To: The Honorable Terence R. McAuliffe and Members, Virginia General Assembly

As Chair of the Substance Abuse Services Council, I am pleased to provide the council's recommendation concerning the legalization of medical marijuana in Virginia. As you are aware, §2.2-2696 of the *Code of Virginia* charges the council with recommending policies about substance abuse and closely related issues within the Commonwealth. The membership of the council includes senators, delegates, representatives of state agencies, and representatives of provider and advocacy organizations appointed by the Governor. Their role is to advise the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Board of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services about policy issues and to make recommendations to them for implementation or further study.

The council's major focus in 2014 was the study of issues related to marijuana, particularly medical marijuana. Based on the preliminary information reviewed, *the council recommends that the Governor direct the Substance Abuse Services Council to continue its indepth study of medical marijuana and of legalization or decriminalization of marijuana and of the social, public safety, legal, economic, and other effects on the Commonwealth and its residents, and to prepare a report of their findings and recommendations by December 1,* 2015.

The Substance Abuse Services Council's 2014 Annual Report (http://leg2.state.va.us/dls/h&sdocs.nsf/By+Year/RD52015/\$file/RD5.pdf) details the council's activities during the past year. Council members reviewed and discussed the currently available research on cannabis (marijuana), the medical components and therapeutic uses of marijuana, the health and legal aspects of its medical use, the public health impact of legalizing medical marijuana, other states' experience with legalization, and the impact of legalization on Virginia's communities and on the Commonwealth's prevention and treatment services system. To inform their discussion, council members heard detailed presentations by speakers providing the medical background and effects of marijuana as well as potential concerns for use, and also from presenters speaking in favor of medical marijuana.
