Dear Senator Norment, Senator Hanger, Delegate Jones and Mister Secretary,

Chapter 2, Item 388 D of the 2018 Virginia Acts of Assembly states that "The Board of Corrections shall include within its reporting formats on the capacity of each local and regional jail, a measure of the actual jail capacity, which shall include double-bunking, with exceptions as

appropriate, in the judgement of the Board, for isolation, segregation, or medical cells, or similar units which would not normally be double-bunked. Exceptions to this measure of capacity may also be made for jails which were constructed prior to 1980. A report including the doublebunked capacity, as well as the standard Board of Corrections measure of rated capacity, for each jail shall be presented to the Secretary of Public Safety and the Chairmen of the Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committees by October 1 of each year.

The Survey on Actual Capacity of the Local and Regional Jails in Virginia is attached. The information in this report was gathered directly from local and regional jails in an effort to help the Legislature analyze correctional services in the Commonwealth. We recognize and support the Legislature's continuing effort in this area. The survey documents that there are more permanent beds than there are offenders in the system. From July1, 2017 through June 30, 2018, the average daily population was 28,648 inmates. Local facilities had just over 36,000 beds available to house these offenders, and additionally over 2,300 beds available on a temporary basis. Of the 28,648 inmates, 5,069 were state-responsible inmates waiting to be transferred to the Department of Corrections. Of this number, approximately 2,947 were 61 days past their sentencing date.

Although it may appear that that the data conclusively establishes that we have sufficient and appropriate bed space in Virginia, this analysis would be over-simplified, and we in fact do not have sufficient data to justify such a conclusion. Bed space or capacity cannot be analyzed globally as it must be assessed within each individual facility in order to get an accurate picture of the health of our correctional system. For example, extra minimum-security bed space in Loudoun County does not help the Superintendent in Hampton Roads who needs a bunk for an offender with severe psychiatric disorders. Moreover, this data does not answer the question: What is the maximum population level for each facility in order for it to remain safe and secure for the public, the staff and the offender? The answer to this core question simply cannot be determined since no one has ever analyzed each of Virginia's 72 local facilities for a capacity rating focused on this most central issue.

We do have a "design capacity" for each facility. The "design capacity" is the number assigned to the facility by the A/E when it was first constructed. It does not take into account changes in the number of beds or bunks in cells, changes in staffing supervision systems, improvements in technology or best practices, the quality of leadership or the history of the facility. In Virginia, nearly all of our facilities have been functioning for years at a much higher level than the "design capacity" without serious safety problems. In short, the term "design capacity" has been rendered almost meaningless in the field as a factor in determining the number of offenders who can safely occupy a jail.

It is perhaps tempting to take the number of beds in each facility as the marker for the amount of offenders that it can safely and Constitutionally hold as this would be the capacity figure of record. Unfortunately, it is not that simple. While some administrators have increased the number of beds in their facilities to a level beyond the "design capacity," they have done so to provide flexibility in managing their specific needs along with the fluctuating offender populations, not so they could fill each bunk every day. Indeed, local facilities do not have sufficient staffing to safely fill each bunk and they are fully aware of it. For example, a medium-security cell might be safe with two men in it, or it might not, depending on the men, the cell block, and the available supervision. The manner in which that cell is filled is a serious decision

and not one that lends itself to an Excel spreadsheet. Whatever our analysis, it must be insured that local officials have the leeway to make critical safety determinations.

One final point regarding the limitations of the data. We all hope that offenders who are granted leave of the correctional system do indeed "graduate" and do not return. Successful re-entry is our common goal. But this seems to raise an additional challenge: when the local facilities are filled beyond capacity, they cannot afford to provide the kind of re-entry services or programmatic help that is needed to decrease the chances of recidivism. We feel confident that you share this concern.
