In accordance with § 23.1-401.1(D) of the Code of Virginia, the University of Virginia submits this report regarding our compliance with § 23.1-401.1.

The University of Virginia maintains a website, <a href="https://freespeech.virginia.edu/">https://freespeech.virginia.edu/</a>, that features links to University policies and state regulations relevant to free speech, materials that are relevant on such policies, and the process to report incidents involving the disruption of constitutionally protected speech. The University's policies and regulations regarding constitutionally protected speech are located at <a href="https://freespeech.virginia.edu/policies-regulations">https://freespeech.virginia.edu/policies-regulations</a>. Materials on these policies and regulations in the form of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) also are featured on the website at <a href="https://freespeech.virginia.edu/faqs">https://freespeech.virginia.edu/faqs</a>. The homepage of this website prominently displays the reporting systems that our constituents may use to report an incident involving the disruption of constitutionally protected speech at <a href="https://freespeech.virginia.edu/">https://freespeech.virginia.edu/</a>.

The University of Virginia's students and employees, including those responsible for student discipline or education of free speech materials, are notified of these policy resources throughout the year via various communication streams such as the above mentioned websites, University's standard summer orientation programs for all entering students, the University Judiciary Committee training and education, as well as communication to our staff at the Office of the Dean of Students on the issues relating to freedom of speech and applicable policies. In light of the coronavirus pandemic, the University was unable to hold traditional summer orientation programs and the Dean of Students made a post outlining resources and materials available regarding free speech on the Office of the Dean of Students website.

During the past year, no complaints have been filed in a court of law to initiate a lawsuit against the University of Virginia or an employee of the institution in his or her official capacity for an alleged violation of the First Amendment to the United States Constitution.

On behalf of the University, I am pleased to certify that the University has fulfilled the requirements in Virginia Code § 23.1-401.1. Thank you for your service to the Commonwealth. Should you need additional information, please do not hesitate to contact me.
