# 100 Homes Vets



#### The Parkers

The initiative kicked-off on November 14 at the home of Chesterfield County Naval veteran Mr. Parker. EnergyShare's longtime partner, project:HOMES, performed weatherization services including sealing air leaks in the ductwork and window, and adding insulation in the attic and walls to make the home more comfortable. Safety measures such as new outlets, CO2 and smoke detectors were also installed. In addition to the energy efficiency upgrades, skilled Dominion Energy volunteers repaired the Parkers' storm door, put a new roof on their shed, and sanded and stained their deck.

#### The Burnos

Mr. Danny Burno, a 6-year Navy veteran, and his wife Melissa were using kerosene heaters to warm their home last winter. Their financial troubles started in December 2015 when Mr. Burno suffered a stroke that left him paralyzed on the left side of his body and unable to work. Their gas heater wasn't working properly, causing their gas bill to become unmanageable. Eventually they fell behind on their payments and their service was disconnected. Desperate for assistance, the Burnos reached out to the community and learned about EnergyShare. EnergyShare was able to cover the balance of their electric and gas bill and have their services restored. The gas furnace had to be replaced, so in partnership with the Department of Housing and Community Development and the Virginia Beach-based community action agency, STOP, Inc., the Burnos were able to get a new gas heating unit, a water heater, and insulation for their attic. "It's humbling at times," said Mr. Burno.





#### Steven Pagach

Mr. Steven Pagach, World War II veteran, was referred to the EnergyShare program by the executive director of Operation Renewed Hope Foundation, Col. Deborah Snyder. EnergyShare partnered with Community Housing Partners (CHP) to provide LED lighting, a low flow shower head, pipe wrap for the water heater, an AC system tune-up, duct seals, and smoke and carbon dioxide detectors, as well as repairs to his junction box cover and dryer vent. Along with several energy efficiency upgrades, Dominion Energy volunteers also completed yard work around Mr. Pagach's home.



#### 100 Homes 100 Vets

Dominion Energy partnered with the Department of Veterans Services on the 100 Homes 100 Vets initiative. The company has committed to provide free energy efficiency upgrades for at least 100 qualifying veteran's homes. Veterans will also learn how to better manage their energy use to save money on their energy bills. Through our volunteer program, projects may also include additional home repairs to improve the safety and comfort of the residence.

We are reaching out to identify eligible veterans and their spouses in several ways, including community outreach and education events and our call-in segments at local news stations. EnergyShare administered assistance to over

#### How does it work?

EnergyShare provides three forms of assistance:



#### Bill Payment

Helps with any type of heating/cooling source (wood, oil, natural gas, propane, kerosene, electric) for qualifying individuals, veterans and persons living with disabilities.



#### Weatherization

To help save on energy costs, Dominion Energy offers free energy audits and energy efficiency upgrades. Free weatherization is open to renters and homeowners. Approved Dominion Energy customers who have previously received bill assistance are automatically eligible to receive a free energy assessment and installation of energy efficiency upgrades. Measures may include: EnergyStar® qualified LED light bulbs, efficient showerhead(s) and faucet aerators, wrap insulation for water heater and hot water pipes, attic and floor insulation, and air/duct sealing, furnace fan motor, heat pump and A/C tune—up and refrigerator replacement to EnergyStar® level.



#### **Education/Outreach**

Partnering with the community to help residents understand energy use and providing low or no cost tips to make simple, cost-effective changes.

#### **Background**

Dominion Energy provides clean, safe, and reliable energy to our customers, and we are committed to strengthening the communities where we do business. Through its EnergyShare program, the company provides assistance to customers in times of need to bridge a financial gap by helping them cover their energy costs and offering free energy efficiency upgrades. These upgrades provide permanent energy bill savings through energy conservation. EnergyShare has helped nearly 827,600 qualified individuals and families in the communities we serve through its year-round energy assistance program since 1982. Following a significant program expansion in 2015, Dominion Energy engaged the help of key stakeholders to develop the future of the program. The commitment was further strengthened in 2018 by the Grid Transformation and Security Act (GTSA), which increased funding to \$130 million through 2028, helping even more individuals and their families experiencing financial crises pay for the cost of heating and cooling their homes.

#### Since the 2015 expansion:

- 4,500 veterans and 4,300 individuals living with disabilities have received bill assistance
- More than 9,800 single- and multi-family homes have been made more efficient, and
- Dominion Energy representatives and volunteers have participated in more than **1,400** outreach events educating more than **606,000** people.

The company has a long history of working with the communities we serve. The service we provide is essential to the health and well-being of our customers, especially those more vulnerable residents, like the elderly or those living with disabilities.





#### **Engaging Our Partners**

For more than 37 years, Dominion Energy has hosted agency workshops with our health and human service partner agencies throughout Virginia. The company engaged with nearly 100 partner agencies providing a forum to share updates on the status of the program as well as best practices on an annual basis. Dominion Energy also holds meetings with our Customer Advisory Board, Weatherization Advisory Committee and other industry advocates to listen to our stakeholders and have an open dialogue to continue to improve the program.

Another example of how Dominion Energy is engaging our partners is through our work with an EnergyShare intake agency, STEPS, Inc., in the expansion of our EnergyShare program in Buckingham County. To help alleviate transportation barriers and create additional awareness about the program, EnergyShare and STEPS, Inc. are working with Ellis Acres Park, a local non-profit, to accept applications for energy assistance twice monthly at their location and others throughout the county.

## **Expanding Support for Veterans and Individuals living with Disabilities**

As a result of the GTSA of 2018 and our unique public-private partnership with the Department of Veterans Services and the Centers for Independent Living, support significantly increased for veterans and individuals living with disabilities to \$800,000 annually. The additional resources allow the EnergyShare program to help those who need it the most without them having to work through multiple state agencies.

Here are some examples of how our customers are benefiting from these resources:

#### Mrs. V

Mrs. V is a single mom with 3-year-old twin girls and a 5-year-old son who has a disability. She was recently laid off from her job. Resources for Independent Living is helping her with community resources for food, household items and job training. She was "overjoyed" when her case manager connected her to EnergyShare. Not having to worry about paying the electric bill enables her to use more of her resources to care for her three children. The support from EnergyShare has resulted in one less thing to worry about as she focuses on her family and her future goals.

#### Ms. T

Ms. T's electric bills have been consistently high as a result of many needed home repairs. Living with multiple illnesses, a disabled adult child and a small income from Social Security, she is facing a difficult financial situation. Through the EnergyShare program, Ms. T was able to receive energy efficiency upgrades to her home and have her entire electric account balance cleared through a once-in-a-lifetime funding available to those experiencing extraordinary financial challenges. With the much-needed help and home repairs, Ms. T can finally say, "she's back on her feet, grateful for the help, and on her way to recovery."
