

# Boards of Visitors Orientation Report

2016



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## **Overview**

Section 23.1-1304 of the Code of Virginia states that the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia "shall develop, in consultation with public institutions of higher education and members of their governing boards, and annually deliver educational programs for the governing boards of such institutions" and "submit to the General Assembly and the Governor an annual executive summary of the interim activity and work of the Council pursuant to this section no later than the first day of each regular session of the General Assembly." A 2013 amendment to the Code of Virginia stated that new board members "shall participate in an orientation session at least once during their first two y ears of members." In 2015, the Code language was amended to provide a process whereby members who do not participate could be removed.

In accordance with this requirement, SCHEV staff held a mandatory orientation session for newly appointed board members on October 18-19, 2016. A copy of the agenda summarizing the topics covered in these meetings is attached.

#### **Planning Group**

In order to comply with the mandate to develop the orientation "in consultation with public institutions of higher education and members of their governing boards," SCHEV created a planning committee that included two current and one retired college president, two Council members, and three college representatives. Representatives from the Secretary of Education, the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Virginia Commission on Higher Education Board Appointments, and the Office of the Attorney General also participated in the planning sessions.

#### **Survey Results**
