Pursuant to § 2.2-2373 of the *Code of Virginia* it is my pleasure to submit, on behalf of the Board of Directors, the first annual report detailing the activities of the Opioid Abatement Authority during 2022.

The past year has been an active and important year for the Authority. The Board of Directors recruited an executive director and a small team of professional staff members, opened a permanent office in Richmond, and began the work of the Authority.

At the same time these early steps were being completed, Virginia began to receive distributions from settlements with companies that produced, marketed, and distributed prescription opioids. As a result of collaborative efforts between the Virginia Attorney General and counsel for local governments, more than \$109 million was paid to the Commonwealth of Virginia during 2022. Additional settlements are expected, and payments to Virginia from these various settlements are likely to continue for at least sixteen more years.

The foundational work accomplished by the Board in 2022 will allow the Authority to begin awarding grants to Virginia's cities, counties, and state agencies in early 2023. The Authority is committed to ensuring these funds are directed to efforts that will stem the tide of the opioid epidemic in Virginia, and in the process save lives, restore families, and strengthen communities.

2022 Annual Report

Executive Summary

The Board of Directors for the Opioid Abatement Authority was initially formed in late 2021, adopting by-laws and voting on leadership roles on November 8, 2021. Statewide elections took place that same day leading to changes in two of the Board's ex-officio positions.

The Authority met next on June 3, 2022, with two new Board members and support staff from the administration in attendance. A framework for 2022's workplan was put into action and included the hiring of an executive director.

Mr. Anthony E. "Tony" McDowell was selected as the executive director and started in August 2022. With staff in place the Authority then established its basic business infrastructure including the creation of email addresses and phone numbers, a budget, a new website, and a permanent office in downtown Richmond. The Authority employed three additional staff members by mid-November for a total of four full-time employees.

The Authority conducted a total of twelve public meetings during 2022. During these meetings the Board received presentations from the Office of the Attorney General regarding the status of litigation and settlement negotiations. The Board also voted to approve several administrative policies, approved staffing decisions, and provided direction regarding the development of long-term financial policies and grant practices.

The Authority conducted extensive outreach efforts in 2022, with Board members and staff attending and participating as speakers at conferences, workshops, individual meetings, webinars, and podcasts with a wide range of stakeholders and statewide organizations, including print and television media.

The Authority has received indications from localities that assistance will be needed in identifying evidence-based programs and best practices that can be implemented using opioid settlement funds. Staff has begun to compile the Authority's "toolkit" of evidence-based programs for cities and counties to combat the opioid epidemic. Organizations such as the Virginia Chapter of the American Society of Addiction Medicine and the Virginia Association of Community Services Boards are assisting with this effort. Additionally, the Authority has been working with numerous state agencies to identify existing abatement programs as well as any gaps in services that could be addressed through the Authority's efforts.

By the end of the calendar year \$71,911,971.64 had been deposited in the Opioid Abatement Fund as a result of settlement distributions. Although no distributions have been made by the Authority from this Fund, the first process for accepting applications will launch on January 19, 2023.

Board Members and Key Staff

In accordance with § 2.2-2367 of the *Code of Virginia* the Opioid Abatement Authority is governed by an eleven-member board. The statutory assignments and names of members serving in exofficio or appointed positions are listed below.
