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## Background

During the 2019 Session of the Virginia General Assembly, policymakers enacted § 9.1-116.5 of Article 1 of Chapter 1 of Title 9.1 of the *Code of Virginia*, establishing the Sex Trafficking Response Coordinator at the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), effective July 1, 2019. The goals of the Coordinator, as outlined in *Code of Virginia* [§ 9.1-116.5](#), include creating a statewide plan for local and state agencies to identify and respond to victims of sex trafficking, promoting strategies for education, training, and awareness of sex trafficking and for the reduction of demand for commercial sex, and maintaining a directory of sex trafficking victims services in Virginia. The State Trafficking Response Coordinator (Coordinator) at DCJS leads this work.

*Code of Virginia* § 9.1-116.5 also requires that the “Coordinator shall report annually on or before October 1 to the Governor and the General Assembly. The report shall include a summary of activities for the year and any recommendations to address sex trafficking within the Commonwealth.”

## Activities

The Coordinator has five responsibilities outlined in *Code of Virginia* § 9.1-116.5. State fiscal year (SFY) 2024 activities related to each responsibility are described below.

### **1. Create a statewide plan for local and state agencies to identify and respond to victims of sex trafficking.**

DCJS collaborated with local, regional, state, and national agencies to improve the identification of and response to victims of sex trafficking in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Coordinator participated in 89 partnership building activities with the goals of (i) increasing capacity to identify and serve victims, (ii) increasing victims’ access to a range of services, (iii) increasing awareness of the issue of human trafficking, and (iv) increasing sharing of professional expertise.

The Coordinator communicated with local and regional human trafficking collaborative groups to stay updated on initiatives throughout the Commonwealth. Guidance was provided to developing collaboratives and education and training opportunities were communicated. The Coordinator attended meetings of the following human trafficking collaborative groups:

- Fauquier Anti-Sex Trafficking Alliance
- Greater Prince William Human Trafficking Task Force
- Loudoun County Trafficking Task Force
- Lynchburg Human Trafficking Collaborative
- Richmond Regional Human Trafficking Collaborative
- Southwest Virginia Trafficking Collaborative

DCJS collaborated with other state agencies to build capacity to identify and respond to victims of sex trafficking. Meetings were held with representatives from the Virginia State Police, the Office of the Attorney General, the Commonwealth’s Attorneys’ Services Council, the Virginia Department of Social Services, the Virginia Department of Education, the Virginia Department of Health, and the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice.

The Coordinator facilitated training at events hosted by the Virginia State Police, the Virginia Department of Education, the Virginia Department of Social Services, and the Virginia Department of Transportation. Training was also provided for local departments of social services, court services units, law enforcement agencies, and public school districts.

In partnership with the Office of the Attorney General and the Virginia State Police, the Coordinator attended a meeting with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Center for Countering Human Trafficking. The Coordinator also participated in meetings of the National Compendium of State Run Anti-Trafficking Initiatives to learn about initiatives that have been successful in identifying and responding to victims of human trafficking in other states.

**2. Coordinate the development of standards and guidelines for treatment programs for victims of sex trafficking.**

The Coordinator researched models for standards and guidelines and identified existing standards and guidelines for sex trafficking treatment programs in other states, as well as reviewed the Virginia Sexual and Domestic Violence Program Professional Standards.

The Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) of the U.S. Department of Justice is partnering with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services’ Office on Trafficking in Persons (OTIP) to fund the development of national standards of care for anti-trafficking service providers. The Coordinator attended OVC information sessions on the process of developing of standards of care.

The Coordinator is in communication with treatment programs for victims of sex trafficking throughout the Commonwealth. The Coordinator hosted monthly meetings for juvenile sex trafficking residential treatment providers for information sharing and collaborative problem solving. The Coordinator provided technical assistance for existing and developing treatment programs for victims of sex trafficking.

**3. Maintain a list of programs that provide treatment or specialized services to victims of sex trafficking and make such list available to law enforcement agencies, attorneys for the Commonwealth, crime victim and witness assistance programs, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Department of Social Services, the Department of Education, and school divisions.**

The Virginia Human Trafficking Resource Guide is a directory of human trafficking victim services providers in the Commonwealth. This list also includes organizations that provide education, training, and awareness of human trafficking. DCJS updated the Resource Guide as new providers were identified. The Resource Guide appears on the Human Trafficking Response page under the DCJS public facing website. The link and the Resource Guide can be found in Appendix A.

**4. Oversee the development of a curriculum to be completed by persons convicted of solicitation of prostitution under § 18.2-346.01.**

The Coordinator identified two existing programs in the Commonwealth for persons convicted of solicitation of prostitution. The Coordinator is in communication with the organizations that facilitate these demand-based treatment programs.

The Sexual Exploitation Treatment and Training Services (SETTS) course provided in partnership with Trauma & Hope includes information to reduce the demand for commercial sex. This course is described in detail in a later section of this report. After completion of this course, participants are equipped to:

- a. Understand the mindset of sex buyers;
- b. Understand how demand-based treatment programs work; and
- c. Identify treatment standards for sex buyers.

**5. Promote strategies for the education, training, and awareness of sex trafficking and for the reduction of demand for commercial sex.**

DCJS facilitated education and training activities that reached a total of 8,459 professionals across the Commonwealth. A variety of learning formats were utilized to meet the needs of the constituents, to include in-person courses and presentations as well as webinars. Professionals trained include, but are not limited to, law enforcement, prosecutors, victim advocates, mental health and medical providers, social services, and court services.

In addition to the training courses described in detail below, DCJS provided sex trafficking education and training to 2,087 constituents through partnerships with local, regional, and state agencies.


DCJS collaborated with other state agencies to provide human trafficking education and training, including the Virginia State Police, the Commonwealth's Attorneys' Services Council, the Virginia Department of Social Services, the Virginia Department of Education, and the Virginia Department of Transportation. DCJS also responded to the needs of local departments of social services, court services units, law enforcement agencies, and school districts.

**Sexual Exploitation Treatment and Training Services (SETTS)**

In partnership with Trauma & Hope, DCJS coordinated five Sexual Exploitation Treatment and Training Services (SETTS) courses. Trauma & Hope developed this course in 2020 to build capacity of effective human trafficking therapeutic services in the Commonwealth. The purpose of SETTS is to equip professionals to provide trauma-informed services to both adult and minor victims of sex trafficking. The course covers topics such as screening, assessment, clinical interventions, organizational capacity building, and multidisciplinary approaches to preventing and addressing human trafficking. As noted previously, this course also offers information on sex buyers and demand-based treatment programs.

DCJS coordinated one SETTS course designed for case managers and four courses for multidisciplinary professionals. A total of 111 professionals were trained. The two-day specialized case manager course was completed by 17 case managers. Ninety-four professionals completed the five-day multidisciplinary courses. In addition to providing therapeutic tools and interventions to utilize with victim of sex trafficking, this course promotes multidisciplinary, team-based approaches to addressing and preventing trafficking. The traditional audience for this course has included mental health clinicians and victim advocates, but there has been an increase in attendance by other disciplines including social services, law enforcement, prosecutors, court services, and forensic nurses.

Of the 111 professionals who completed the SETTS course instructed by Trauma & Hope in state fiscal year (SFY) 2024, 98 completed the course evaluation survey. The chart displays evaluation responses to the following statements:




### Human Trafficking Investigation and Prosecution

DCJS organized three Human Trafficking Investigation and Prosecution courses in partnership with Virginia State Police (VSP) and the Commonwealth’s Attorneys’ Services Council (CASC). This course is designed to improve investigative techniques centered on victim needs and bring human trafficking cases to prosecution. The Human Trafficking Institute (HTI) instructed this course. HTI developed the course with input from DCJS, VSP, and CASC to properly address the needs of the Commonwealth. A total of 142 investigators and prosecutors were trained.

Of the 142 investigators and prosecutors who completed the Human Trafficking Investigation and Prosecution course instructed by Human Trafficking Institute (HTI) in SFY 2024, 131 completed the course evaluation survey.

Prior to training, an average of 41.4% of participants surveyed reported that they believed they were familiar with common signs and indicators of human trafficking compared to 100% post-training. Also, after training, 100% of participants felt they had a good understanding of the Virginia human trafficking laws, as compared to an average of 21.9% pre-training.



### Human Trafficking Victim Identification for Law Enforcement

DCJS piloted a Human Trafficking Victim Identification for Law Enforcement course. This course was instructed by Human Trafficking Institute (HTI). The purpose of this course is to teach law enforcement how to identify potential human trafficking and report cases to the appropriate parties. Virginia State Police provided this course to troopers. To promote consistency, DCJS piloted the course for law enforcement officers from local agencies, training 38 officers.

The SETTS, Human Trafficking Investigation and Prosecution, and Human Trafficking Victim Identification for Law Enforcement courses are all held in-person. These courses are offered in multiple localities to meet the needs and build capacity of professionals throughout Virginia.

### Human Trafficking Awareness for Hotels

*Code of Virginia* § 35.1-15.1 requires hotel employees in the Commonwealth to complete training on recognizing and reporting suspected human trafficking. DCJS was required to develop an online course at no cost to hotel proprietors and employees. Hotel proprietors can utilize the online course provided by DCJS or an alternative online or in-person training course approved by DCJS. The State Board of Health enforces the regulations for the required training.

The *Human Trafficking Awareness for Hotels* course was developed by DCJS in SFY 2023. In SFY 2024, 6,081 hotel employees completed the course. The course was translated to offer a Spanish language option. To meet the needs of the constituents, the course will also be translated to Bengali, Hindi, and Gujarati. These language options are anticipated to be available in SFY 2025.

DCJS continues to review submitted applications for approval of alternative curriculums. In SFY 2024, DCJS approved four curriculums created by advocacy agencies and for-profit vendors.

Each of the courses provide information on Virginia-specific reporting mechanisms, including the Virginia State Police human trafficking tip line and the Virginia Department of Social Services hotlines.

## Future Activities

The Coordinator will continue to advance the responsibilities outlined in *Code of Virginia* § 9.1-116.5. Additional activities planned for SFY 2025 are described below.

### Demand Reduction and Safe Harbor Pilot Program

During the 2023 Session of the Virginia General Assembly, policymakers directed DCJS to establish a two-year pilot program titled *Demand Reduction and Safe Harbor for Domestic Minor Sex Trafficked Youth*. The legislation directed DCJS, in consultation with the Virginia State Crime Commission, to identify a suitable locality to administer the pilot program. The goals are to reduce the arrest of sex

trafficking victims, reduce demand for commercial sexual exploitation by focusing on buyers, and establish high-quality education, alternative employment opportunities, and life skills for victims. DCJS will continue to provide consultation to the pilot locality.

### Human Trafficking Multidisciplinary Response Teams

In 2024, the Virginia General Assembly established *Code of Virginia* § 15.2-1627.6, requiring the Commonwealth’s Attorney in each political subdivision to coordinate the establishment of a multidisciplinary response to human trafficking. DCJS is required to establish protocols for human trafficking response teams to guide the work of the Commonwealth’s Attorneys.

### Online Courses

*Code of Virginia* § 23.1-808.1 requires all first-year students of public institutions of higher education to complete human trafficking awareness and prevention training. Although not required, DCJS is developing an online course for college students on recognizing, preventing, and reporting human trafficking.

DCJS is also developing a *Human Trafficking 101* online course to promote education and awareness of human trafficking among the public. This course will include information on what human trafficking is, common myths and misconceptions, and how to recognize and report suspected human trafficking.

In 2024, the Virginia General Assembly amended *Code of Virginia* § 9.1-141, requiring DCJS to establish training standards for unarmed and armed security officers, couriers, security canine handlers, and alarm respondents to include a training requirement on recognizing and reporting suspected human trafficking. DCJS is required to develop an online training course for security personnel to fulfill this requirement and will move forward with this as regulations are advanced.

## Recommendation

The Coordinator recommends amending *Code of Virginia* § 9.1-116.5 that established a Sex Trafficking Response Coordinator within DCJS. This is a technical amendment to replace the term “sex trafficking” with “human trafficking,” making the new title “Human Trafficking Response Coordinator” and updating the following responsibilities:

1. Create a statewide plan for local and state agencies to identify and respond to victims of [human] trafficking;
2. Coordinate the development of standards and guidelines for treatment programs for victims of [human] trafficking;
3. Maintain a list of programs that provide treatment or specialized services to victims of [human] trafficking and make such list available to...; and
4. Promote strategies for the education, training, and awareness of [human] trafficking and for the reduction of demand for commercial sex.

The current use of the term “sex trafficking” limits the codified requirement of DCJS to respond to only one form of human trafficking. This is not reflective of the work being done to respond to labor trafficking. The term “human trafficking” includes sex and labor trafficking. Sex and labor trafficking intersect and cannot be addressed in silos. Updating the language broadens the codified responsibility of DCJS to respond to both forms of trafficking and is representative of the work already being done to address labor trafficking. This could lead to an increase in identification of victims and better response to labor trafficking cases.
