REFERENCE: 2020 Catalog of State and Federal Mandates on Local Governments

Pursuant to Sections 2.2-613 and 15.2-2903 of the Code of Virginia and Paragraph B(1)(g) of Executive Order 58 (2007), I am hereby submitting to your office the following completed assessments of local government mandates administered by State executive agencies. These assessments have been approved by the appropriate cabinet secretaries during the first half of FY2021.

The Commission on Local Government (CLG) maintains and updates a catalog of state and federal mandates on local governments pursuant to § 15.2-2903 Code of Virginia. The CLG facilitates the assessment of mandates and the process is governed by Executive Order 58 (Kaine). The Commission adopts a schedule at their March meeting for the upcoming fiscal year that usually includes about 10-15 mandates. The schedule is created using feedback from all executive agencies that administer the mandates. The agencies conduct the assessments according to the schedule and use a standardized assessment form adopted by the Commission. The assessments are submitted to the appropriate Cabinet Secretary for endorsement or amendment before being routed back to the Commission. The agencies based on their assessment can recommend to alter, eliminate, or keep the mandate.

The Commission pursuant to Executive Order 58 (Kaine) submits a copy of all completed assessments along with a transmittal letter to the Secretary of Commerce and Trade, the Governor, the Clerks of the House and Senate, and forwards along copies to the Virginia Municipal League and the Virginia Association of Counties. The Commission sends a transmittal letter after the first and second half of the fiscal year. This year, all of the agencies opted to conduct their assessments during the first half of the fiscal year.

Section 15.2-2903(6) directs the Commission on Local Government to bring to your attention those assessments that carry recommendations from the administering agency for altering or eliminating the mandate in question. However, these assessments carry no such recommendations.

Description of Essentiality to the Public Safety: Enrollment by localities has allowed the Department to maintain and publish a list of participating localities on its website and in its annual hunting laws digest. This provides a service to hunters and allows local citizens to be aware of when and where hunting is occurring in their area.

G. Alternative Approaches to Achieving Purpose of Mandate:

Identification of Alternative Approaches: Rather than offer localities the option of
enrolling in Urban Archery season, the Department could establish a statewide season
(of the same dates) and localities could restrict participation by default using weapons
ordinances, as they can do now with respect to other deer hunting seasons.

2. Fiscal Impact of Alternative Approaches:

- a) Estimated Change in Range of Costs to Localities of Alternative Approaches: Localities that do not wish to participate in Urban Archery, but that do not already have ordinances prohibiting archery hunting, would need to enact ordinances prohibiting archery hunting during certain periods if the season were statewide. It is unknown how many localities fall into either of these categories, so costs are unknown. A likely cost to localities would be additional staff time fielding inquiries from the public.
- b) Estimated Change in Range of Costs to State of Alternative Approaches: No true change in costs (or at least cost savings) would be anticipated from any alternative approach. On one hand, costs to the state could be reduced with less staff time obtaining and publishing local urban archery hunting restrictions on the website and in the game laws digest. On the other hand, this cost is minimal, and without enrollments, it may actually increase staff time in some instances trying to determine which localities are not participating.
- c)Explanation of Estimation Methodologies: No actual cost estimates were derived.

H. Agency Recommendation:

- 1. Determination by Agency: Retain
- 2. Justification: Given that the mandates associated with the Urban Archery season are the result of voluntary enrollment where localities choose to participate (and not mandatory), and that costs are extremely minimal and are only associated with a small amount of staff time to administer, the Department feels that the benefits to keeping SNR.DGIF010 far outweigh any negatives. It provides localities the ability, if they choose, to have another tool available for their citizens to control deer numbers within their jurisdictional boundaries to help reduce damage that deer can cause in the form of vehicle accidents, crop/plant damage, and habitat degradation over time.

- A. Short Title of Mandate: Virginia Growth and Opportunity Act and Fund
- B. Specific Provisions of Mandate: Local governments that choose to apply for GO Virginia grants are required to meet the match requirements of the Virginia Growth and Opportunity Board. GO Virginia is designed to encourage and reward regional collaboration around efforts to spur high-wage job growth in regionally-selected traded sector industry clusters while expanding and diversifying regional economies. GO Virginia was founded on the principles of regional collaboration. The program incentivizes that collaboration and encourages state and local investments to support shared, strategic goals on projects with significant regional impact. State code requires that the designated regional councils have a Growth and Diversification Plan and every two years must update the plan in order to keep receiving grants (§ 2.2-2489 Code of Virginia). However this is a requirement of the councils but not the local governments.

Any grant awarded from the Fund to a regional council must require matching funds at least equal to the grant, but the Go Virginia Board has the authority to reduce the match requirement to no less than half of the grant upon a finding by the Board of fiscal distress or an exceptional economic opportunity in a region. The matching funds may

be from local, regional, federal, or private funds.

- Extension of Federal Mandates by State Authority: This mandate does not have any federal statute governing the program.
- D. Method by Which Agency Oversees Implementation of Mandate: The agency oversees the Growth and Opportunity (Go Virginia) program and Board. The Board adopts guidelines for grants made to regional councils and programmatic staff oversees the grant making process. Appropriations for the Virginia Growth and Opportunity Fund are included in the budget for the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). The fund, as created in §2.2-2487, has three grant categories; (1) capacity building funds to assist regional councils in building regional capacity for job creation and program implementation (capacity building grants); (2) per capita project grants allocated to each region on a per capita basis for projects of regional significance (per capita grants); and (3) competitive grants awarded for projects of statewide economic impact and interregional collaborations (competitive grants).

E. Fiscal Impact of Mandate on Localities:

 Localities Affected: All local governments are part of a Go Virginia region, therefore this mandate to any locality in the Commonwealth that chooses to apply for GO Virginia grants to meet program matching requirements.

2. Funding of Mandate:

Funding Formula: Per § 2.2-2489 Code of Virginia, the board a) establishes guidelines, procedures and objective criteria for the award and distribution of grants to regional councils. In order to qualify to receive grants, a regional council shall develop an economic growth and diversification plan. The Board can only consider those regional activities endorsed by a regional council in its application for grants. Any grant awarded from the Fund to a regional council shall require matching funds at least equal to the grant, provided, however, that the Board shall have the authority to reduce the match requirement to no less than half of the grant upon a finding by the Board of fiscal distress or an exceptional economic opportunity in a region. Such matching funds may be from local, regional, federal, or private funds. Matching funds may also be from grants awarded to a locality by the Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission but shall not include any other state general or nongeneral funds, from whatever source.

Specifically, GO Virginia Per Capita and Competitive grants must be matched \$1:1 by non-state resources such as federal, private, non-profit, and local entities. Those matching funds should include a local government contribution of no less than 20% of the required \$1:1 match. Application budgets should reflect adequate funding through committed match and the requested funds to cover the full cost of the proposed project.

Since program inception, more than 100 public entities, including 85 localities, have chosen to contribute \$11.8 million in qualifying local match to GO Virginia projects.

Currently the match requirements have been changed by the Board to not require local government match and only 2:1 match to assist with the pandemic related economic recovery efforts.

b) Funding of Mandate: Matching funds include a local contribution of no less than 20% of the required \$1:1 match. Funds must be derived from local governments or other entities in order to receive grants from the state. These match requirements have been relaxed in response to pandemic response efforts.

F. Effectiveness of Mandate in Accomplishing Purpose:

- General Purpose of Mandate: The purpose of the Growth and Opportunity Act is
 regional collaboration to attract and retain high wages jobs in target sectors. The
 local match for certain grants is to ensure there is local and regional participation
 in attracting and retaining high wage jobs in traded sectors in each Go Virginia
 region. The match also ensures there is local and regional buy in on the project.
- 2. Description of Essentiality to the Public: Overall, the Growth and Opportunity Act has increased collaboration amongst local governments in the Commonwealth. GO Virginia is designed to encourage and reward regional collaboration around efforts to spur high-wage job growth in regionally-selected traded sector industry clusters while expanding and diversifying regional economies. Between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2019, GO Virginia provided \$20.8 million in funding for 60 diverse and distinctive projects. These included 36 project implementation grants (34 utilizing regional per capita funds and 2 using statewide competitive funds) and 24 projects designed to enhance regional capacity. These project awards have leveraged more than \$33 million in additional funding from public and private sources.

Since program inception, more than 100 public entities, including 85 localities, have contributed \$11.8 million in qualifying local match to GO Virginia projects. In addition, GO Virginia funds have helped to form or strengthen four Regional Industrial Facility Authorities (RIFAs), a best practice in regional collaboration and one which sets the stage for cost and revenue sharing around site development projects of regional significance.

Funded projects have committed to support the creation of more than 10,000 high-paying jobs in one or more of their region's priority industry clusters.

G. Alternative Approaches to Achieving Purpose of Mandate:

Identification of Alternative Approaches: In Spring 2020, workgroups were facilitated by Go Virginia staff. The Workgroup provided some recommendations for the Go Virginia Board to consider regarding the local match requirements.

The workgroup recommended the Board reconsider its position on the guidance regarding Local Match to require local governments to provide a proportioned 20% of total required match (rather than 20% or \$50,000, whichever is greater). The group requested that the Board revise the local match policy to require that 20% of the total match required be contributed by local governments and eliminate the \$50,000 minimum. The Board acted on this recommendation.

Similar to the Board's authority to reduce match requirements for fiscal distress, the Board should consider a project that has a significant impact on an economically distressed community as an exceptional economic opportunity. This could include projects that occur in Opportunity Zones or that impact individuals in low income census tracts. This should be incorporated into administrative guidance on waivers mentioned above. The workgroup requested that DHCD modify Administrative Guidance to recognize the extraordinary opportunity associated with projects that impact economically distressed communities as a waiver condition. Direct DHCD to develop

guidelines around the definition of distress and application of the designation to projects and waiver procedures.

Fiscal Impact of Alternative Approaches: The board waived the \$50,000
minimum requirement to reduce local match requirement and has responded in
the pandemic to reduce local match requirements.

H. Agency Recommendation:

- 1. Determination by Agency: Retain
- 2. Justification: Localities have experienced increased levels of regional collaboration, increased job creation, increased training opportunities and increased businesses assistance and business creation by voluntarily participating in the GO Virginia projects through in kind and cash match voluntarily provided by local governments. The Board has utilized its discretion to decrease match requirements as needed in response to the pandemic and from stakeholder feedback.

- B. <u>Specific Provisions of Mandate:</u> If a motor vehicle is seized in a forfeiture proceeding, the Commonwealth's Attorney shall forthwith notify the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of the seizure and motor number of the seized vehicle by certified mail or electronically in a format approved by the Commissioner. In response, the Commissioner provides a certificate confirming the names of any owners and lien holder, which shall be received in evidence in a court proceeding where the facts of the certificate are material.
- C. Source/Authority:
 - 1. Specify Each Applicable
 - a) Federal Statute: No federal authority governs this requirement.
 - b) Federal Regulation: No federal authority governs this requirement.
 - c) State Statute: Va. Code § 19.2-386.2:1

 - Extension of Federal Mandates by State Authority: The state authority is not adding to or extending a federal mandate.
- D. Method by Which Agency Oversees Implementation of Mandate: DMV has no enforcement authority provided in the statute. At most, DMV receives approximately 5-6 notices per month pursuant to § 19.2-386.2:1. Upon receipt of the notification from a Commonwealth's Attorney DMV provides the required information to the Commonwealth's Attorney, registered owner, and any lienholder.

 - a) Funding Formula: The statute permits localities to notify the Commissioner via certified mail or electronically. While most localities send notification to DMV in writing, DMV will accept notification by fax or email. Localities need not incur costs associated with notification if they use fax or email. Localities choosing

certified mail incur costs associated with certified mailing. However, costs are likely de minimis due to the few notices that a locality may send to DMV annually.

- b)Funding of Mandate: Localities using the electronic notification option would not incur any costs. Localities using certified mail would incur the costs of mailing based on the number of seized vehicles annually.
- c) Explanation of Estimation Methodology: Cost of certified mail is used to calculate costs.

F. Effectiveness of Mandate in Accomplishing Purpose:

General Purpose of Mandate: The mandate provides that if a motor vehicle is seized as part of a forfeiture proceeding the attorney for the Commonwealth shall notify the DMV Commissioner by certified mail, or electronically of such seizure and the motor number of the vehicle, The Commissioner shall certify to such attorney for the Commonwealth the name and address of the person in whose name such vehicle is registered, together with the name and address of any person holding a lien thereon. The Commissioner shall also notify such registered owner and lienor, in writing, of the reported seizure and the county or city wherein such seizure was made.
- Description of Essentiality to the Public Safety: The mandate ensures that the Commonwealth's attorneys have the registered owner's name and address of a seized vehicle to be able to use such information in evidence in a civil or criminal proceeding. The mandate ensures that the registered owner and lien holder receives notice of the seizure and the county or city where the seizure was made.

Each fire department must maintain a copy of any approved applications and notify the Commissioner within 30 days of separation of any professional fire fighter, volunteer fire fighter, or member of a volunteer fire department auxiliary, from such fire department.

Method by Which Agency Oversees Implementation of Mandate: DMV form VSA 124, Firefighter, Professional, Firefighter, Rescue Squad License Plates Vehicle Registration Application, permits members of the fire services to apply for vehicle registration and Firefighter (FD), or Professional Firefighter (PF) plates. The form provides that once certified, the department/squad must retain a copy of the application while the person named in the Owner section remains a member. Upon separation of the person from the department/squad, the department/squad chief or leader must complete the specified section on the form and send a copy of the signed form to the Department of Motor Vehicles, within thirty (30) days of the separation date.

- a)Funding Formula: DMV does not charge a fee to localities to implement § 46.2-736
- b) Funding of Mandate: Localities submitting the form via email or fax would not incur any costs. Localities notifying DMV via mail would incur the costs of mailing based on the number applications annually. Since 2018 when the legislation was enacted requiring each fire department to maintain a copy of any approved applications and notify the Commissioner within 30 days of separation of any professional fire fighter, volunteer fire fighter, or member of a volunteer fire department auxiliary, from such fire department DMV has only received two notices of separation. There are over 9,800 FD and 9,500 PF plates on the road.
- c) Explanation of Estimation Methodology: Cost of mailing is used to determine costs.

F. Effectiveness of Mandate in Accomplishing Purpose:

- 1. General Purpose of Mandate: The mandate provides that the Commissioner, on application, shall supply professional fire fighters, members of volunteer fire departments, members of volunteer fire department auxiliaries, and volunteer members of any fire department license plates bearing the letters "F D" followed by numbers or letters or any combination thereof. An application shall be required from each professional fire fighter, volunteer fire fighter, or member of a volunteer fire department auxiliary. The application shall be approved by the chief or head of the fire department and shall contain the name and residence address of the applicant. Each fire department shall maintain a copy of such approved application and shall notify the Commissioner within 30 days of separation of any professional fire fighter, volunteer fire fighter, or member of a volunteer fire department auxiliary from such fire department.
- Description of Essentiality to the Public Safety: The mandate is not essential to public safety. The mandate permits firefighters to obtain special license plates.

G. Alternative Approaches to Achieving Purpose of Mandate:

E. Fiscal Impact of Mandate on Localities:

Localities Affected: Alexandria (DASH), Arlington Transit, Blacksburg Transit,
Charlottesville Area Transit, Fairfax Connector, Fredericksburg Transit, Greater
Lynchburg Transit Company, Greater Richmond Transit Company, Greater Roanoke

2. Funding of Mandate:

- a) Funding Formula: Currently, two entities, Hampton Roads Transit and the Greater Lynchburg Transit Company, have completed their strategic plans as part of the program pilot. The Greater Lynchburg Transit Company used prior efforts as a foundation for its strategic plan and spent approximately \$50,000 on its efforts. The Commonwealth paid for this plan in its entirety. Hampton Roads Transit is a larger entity and had no foundation to build upon. It spent approximately \$1 million on its strategic plan, and the state contributed 80 percent of those funds. The remaining funds came from the six localities served by Hampton Roads Transit.
- b)Funding of Mandate: DRPT has a program for "technical assistance projects" within the Commonwealth Mass Transit Fund. The selected projects are funded at a 50 percent state/50 percent local split. DRPT anticipates that the majority of future strategic plans will be funded through this program.

F. Effectiveness of Mandate in Accomplishing Purpose:

- General Purpose of Mandate: The main goal of a transit strategic plan is to create a
 strategic blueprint outlining desired changes that will improve the provision of transit
 services throughout each agency's service area within existing funding structures. This is
 an opportunity for each agency to look at their system as a blank slate, re-examine the
 priorities of stakeholders and riders, and make difficult choices concerning where and
 how to provide services in an efficient and cost-effective manner.
- 2. Description of Essentiality to the Public Safety: Urban areas throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia have been changing rapidly over the past 30 years, resulting in new settlement and commute patterns. The transit systems and networks that serve these areas, however, have not always kept up with these changes. Many transit routes and networks still follow decades-old travel patterns designed for a different era. In many areas, bus ridership has been declining as new modes of travel are introduced. This requires strategic focus to assess how transit service should be restructured in an era of new mobility. To address this issue, the Virginia General Assembly passed legislation in 2018 that requires transit agencies operating in urbanized areas to develop a Transit Strategic Plan to ensure that transit services are planned in a way that better meets the mobility needs of their communities. This gives those agencies an opportunity to evaluate and update their services and networks to respond to changes in demand.

G. Alternative Approaches to Achieving Purpose of Mandate:

Identification of Alternative Approaches: The General Assembly created the strategic
plan requirement during its 2018 legislative session. Due to its recent implementation
and the fact that not all agencies have completed their first plan, DRPT has not identified
any alternative approaches to a strategic plan that would be acceptable to the General
Assembly. Prior to this requirement, agencies were required to create Transit
Development Plans, which were not as robust as transit strategic plans and did not focus
on operational and financial efficiency.
