Dear Governor Youngkin, Delegate Knight, and Senator Howell:

We are pleased to submit the enclosed copy of the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Annual Report as required by [Item 129 of the Appropriation Act](#).

The Report details all expenditures in the Child Care Subsidy Program from the previous fiscal year, current grant balances, as well as all anticipated spending for the current and two subsequent fiscal years, administrative costs, and quality efforts for state fiscal year (SFY) 2022 and projects such expenditures for SFY 2023-25. The report also includes the number of children on the waitlist and estimates unduplicated counts of children participating in the Child Care Subsidy Program for these fiscal years. Finally, it reports the total number of providers that are licensed, registered, or otherwise tracked through the licensing system and the number of providers participating in subsidy by locality for SFY 2020-25.

Additionally, a new requirement in 2022 directs VDOE to certify it maximized federal drawdowns. Also, the report details the impact of expanded allowances in the Child Care Subsidy Program on the number of families and children served, the number of participating child care vendors, and the Child Care Development Fund balance, as well as plans to prepare for reductions in federal relief funding after SFY 2024.

Annual Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Report October 1, 2022

Introduction

House Bill 30 (Chapter 2) of the 2022 Special Session I, Item 129, directs the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE), in collaboration with the Department of Social Services (VDSS), to prepare an annual Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) report. The specific language of the mandate is as follows:

L. The Department of Education, in collaboration with the Department of Social Services, shall prepare an annual Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) report that reflects all CCDF expenditures from the previous fiscal year, current grant balances and obligation and liquidation deadlines, as well as all anticipated spending for the current and two subsequent fiscal years. Identified spending should, at a minimum, be broken down by subsidies (mandated and discretionary), administrative costs, and quality efforts. The plan also shall include a certification from the Department that the maximum amount of federal funds were drawn down in the preceding fiscal year. Should the Department be unable to certify that maximum federal funds were drawn down, the Department shall identify strategies for Virginia to obtain the maximum amount of federal funds in the following fiscal year(s) as part of this plan. In addition, this plan should report, by locality, the number of subsidies (mandated and discretionary) provided, number of providers receiving CCDF dollars, the overall number of child care providers, and the waitlist for services. This information should be provided the previous fiscal year, current fiscal year, and two subsequent fiscal years. The plan shall also include an appendix with the most recently completed CCDF annual report as required by the federal Office of Child Care. The department shall submit the report by October 1 of each year to the Governor and the Chairs of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance and Appropriations Committees. In addition, the department shall post this report on its website along with any reports from previous fiscal years.

Activities funded by CCDF are critical to the health, safety, and well-being of Virginia children and their families. CCDF is the primary federal funding source for Virginia's Child Care Subsidy Program (CCSP), which helps low-income families access child care while they work, search for work, or participate in education or training programs. In addition to funding direct services for families, CCDF dollars also support broader quality improvement and supply building efforts for the entire child care system.

In the 2021 Session, the General Assembly voted to leverage COVID relief funding to expand CCSP eligibility, allowing families in which parents were searching for work to enroll and increasing the income eligibility limits to 85 percent of the state median income (SMI) for families with young children ([HB 2206](#)). Taken with other policy flexibility, this expansion in eligibility has contributed to a steady increase in participation.

Over 36,000 children participated in the CCSP, a 39 percent increase in the unduplicated count of children served in SFY 2021. VDOE and VDSS worked together to provide needed policy flexibility and support to providers and families over the course of SFY 2022 ensuring that more families signed up, the Department increased utilization of recovery funds, and more children were served.

Enrollment in SFY 2022 increased across all ages and racial and ethnic groups. The age group with the largest increase was infants and toddlers, which reflects the result of expanded eligibility for families with young children and provides encouraging evidence of the CCSP meeting the needs of families in a historically underserved age group. Increases were observed across all racial and ethnic groups, with some variation across groups. See Table 1.

The result of the increased income eligibility limit to 85 percent of the state median income for families with young children ([HB 2206](#)) is evident in Table 2. At the end of SFY 2022, children of families above 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines comprised 14 percent of enrollment, compared to eight percent at the start of SFY 2022.

Through September 30, 2024, Virginia has access to significant additional federal funds to provide financial relief to struggling child care providers, expand access to child care assistance, invest in quality supports, and build the supply of child care across the Commonwealth. Projected expenditures and participation levels take these one-time resources into account and assume the state’s efforts to restore the subsidy program are effective. However, it is important to note that the pandemic remains a fluid influence on providers’ operations and families’ need for services. VDOE and VDSS will continue to work closely with key stakeholders to be nimble and responsive to the changing context.

CCDF Expenditures

CCDF expenditures in SFY 2022 totaled \$698,500,918, including \$220,242,743 million in regular federal grant awards and \$478,258,175 million in federal relief funds. These expenditures reflect an increase in the CCSP participation due to expanded eligibility. Additionally, Virginia dedicated \$439,600,000 million in ARPA stabilization grants to support needs of children and parents as they are returning to work or searching for employment.

Table 3 provides a detailed breakdown of past and projected expenditures by category.

- **Child care subsidies:** includes subsidies covered by mandatory and discretionary dollars. Mandatory dollars support TANF/VIEW Working and Transitional child care. Discretionary dollars support the Head Start Wrap-Around and Fee Child Care programs. COVID-funded expenditures include one-time federal relief funds to support expanded access to child care subsidies by reducing copayments, increasing paid absence days, expanding eligibility, and increasing reimbursement rates. These initiatives will be reflected in payments to participating CCSP vendors.
- **Administrative costs:** in SFY 2022, this category includes DOE direct personnel and operating costs for staff supporting CCDF activities for the Division of Child care and Early Childhood Development at DOE. This also includes DSS direct personnel and operating costs for the CCSP as well as indirect costs charged to the grant by both DSS and DOE.
- **Quality efforts:** includes child care quality activities, child care licensing, and coverage of fingerprint background check costs for child care providers. Estimates are separated by regular CCDF appropriations and COVID relief funding.
- **Other:** includes costs for data systems and state support for local staff. Does not include local funds utilized for state CCDF match.
- **COVID relief funded initiatives:** includes one-time, short-term activities funded by federal relief funds appropriated through CCDBG.
 - *Provider grants, including associated administrative functions* via the federally mandated Child Care Stabilization Grant Program;
 - *Supply building* to expand the supply of licensed and regulated child care in Virginia, targeting child care deserts and children and families for whom care is in short supply generally, such as infants and toddlers, children with disabilities, and children in need of nontraditional hours of care.

Total CCDF grant balances at the end of SFY 2022 equaled \$629 million, of which \$409 million is COVID relief funding.

Maximizing Federal Funds

In FFY 2022, Virginia was able to obtain the maximum amount of federal funds available to operate the CCSP. The CCDF grant is divided into three categories of funding: mandatory, matching, and discretionary. Mandatory funds are 100% federal funds authorized by the Social Security Act. These funds are primarily used to provide direct services to families receiving or at-risk for becoming dependent on Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Matching funds are available to states that obligate and use the funds within a required period. The state must match the funds based on the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP). State, local, or donated funds can be used to satisfy the matching requirement. Discretionary funds are used to enhance the overall quality and availability of child care. In addition to the CCDF grant, a state may transfer up to 10% of the TANF grant to the Social Services Block Grant, but the combined total of the transfers may not exceed 30%. Annually, DSS transfers a percentage of the TANF block grant to the CCDF.

In FFY 2022, Virginia maximized the total amount of federal funds available by meeting the matching requirement and transferring TANF funds to CCDF. DSS transferred \$18,016,245 to CCDF for use in the CCSP. Based on the current FMAP of 56.2%, Virginia received \$55,668,968 in federal funds by matching federal dollars with general funds at 43.8% or \$43,386,135. To meet the match requirement, Virginia used public pre-K expenditures as well as general funds allocated to the DSS to help support the local staff and operations.

**VDOE assumed oversight of the CCSP in FFY 2022, which will be associated with a slight increase in administrative costs. Projected expenses will not exceed the federal 5 percent cap.

Program Service Levels

Information in the following sections are based on best estimates.

Number of Children Receiving Child Care Subsidies

A total of 35,468 children were served by the CCSP statewide in SFY 2022. An average of 23,130 children were served per month at an average rate of \$747.23 per month or \$8,967 per year in SFY 2022. (Note that the number of children receiving Subsidy at any point in time is lower than the fiscal year unduplicated total count, given that children enter and leave the program over the course of the year.)

Table 4 includes unduplicated counts of children receiving subsidies in SFYs 2020-22 and child targets for SFYs 2023-25, subject to approval and availability of funds. Information by locality is in Appendix A.

Participating Children by Age and Full- or Part-Day Status

About half of participating children in the CCSP are ages birth to five (51 percent at the start of FY 2022). A majority of care provided is full day—meaning more than 5 hours per day—and preschool-aged children are much more likely to receive full-day care than children of other age groups.

Number of Providers Receiving CCDF Dollars

A total of 2,180 child care providers received CCDF dollars in SFY 2022. After a decline in providers, consistent with lower patterns of child participation, from SFY 2020 to SFY 2021, in SFY 2022, the number of paid providers increased by 15 percent. Table 5 projects the total number of active subsidy providers SFYs 2023-25. The projected count of subsidy providers assumes a sustained growth rate of 15 percent, consistent with the increase from SFY 2021 to SFY 2022. Information by locality is included in Appendix B.

Overall Number of Child Care Providers

The best source of information on the overall number of child care providers in the Commonwealth is the automated system maintained by the Department of Education, Office of Child Care Health and

Safety. As of July 1, 2022, there were 6,480 child care providers in the Commonwealth. The number of child care providers licensed, registered, or otherwise tracked through the licensing system is projected to increase over the course of the next several fiscal years as VDOE dedicates COVID relief funding to support supply-building efforts, particularly in child care deserts. Table 6 projects the number of child care providers in the system SFY 2023-25, estimating a five percent annual increase in the number of providers statewide. Information for SFY 2022 by locality and provider type is included in Appendix C.

Waitlist for Subsidy Services

Waitlists for the CCSP fluctuate over time and are influenced by demand for service and funding availability. VDOE and VDSS worked diligently with local departments of social services to clear waitlists in SFY 2022. Thirteen localities had a waitlist at the start of SFY 2022, totaling 38 children. By November 2022, just four localities had a waitlist. By March, all waitlists were cleared and have remained cleared, to date.

The 2022 biennial state budget directs VDOE to maximize federal Child Care Development Funds to eliminate the waitlist for child care subsidy assistance. Given the significant level of federal resources available to support children’s participation in the program, VDOE has had sufficient funds to clear waitlists. VDOE has worked with VDSS to create a process for local departments to request an increase in their child targets on a rolling basis. At present, VDOE is in the process of finalizing cost estimates based on the proposed provider payment rates and family copayments and updating child targets for the remainder of SFY 2023. VDOE and VDSS share the goal of eliminating waitlists as long as possible. The Department will continue to closely monitor incurred and projected expenditures and service levels and may need to activate waitlists if family demand exceeds the current child targets and available funds. Note that there is not sufficient data to estimate potential demand and future waitlist counts beyond 2023.

Table 7 shows the range of the number of children on the subsidy waitlist in SFYs 2020-22. Information by locality is included in Appendix D.
