



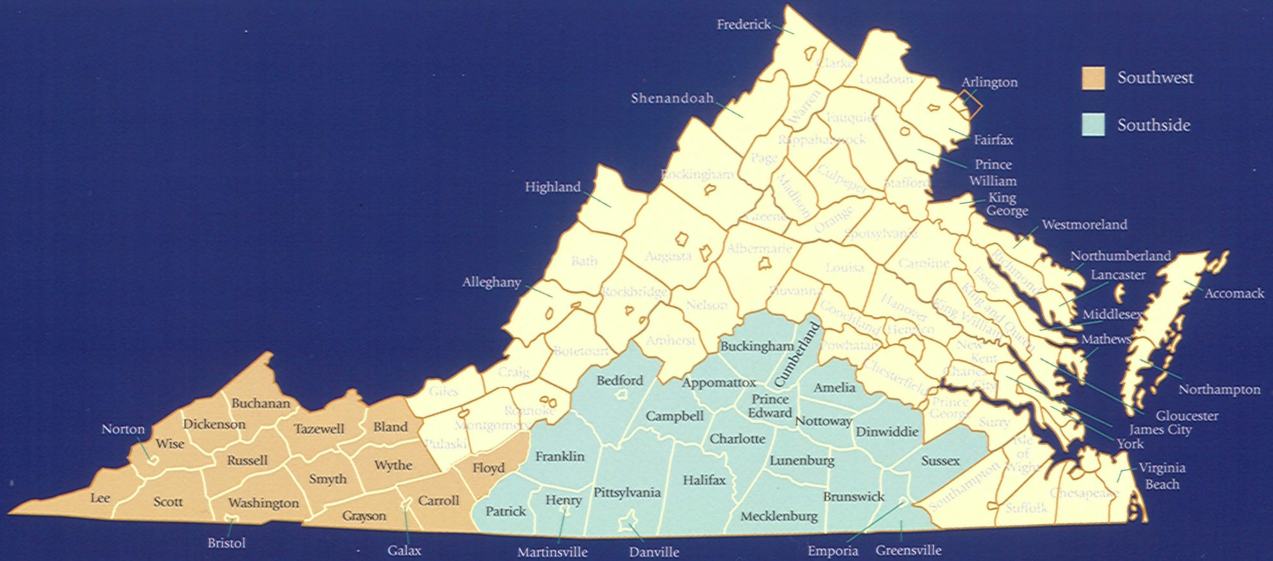

### VIRGINIA TOBACCO COMMISSION: Funding Revitalization and Innovation in the Tobacco Region

**TOBACCO FUNDS BOOST EDUCATION ACROSS A REGION**

As the recently released EAAC study of the Tobacco Commission notes, "One of the Commission's Education grant program initiatives for at least four decades, and recent declines in key industries have exacerbated these challenges. Importantly, low educational attainment continues to be a major economic obstacle in the tobacco region and has been identified as a key obstacle to revitalization." As the result of the Commission's vision, there was an immediate recognition that the region historically has always been a region of educational attainment, a cultural phenomenon directly related to long-standing regional industries that required only low-skill, low-wage workers. The Commission immediately partnered with the region's community colleges in 2009 to expand access to programs, facilities and financial aid. The creation of the Commission's Education grant program in 2009 has provided a venue to target funds to a wide array of projects that build a more robust regional educational pipeline from CDEP to community college to bachelor and graduate degrees. Today the Commission's investments in education continue to assist educational institutions and tobacco region residents to build personal pathways to higher education that enable students to gain higher wage, higher skilled employment with businesses that are also being recruited to the region. The first contingent to be on providing facilities and programs that previously did not exist in the region, providing financial aid

to encourage students to obtain degrees and certifications, meeting the workforce training needs of the region's employers, and creating a new cultural mindset in the region that prioritizes the value and importance of higher education not only to the individual but to the long term restructuring and success of the regional economy. "Partnering with educational institutions in our region was one of the first strategies we adopted as a Commission, and to this day it is one of the best and more important things we are doing for our residents with these funds. The programs and facilities that have grown out of these partnerships will benefit three students for decades to come!" says the Commission's Chairman, Delegate Terry G. Kilgore.

The Commission reached out to a statewide audience and beyond to promote economic development opportunities in the tobacco region through three advertising sections of 8-16 pages each that were purchased in Virginia Business magazine over the past year. In November 2010 an 8-page insert promoted six **research and development** centers that Commission grants have helped establish across the footprint, as well as the Commission's R&D grant program. In June 2011 a second 8-page insert highlighted six **broadband** grantees and their high-speed fiber networks that provide robust connectivity in more than 70 industrial and business parks in 27 localities across the entire tobacco region.

Most recently, a 16-page insert in November 2011 focused on the Commission's investments in **education** institutions, higher education and distance learning centers, scholarships, and programs/facilities that grant degrees and workforce training credentials. The insert noted that TIGR scholarships have now exceeded \$30 million and served more than 7,000 residents of the region. Virginia Business reaches more than 75,000 readers each month in corporate leadership roles in a wide array of business fields including manufacturing, finance, medical, real estate, communications, construction and transportation.

## Virginia Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Commission

December 1, 2011

To the Governor and Members of the General Assembly of Virginia:

The enclosed report documents the Commission's 12th year of economic development in the Commonwealth's most challenging economic region. Our long-term, twin objectives of tobacco quota holder indemnification and community revitalization remain both an accomplishment and a challenge. On behalf of the Commission, I am pleased to report both to you in this Annual Report.

Since the Commission was formed in 1999, tobacco growers and quota owners in Virginia have sustained cataclysmic and historic losses, totaling \$479 million. To date, the Commission, together with other sources, has redeemed 98% of that loss and is on course to reach 100% by 2012. This effort alone has made unparalleled improvements in the economy of Virginia's tobacco region.

Our efforts to revitalize tobacco communities have taken many forms, as you will see in the pages that follow. Among the many and diverse efforts of the Commission, access to education, affordable broadband, and jobs remain among our highest priorities. On behalf of the Commission, I am grateful for your continued support of these efforts and I look forward to promoting still greater prosperity in this area of the Commonwealth that we are privileged to serve.

# Fund Descriptions and Commission Priorities

## Mission and Fund Descriptions:

“The Commission is established for the purposes of determining the appropriate recipients of moneys in the Tobacco Indemnification and Community Revitalization Fund and causing distribution of such moneys for the purposes provided in this chapter, including using moneys in the Fund to (i) provide payments to tobacco farmers as compensation for the adverse economic effects resulting from loss of investment in specialized tobacco equipment and barns and lost tobacco production opportunities associated with a decline in quota and (ii) revitalize tobacco dependent communities.”

– Section 3.2-3101, Code of Virginia

### (i) Indemnification of Tobacco Farmers

The Commission compensates tobacco producers and quota owners for their losses due to the decline in tobacco quota from the 1995-98 average through 2002, the effective year of the federal tobacco quota buyout. For fiscal year 2011, the Commission made available over \$10 million for indemnification of these losses. From its inception through the end of fiscal year 2011, the Commission has made available nearly \$299 million in addition to the \$170 million from other sources for indemnifying losses, leaving a remaining obligation of \$10.3 million. Over 48,000 claims were processed in the fiscal year.

### (ii) Revitalization of Tobacco Dependent Communities

Over \$142 million was awarded for economic revitalization in the tobacco-growing region in fiscal year 2011. Revitalization is accomplished through nine grant programs that make awards to local governments, government entities, and non-profit organizations. The Commission prioritizes projects that maximize leveraging from applicants and other partner organizations, and gives preference to projects that have regional participation and generate the most significant outcomes for the residents, businesses and localities in the tobacco region.

## Agribusiness:

Awarded to assist the tobacco region’s agricultural community in diversifying into new production opportunities and developing value-added enterprises.

## Education:

Awarded for various projects that will create a world-class workforce in the tobacco region, including scholarships, community college programs, workforce training and vocational and adult education programs.

## Megasite:

Grants for site development of large scale industrial properties that are intended to attract significant economic development employers and facilities such as automotive assembly.

## Research and Development:

Grants to encourage collaboration between private investors, tobacco region localities and/or Virginia’s educational institutions to conduct research and development that will lead to commercialization in the region in areas such as Energy, Biomedical and Health Care, Information Technology, Chemical and Materials, and Environmental.

## Reserve:

Two-year program, ended in 2011, to provide the commitment of required matching funds needed to attract non-Commission project funding, including federal ARRA stimulus funds, for new construction projects in broadband deployment, sustainable energy production, workforce training facilities, and utility/site development for business parks.

## Southside and Southwest Economic Development:

Grants to develop industrial sites and business/technology parks, improve water, sewer, broadband and other utility infrastructure that serves employment centers, and develop tourism infrastructure.

## Special Projects:

Awards for projects that benefit several localities within a region or have the potential to have a significant impact on the economy of the tobacco region as a whole such as research facilities and regional business development that impact multiple localities.

## Tobacco Region Opportunity Fund (TROF):

Provides performance-based grants to localities in Virginia’s tobacco producing regions to assist in the creation of new jobs and investments, whether through new business attraction or existing business expansion, and based on the following criteria: local unemployment rates, prevailing wage rates, number of new jobs, capital investment levels, industry type and the possibility of related economic multiplier effect.





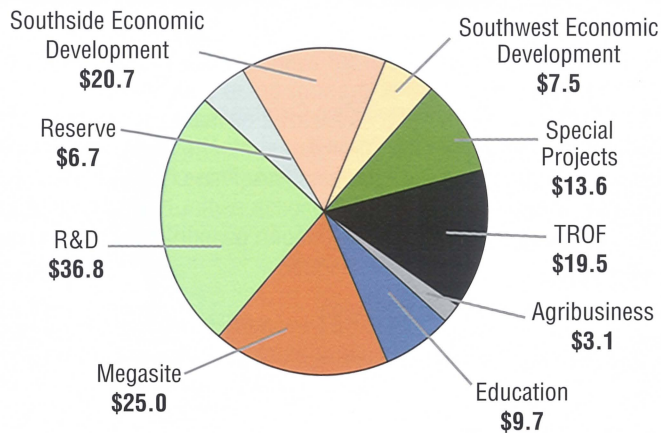
