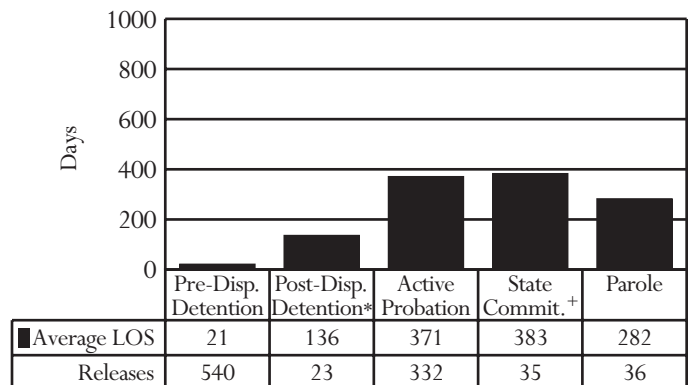

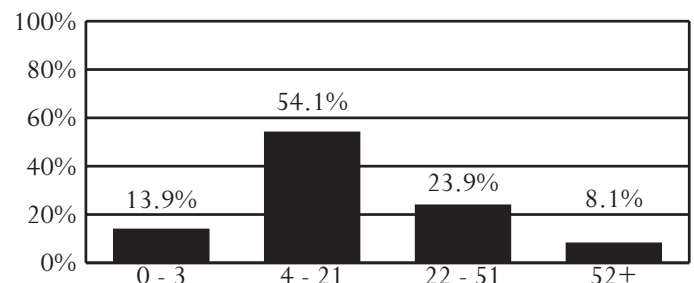
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

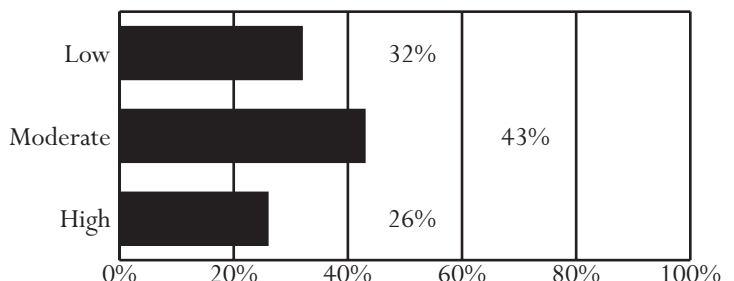

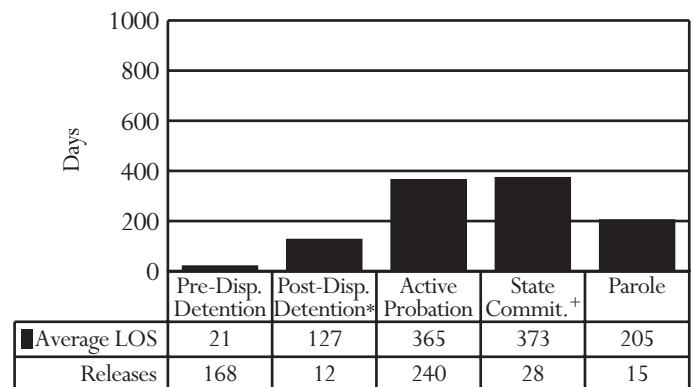

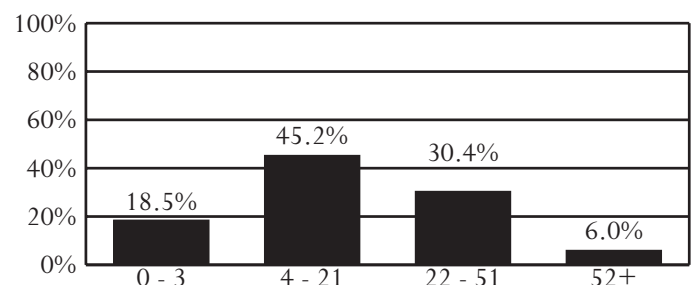
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

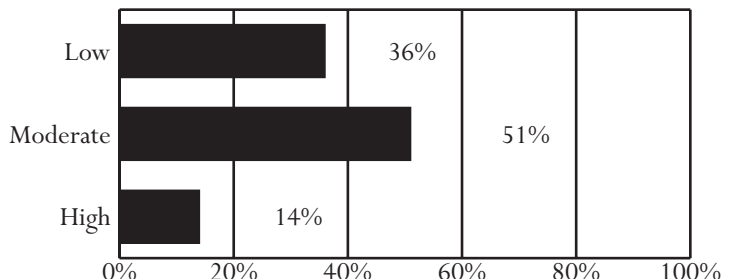

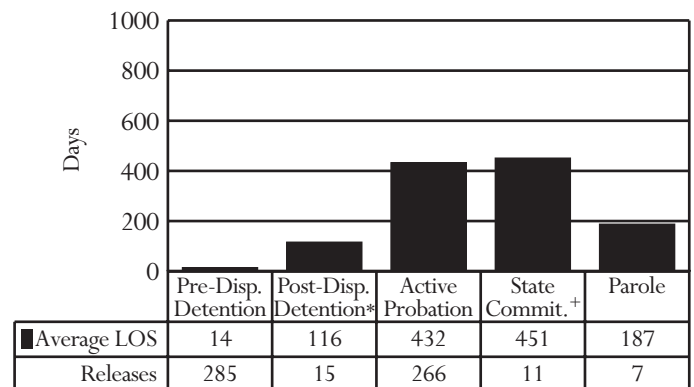

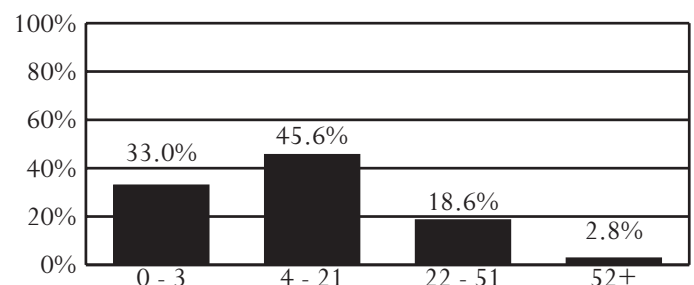
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

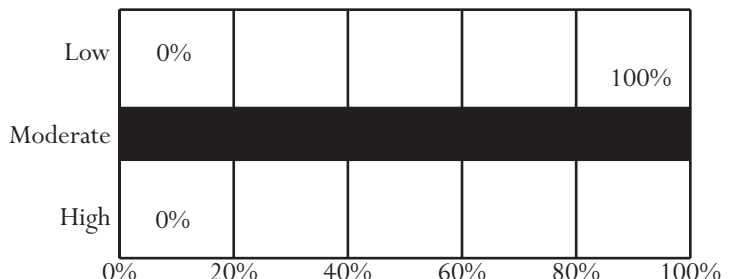

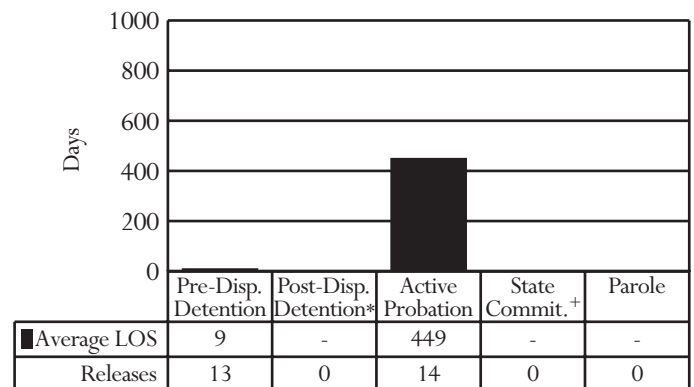

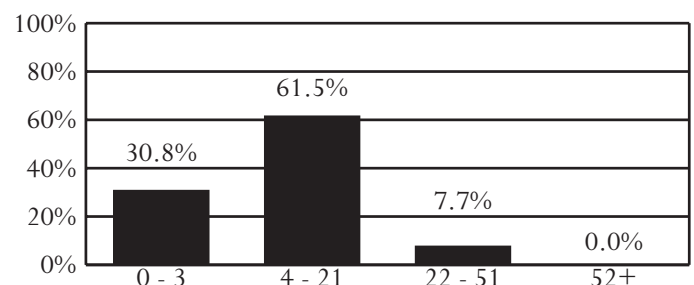
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

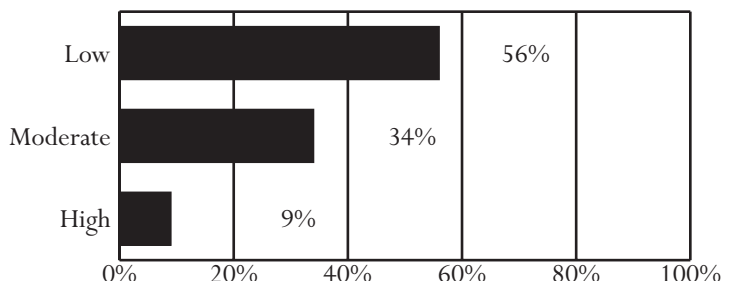

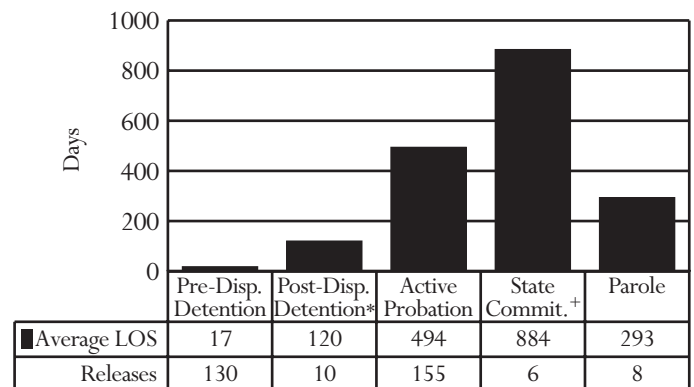

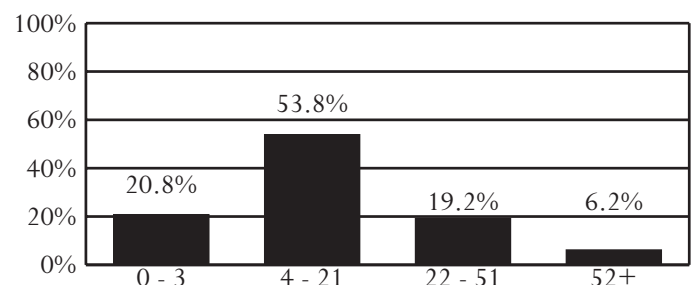
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

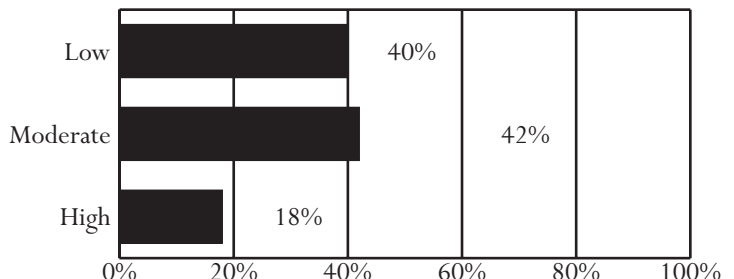

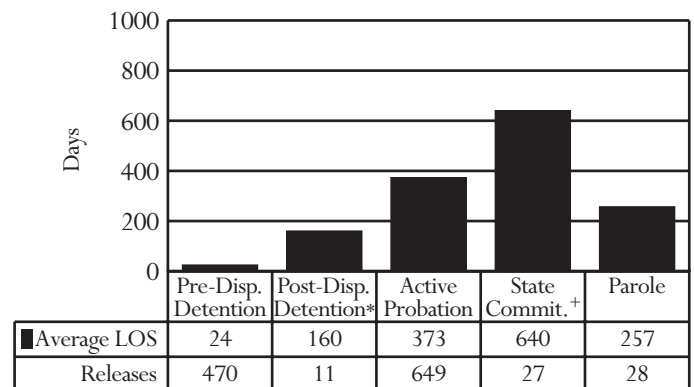

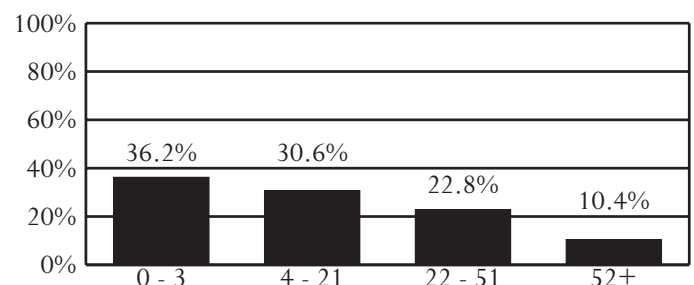
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

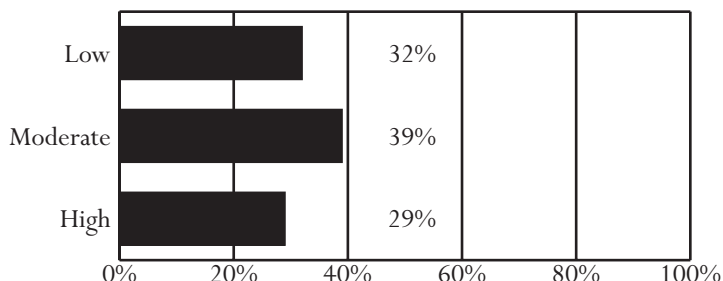

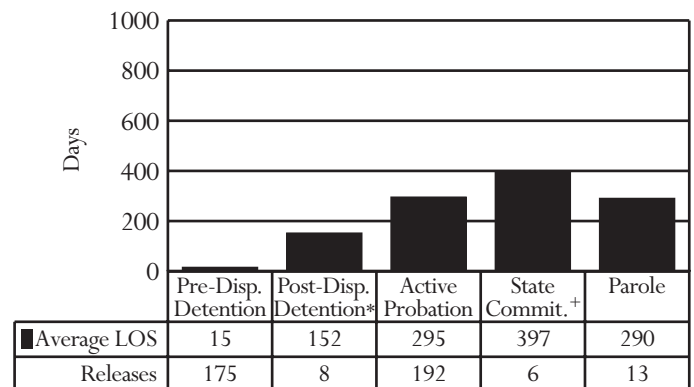

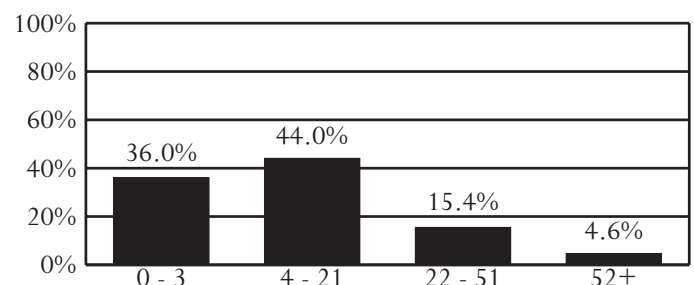
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

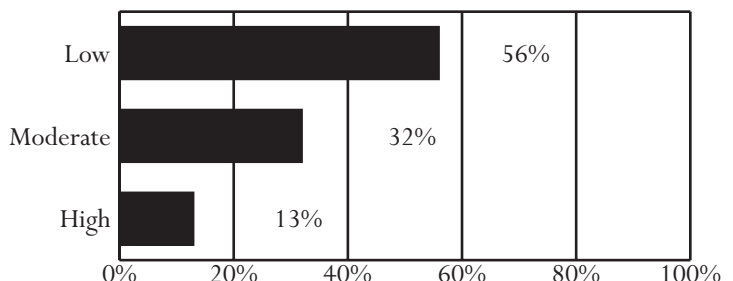

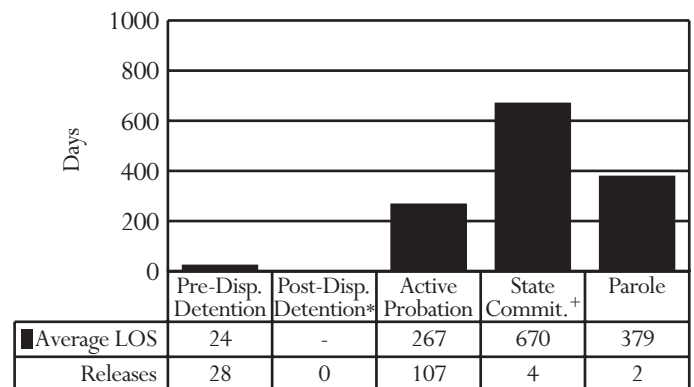

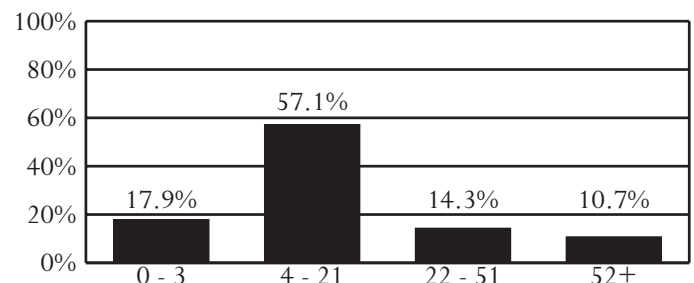
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

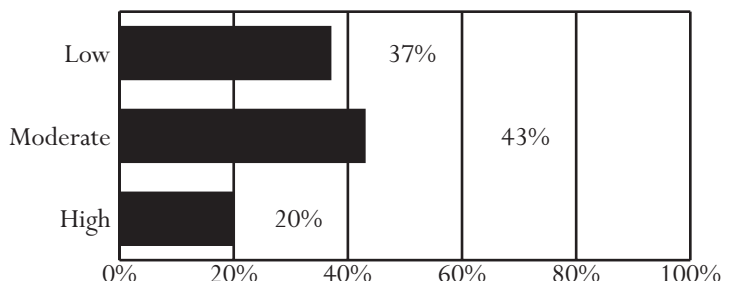

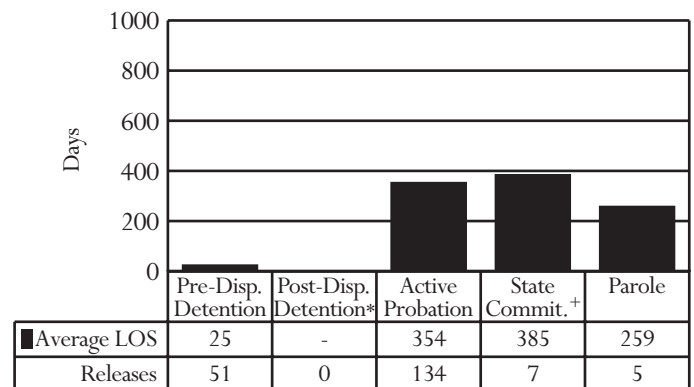

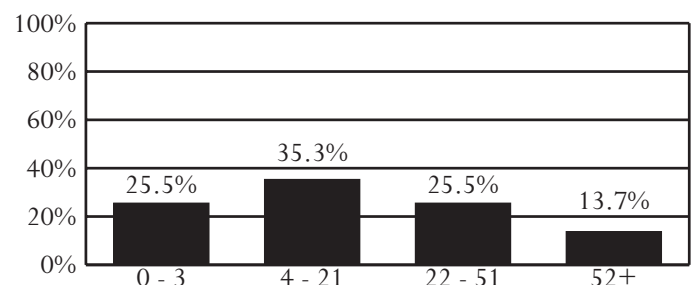
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

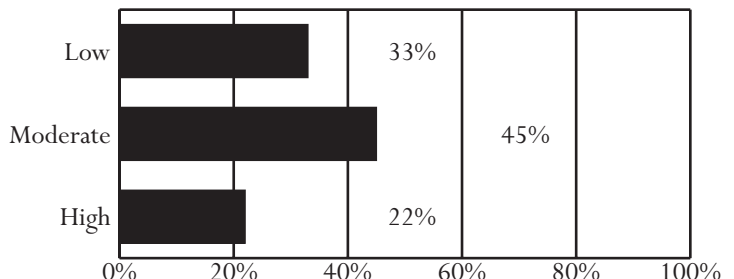

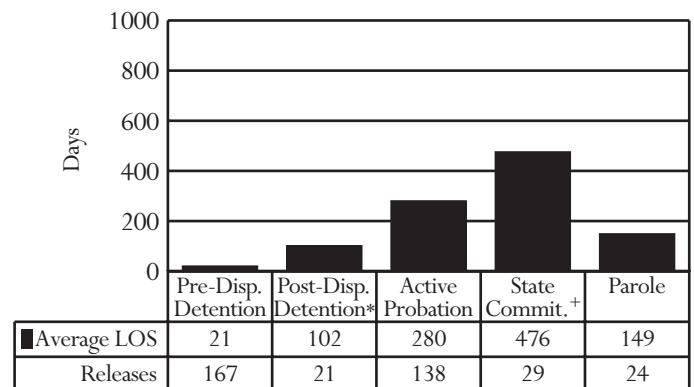

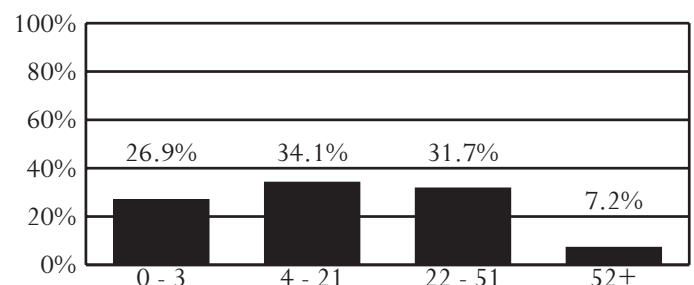
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

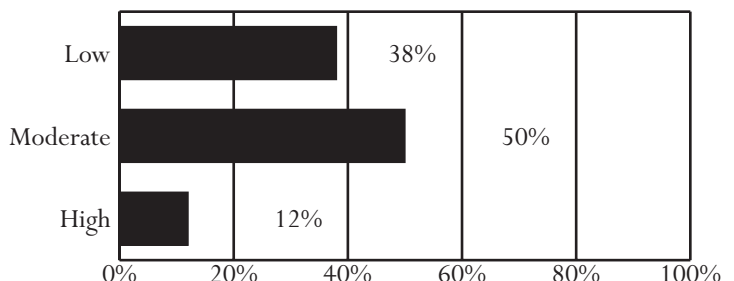

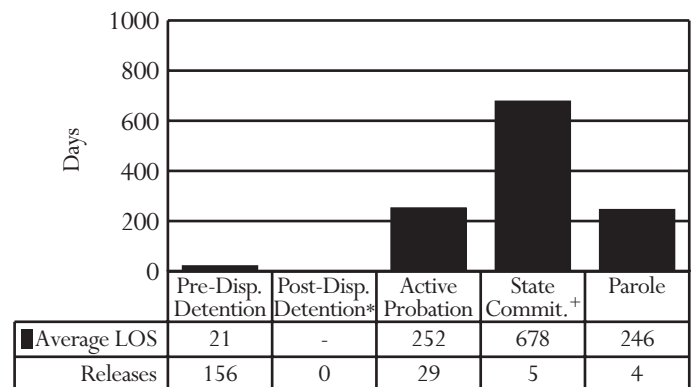

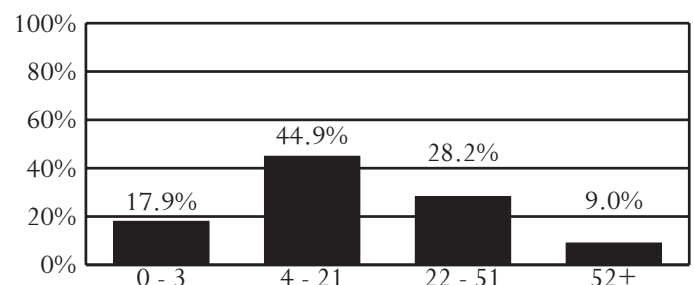
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

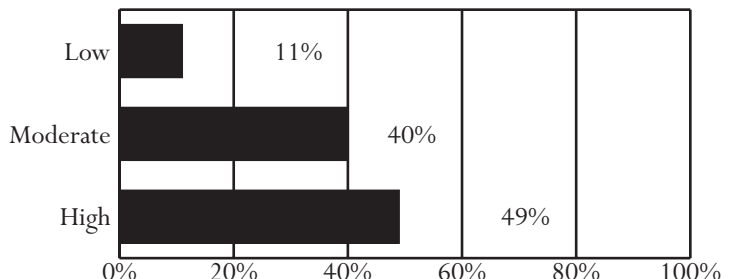

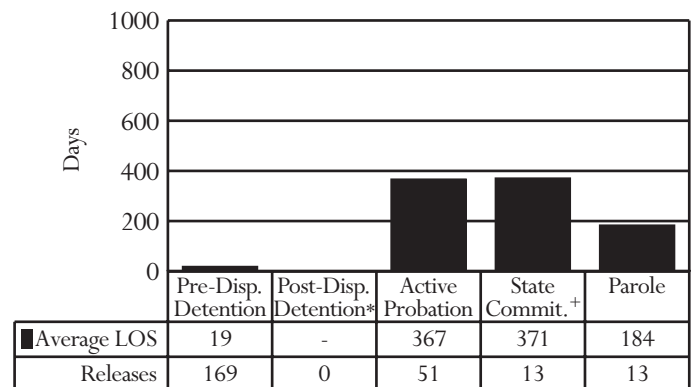

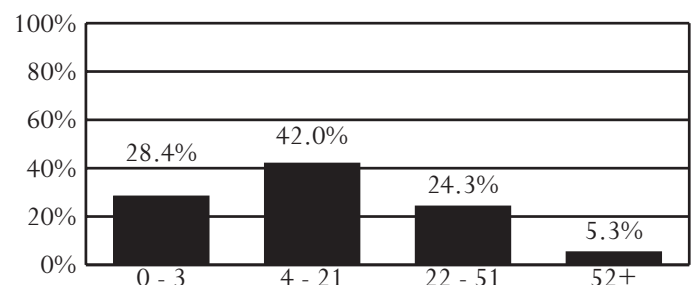
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

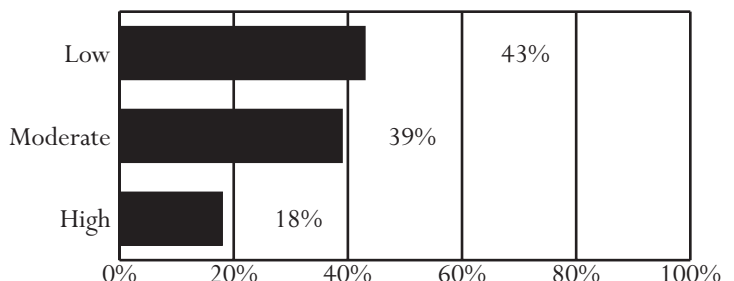

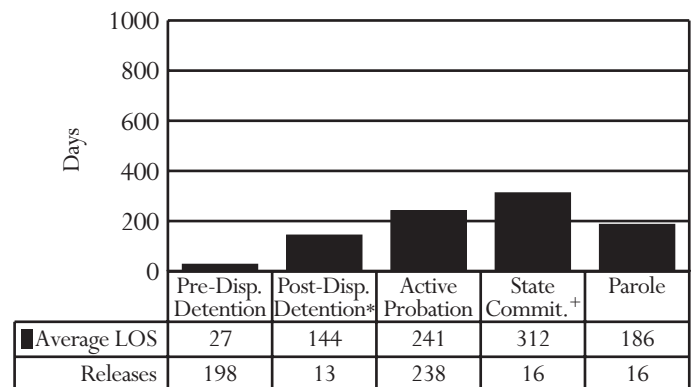

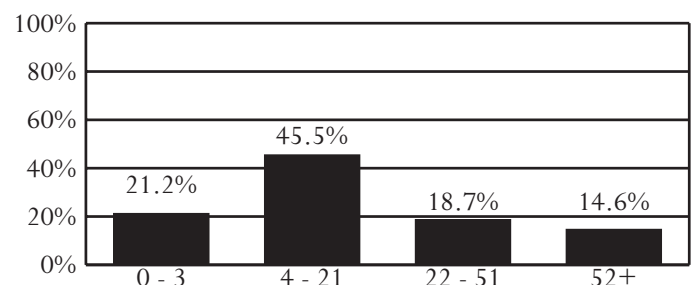
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

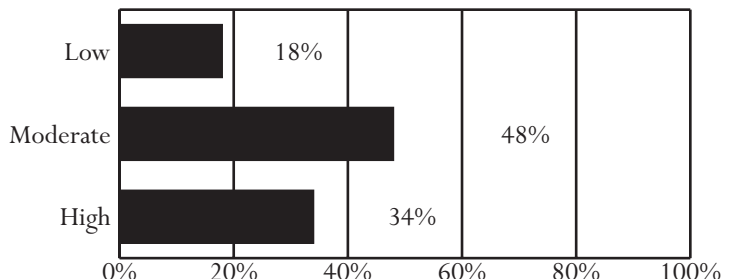

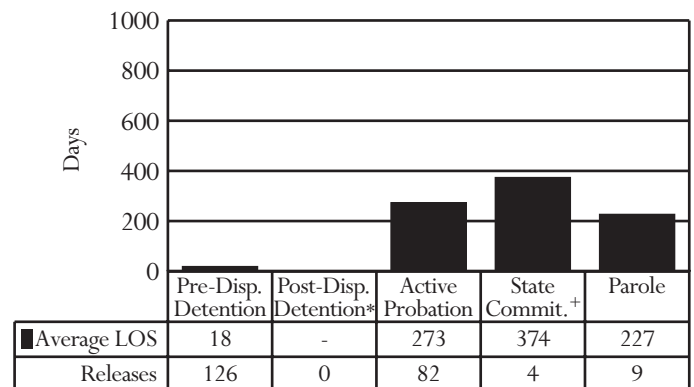

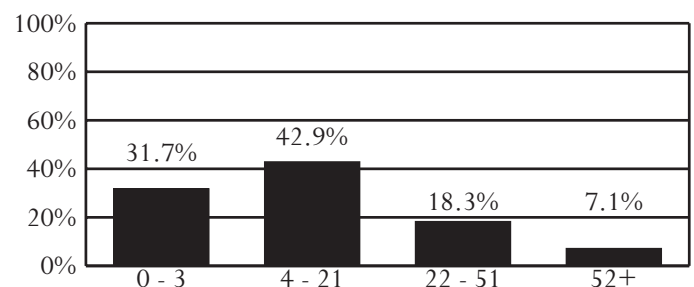
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

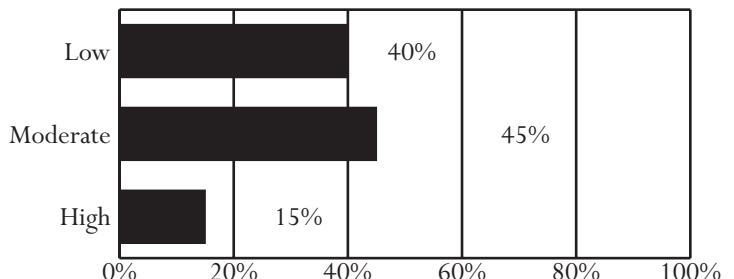

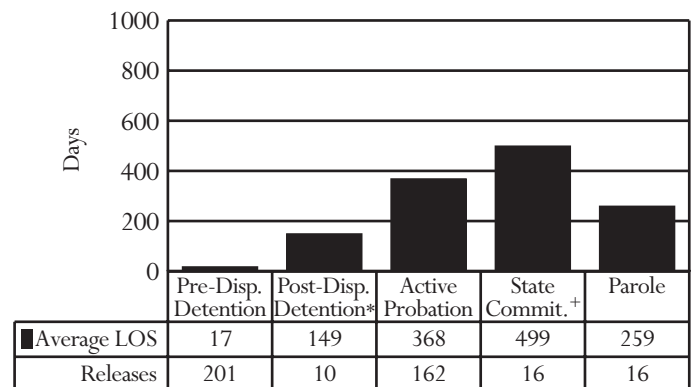

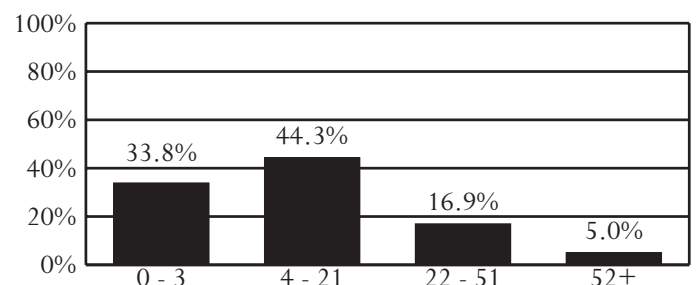
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

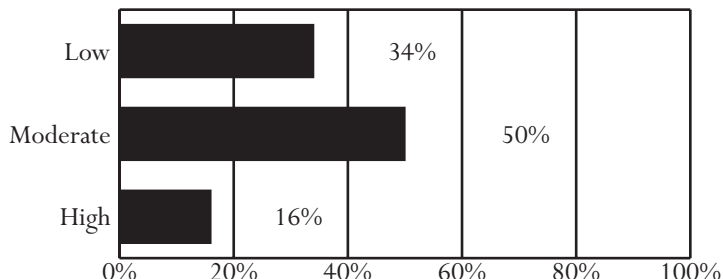

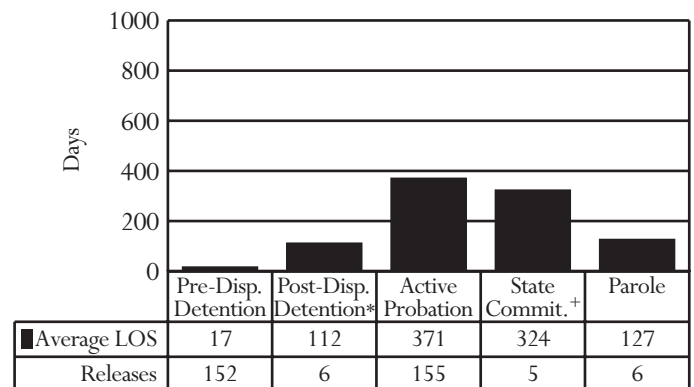

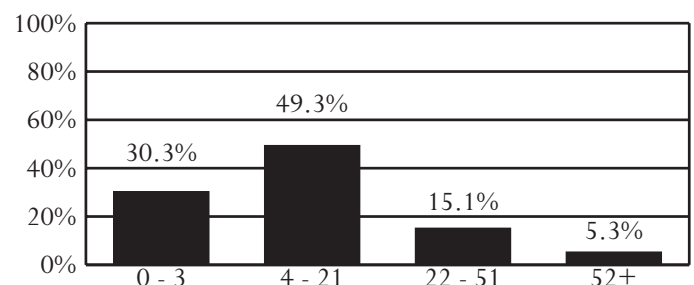
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

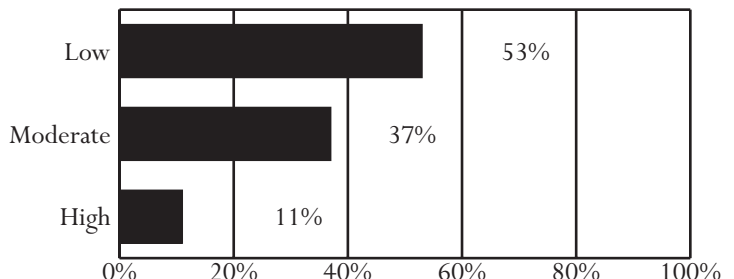

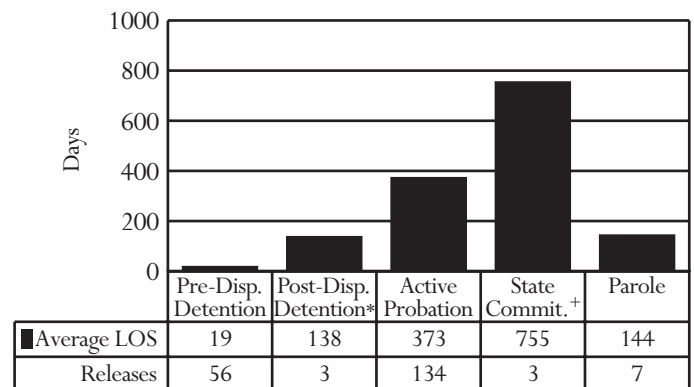

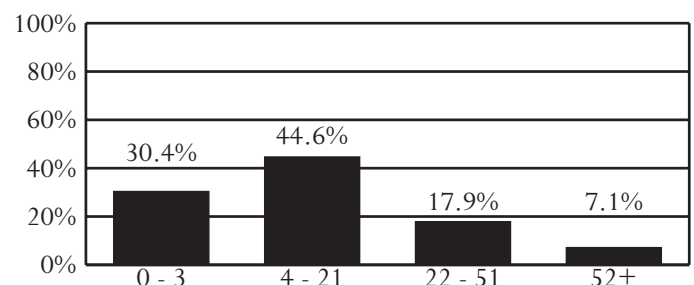
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

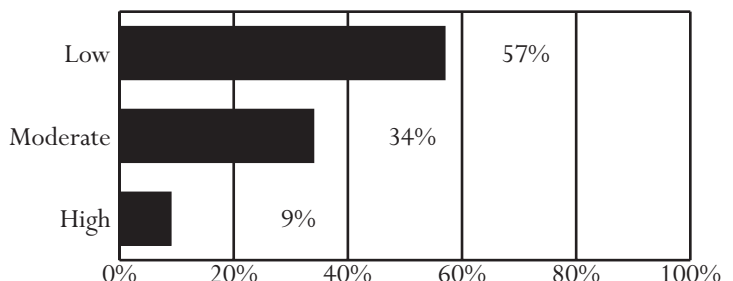

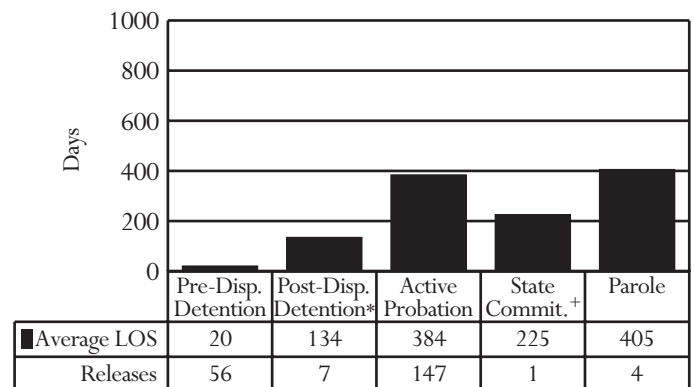

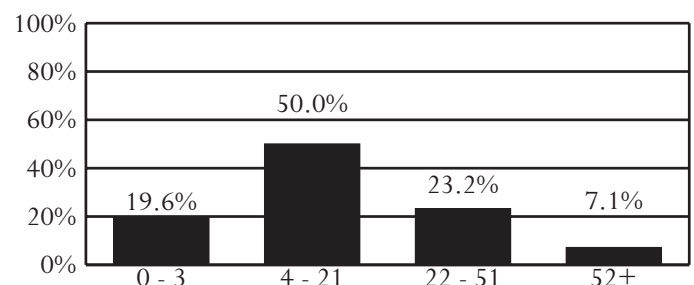
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

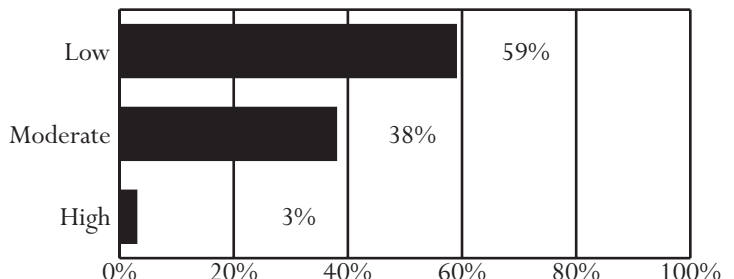

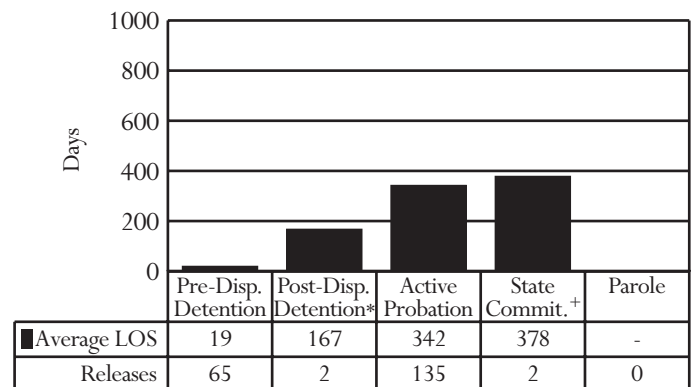

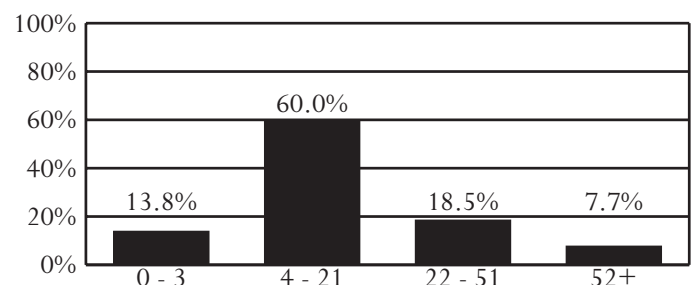
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

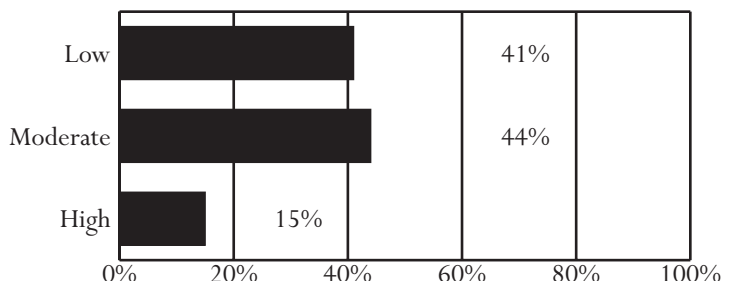

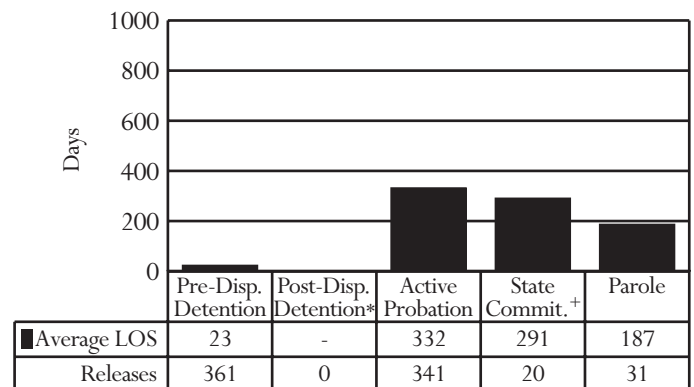

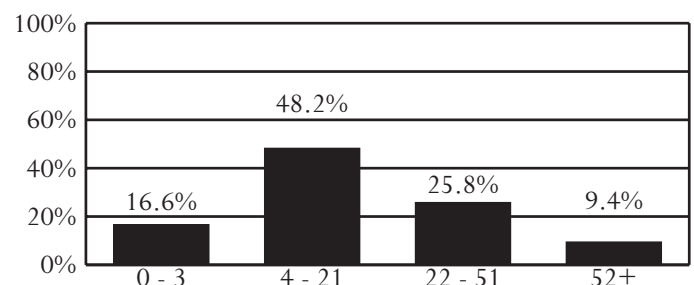
## AVERAGE LOS, FY 2011 RELEASES

## Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA)

A legislative study on the lack of alternatives to detention and substantial revisions to the juvenile code led the 1995 session of the Virginia General Assembly to pass the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA) “to establish a community-based system of progressive intensive sanctions and services that correspond to the severity of offense and treatment needs” (Va. Code §16.1-309.2). The purpose of VJCCCA is “to deter crime by providing immediate, effective punishment that emphasizes accountability of the juvenile offender for his actions as well as reduces the pattern of repeat offending”

Since January 1996, funding has been allocated to each local governing body (an independent city or county) through a formula based on factors including number and types of arrests in a locality and average daily cost for serving a child. In order to maintain their commitment to youth, participating localities must maintain the same level of contribution to these programs that they made in 1995.

### LOCALITIES DEVELOP PLANS

To participate in VJCCCA, each jurisdiction must develop a plan for how it will use the funding and have that plan approved by the Board of Juvenile Justice. Some localities have combined programs and funding across jurisdictions. Communities are given substantial autonomy and flexibility to address local juvenile crime patterns. Development of the plan requires consultation with judges, CSU directors, and Comprehensive Services Act (CSA) Community Policy and Management Teams (an interagency body that manages the expenditure of CSA state funding to serve children and families). The local governing body designates who will be responsible for managing the plan. In the majority of localities, this responsibility has been delegated to the CSU.

All funding must be used to serve “juveniles before intake on complaints or the court on petitions alleging that the juvenile is a child in need of services, child in need of supervision or delinquent” (Va. Code §16.1-309.2). Local governing bodies may provide services directly or purchase them from other public or private agencies. No specific types of programs or services are required, although a menu of permissible activities is in place. The intent is for programs and services to be developed to fit the needs of each locality.

### PROGRAMS

In FY 2011, VJCCCA served over 10,000 youth through residential and non-residential programs and services, including academic improvement; after-school or extended day services; anger management; case management; community service; crisis intervention and shelter care; employment/vocational programs; group homes; home-based or family preservation services; individual, group, and family counseling; intensive supervision; individually purchased services to meet specific needs; law-related education; life skills; mental health assessments; mentoring; outreach detention and electronic monitoring; parenting skills; restitution and restorative justice; sex offender assessment and treatment; shoplifting programs; and substance abuse assessment and treatment.

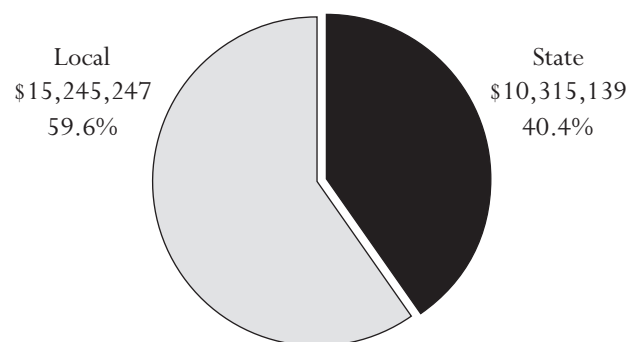

### • Program Services Provided:

- 10,880 juveniles received services in 19,029 program placements for an average of 1.75 placements per juvenile.
- 80% of juveniles met the statutory criteria for detention.

### • VJCCA Funding:

- The state and localities expended a combined total of \$25,560,386 on services.
- Approximately 60% of VJCCA expenditures were local funding.

### • Placements by Status:

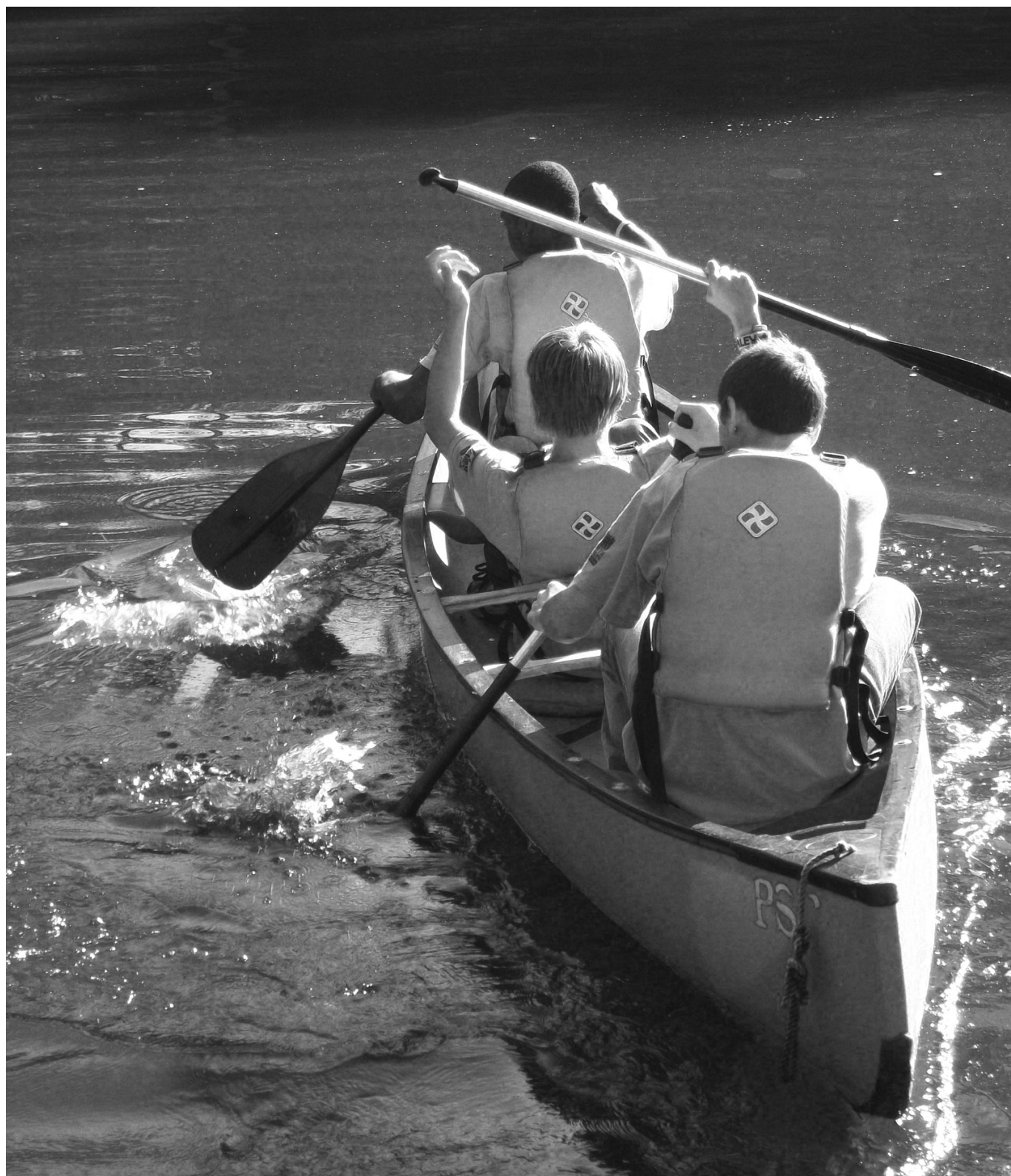

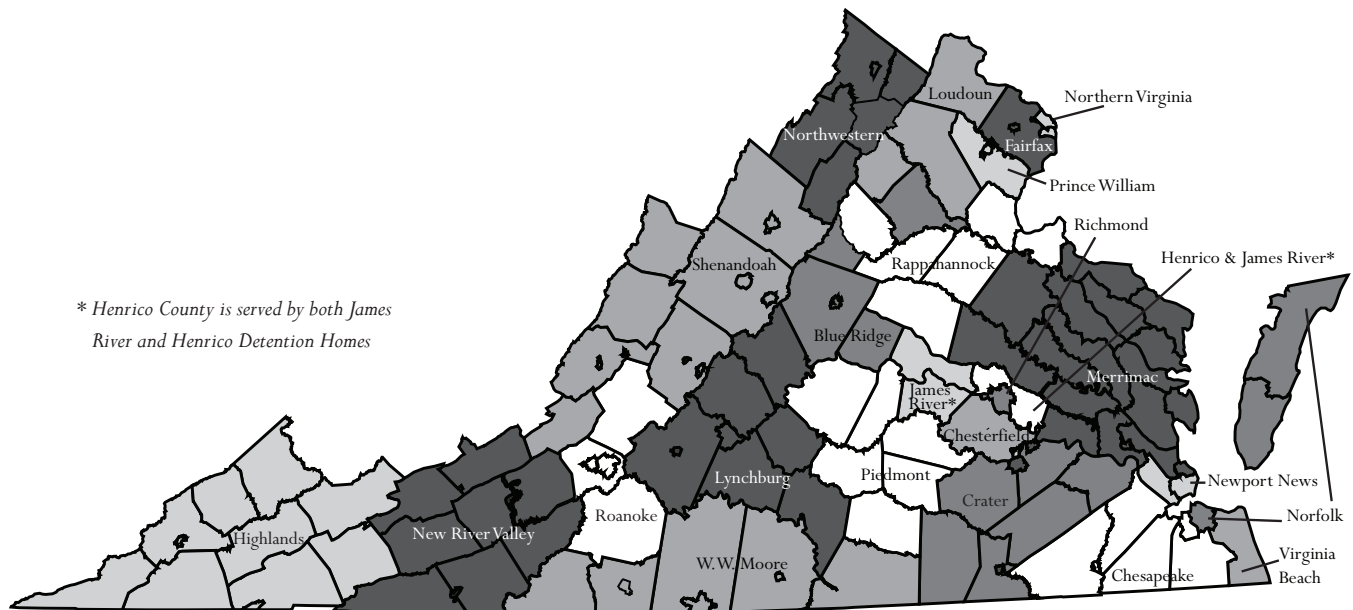

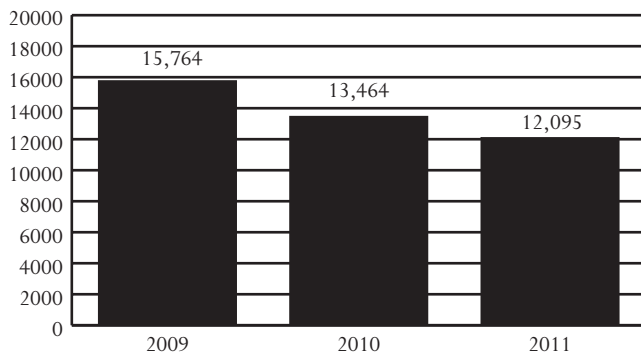

## Statewide Activity for Detention Homes

Total Capacity: 1,425 beds

In FY 2011, there were 24 secure detention facilities throughout the Commonwealth. These community-based, residential facilities provide temporary care for delinquents and alleged delinquents requiring secure custody pending court disposition or placement. Twelve of these facilities are locally operated, and 12 are run by commissions (political entities comprised of three or more localities). According to the 2007 Census of Juveniles in Residential Placement Databook, Virginia ranked 27th lowest for the number of detained juveniles among the 38 states with an upper age of jurisdiction of 17 (based on a rate per 100,000 juveniles).

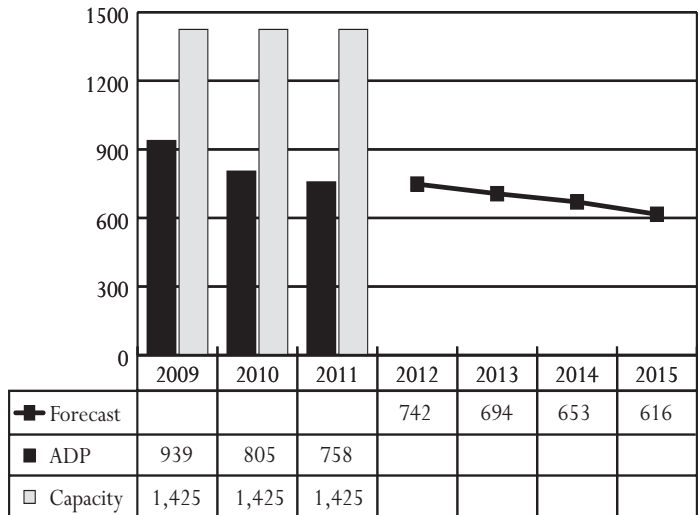
- *Source of Admissions (FY 2011):*
  - The highest percentage of detention admissions were from the 14th District (16.1%), followed by the 15th District (6.3%).
  - Weekender admissions were counted as a single admission.
- *Juveniles Admitted to Detention (FY 2011):*
  - 4,474 juveniles were admitted once to detention and 2,505 juveniles were admitted multiple times, for a total of 6,979 juveniles and 12,095 detention admissions.
- *Admission Trends:*
  - Admissions decreased 23% between FY 2009 and FY 2011 and 10% between FY 2010 and FY 2011.

## AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION VS CAPACITY, FY 2009-2015

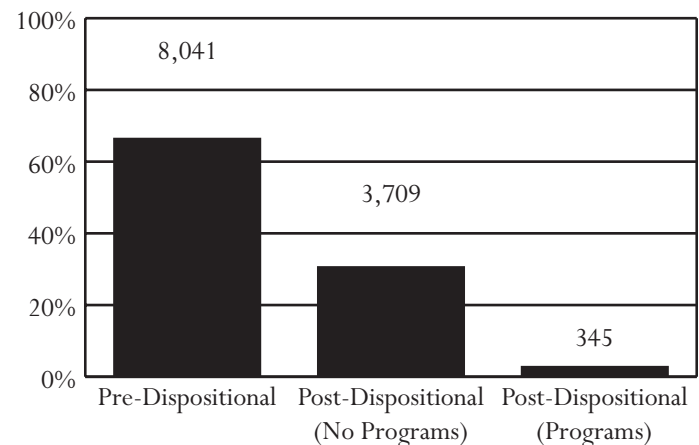


In FY 2002, DJJ, in conjunction with the Governor's Inmate Population Forecasting Committee, began producing a projection of local juvenile detention homes' average daily population (ADP). The most recent forecast predicts that the ADP will decrease 2% (16 juveniles) between FY 2011 and FY 2012 and that ADP will decrease 19% between FY 2011 and FY 2015.

### Updates to Detention Module in DJJ's Data System

In FY 2009, DJJ made improvements to the design and functionality of the detention module of its electronic data collection system. Historical detention data were translated to new tables in the system, and part of this process included data "cleanup" of historical records. For example, duplicated records may have been deleted. Several dispositional status codes were also added for tracking purposes. As a result of these updates, detention data may not be comparable to *Data Resource Guides* prior to FY 2009.

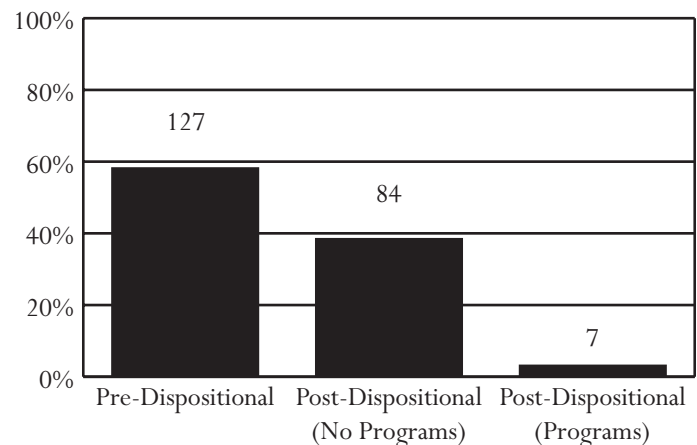
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

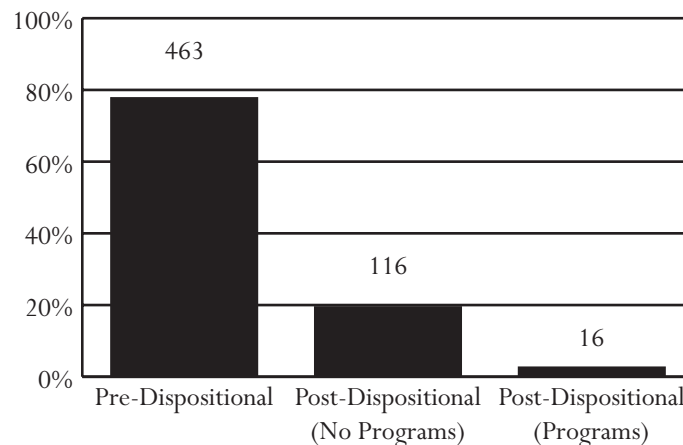
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

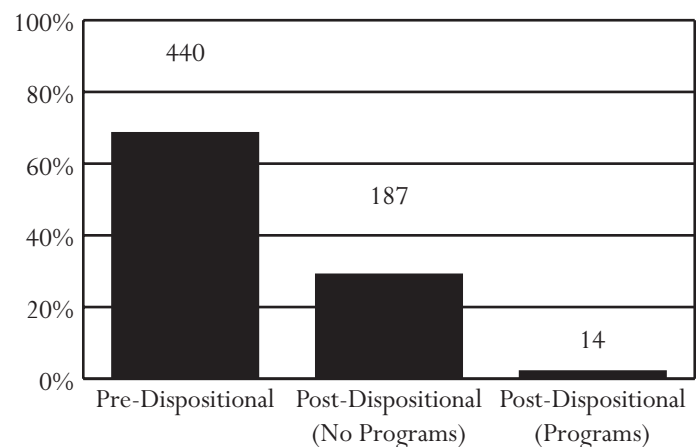
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

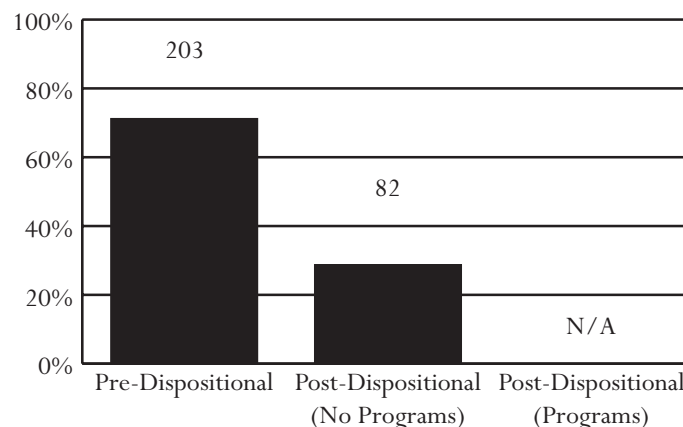
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

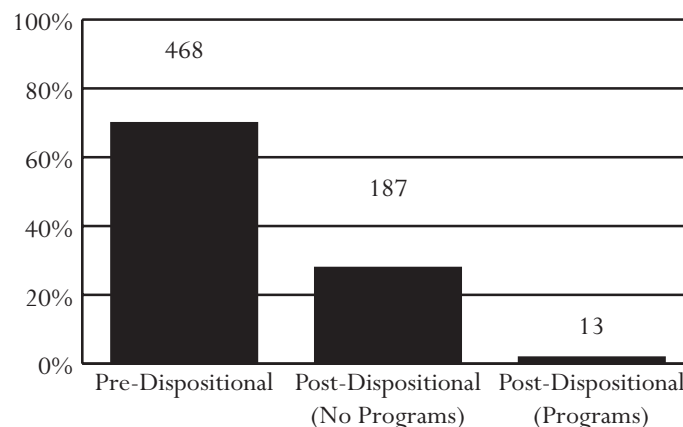
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

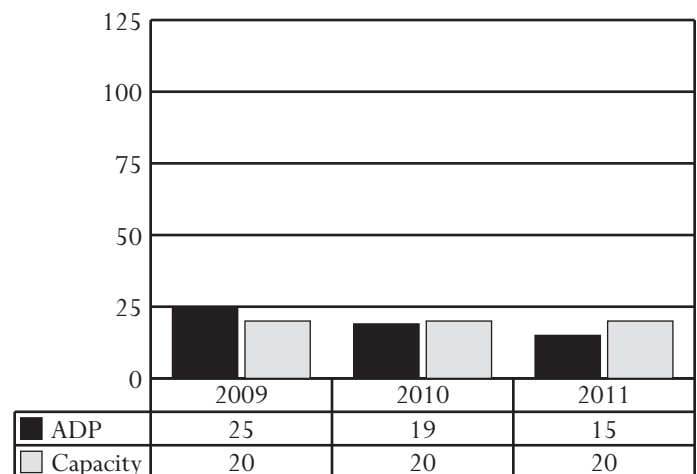

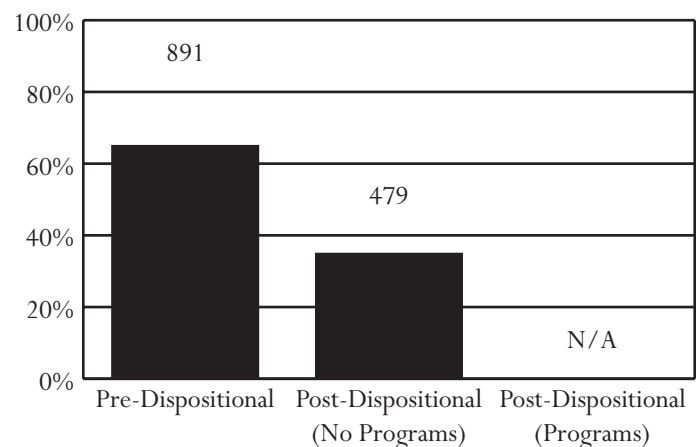
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

### ADMISSIONS BY DISPOSITIONAL STATUS, FY 2011



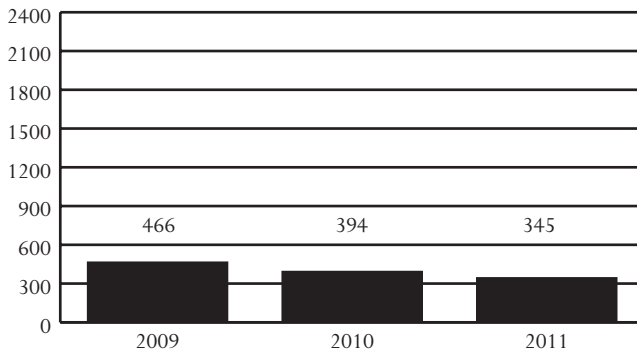

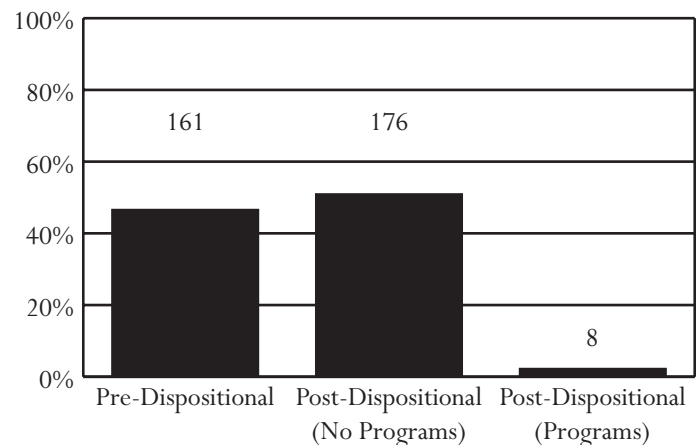
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

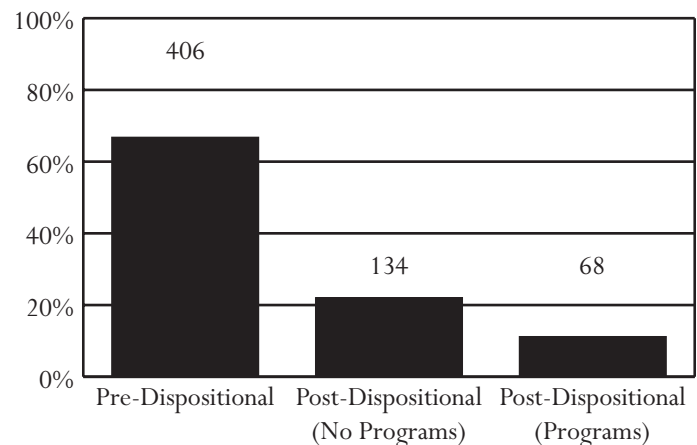
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

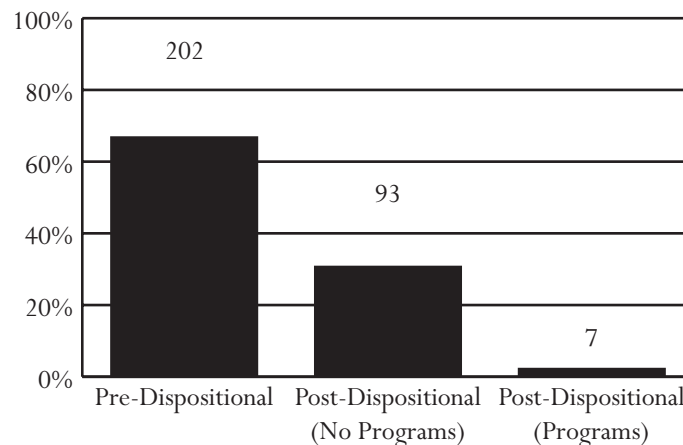
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

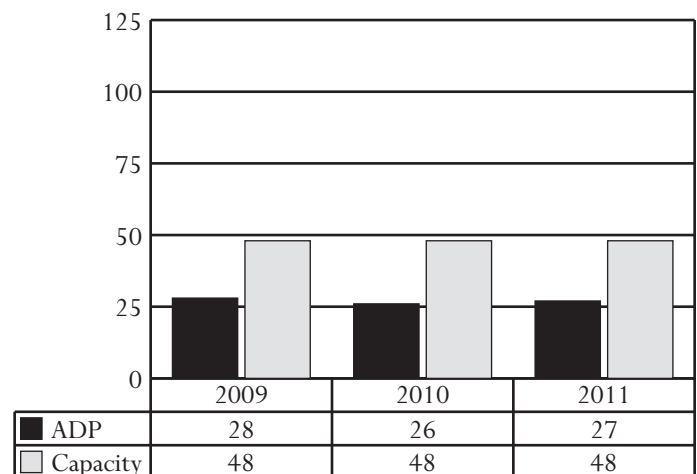

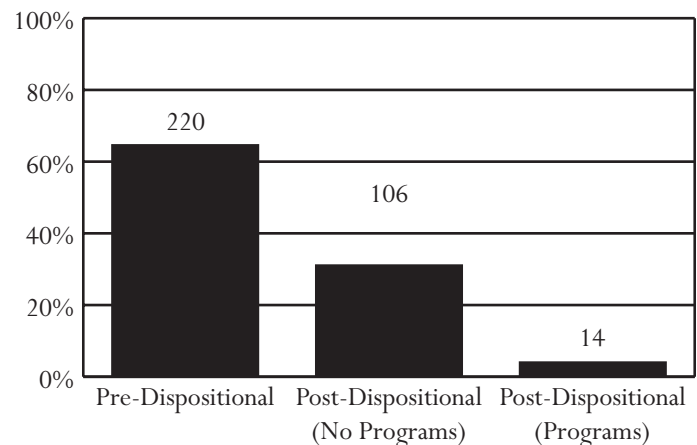
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

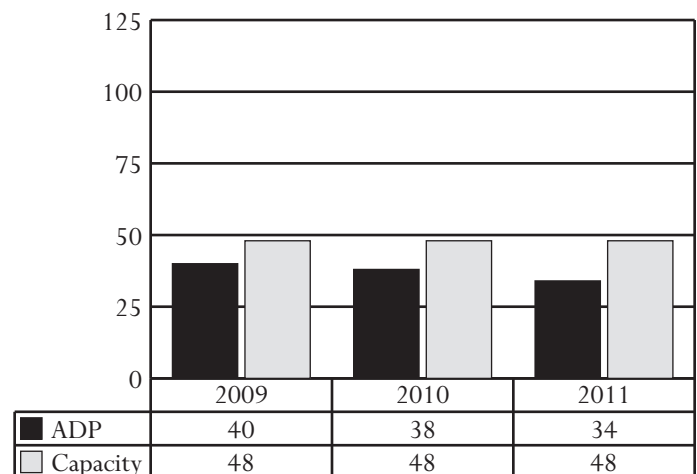

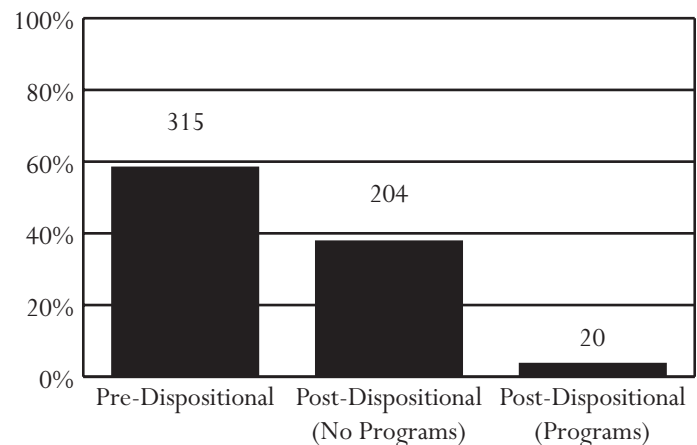
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

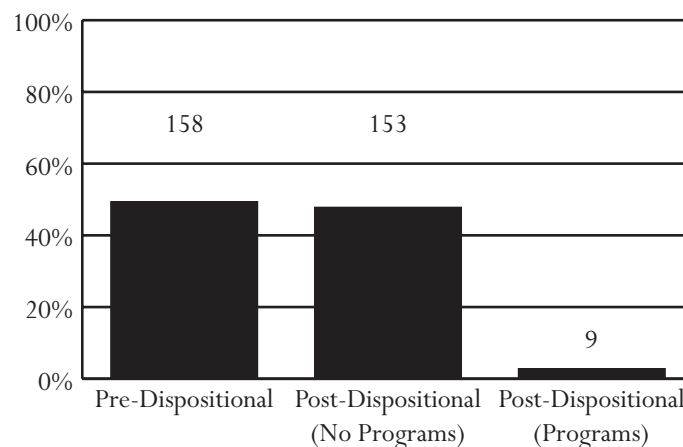
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

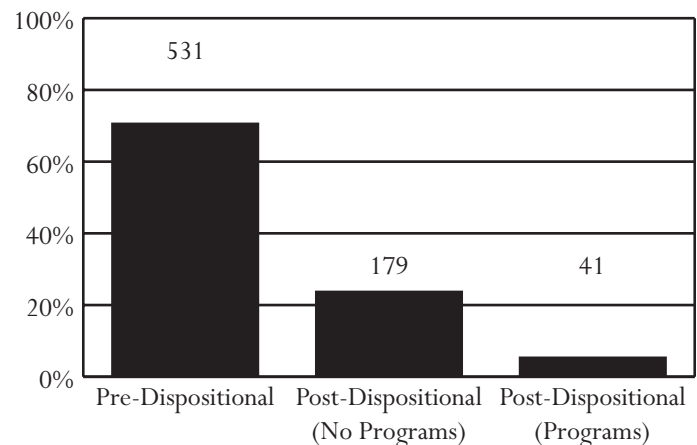
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

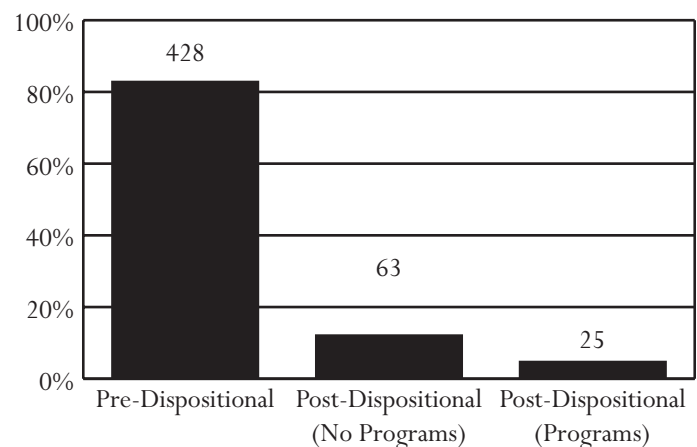
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

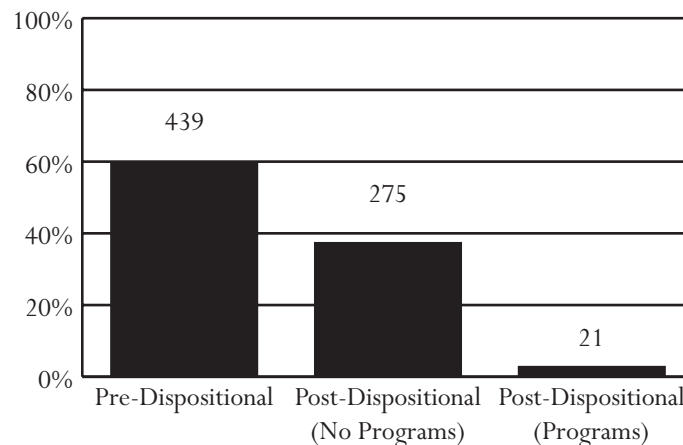
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

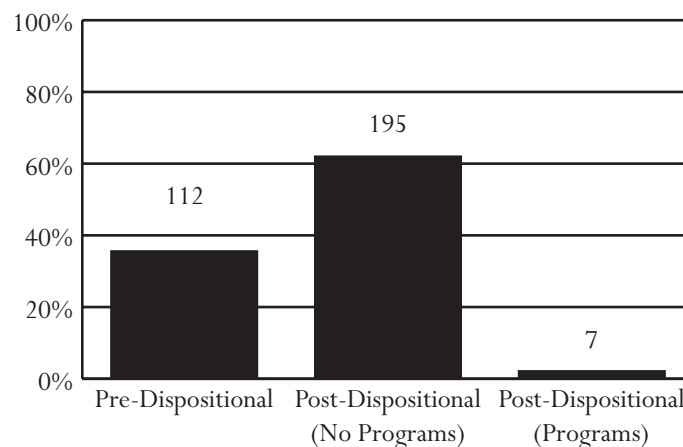
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

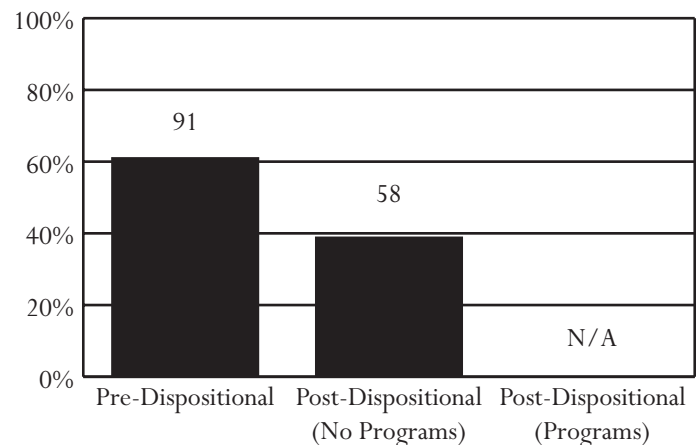
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

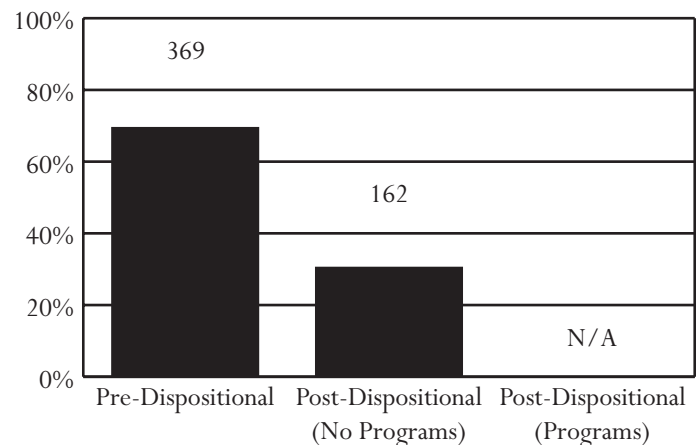
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

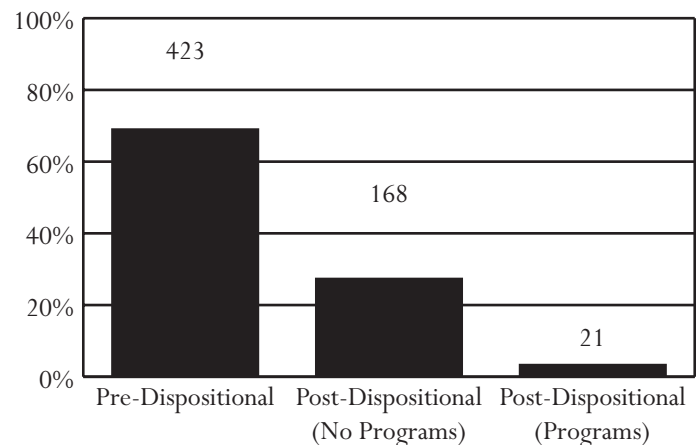
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

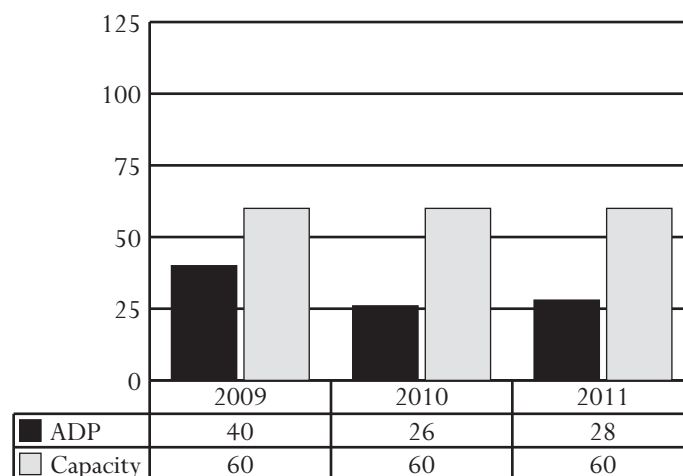

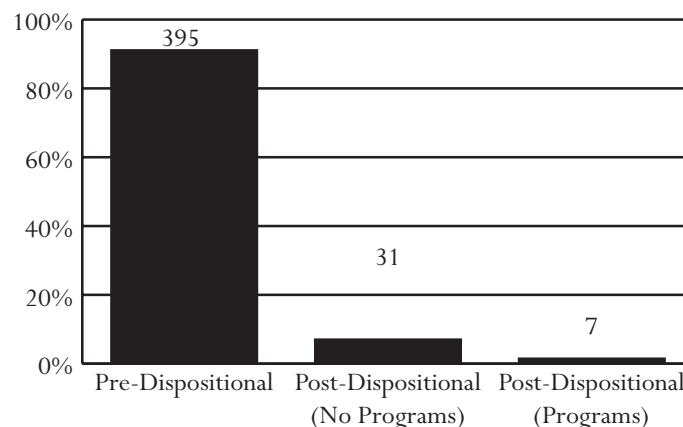
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

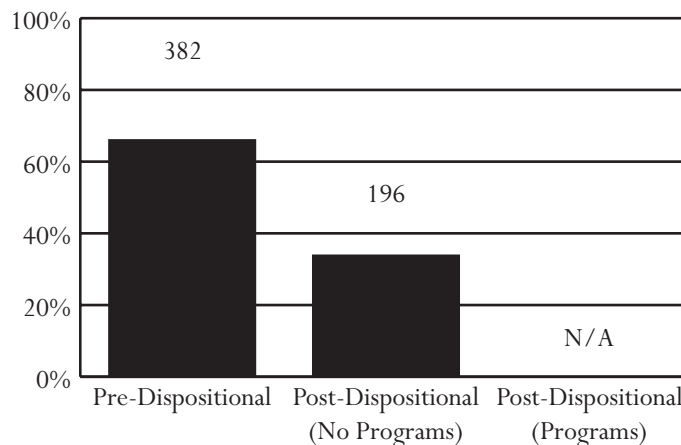
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

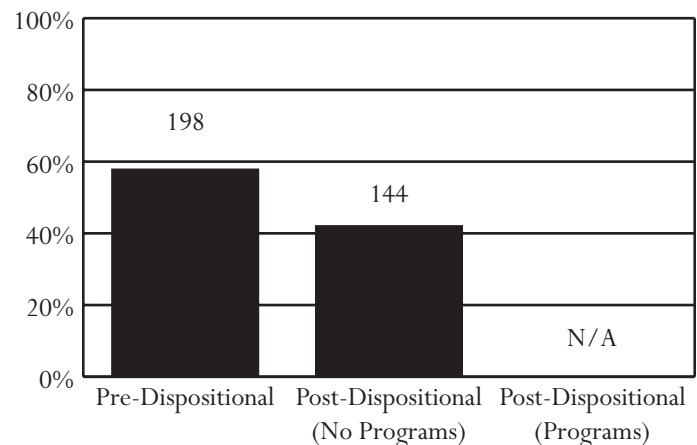
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

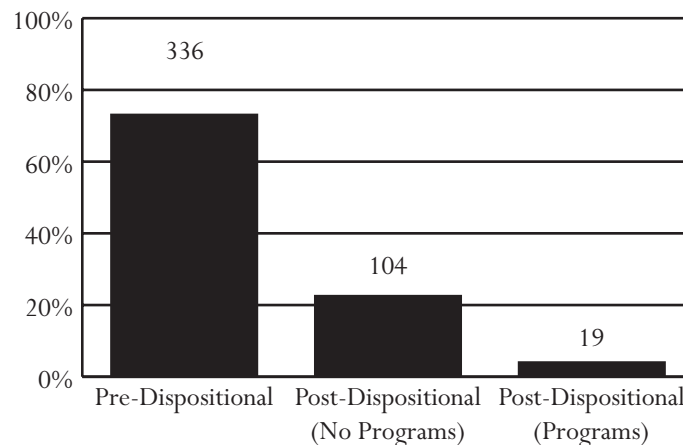
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

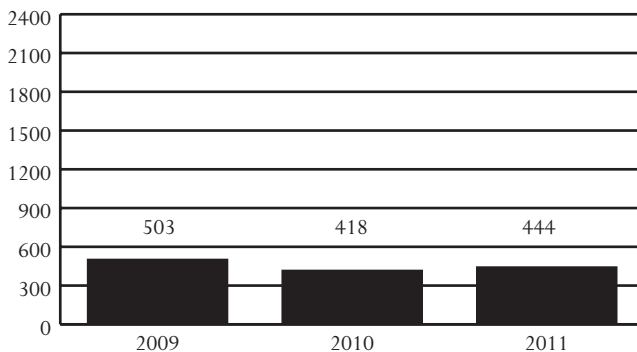

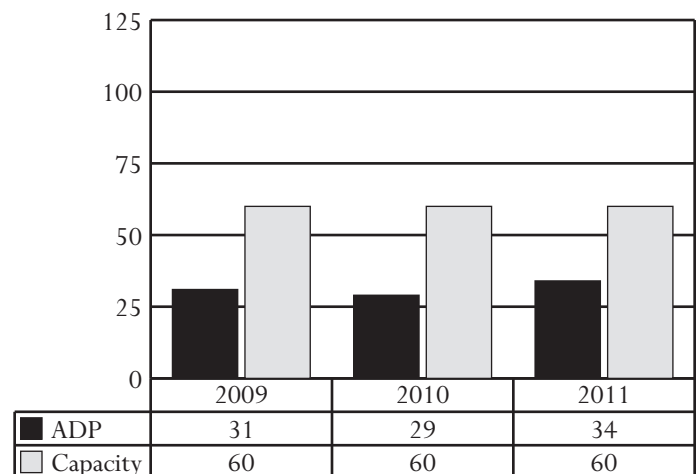

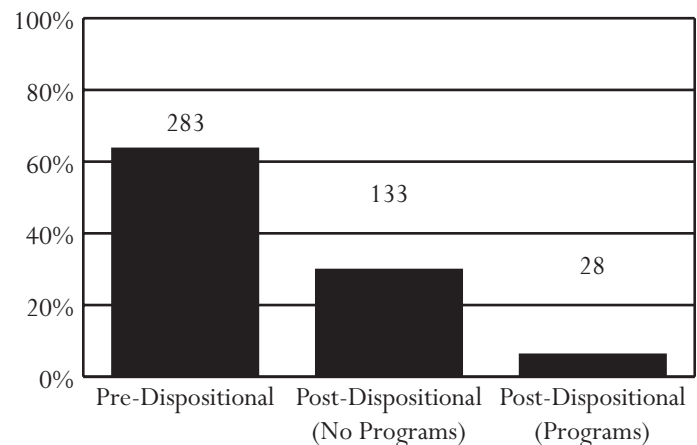
### ADMISSIONS BY COURT DISTRICT, FY 2011

### ADMISSIONS BY DISPOSITIONAL STATUS, FY 2011

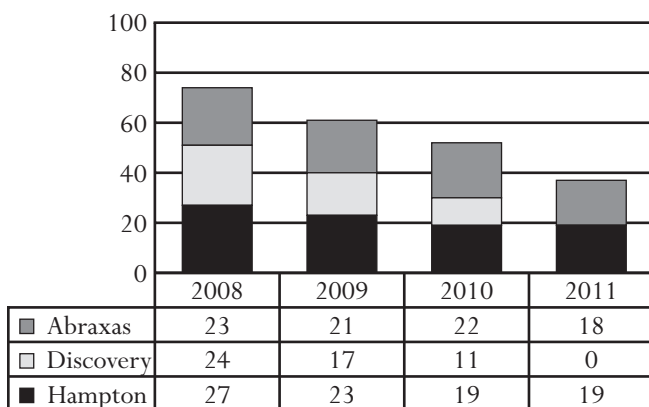

## Halfway Houses

In FY 2011, DJJ operated two state-run juvenile halfway houses, Abraxas House in Staunton and Hampton Place in Norfolk, to address transitional needs of juveniles who were released from JCCs. The purpose of a halfway house is to provide transitional living for juveniles unable to return home or whose service needs make this type of placement beneficial. Residents learn independent living skills and are required to enroll in school, work towards a GED, or be gainfully employed. Residents are placed on parole supervision during their stay at the halfway house. Supportive services such as substance abuse relapse services and sex offender relapse treatment are provided by public or private service providers with the use of transitional service funds. Upon completion of residence at a halfway house, most juveniles return to their families or live independently.

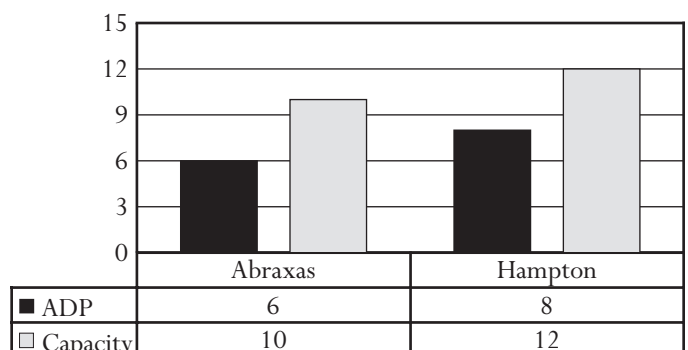

### AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION (ADP) VS CAPACITY, FY 2011





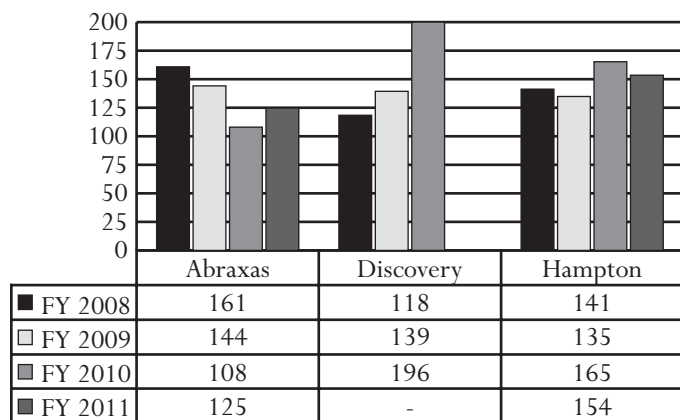

## Introduction to Institutional Programs

The Institutional Programs Section of the Division of Operations has direct responsibility for juvenile offenders who have been committed to the state, ensuring that they receive treatment and educational services while in a safe and secure setting. It operates the Carroll R. Minor Reception and Diagnostic Center (RDC) and juvenile correctional centers (JCCs).

The JCCs and RDC had a combined operating capacity of 917 as of June 30, 2011. The Behavioral Services Unit (BSU), Central Infirmary, Youth Industries, Bon Air Complex Maintenance, Health Services Unit, and Food Services Unit provide support to the JCCs and RDC. The Department of Correctional Education (DCE) provides school and educational services to meet the educational needs of committed juveniles. Through contractual agreements with providers, DJJ offers supplemental programs and services in environments designed to more intensely deliver services. Programs within the JCCs offer community reintegration and specialized services in a secure residential setting, taking into consideration adjustments in service delivery during the course of operation.

The utilization of facilities is continuously monitored in order to maintain therapeutic capacities within the facilities. Ongoing population management takes place through the movement of juveniles between facilities and housing units. When reviewing and adjusting the population for each facility, several factors are taken into consideration, such as housing capacity, staffing levels, and programming initiatives. Revisions to capacities and shifts in the population are considered in order to keep the treatment needs of the juveniles in the forefront. DJJ also plans renovations and new capital construction as funding is available in an ongoing effort to improve facilities.

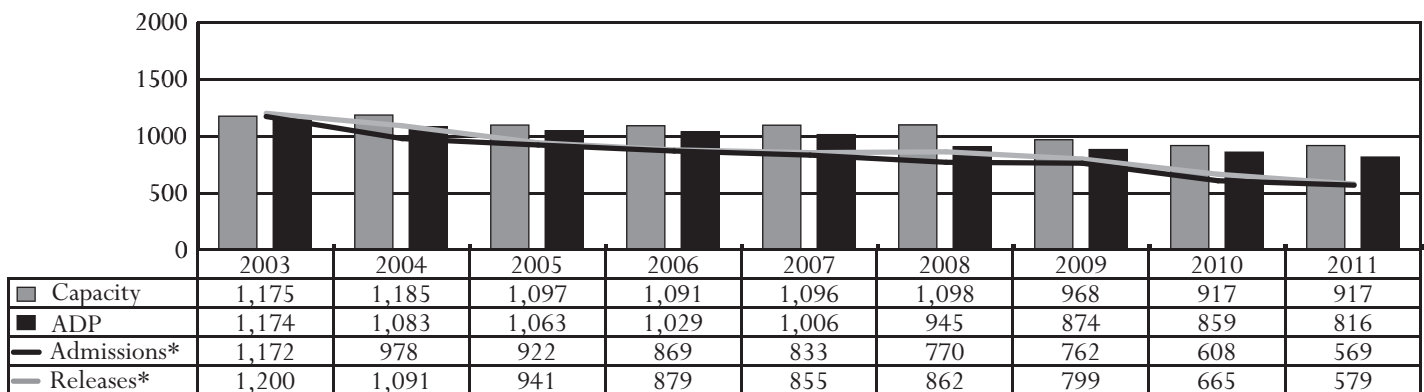

### RECEPTION AND DIAGNOSTIC CENTER

The Department operates a centralized evaluation and classification process at RDC. This facility serves as the central intake facility for juveniles committed to DJJ and is the first encounter a juvenile has with a correctional center. The facility was established in 1968 to receive, evaluate, and place all juveniles committed by the juvenile and domestic relations district or circuit courts. With the primary function of orientation, evaluation, and classification of juveniles, services provided at RDC include academic, medical, psychological, behavioral, and sociological evaluation and classification to determine appropriate treatment needs, security requirements, institutional placements, and lengths of stay.

Juveniles may range in age from 11 to 20 and are typically housed at RDC from four to eight weeks, depending on their individual needs. In addition to psychological screening and evaluation, all

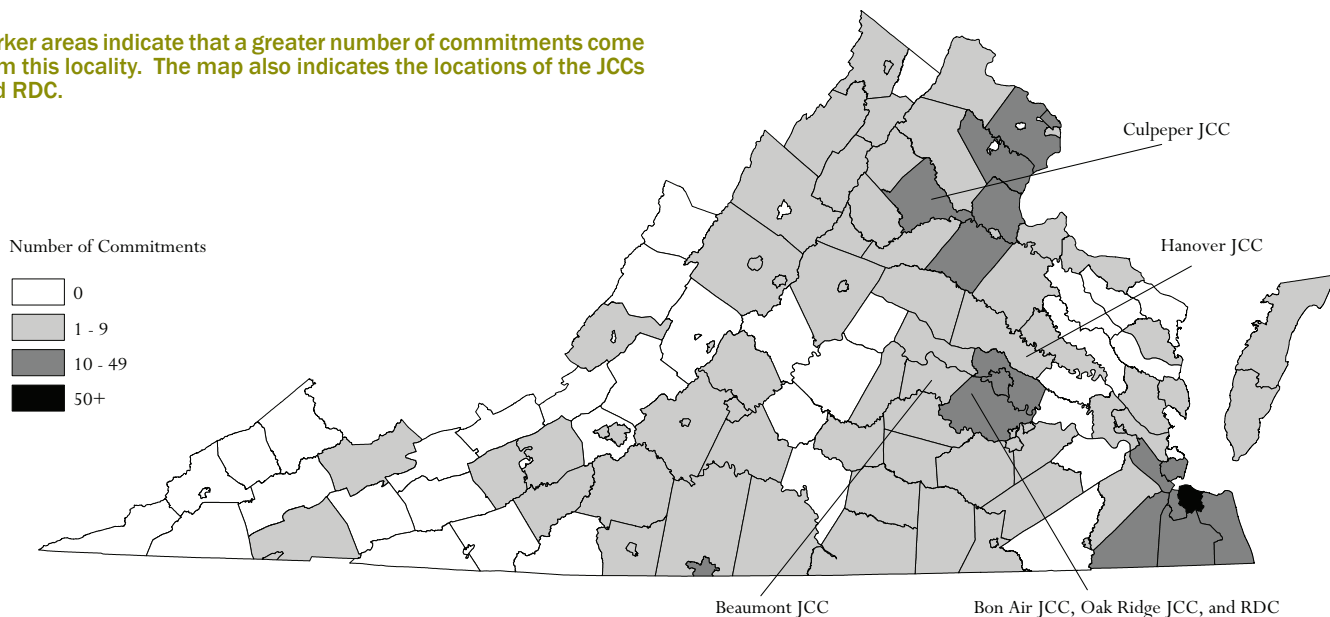
juveniles receive both medical and dental examinations. Each juvenile receives a battery of tests from DCE staff to identify the appropriate educational level, vocational aptitude, and any special educational needs. RDC counselors are responsible for coordination of the evaluation process, individual and crisis counseling, completion of social history, and case management. At the conclusion of the evaluation process, a team of evaluators meet to discuss each case to determine treatment needs, length of stay, classification, transitioning/re-entry, mental health transitioning, and placement recommendations. From RDC, juveniles are sent to their designated correctional centers. As of April 2011, females are admitted directly to Bon Air JCC, the only JCC housing females. Females continue to receive the full series of psychological, medical, dental, and educational assessments at RDC, which is located on the same campus.

RDC operates a highly structured orientation to the Department's behavioral management program, REACH, utilized throughout the JCCs. REACH emphasizes development in areas of responsibility, empowerment, achievement, changes to ways of thinking and acting, and hope for a successful return to the community. It is designed to encourage juveniles to take responsibility for their own actions by earning credits, phase promotions, and reinforcers based on their behaviors.

RDC plays a vital role in tracking juvenile data. Juvenile Profile data are collected at RDC and provide a global picture of the juvenile, including

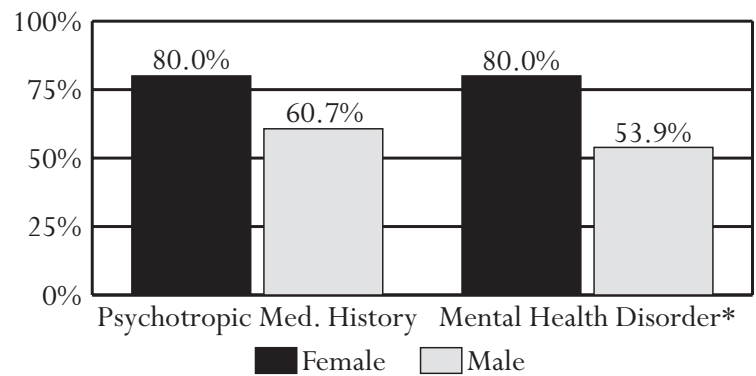

Over half (62%) of the juveniles admitted to the JCCs have a history of prescription psychotropic medication use. At admission, 56% of juveniles had a mental health disorder (other than a DSM-IV diagnosis of ADHD, CD, ODD, or Substance Abuse/Dependence Disorder).

### BEHAVIORAL SERVICES UNIT (BSU)

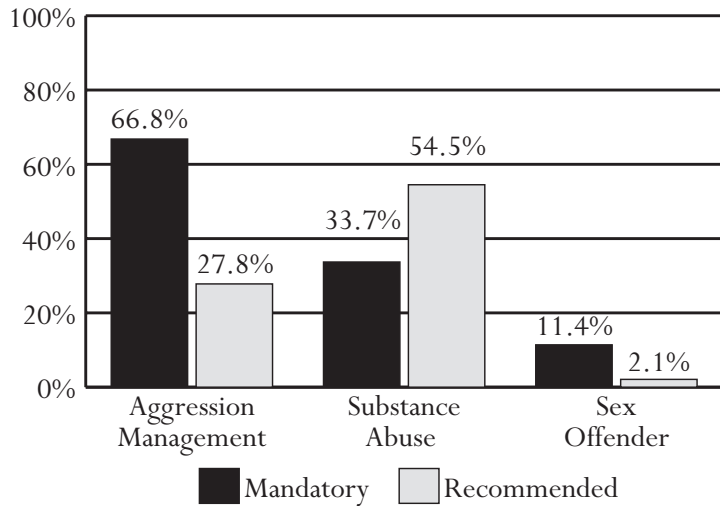
BSU is the organizational unit responsible for providing treatment services to juveniles at RDC and the JCCs. The primary services provided by BSU staff include mental health, substance abuse, sex offender, and aggression management treatment services, as well as psychological and risk assessments.

**Organizational Structure:** There are four BSU staff located at the DJJ Central Office: the Director of the Unit, the Program Supervisor for Substance Abuse and Sex Offender Services, the Program Supervisor for Aggression and Behavior Management Services, and the Executive Secretary of the Unit. RDC and each JCC have a BSU Treatment Director on-site who is responsible for the clinical treatment services at the institution. All supervisory staff are licensed professionals in their respective disciplines.

In addition to clinician supervisors, BSU employs qualified mental health professionals who are doctoral and masters level practitioners in psychology, social work, and rehabilitation counseling. Currently, approximately 53 BSU staff are distributed across the six facilities according to the number of juveniles and particular treatment programs offered at each facility. BSU strongly supports the recruitment and retention of licensed/certified staff.

**Mental Health Treatment:** BSU conducts comprehensive psychological evaluations of all juveniles committed to DJJ while they are residents at RDC. At each facility, BSU provides 24/7 crisis intervention; individual, group, and family therapy; mental status evaluations; case

consultations and development of individualized behavior support protocols; program development and implementation; and staff training. Three JCCs have intensive services units for juveniles whose mental health needs do not allow them to function effectively in the general population of the institution. Risk assessments are completed for all serious and major offenders when they are considered for release.

Psychiatric services at each of the facilities include psychiatric evaluation and medication management. Psychiatric services are provided through contracts with psychiatrists from the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Medicine as well as the private sector.

**Substance Abuse Treatment:** Evidence-based substance abuse treatment services are provided in specialized treatment units as well as in the general population at each of the JCCs. Treatment emphasizes motivation to change, drug and alcohol refusal skills, addiction/craving coping skills, relapse prevention, problem solving, effective communication, and transition to the community, among other skills.

Individualized treatment planning allows juveniles with co-occurring disorders and/or specialized needs to receive additional intervention, including individual, group, and family therapy. Girls with substance abuse treatment needs participate in a specialized treatment unit program that is evidence-based and addresses gender-specific issues, including female sexuality, trauma, and grief and loss.

Depending upon individual needs, completion of substance abuse treatment services requires five weeks to six months.

**Sex Offender Treatment:** DJJ opened its first state-operated juvenile sex offender unit in January 1990. Currently, there are 112 beds in sex offender units across the JCCs. Evidence-based sex offender evaluation and treatment services are also provided in the general population and the intensive services units at the JCCs.

Juveniles in sex offender treatment units receive intensive milieu-based treatment from a multi-disciplinary treatment team that includes a unit manager, counselor, psychologist, and social worker. Specialized sex offender treatment units offer an array of services, including individual, group, and family therapy. Each juvenile receives an individualized treatment plan that addresses programmatic goals, competencies, and core treatment activities. Successful completion of sex offender treatment may require 6 to 36 months depending upon the treatment needs, behavioral stability, and motivation of the juvenile. Median treatment time is approximately 18 months.

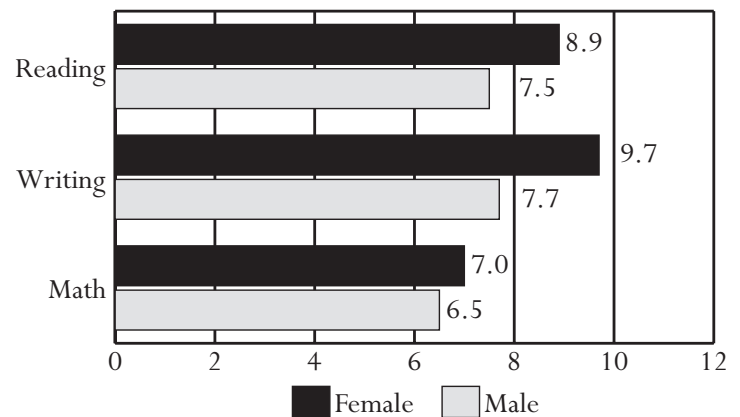
**Aggression Management:** Evidence-based aggression management treatment services are provided at each of the JCCs. Juveniles receive treatment in specialized units as well as in the general population from multidisciplinary treatment teams consisting of mental health professionals, institutional counselors, and security staff.

Juveniles must complete core objectives that address anger control, moral reasoning, and social skills as well as demonstrate aggression management in their environment. Depending upon individual needs, treatment completion requires 10 to 16 weeks or longer.

**HEALTH SERVICES**

The Health Services Unit utilizes an integrated team approach to provide quality health care services to juveniles confined in the JCCs and RDC. The Department's approach to health care is to ensure services provided are clinically appropriate and medically necessary

while emphasizing both prevention and wellness. Health education is an important component of the program; juveniles are provided information to encourage healthy lifestyle choices both now and in the future.

The provision of health care services in the correctional environment presents unique challenges since many juveniles have not had consistent access to preventive care or a medical provider. To meet this challenge, DJJ maintains a staff of physicians, dentists, and nurses on-site who provide assessment, treatment, and care to meet the medical and dental needs of the population housed in the facilities. On-site staff are supplemented by a network of hospitals, physicians, and transport services, provided through contract, to ensure all medically necessary health care services delivered are consistent with the standards of the community.

Upon admission, each juvenile undergoes a comprehensive evaluation which includes a health care screening, medical history, and complete physical examination. A review of immunizations, including the administration of any missed doses; a dental evaluation and prophylaxis; vision and hearing screenings; and routine laboratory testing, including testing for sexually transmitted diseases, complete the evaluation process.

On a continuing basis, evaluation and treatment of new medical concerns as well as follow-up care are provided based on individual needs. Additional health care requirements such as specialty medical care, pharmacy services, diagnostic imaging, physical therapy, and hospital services are provided through the Department's extensive network of medical partners in the community.

The Health Services Unit offers continuing education programs for physician, dental, and nursing staff who work in JCCs, RDC, and detention centers across the Commonwealth to ensure that they are current on adolescent health issues.

## SECURITY AND OPERATIONS

The Institutional Programs Section of the Division of Operations incorporates functions that provide public safety, including supervision and control of committed juveniles and support functions of proper facility operation. Security, which involves both public safety and the safety of the juveniles themselves, is facilitated by the juvenile correctional officers (JCOs) in the field. JCOs operate using paramilitary-style rankings and titles under standard operating procedures that establish how facilities and services are to operate on a 24-hour basis, including proper techniques for addressing various situations. Support staff provide basic daily operating services, including food service, maintenance, human resources, medical, recreation, and business office responsibilities.

As a safeguard for the juveniles, a grievance process is in place in the institutions. The DJJ's Ombudsman Program was instituted in

2002. The purpose of the program is to provide a strong system of advocacy for Virginia's committed juveniles. The program is staffed by an agency-wide ombudsman and grievance coordinators assigned to each of the JCCs. This staffing structure provides a balanced view of facility strengths and challenges and a more objective approach to solving identified problems. By monitoring conditions of confinement and service delivery systems, the program helps identify and solve problems with potential to cause harm or impede rehabilitative efforts. It helps protect the rights of juveniles; promotes system accountability; and helps ensure safe, humane, and lawful living conditions. The Ombudsman and the grievance coordinators operate independently from the facilities in order to provide juveniles with an outlet for addressing issues for which they have expressed concern.

Key components of the Ombudsman Program include SOP-105 Resident Grievance and Complaint/Request Procedure, thorough orientations and training on how to use the grievance procedure for new staff and residents, Resident Advisory Committees in each facility, and the grievance database. In addition, the program provides a toll-free number for parents and staff to contact the office in order to voice any concerns they may have. Additional information is on the agency's website under Initiatives.

## CASE MANAGEMENT AND TREATMENT PROGRAMS

The Case Management and Treatment Programs Section of the Division provides oversight of treatment needs, security requirements (with respect to classification), length of stay, institutional placements, and changes while in direct care. Case management staff monitor treatment and program delivery, facilitate psycho-educational groups utilizing the New Freedom curriculum, assess progress achieved, set parameters for the programs, and deal with broad regulations on classification as well as the residential location of juveniles with different classifications. They are responsible for ensuring that all needed services (including mental health, substance abuse, sex offender, aggression management, and independent living skills development) are available and operational at the facilities, and they serve as a liaison between the field and the administrative offices for procedures and resources. They are responsible for establishing and updating the length of stay for each juvenile and the juvenile's custody classification. These staff follow the case management practices that will eventually justify the release of a juvenile back to the community, and they work with the community to provide a transition and parole plan for re-entry.

## CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

The Department operates an objective classification system to enable staff to assess a juvenile's appropriate security and custody level, determine the most appropriate services and programs, assign juveniles to appropriate housing placements within a facility, and assess juveniles for placement in community transition programs and for special needs. The classification system also provides for periodic reviews of security, custody, and program placement in consideration of the

juvenile's needs and progress and for the reclassification of juveniles as appropriate. A juvenile's behavior, initial committing offense, and willingness to participate in treatment/education programs will impact the classification level.

Juveniles are classified according to their need for structure:

- Level I - low structure
- Level II - medium structure
- Level III - high structure
- Level IV - intensive structure

Juveniles are assigned to facilities based on these classification levels, age, sex, and other factors identified in Appendix D. The need for specific treatment may override a classification level for facility placement, but the classification level is still taken into consideration for room assignment.

## RE-ENTRY PROGRAMS

DJJ developed a four-year strategic plan in 2010 for the re-entry initiative with the mission to promote public safety and accountability by implementing a seamless plan of services for each offender for a successful transition and reintegration into the community. Juvenile re-entry programs begin with the premise that planning for release starts at RDC admission. Some re-entry programs already existed, and several additional re-entry programs were created to support the re-entry initiative.

**Work/Education Release Program:** The Work/Education Release Program (WERP) housed at RDC accommodates 12 male participants and provides education and work experience outside of a JCC. The purpose of WERP is to afford juveniles opportunities to successfully transition back to the community by providing employability skills, job placement in the community, life skills training, and transitional living. Juveniles who qualify for the program have access to a wide array of off-site employment opportunities as well as a community college education. Wages earned by WERP participants are initially used to pay any restitution, fines, or court costs, with any remaining wages credited to the juveniles' accounts. In addition to equipping juveniles with employability skills or furthering their education, the program provides a life skills component that includes financial planning, culinary skills, social etiquette, personal hygiene, parenting skills, household cleanliness, vocational preparation, and moral reasoning.

**Female Transition and Work/Education Release Unit:** Bon Air JCC operates a six-bed transition/WERP unit for its female population, utilizing grant funds administered by the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS). Female residents who are eligible for the Work/Education Release Program or are within six months of their release dates are housed in a separate unit from the general female population. The participants live in a unit modified to resemble a typical homelike environment that includes a kitchen, dining area, common area/family

room, and individual bedrooms. While in this new environment, the juveniles receive intensive life skills programming as preparation for a successful reintegration to the community.

**Badges for Baseball:** The Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation (CRSF) pairs at-risk juveniles with law enforcement officers who serve as mentors in a structured activity-based and curriculum-based program. Its concept of pairing officers with juveniles is designed to reshape the relationship between law enforcement and at-risk juveniles. The Ripken Foundation agreed to bring their concept to Hanover JCC and apply it within a correctional facility for the first time. Participating juveniles are paired with law enforcement mentors and complete a 12-session program consisting of an educational curriculum that teaches life skills concepts via sports terminology in conjunction with an athletic program. Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the Governor's Office on Substance Abuse Prevention (GOSAP).

**Mentoring Project:** DJJ, with the Virginia Mentoring Partnership, has developed a Mentoring Project. The project is designed to provide committed juveniles who are within 90 days of their projected release date with an adult to aid him or her in overcoming specific risk factors. The mentor-mentee relationship will begin a minimum of 60 days prior to a resident's release while the juvenile is still in direct care. The relationship will continue in the community for an additional 10 months post-release. The program's goal is to increase the juvenile's competencies in the areas of consequential thinking, impulse control, problem-solving, decision-making, interpersonal relationships, and goal setting. Funding for this program was provided by a grant from GOSAP.

**Mental Health Services Transition Plans:** For those juveniles with mental health needs, facility counseling staff work with the assigned CSU staff to facilitate a case review meeting 90 days prior to

release that includes the institutional counselor, BSU therapist, parole officer, juvenile, juvenile's family, and community services providers. In this meeting, these parties collaboratively develop a mental health services transition plan for the juvenile to provide a seamless transition from facility to community with no lapse in mental health services.

**Responsibility, Empowerment, Achievement, Change, and Hope (REACH):** The Department's behavior management program used in the facilities, called REACH, provides juveniles with the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary for rehabilitation, positive growth, and behavioral change. The program is designed to focus on identifying desired behaviors, tracking inappropriate behaviors, providing feedback, and having a system of phases through which the juvenile can advance. The program also emphasizes a community approach within the facilities in order to better prepare juveniles for successful re-entry upon release. The main premise behind REACH is to teach juveniles to make better, independent choices and decisions to provide for a positive transition following release.

REACH allows juveniles to earn credits for positive behavior and to exchange those credits for reinforcers or privileges. With consistent positive behavior, juveniles can be promoted to higher phases within the program and obtain corresponding access to a greater number of reinforcer choices at each level. The program also emphasizes the relationship between staff and residents and the appropriate modeling of behavior. Finally, each housing unit operates as a community with daily meetings and a leadership structure board to encourage positive interactions between residents.

**Youth Industries:** Recognizing that many of the juveniles released to the community from the JCCs are not prepared to enter the work force, the Youth Industries Program was created in partnership with DCE to help participants overcome barriers to employment. DJJ manages its programs so that juveniles are offered meaningful opportunities to learn employable skills and to practice those skills in a constructive environment. Participants engage in employment provided both on the JCC grounds and in local communities through agreements with agencies of state and local government, private employers, foundations, and charitable organizations. Additionally, juveniles who otherwise might not be able to complete or participate in all phases of the work-training program may be offered the opportunity to contribute toward meaningful community service work activities both on the facility grounds and in local communities. Fields of study vary at each JCC and include horticulture, silk screening, offset printing, food service, immediate assembly, electrical, barbering, embroidery, vinyl sign-making, and advertising and design. Youth Industries works with the state's One-Stop Centers, operated through the Virginia Workforce Council and Workforce Investment Boards, to help secure employment and other needed services for these juveniles. If warranted, participating juveniles are modestly compensated based on work-training hours completed or receive an established piecework rate. Fields of study may also be integrated with an apprenticeship program.

**New Freedom:** New Freedom, formerly known as the Phoenix Program, is an evidence-based curriculum developed by A. R. Phoenix Resources, Inc. The curriculum helps juveniles develop a variety of behavioral, cognitive, and affective skills necessary to function effectively in the institutions and community settings. This curriculum, designed for adolescents, includes skills such as decision-making, problem-solving, anger management, coping skills, relapse prevention, returning home, vocational issues, understanding and handling feelings, and dealing with transitions. New Freedom treatment assignments are organized according to the stages of change. This design ensures that each juvenile receives treatment during their entire stay at DJJ. Weekly group sessions are accompanied by specific assignments that require juveniles to apply the lessons to their daily lives.

The New Freedom curriculum begins at RDC with counselors delivering the 'Treatment Readiness' portion of the program. Juveniles continue to receive instruction in the New Freedom curriculum throughout their stay in direct care, participating in groups specifically targeted to address areas identified as a need for the juvenile. Prior to release, all juveniles receive the 'Going Home' portion of the curriculum to prepare them for successful re-entry to the community. Finally, additional curriculum can be delivered by the parole officer in the community to reinforce the components the juveniles received in the institution.

**Transitional Services:** An array of transitional services is provided statewide by a network of contracted vendors from which the local CSUs purchase services for paroled juveniles and their families. The intent of community-based transitional services is to provide short-term non-residential services to support and assist the juvenile's adjustment to the community following commitment. Clinical services such as sex offender and substance abuse treatment build upon treatment that was initiated during commitment. Services focus on criminogenic needs in the individual, peer group, family, school, and community domains. The utilization of contracted services is guided by the juvenile's level of risk and need with resources focused on those juveniles at greatest risk of re-offending and those whose offense pattern represents a particular risk to community safety.

**Halfway Houses:** DJJ operates two halfway houses: Hampton Place, located in Norfolk, and Abraxas House, located in Staunton. The halfway houses are designed to provide transitional skills to juveniles released from the JCCs. Each halfway house program is designed to take advantage of the unique resources available in its community to meet the needs of the juveniles. Upon completion of the program, the juvenile will have gained additional skills to promote a continued positive adjustment and reduce the risk of recidivism. See page 148 for additional Halfway House information.

**Second Chance Act Grant for Re-Entry:** The Department, in partnership with Tidewater Youth Services Commission (TYSC), received a grant award of \$675,000 from the Office of Justice Programs at the U.S. Department of Justice for a Juvenile Offender Re-entry Demonstration Project. The project will serve high-risk and moderate-risk parolees up to the age of 21 from the cities of Chesapeake, Virginia Beach, Portsmouth, Norfolk, Suffolk, Newport News, and Hampton; and the counties of Southampton, Franklin, and Isle of Wight. The grant funding and matching DJJ funds support a comprehensive range of services and provide

for graduated re-entry options to address challenges posed by re-entry and to reduce recidivism. The program is grounded in research-based principles and implements evidence-based modalities targeting criminogenic needs.

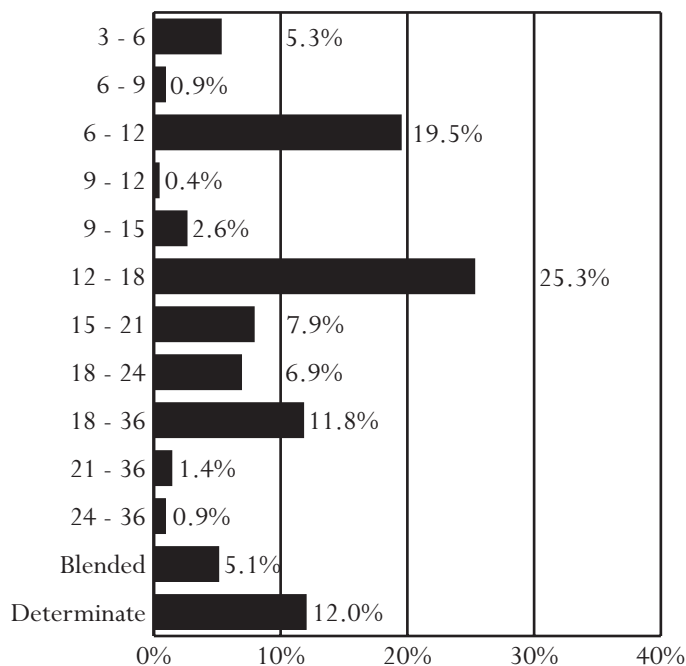
**Family Link Pilot Video Visitation:** The Family Link program allows juvenile offenders and their family members to visit via video in collaborative sites operated by DJJ and non-profit agencies. This contact will augment and support the DJJ visitation program while fostering a stronger family connection to enhance re-entry initiatives. New Jubilee Inc., located in Richmond, coordinates the services, and the program is being piloted at Culpeper JCC. The video services are available to families at Saint James United Methodist Church in Hampton, Virginia. Additional facilities and visitor centers will be added in the future.

**Re-Entry to Education and Employment Project (REEP):** REEP is a cooperative initiative between the Department and the Peninsula Area Worklink, a workforce investment board that serves the Hampton, Newport News, and Williamsburg areas. The One-Stop site within Beaumont JCC allows certain juveniles to participate in job training and to access job-search services under the Commonwealth of Virginia's SHARE Network Program. Upon release from custody, the juveniles are given opportunities for on-the-job training and apprenticeship programs through the employers who work with Peninsula Worklink. The goal under REEP is to have participants work full time in stable jobs following their release, thereby improving community reintegration and lowering recidivism rates for this population.

74% of JCC admissions were committed by the J&DR court, and over half of those had either 6-12 or 12-18 month assigned LOS. 18% of JCC admissions were committed by circuit court with 47% of those having a determinate LOS. (The remaining 8% of admissions had J&DR commitments upheld by circuit court on appeal).

### LENGTH OF STAY (LOS)

Using guidelines issued by the Board of Juvenile Justice, DJJ establishes the length of stay for indeterminately committed juveniles based on the severity of a juvenile's offense(s) and chronicity of criminal behavior, with due consideration given to the youth's treatment needs and demonstrated behavior while under DJJ's supervision. LOS categories are defined by an anticipated minimum and maximum number of months that the resident will remain

with DJJ. For example, the LOS category 3-6 indicates a resident is expected to stay between three and six months. The actual LOS may vary from this range due to institutional offenses or failure to complete mandatory treatment. (The guidelines and LOS categories can be found in Appendix E.)

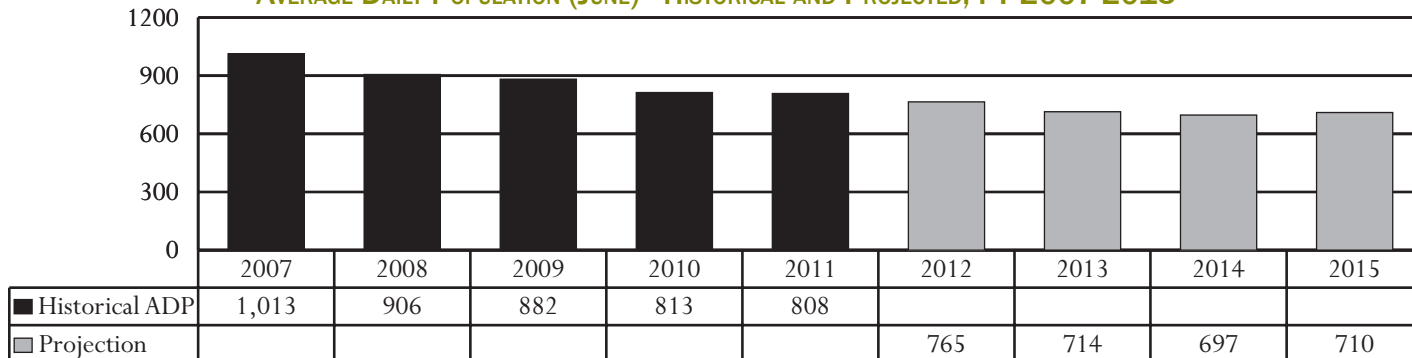

### PROJECTION FOR THE INSTITUTIONAL POPULATION

Each year, DJJ, in conjunction with the Governor's Inmate Population Forecasting Committee, produces a projection of the state-responsible juvenile offender average daily population. The most recent forecast projects that the institutional population will decrease 12.1% between FY 2011 and FY 2015. It is important to note that the values shown in the graph below are June values for each fiscal year.

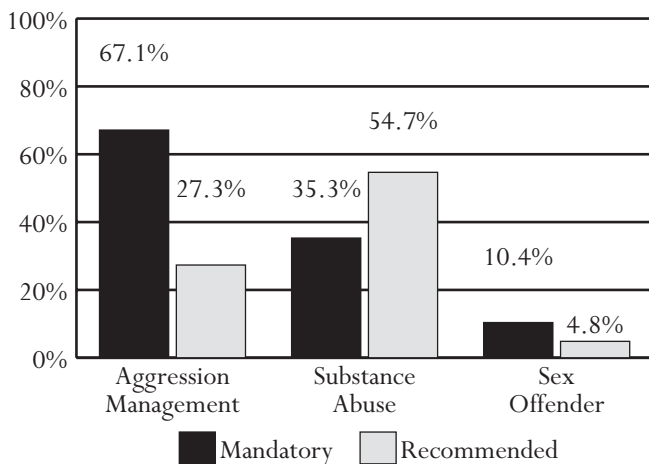

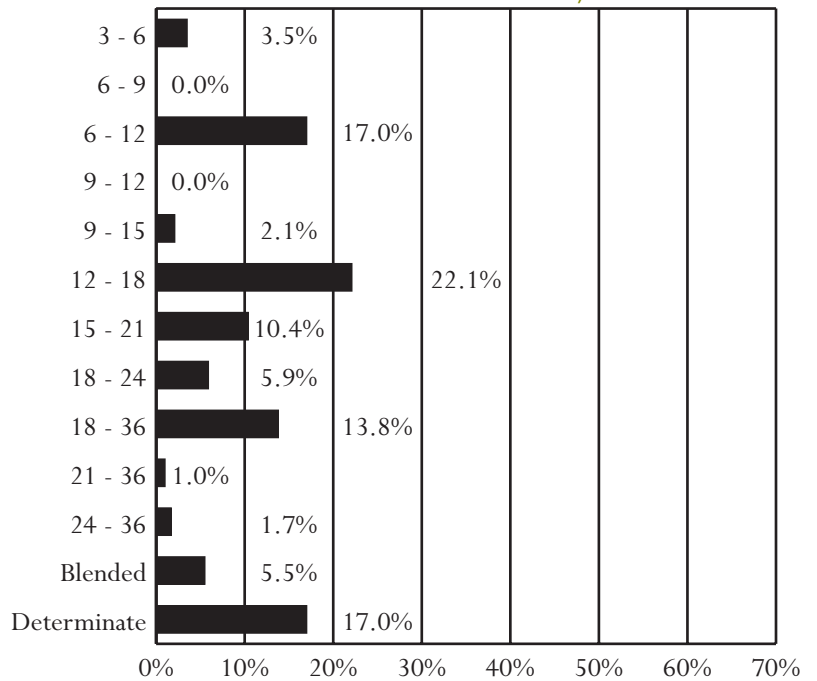

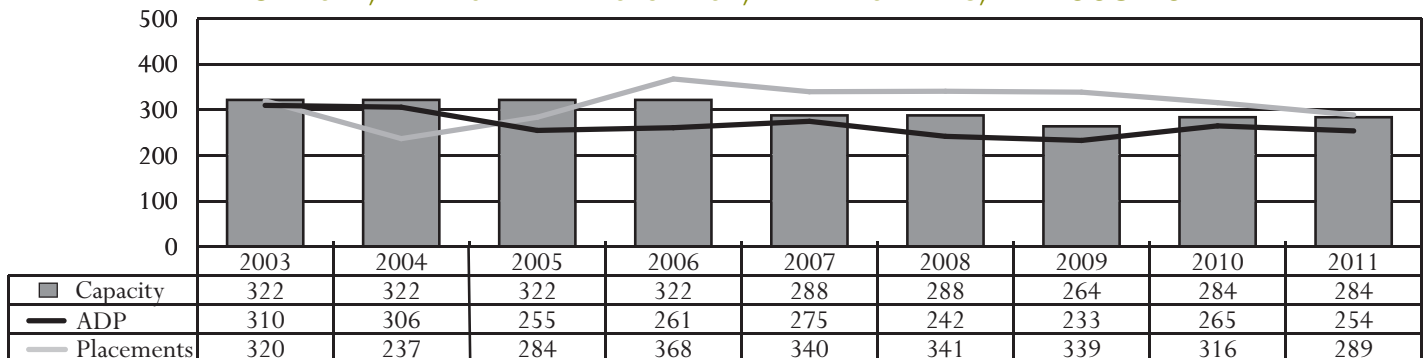
### PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2011

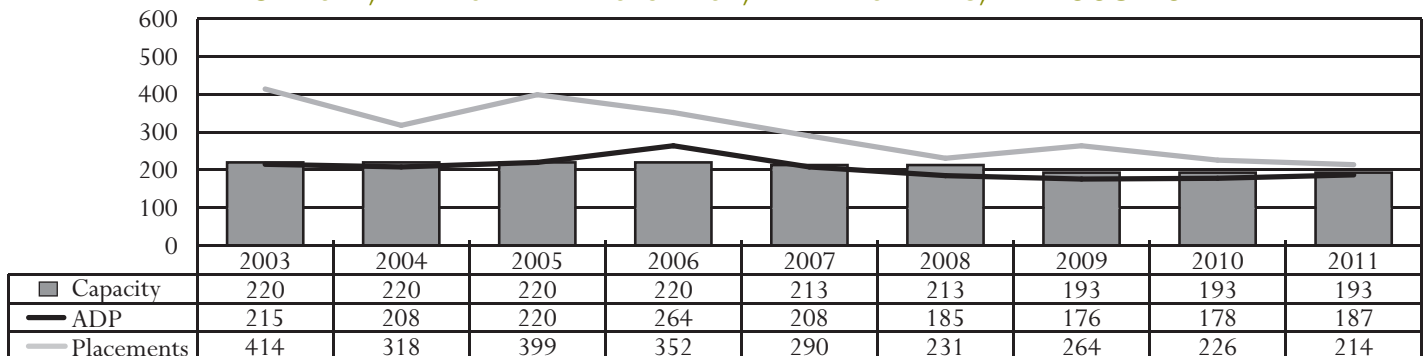
### PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2011

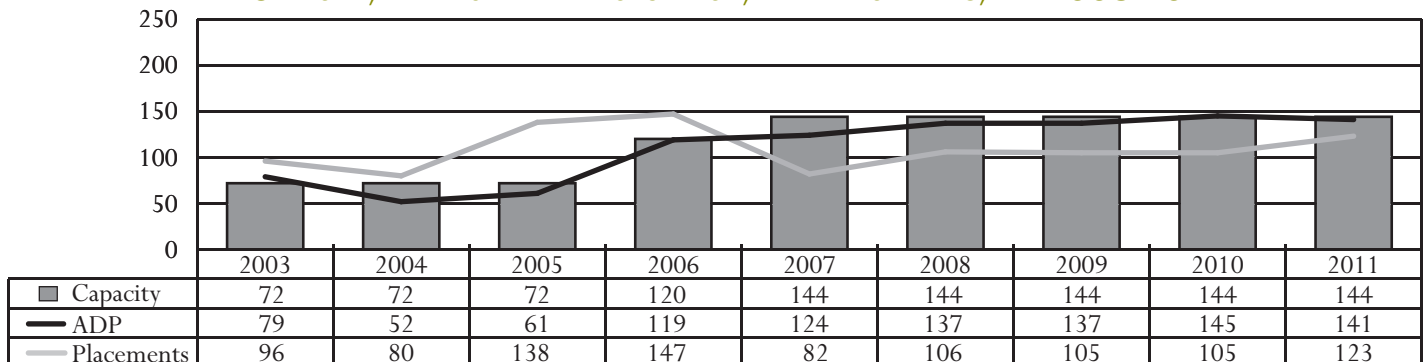
### PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2011

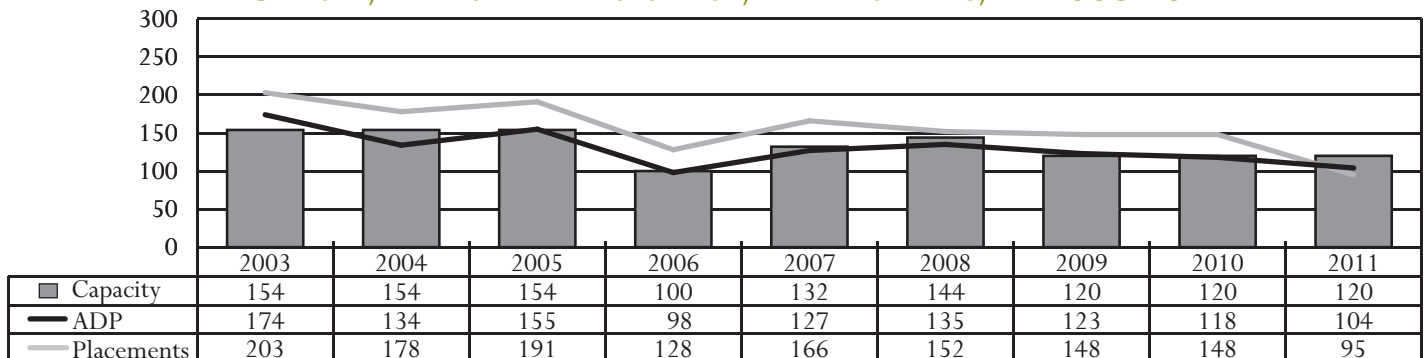
### PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2011

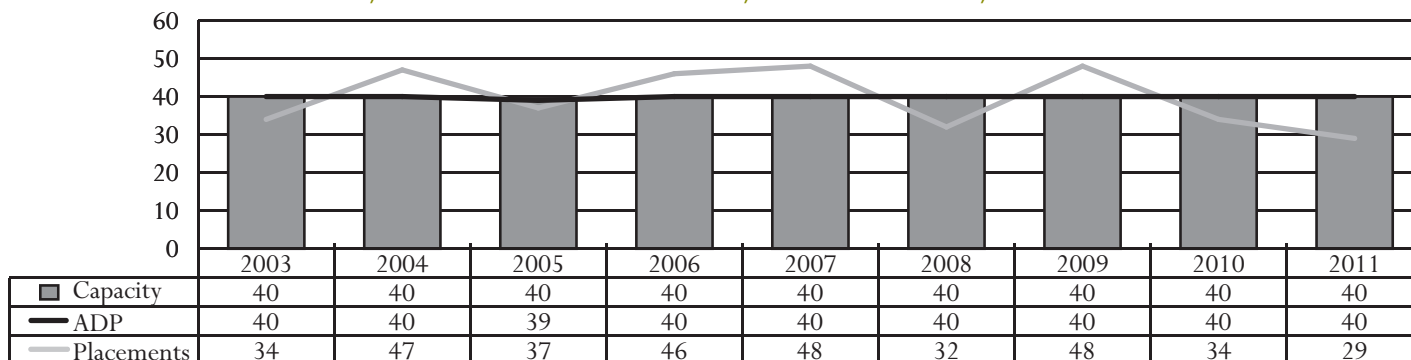
### PLACEMENTS BY ASSIGNED LENGTH OF STAY, FY 2011

## Measuring Reoffense Rates

Recidivism, or reoffending, is an important concept for juvenile and adult criminal justice systems because it provides a measure of outcome success. In terms of public awareness, this concept is usually the primary measure of interest when evaluating program effectiveness. Use of a standardized measure of recidivism allows evaluation across different types of programs and facilitates comparison to program outcomes from other states.

While there are many studies on offender recidivism, comparison of results is difficult because the evaluation methodologies used vary widely. Definitions of recidivism differ from study to study, and characteristics of the juveniles studied may not be adequately identified. These issues, as well as others concerning reoffense analysis, were discussed in DJJ's research quarterly on juvenile recidivism in Virginia (available on the DJJ website at [www.djj.virginia.gov/Resources/DJJ\\_Publications/ResearchQuarterlies.aspx](http://www.djj.virginia.gov/Resources/DJJ_Publications/ResearchQuarterlies.aspx)). In November 2009, the Council of Juvenile Correctional Administrators (CJCA) released a white paper entitled, "Defining and Measuring Recidivism." This study determined that because reoffense findings can differ greatly depending on how recidivism is defined and measured, there is a need for standardization of measurement. According to CJCA, "standardization is necessary in order to communicate clearly the meaning of outcome study results, to communicate unambiguously the methods used to obtain research findings, to enable replication of research designs, to make possible comparisons across studies and regions, and to facilitate knowledge development." Since there is a general agreement regarding the use of adjudication/conviction, CJCA recommends that all recidivism studies use this decision point to measure recidivism and the date of the offense to determine the date of the recidivism event.

### METHODS FOR STUDYING REOFFENDING

One method used to evaluate reoffending is the longitudinal cohort study. A cohort is a group of individuals who share some common characteristic, such as release from incarceration during a specific year. This method may use the entire population of interest or a sample from that population. The chosen cohort is followed over a period of time so that any trends for the group may be identified. For reoffense rates, a cohort is tracked for a specific follow-up period. For a longitudinal cohort analysis, the cohort is chosen (for example, all juveniles released from JCCs during FY 2009). At the end of a specified follow-up period (for example, 12 months after release) all instances of reoffending are identified. The cohort is then divided into groups depending on whether or not they reoffended.

Most recidivism studies use the longitudinal cohort method, including the Florida Department of Corrections' report on adult recidivism (2003) and Virginia's annual evaluations of juvenile reoffending (see previous *Data Resource Guides*). This method provides a clear picture of long-term trends and allows public safety agencies to see patterns in offending.

### DEFINITIONS OF REOFFENDING

The American Correctional Association (ACA) has stated that the definition of recidivism is one of the primary issues for juvenile and

adult correctional organizations. According to the ACA, "...there are numerous ways to measure recidivism... [d]epending on what perspective is taken, statistical outcomes may vary."

There are three commonly accepted definitions used to measure reoffending:

- *Rearrest* refers to a petitioned juvenile complaint for a new criminal offense made at intake or an adult arrest for a new criminal offense. Rearrest is an important measure of reoffending because it represents the first official contact with the criminal justice system after the placement on probation or the release from a JCC. Uses of rearrest rates are limited as a gauge of reoffending because rearrest measures police activity, and juveniles may be rearrested for offenses they did not actually commit.
- *Reconviction* refers to a delinquent adjudication for a delinquent act or a guilty conviction of a criminal offense. This measure represents a more stringent way to measure reoffending. Because reconviction rates are based on the final disposition for an offense, only cases with a court finding of delinquency or guilt are counted.
- *Reincarceration* refers to a return to incarceration (after having been previously released from incarceration in a juvenile or adult facility) subsequent to rearrest and reconviction on a new criminal offense. This measure indicates that the new offense is serious enough to warrant a return to incarceration.

A report on offender risk assessment in Virginia (Ostrom, Kleiman, Chessman, Hansen, & Kauder, 2002) emphasized that the way recidivism is defined influences the interpretation of study results. According to their report, there are strengths and weaknesses associated with each measure of recidivism. Use of rearrest as a measure of recidivism has the advantage of not being influenced by court proceedings (offense reduction, plea bargaining, diversion) but may overestimate the level of reoffending because arrest criteria are less stringent than conviction criteria. Rearrest rates represent the *maximum* rate for reoffending as captured in official records.

Use of reconviction as a measure of recidivism lessens the likelihood of overinflating reoffending rates. It should be noted that time to reconviction is best measured as the number of days until a new arrest for which the offender will be subsequently convicted so that any discrepancies in court procedures will not influence the measurement of time to reoffense.

Reincarceration rates offer the most stringent measure of reoffending. Juveniles recommitted to a JCC or sentenced to an adult facility have been considered by a judge to have committed offenses serious enough to justify return to a secure facility.

### ISSUES WITH THE STUDY OF REOFFENDING

Ostrom et al. (2002) noted that studies of reoffending (recidivism) differ in terms of the length of time used for follow-up. Length of follow-up period in these studies typically ranges from three months

to five years. Most studies use a one-year follow-up period to assess reoffending. While reoffense rates are often highest within the first year after release or judicial action, the limitation of follow-up to one year does not allow for a comprehensive analysis of reoffending patterns. Studies of reoffending should use longer follow-up periods to get a better idea of the recidivism process. Ostrom et al. (2002) recommended using a follow-up period of at least one to three years.

There are other issues relevant to the examination of reoffending, particularly for juveniles. First, many studies have focused on offenders who were released from correctional centers. Focusing on this group limits the understanding of reoffending rates because it does not allow for examination of all individuals who have contact with the justice system and eliminates the possibility of comparison between individuals who were incarcerated in secure facilities and individuals who were sent to diversion programs or placed on probation.

Also, some studies do not track offenses through both the juvenile and adult justice systems. A complete examination of juvenile reoffending is not possible unless all juvenile and adult contacts with the justice system are included.

Additionally, studies of reoffending should include information on gender and age differences when presenting reoffense data, particularly evaluations of juvenile reoffending. There are well-documented developmental differences between males and females, as well as juveniles in early adolescence versus late adolescence. For example, a 2007 study by Oregon Youth Authority found that female offenders were less likely than male offenders to be reconvicted of a felony. Therefore, reoffending patterns should not be assumed to be the same for all juveniles, and comparing recidivism rates between states with different ages of jurisdiction is not advisable.

## DJJ'S STUDY OF JUVENILE REOFFENDING

Data on juvenile offenders in Virginia are contained in DJJ's electronic data collection system. This system contains information on juvenile intakes, detention placements, commitments to JCCs or other incarceration alternatives, and probation placements for all localities within Virginia. This information allows for the examination of juvenile reoffending patterns in a standardized way. DJJ also obtains statewide adult arrest and conviction information from the Virginia State Police and the Virginia Sentencing Commission. In addition, DJJ acquires information on subsequent incarcerations from the Department of Corrections (DOC) and the State Compensation Board. Information from these sources enables the study of statewide juvenile reoffending patterns with long-term follow-up periods.

Juvenile reoffending patterns for FY 2006 through FY 2010 were examined for this *Data Resource Guide*. Juvenile and adult arrest data on juveniles released from Virginia JCCs or placed on probation during these years were examined. The follow-up period ranged from three months to three years from the date the juvenile was

released or placed. Demographic information for reoffenders was also included.

Although all three measures of reoffending were included in this *Data Resource Guide*, it is important to note that the official DJJ recidivism definition is based on measures of reconviction. In February 2000, the Director of the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice issued an administrative directive (07-710) that established an official definition for recidivism to be used by the Department (this directive was updated in December 2004).

*For the purposes of reporting recidivism rates of juveniles as required by Va. Code §2.2-222, the Department will use the following definition:*

***A recidivist is a person who is found by a court to have committed, after being (a) placed on probation or (b) released from confinement, a delinquent or criminal act other than violation of probation or parole.***

As the recidivism definition currently stands, all instances of petitioned delinquent intakes and adult arrests for criminal activity for which a juvenile has been adjudicated guilty that occur after a juvenile is released from a JCC or is placed on probation are collected by DJJ. Technical violations are not included in this definition of reoffending. Tracking information for subsequent juvenile and adult offenses provides a better measure of reoffending than simply gathering information from the juvenile justice system alone.

As previously mentioned, DJJ uses a longitudinal cohort method for analysis; however, it is important to note that recidivism data tracks particular juveniles and not specific offenses. For example:

A juvenile is released from a JCC on January 1, 2010.

- A) On March 1, 2010 he is arrested on a misdemeanor assault and the case is ultimately dismissed.
- B) On October 1, 2010 he is arrested on a felony assault and is ultimately adjudicated guilty.

Rearrest rates would capture (A) within the 3-month follow-up period because it was the first arrest; (B) would not count in the rearrest rates. Reconviction rates would capture (B) as the first conviction within the 12-month follow-up period. Thus, the reconviction offense is not necessarily correlated with the initial rearrest. Likewise, the reincarceration offenses may not necessarily correlate with the reconviction offense.

## Reoffense Rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements

Reoffense data were examined for the following cohorts:

- **JCC Releases** – all juveniles released from juvenile correctional centers between FY 2006 and FY 2010
- **Probation Placements** – all juveniles placed on probation between FY 2006 and FY 2010
- **Juveniles in DJJ Programs** – all juveniles who were in various treatment programs (including juveniles served by VJCCCA) or commitment alternatives (including post-dispositional detention programs) between FY 2008 and FY 2010

Tables on the next few pages include the following data:

- **Rearrest rates** are presented for JCC Releases and Probation Placements in FY 2006 to FY 2010 and for VJCCCA Placements in FY 2008 to FY 2010.
- **Reconviction rates** are presented for JCC Releases and Probation Placements in FY 2006 to FY 2009.
- **Reincarceration rates\*** are presented for JCC Releases in FY 2006 to FY 2009. These rates represent recommitment back into a JCC, incarceration in a DOC facility (not including blended sentences), or a jail sentence imposed by a judge. Data on any commitment to a JCC, an adult incarceration, or a jail sentence are also included for the post-dispositional detention program cohorts.

\* Reincarceration rates are not comparable to previous *Data Resource Guides*. In previous years, pre-trial jail admissions for alleged criminal behavior were included as reincarcerations due to an over-inclusion in the data shared between agencies. However, the definition of reincarceration requires that the admissions to secure facilities follow an arrest and conviction for the reoffense. In this *Data Resource Guide*, only jail sentences imposed by a judge after a conviction were included in order to be consistent with the reincarceration definition. Therefore, reincarceration rates are lower and more accurate than in past reports.

Only petitioned delinquent intakes were used for the analysis. Reoffense data did not include the following offenses: violation of probation or parole, contempt of court, failure to appear (for offenses other than felonies and misdemeanors), non-criminal domestic relations/child welfare complaints, or non-criminal traffic violations.

When the length of time to rearrest or reconviction is reported, it indicates the time between the date the juvenile was released from a JCC or placed on probation and the date of a new arrest. For reincarceration length of time, the difference between the release date from a JCC and the reincarceration date was used.

There is a slight discrepancy between the total number of JCC Releases/Probation Placements in the reoffense analysis when compared with the total number of juveniles released from the JCCs or placed on probation reported in other sections of this *Data Resource Guide*. This slight discrepancy is due to the following methodological criteria used to establish the cohorts:

- Probation Placement cohorts did not include those few juveniles with missing date of birth data. This information is required to match cases in different state data systems (such as DJJ's electronic data collection system and the Virginia Criminal Information Network used by the Virginia State Police).
- Juveniles sent directly to DOC upon release from the JCCs and juveniles released from the JCCs on appeal were not included in the reoffense analysis. (Juveniles released on appeals were included in the analysis for any *subsequent* admissions and releases once the appeal processes were completed and the juveniles were adjudicated delinquent or found guilty).

The numbers presented in this section have changed from previous *Data Resource Guides* due to more comprehensive information obtained from other agencies.

- Recidivism rates for FY 2009 (defined by DJJ as 12-month reconviction rates) were as follows:
  - 36.6% for juveniles released from the JCCs
  - 24.2% for juveniles placed on probation
- JCC Releases had higher 12-month rearrest and reconviction rates than Probation Placements for all years presented.
- The following reoffending patterns were noted at 12-months when comparing FY 2008 and FY 2009:
  - For JCC Releases, rearrest and reincarceration rates increased while reconviction rates decreased.
  - For Probation Placements, rearrest and reconviction rates decreased.

Rearrest rates reflect the level of official contact juveniles have with the justice system after release or placement. Also, analysis of rearrests allows for comparison to other studies that use rearrest as their measure of recidivism. Evaluation of rearrest rates provides a sense of the *maximum rate* of known reoffending.

- Rearrest rates for Probation Placements have been consistently lower than rearrest rates for JCC Releases since FY 2006 (with the exception of the 3-month rates in FY 2008 through FY 2010).
- Examining trends from FY 2006 to FY 2010:
  - The rearrest rates for JCC Releases increased at each interval between FY 2006 and FY 2007 and decreased at each interval between FY 2007 and FY 2008. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, rates decreased at the 3-month and 6-month intervals but increased at the 12-month and 24-month intervals. Between FY 2009 and FY 2010, rates increased at the 3-month and 6-month intervals but decreased at the 12-month interval. Overall, comparing FY 2006 to FY 2010, the 3-month rearrest rate for JCC Releases decreased slightly while both the 6-month and 12-month rearrest rates were approximately the same.
  - The rearrest rates for Probation Placements remained relatively stable from year to year.

DJJ's official definition of recidivism requires a new conviction. This rate is preferred because it considers the final adjudication of delinquency/guilt rather than level of arrest activity. Only offenses for which there has been a final disposition of delinquency/guilt are counted as reconvictions. Because of cases still pending at the time of analysis, reconviction rates for FY 2010 JCC Releases and Probation Placements are unavailable. Reconviction rates may increase slightly when re-examined next year because of updated final case dispositions.

- Reconviction rates for Probation Placements have been consistently lower than the reconviction rates for JCC Releases since FY 2006.
- Examining trends from FY 2006 to FY 2009:
  - The reconviction rates for JCC Releases increased at each interval between FY 2006 and FY 2007 and decreased at each interval between FY 2007 and FY 2008 and between FY 2008 and FY 2009. Overall, comparing FY 2006 to FY 2009, the 3-month and 6-month reconviction rates for JCC Releases decreased slightly while the 12-month reconviction rates were approximately the same.
  - Between FY 2006 and FY 2007, reconviction rates for Probation Placements increased at the 3-month and 6-month intervals but decreased at the 12-month, 24-month, and 36-month intervals. Reconviction rates decreased at each interval between FY 2007 and FY 2008 and between FY 2008 and FY 2009. Overall, comparing FY 2006 to FY 2009, reconviction rates for Probation Placements decreased slightly at each interval.

DJJ tracks both juvenile and adult reincarceration. Reincarceration rates are based on any new commitment to DJJ, incarceration with DOC, or a post-conviction sentence to a local jail. The inclusion of adult incarceration information, for both the prisons and jails, is especially useful because DJJ retains custody of some residents until age 21.

Because of cases still pending at the time of analysis, reincarceration rates for FY 2010 JCC Releases are unavailable. Reincarceration rates presented in this *Data Resource Guide* may differ from rates presented in previous years because of updated information obtained from DOC and from the Virginia Compensation Board (local jail sentence information) for FY 2006 through FY 2009 JCC Releases.

- Examining trends from FY 2006 to FY 2009:
  - The reincarceration rates for JCC Releases increased at each interval between FY 2006 and FY 2007 and decreased at each interval between FY 2007 and FY 2008. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, rates decreased at the 3-month and 6-month intervals but increased at the 12-month interval. Overall, comparing FY 2006 to FY 2009, the reincarceration rates for JCC Releases decreased slightly at each interval.
  - The percentage of JCC Releases recommitted to DJJ JCCs within 12 months of release decreased from 6.3% in FY 2006 to 4.3% in FY 2009. The percentage of JCC Releases reincarcerated in a local jail (with a sentence imposed by a judge) increased from 10.3% in FY 2006 to 12.6% in FY 2009. The percentage of JCC Releases reincarcerated in a DOC facility decreased from 2.7% in FY 2006 to 1.1% in FY 2009. (Data are not included in the table above.)

The DJJ Risk Assessment Instrument or the Youth Assessment & Screening Instrument (YASI) is completed by CSU staff to determine a juvenile's relative risk of reoffending (see Appendix H for an outline of YASI items). According to the risk assessment score, a juvenile's reoffense risk level is classified as low, moderate, or high. The risk assessment is completed as part of a social history report and is not completed for all juveniles. A juvenile's risk assessment score is one factor examined when parole supervision level is established. Juveniles with high risk assessment scores are usually placed on higher levels of parole supervision when first released from the JCCs.

The table above presents the reoffense rates for JCC Releases and Probation Placements with completed risk assessment scores. For both JCC Releases and Probation Placements, juveniles with low risk levels had the lowest reoffense rates, and juveniles with high risk levels had the highest reoffense rates. These rates are consistent with probable risk to reoffend (according to risk score levels). In FY 2009, 4% of JCC Releases and 12% of Probation Placements were missing risk assessment scores, and in FY 2010, 4% of JCC Releases and 14% of Probation Placements were missing scores.

- Probation Placements had higher rearrest rates than JCC Releases for the low and high risk levels while JCC Releases had higher rates for the moderate risk level.
- JCC Releases had higher reconviction rates than Probation Placements for low and moderate risk levels and a lower rate at the high risk level.
- The instruments' risk level classifications correspond to the actual reoffense rates.

VJCCCA programs serve thousands of juveniles each year, with a variety of programs in each locality. One of the outcome measures chosen for the evaluation of VJCCCA programs is rearrest, defined as a new petitioned intake or adult arrest. (Not all juveniles were arrested before placement in VJCCCA programs.) The rearrest rates at 3-month, 6-month, and 12-month follow-up intervals for juveniles who were placed in VJCCCA programs are provided in the table above. For comparative purposes, the rearrest rates for Probation Placements and JCC Releases are also listed.

- Rearrest rates at the 3-month, 6-month, and 12-month intervals decreased for VJCCCA Placements each year.
- VJCCCA Placements had the highest 3-month rearrest rates each year when compared to Probation Placements and JCC Releases.
- Rearrest rates for VJCCCA Placements were consistently lower than both Probation Placements and JCC Releases at the 6-month and 12-month intervals (with the exception of the 6-month rate in FY 2008).

Many juveniles committed to DJJ participate in programs designed to meet their treatment needs. There are also various program opportunities to assist in the successful return of these committed juveniles back into the community. Not all those who are adjudicated delinquent are placed in the JCCs, however. There are commitment alternatives available to judges for placement of juveniles who may be better served in non-JCC residential facilities. The table above presents the 12-month reoffense rates for juveniles in these programs who were released from the JCCs or post-dispositional detention programs between FY 2008 and FY 2010.

The table is not intended to provoke a comparison between the different programs – these programs often serve vastly different groups of juveniles with varying offense histories, treatment needs, and skills. **Also, some programs serve a small number of juveniles each year; in such instances the reoffenses of only a few juveniles can strongly influence the reoffense rate.** The information in this table may be useful as DJJ evaluates these programs and commitment alternatives over time. Also, these data may serve as a source of comparison for similar programs in other states. It should be noted that all programs in the table *except post-dispositional detention* are subsets of the overall JCC population; no comparisons are made between program reoffense rates and the overall JCC release rates for that reason.

- **Substance Abuse Treatment Need** – Rearrest rates increased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 and decreased from FY 2009 to FY 2010. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, the reconviction rate decreased, and the reincarceration rate increased.
- **Sex Offender Treatment Need** – Rearrest rates increased between FY 2008 to FY 2010. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, reconviction and reincarceration rates both decreased.
- **Hanover JCC Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC)** – Rearrest rates increased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 and decreased from FY 2009 to FY 2010. Reconviction and reincarceration rates both increased between FY 2008 and FY 2009.
- **Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) Program** – Rearrest rates decreased between FY 2008 and FY 2010. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, reconviction rates decreased while reincarceration rates increased. The RSAT program only serves females in the JCCs (see pages 178-180 for the reoffense rates for female JCC Releases).
- **Halfway Houses** – Rearrest rates decreased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 and increased between FY 2009 and FY 2010. Reconviction and reincarceration rates both decreased between FY 2008 and FY 2009.
- **Post-Dispositional Detention (with programs)** – Rearrest rates increased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 and decreased from FY 2009 to FY 2010. Between FY 2008 and FY 2009, reconviction and reincarceration rates both increased. Although juveniles placed into post-dispositional programs were not in the JCCs, a “reincarceration” rate is reported to illustrate the rate of their return to a secure setting.

**Diverted Intakes (Not Included in the Table Above):**

- Of the 11,633 juveniles with a first-time diversion in FY 2010, 14.2% were rearrested within 12 months for a new offense. (Note: this is not comparable to *Data Resource Guides* prior to FY 2009 due to methodological changes).

## Appendix E LENGTH OF STAY (LOS) GUIDELINES

Two tables are used in determining a resident's length of stay.

- Table I assigns the level of severity for (a) the most serious current committing offense and (b) the most serious prior offense. The resulting two numbers are combined in a pattern (a)-(b) for further calculation.
- Table II accounts for chronic offense behavior that may increase the resident's initial length of stay calculation. The resident's entire delinquent and criminal histories, except the two offenses used as the most serious committing offense and the most serious prior offense, are examined; one point is assigned for each Class 1 misdemeanor, and two points are assigned for each felony.
  - A chronicity score of less than 8 points does not affect length of stay.
  - A chronicity score of 8 to 11 points increases length of stay by three months.
  - A chronicity score of 12 or more points increases length of stay by six months.

<b>§ 16.1-241</b>	<b>Jurisdiction of the J&amp;DR court</b> Specifies the types of cases, matters, and proceedings for which the J&DR court has subject matter jurisdiction.
<b>§ 16.1-246</b>	<b>When and how child may be taken into immediate custody</b> Explains when a child may be taken into immediate custody and outlines the acceptable offense classifications and scenarios.
<b>§ 16.1-247</b>	<b>Duties of person taking child into custody</b> Dictates the duties of an official taking a child into custody pursuant to Va. Code § 16.1-246.
<b>§ 16.1-248.1</b>	<b>Criteria for detention or shelter care</b> Specifies the procedures for placement in secure detention and shelter care, outlining the acceptable offense classifications and scenarios.

Provides procedures used for the certification or transfer of a juvenile (14 and older) for trial in circuit court.
- § 16.1-270 **Waiver of jurisdiction of juvenile court in certain cases**  
Establishes criteria used for juveniles 14 years of age or older to waive the jurisdiction of the juvenile court and have a case transferred to circuit court.
- § 16.1-272 **Power of circuit court over juvenile offender**  
Addresses the sentencing authority of the circuit court over juveniles who have been tried or convicted as adults.
- § 16.1-273 **Provision of social history and preparation of victim impact statements**  
Allows for the juvenile court to order the completion of social history reports and victim impact statements.
- § 16.1-277.1 **Time limitation for court hearings**  
Provides required time frames for conducting hearings for when a petition is filed, regardless of whether the juvenile is in detention.
- § 16.1-278.4 **Children in need of services (CHINS)**  
Provides the dispositional options for the supervision, care, and rehabilitation of a child found to be in need of services.
- § 16.1-278.5 **Children in need of supervision (CHINSup)**  
Provides dispositional options for supervision, care, and rehabilitation of a child found to be in need of supervision.
- § 16.1-278.8 **Delinquent juveniles**  
Specifies the dispositional options available to the J&DR or circuit courts if a juvenile is found to be delinquent (including commitment of a juvenile to DJJ). (See also Va. Code § 16.1-278.9).
- § 16.1-284.1 **Placement in secure local facility (Post-dispositional)**  
Addresses the criteria (age, offense history, commitment history, response to past treatment efforts, etc.) for post-dispositional placement in a secure detention facility.
- § 16.1-285 **Duration of commitments**  
Establishes the parameters for the indeterminate commitments of juveniles, including time.
- § 16.1-285.1 **Commitment of serious offenders**

Specifies the purpose and general goals for the VJCCCA.
- § 16.1-335 **Psychiatric Inpatient Treatment of Minors Act (Article 16 of title 16.1 of the Code of Virginia)**  
Voluntary or involuntary provision of mental health treatment of minors
- Title 18.2 **Crimes and Offenses Generally**  
Commonly referred to as the Criminal Code and designates crimes under Virginia law.

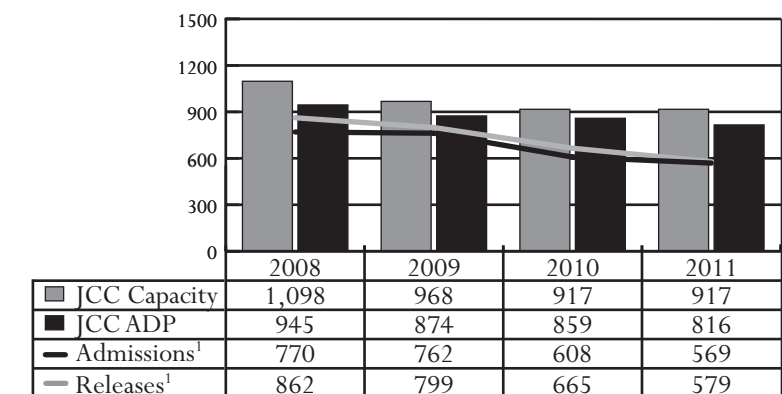
