Report to the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees of the Virginia General Assembly on Community-Based Sickle Cell Programs

September 26, 2016

What is Sickle Cell Disease?

Sickle Cell Disease is an inherited blood disorder where normal round shaped red blood cells change from their normal round shape to a "quarter-moon" or sickle-like shape. This disease is produced when the sickle cell gene is transmitted by both parents to a child. Sickled shaped cells cannot squeeze through small blood vessels so they often jam up, blocking the flow of blood and oxygen to body parts and causing extreme pain. A pain crisis can last for days or even weeks and may occur several times a year. Lack of oxygen flow can also damage muscles, bones and internal organs and lead to strokes and other serious medical problems.

Nationally, approximately 1 in 500 African American children is born with a serious Sickle Cell disorder, making it the most common long term illness identified in this population. However, in Virginia, approximately 1 in 325 African Americans suffer with Sickle Cell Disease, far higher than the national average. Up to 100,000 people in the USA suffer with Sickle Cell Disease of which around 4,000 are in Virginia. Over 2,000,000 people in the USA have Sickle Cell Trait and approximately 155,000 are in Virginia.

<u>DALLAS</u>, <u>Sept. 27, 2006 /PRNewswire</u>/ -- "Sickle Cell Disease is one of the most prevalent and costly genetic disorders in the U.S. Today, one in every 4,000 Americans is born with a form of SCD and many experience chronic anemia, stroke, spleen and kidney dysfunction, pain crises, and susceptibility to bacterial infections. Moreover, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) estimates that almost one-third of adults with SCD develop pulmonary hypertension, a life-threatening condition resulting in a 10-fold greater risk of death."

"Due to this high disease burden, the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America (SCDAA) reports that Sickle Cell Disease in which abnormal hemoglobin causes red blood cells to become stiff, sickle- shaped and unable to flow easily through blood vessels -- <u>results in an estimated</u> 750,000 hospitalizations a year. The cost of these hospitalizations is estimated at \$475 million annually."

Background

The Commissioner of Health has the responsibility for sickle cell screening under the Code of Virginia. Screening of all newborns for sickle cell disease began in Virginia during July of 1989. At the beginning of the program, centers for comprehensive follow-up care were not available. In 1994, Virginia began providing statewide comprehensive sickle cell services to decrease the morbidity and mortality among children.

The June 30, 2011 report to the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees of the Virginia General Assembly on Community-Based Sickle Cell Programs submitted by the Virginia Department of Health made the following statements. "The provision of comprehensive care is a time-intensive endeavor that includes ongoing patient and family education, periodic comprehensive evaluations and other disease-specific health maintenance services, psychosocial care, genetic counseling, and transition services. However, research demonstrates that the medical management model alone cannot address the multiple social, psychological, and educational needs of individuals living with chronic illnesses such as sickle cell disease."

Community-based programs provide resources to support the development of coping strategies and support for families impacted by sickle cell disease by addressing unmet social, psychosocial and educational needs. Statewide Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia, Inc. (SSCCV), also known as Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia or Statewide, a non-profit 501(c)(3) tax-exempt community-based organization, has a network of nine (9) community-based sickle cell disease organizations (chapters) that provide a variety of services across the Commonwealth. The chapters are located in Danville, Fredericksburg, Hampton, Lynchburg, Norfolk, Richmond, Rocky Mount, South Boston and Northern Virginia. Most of the chapters in this network have operated since 1972.

There are four comprehensive sickle cell centers under contract for services in the state. The centers are Children's Hospital of the King's Daughters in Norfolk, Virginia Commonwealth University Health System in Richmond, University of Virginia in Charlottesville and D. C. Children's Medical Center in Washington, D.C. which replaced INOVA Hospital in Fairfax, Virginia. It should be noted that only Virginia Commonwealth University Health System provides clinical care for adult clients.

It is estimated that the State of Virginia has about 4,000 sickle cell clients/patients. The centers care for around 1,200 of them. The centers provide care and services to patients of the centers, but generally, do not provide services to non-patients of their hospitals. That means that the centers are only serving around 30% of the Sickle Cell population. This demonstrates the very need for a network of community-based programs to serve the 70% of clients who still need services.

Those of us involved in community programs define community-based sickle cell programs as ones that work to assist any client needing services who is in the care of a private physician or any client receiving services from sickle cell centers who needs or wants additional service.

General Assembly Background

According to figures from the Virginia Department of Health, between 1995 and 2007 the number of sickle cell patients needing services increased by 136%. The 2007 General Assembly increased funding to \$450,000 a year for medical (hospital) management services for individuals living with sickle cell disease and a yearly allocation of \$100,000 funds was approved for grants to community-based programs. The purpose of the community-based allocation was to provide education and assist individuals and families living with sickle cell disease to develop necessary skills and resources to improve their health status, family functioning, and self-sufficiency.

Funding Level

Starting in FY08, annual budget appropriations were as follows:

- FY08 \$100,000 for three of our eight chapters
- FY09 \$95,000 for three of our eight chapters
- FY10 \$81,000 for three of our eight chapters
- FY11 \$90,000 for five of our eight chapters
- FY12 \$90,000 for five of our eight chapters
- FY13 \$88,200 for five of our eight chapters
- FY14 \$105,000 for six of our nine chapters
- FY15 \$105,000 for six of our nine chapters
- FY16 \$105,000 for six of our nine chapters

Item 288Q of the 2010 Appropriation Act required the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) to develop criteria for distributing these funds, including specific goals and outcome measures and to submit an annual report detailing program outcomes to the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committees of the Virginia General Assembly.

Item 288Q of the 2011 Appropriation Act required the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) to allocate the appropriation for community-based sickle cell programs by contract to Statewide Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia. This funding is to be used for grants to community-based programs that provide services for individuals suffering from sickle cell disease. "Statewide" developed criteria for distributing these funds including specific goals and outcome measures.

During FY12 and FY13, Statewide Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia issued Proposals for community-based Sickle Cell Support Services and awarded five contracts to member chapters.

During F14, FY15 and FY16, Statewide Sickle Cell Chapters of Virginia issued Proposals for community-based Sickle Cell Support Services and awarded six contracts to member chapters.

All chapters receiving grant awards have previously been required to conduct a "Survey of Needs" with as many of their registered clients as possible. Several years of surveys have been conducted. The surveys have enabled chapters to determine what services are needed, by whom and how best the services can be delivered to clients.

All chapters provide sickle cell education in the community through participation in health fairs or forums, church activities and various civic or health related events. Many of the community-based program activities provide a focus on mental and social well-being. Stress-reducing activities have a positive effect on physical well-being. During the course of the grant year, chapters try to provide whatever services they have available. These services vary from chapter to chapter based in part on funds and man-power available. Some of the services include support group meetings, calls to check on clients, visitations, sending "Birthday" and "Thinking of You" cards, information or referral assistance, assistance with obtaining disability benefits, employment and vocational rehabilitation.

Community-Based Sickle Cell Program Activities as of June 30, 2016

The six aforementioned organizations were awarded funding to begin community-based services on July 1, 2015. The following information provides a summary of the community-based activities performed as of June 30, 2016. Monthly activity and financial reports are submitted by each chapter to the "Statewide Grant Administrator" for review and approval and submitted to the Virginia Department of Health by the 15th of each month.

Northern VA

The Heart of Gold Sickle Cell Foundation of Northern Virginia is our newest organization. While the area has a sizable population of Sickle Cell Clients, HIPPA laws prevent the area hospitals and doctors from supplying their information. The chapter must rely on referrals. Some of their activities numbers are low, however, their involvement in health actives has been high as demonstrated in the narrative below.

July - Donation (non-grant funds) made to Children's National Medical Center's "Brainy Camp" to support camper suffering from SCD. Information distributed at Health Fair sponsored by First Mount Zion Baptist Church, Dumfries, Virginia. Information distributed on Facebook and Chapter webpage. Information distributed at Inova Alexandria Hospital re: Adult Sickle Cell Clinic in Northern Virginia.

August - Information distributed on Facebook and Chapter webpage. Letters sent to 20 churches in Northern Virginia including brochure and business card discussing Sickle Cell Awareness Month, upcoming Stomp Out Sickle Cell Walk and the importance of blood donations. Norfolk

July - Held the Young Adults Meet and Greet Pool Party. Identified a new client and followed up to complete intake information.

August - Held the Annual Sickle Cell Family Fun Day Camp and Back to School event on August 17 at EW Young Campsite. The activities included volunteer coordinated fishing clinic, arts and crafts, nature scavenger hunt, outdoor recreation games of basketball, bowling and indoor swimming. Twenty-five students received school supplies in a backpack and other students from Middle through College received school supplies. A \$1,200 scholarship was awarded to a volunteer participant who is attending college.

September - Clients held the first benefit to help families with emergency financial needs with a Las Vegas style Casino Night. Sickle Cell families kicked off the Annual Walk for Sickle Cell on September 19, 2015 alongside the Walk Grand Marshall. Clients received information about the SCDAA Conference and will be informed of advocacy events on issues that affect Sickle Cell Disease.

October - Held a webinar on Nutrition for Sickle Cell patients in the office and invited clients and their families. Twelve families participated and other families will be mailed and emailed a copy of the cookbook when the copies are received. Hosted an "Unveiling Sickle Cell Services" forum for 75 community leaders, churches, clients and volunteers to present the services offered by the Association.

November - Invited Sickle cell families and volunteers to 43rd Birthday celebration of the Agency on November 13, 2015. Distributed 13 Thanksgiving food baskets to sickle cell families (7 were given on the Virginia Eastern Shore). Sent 93 brochures on Agency services along with "Thinking of You" Thanksgiving cards.

December - Held Sickle Cell families "Lunch with Santa" event on December 12, 2015 where 25 families participated and all children received toys. Sickle Cell adult clients and volunteers participated in "Holiday Ugly Sweater Party" on December 20, 2015. Participants were given a copy of the cookbook Eating Well with Sickle Cell - High Energy Nutrition Recipes, published by Nemours a national project of Synerge. Christmas food baskets were given to 10 sickle cell families by the Hiram Grand Masonic Lodge and 32 children were given Toys for Tots gifts from Salvation Army, Samaritan House and YWCA, Volunteers collected and wrapped gifts for children at CHKD clinic.

January - Presented at the Annual Martin Luther King Service held at First Baptist Bute Street, Norfolk that has 200 churches who are members of the Metro Baptist Ministers Conference. Blood drive was postponed because of the snow storm.

February - Invited clients to participate in a webinar on Managing Pain in Sickle Cell Patients provided by Karen Proudford Foundation in Baltimore Maryland. Notes from the webinar on pain management was emailed to 68 clients on the email list and copies to be mailed to the clients on mail list.

March - Clients were invited to attend Advocacy training. They were educated on Get Connected Sickle Cell Disease a national patient registry that is patient driven and connects them with current research, treatments and events across the country.

April - Clients were informed of the Advocacy initiative passed in Maryland on Services for Adults with Sickle Cell Disease- Infusion Center - Study. The efficacy of Infusion Centers to treat pain is being researched in the Hampton Roads area. It is proposed that Infusion Centers

would be a cost effective treatment for pain, offer genetic counseling and provide outreach regarding support services needed by the patients.

May - Clients were contacted regarding the National Sickle Cell Advocacy Day scheduled for June 9, 2016 in Washington, DC. Clients updated intake forms are being conducted to help clients get connected with a health care home and resources.

June - Released information about Opiods and is scheduling a roundtable discussion with the Pharmacist to openly talk about the safe use of opiods in sickle cell patients.
