Virginia American Revolution 250 Commission 2023 Annual Report



I. Background

The Virginia American Revolution 250 Commission (VA250) was created by the General Assembly for the purpose of commemorating the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution, the Revolutionary War, and the independence of the United States (2020 Acts, c. 914).

A statutory change in 2023 situated the Commission within the legislative branch, keeping the same powers and duties (2023 Acts, cc. 655, 656). Primary among those are the formulation and implementation of a program for the inclusive observance of the 250th anniversary of the independence of the United States and the Revolutionary War in Virginia, including:

- a. Civic, cultural, and historical education and scholarship concerning the ideals of the American Revolution and their contemporary relevance
- b. Visitation of museums and historic sites, including battlefields
- c. Creation and publication of historical documents and studies
- d. Cooperation with agencies responsible for the preservation or restoration of historic sites, buildings, art, and artifacts
- e. Establishment of exhibitions and interpretive and wayfinding signage
- f. Arrangement of appropriate public ceremonies
- g. Comprehensive marketing and tourism campaign encompassing CY 2025 through 2026
- h. General dissemination of public information regarding Virginia's involvement in the American Revolution and its legacy today

Commission Meetings

The full Commission held four meetings during the 2023 interim. Advisory workgroups were established, including:

• African American Advisory Council, which, led by Senator Mamie Locke, held its inaugural meeting in January 2024

- Tribal Leaders Advisory Council that will begin meeting in late January 2024 (chaired by Chief Steve Adkins)
- Marketing workgroup that meets quarterly (headed by Diane Bechamps, Virginia Tourism Corporation)
- Education workgroup (led by Secretary Aimee Guidera), convening teachers and educators.
- Museums and historic homes will convene later in 2024, to collaborate and share planning efforts.

II. Summary of 2023 Activities

Reflecting on the year, VA250 has seen a monumental shift from the initial planning stages last year to a remarkable burst of activity and success in 2023. Key achievements of the year include:

National 250th anniversary event: Virginia proudly hosted the nation's first successful event marking the semiquincentennial, hosting 250th planners from across the nation in a collaboration and partnership, "A Common Cause to All: A Convening of States on the 250th Anniversary of the Committees of Correspondence."

Local committees in each locality: Demonstrating remarkable statewide engagement, almost every locality in Virginia has formed a Local VA250 Committee. This widespread participation showcases the collective effort and enthusiasm towards this historic milestone.

Massive Media Reach: Our initiatives have captured widespread attention, achieving a remarkable 460 million media impressions. This expansive reach underscores the statewide and national interest in Virginia's unique historical narrative.

Launch of State Capitol Exhibition: A major highlight was the grand opening of a specially curated exhibition at the State Capitol, bringing VA250 to thousands of visitors.

Inspirational Goals and Vision: VA250 has outlined goals and a vision that not only resonate with our communities but also inspire them. These objectives serve as a guiding light for our ongoing and future activities.

Robust Planning for the Future: The Commission has laid down robust plans for the coming years, ensuring that our journey towards commemorating Virginia's key role in the formation of our nation continues with vigor and purpose.

Public-private partnerships: Corporate and philanthropic partners have stepped forward to join the state in ensuring that Virginia's inspirational 250th commemoration leads the nation. Dominion Energy made a leadership investment of \$1 million in the VA250 commemoration, and civic-minded businesses across the Commonwealth have joined in that leadership role, demonstrating dedicated support for their communities, state, employees, and customers.

III. Vision, goals, and statewide engagement

Virginia's semiquincentennial is not simply about our past. How we commemorate our founding also impacts our present and our future. This is why VA250 has chosen "*To Form a More Perfect Union*" as its theme. Our founders knew there was more work required 250 years ago, and work remains to be done.

Our overarching goals are:

- to **educate** Virginians, including our students, about our history, our founding ideals and our system of government;
- to **engage** every community and all regions in events that tell a complete story; and
- to **inspire** Virginians to commit to the values inherent in American citizenship

Virginia's History is America's Story. This is more than a tagline on marketing collateral. Virginia has always been the crucible of our nation, from our founding to the present day. The first colonists arrived in Virginia. The first encounters with Indigenous peoples occurred here. The first ships carrying the enslaved landed here. The first representative government was formed here. The famous speeches, critical debates and major events that led to the movement for independence and sparked a revolution happened here. The Fincastle Resolutions, the Bill of Rights, the Declaration of Independence, and the Constitution were all written by Virginians.

Call to Action

Our founders understood their work was only the beginning of building a great nation. They structured our government to empower us to repair our faults. Let us appreciate our role as citizens to continue that work and recommit to do our part "... to form a more perfect union."

Commemoration Architecture

In addition to our nine signature events throughout 2024, 2025 and 2026; our programming throughout the Commonwealth in each community; and our mobile museum programs; we will have annual themes with specific programming.

2024: A CELEBRATION OF HUMAN FREEDOM AND THE ROLE OF OUR FOUNDERS

Being men of their times, our founders were slaveholders and did not believe the rights they espoused applied to anyone other than white, male property owners. Nevertheless, the words and leadership of Thomas Jefferson, George Mason, James Madison, and George Washington changed the world forever and have inspired every movement for liberty, dignity, and equality everywhere and ever since. As we design and build programming, we are grateful for the engagement of Mt. Vernon, Gunston Hall, Montpelier and Monticello as well as the descendent communities.

2025: A CELEBRATION OF OUR ROLE IN THE WORLD

Ambassadors from democracies around the world will gather at Mt. Vernon to reflect on how the American story has inspired their nations.

2026: A CELEBRATION OF CITIZENSHIP

At naturalization ceremonies across the Commonwealth, Americans will join our newest citizens by considering the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and being invited to raise their right hand to also recommit to the oath of citizenship on July 4, 2026.

In short, Virginia's 250th commemoration will be meaningful to all Virginians, and will be a commemoration that reflects each Virginian, and resonates with civic pride and hope for the future.

IV. "A Common Cause to All: A Convening of States on the 250th Anniversary of the Call for Committees of Correspondence

The nation's first 250th program was held in Colonial Williamsburg on March 10-12, 2023, hosted by the VA250 Commission and Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, in partnership with the Virginia Museum of History and Culture and Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation.

During this first gathering of states to plan for 250th anniversary of American independence, planners from **34 states** and more than **50 Virginia localities** gathered in Williamsburg for a weekend of collaboration, cooperation, and education.

Mirroring the Committees of Correspondence, through which colonies began to communicate and unify action, *A Common Cause to All* catapulted Virginia into a national leadership role for the semiquincentennial, convening planners, seeking partnerships, and sharing information. The event was overwhelmingly well-received, with a chorus of requests for the continuation of such convenings each year.

The **nearly 300 attendees** engaged in presentation of the latest data on what Americans are looking for in the 250th, networking opportunities, and inspiration provided by the commission and its partners, The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, the Virginia Museum of History and Culture and the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation.

Culminating the weekend, an emotion-packed Closing Ceremony was held on the steps of the Raleigh Tavern, where Thomas Jefferson, Patrick Henry, and other members of Virginia's Committee of Correspondence met, 250 years earlier. Delegates unanimously adopted a Resolution of the States Gathered in Partnership, pledging to join in a new common cause – for all Americans to unite in reflection, celebration, and aspiration as we continue our national journey together.

At the request of all, this highly acclaimed program will continue in 2024 (March 18-20) and 2025.

V. Media, communications, and marketing

Raising awareness of the coming 250th was key to outreach and engagement endeavors in 2023. To that end, VA250 leaders and staff held meetings to engage key stakeholders and partners, meeting with the congressional delegation and French embassy, among others. In addition, several regional meetings were held in with business leaders across the state, and local committee representatives attended "Local VA250 Roundtable" meetings in Botetourt, Richmond, and Alexandria, in addition to convening virtually on a periodic basis.

Staff had a presence at a number of high-profile events, including On the Square, the Virginia Women's Conference, and the VA-1 Governor's Tourism Summit.

Digital report: The website (VA250.org) continues to grow and users clearly respond to the dynamic search capability, particularly engaging with the interactive Places to Visit and Statewide Calendar of Events. To date, 262 events have been added to the website, and more than 70 localities have responded to the call to "tell your local story," resulting in a plethora of new information. Reach and engagement also continues to increase across social media channels.

Media report: VA250 joined with Cardinal News to tell the under-known stories of Virginia's role in the march to independence. The highly engaging series, *Cardinal 250*, will run monthly articles through 2026, diving into Virginia's key role in the formation of our nation. The series may be expanded through additional web resources and podcasts, and consideration is being given to publishing a compilation of the articles at the conclusion of the multi-year series.

Total media impressions for the year were 460 million (as compared with 3.35 million in the previous year. Awareness and coverage of VA250 saw significant growth in March 2023, when mentions (primarily from "A Common Cause to All") spiked to 169 articles. May saw an uptick again to 53 mentions (primarily from Carly Fiorina being chosen as National Honorary Chair), followed by 41 mentions in November, and 46 in December (primarily from using the Boston Tea Party anniversary to get attention for the Yorktown Tea Party). The upward trend is a positive sign that awareness can be built over time with concerted efforts.

VI. Grants to support statewide 250th initiatives

Grants to support local VA250 programs began in earnest in 2023. The Commission offers three grant funding streams, with awards requiring a 1:1 ratio by the locality:

- VTC VA250 Marketing Leverage Grants: Two rounds of grants were held in 2023. Twelve localities received VA250 grants, cumulatively awarding \$95,100 to local committees, which was matched by \$108,807, resulting in \$203,907 for marketing of events throughout the Commonwealth.
- 2. Virginia Humanities VA250 Grants: The first round of VH-VA250 grants awarded \$116,351 to 13 local committees, which was matched by \$142,523, resulting in \$259,874

for programs, exhibitions, and events throughout the Commonwealth.

3. Virginia Commission for the Arts – VA250 grants open in January and will award up to \$4,500 per recipient to support arts related to the commemoration.

VII. Looking Ahead to 2024

A number of large-scale programs will be held in 2023, including the launch of the VA250 Mobile Museum Experience, a vibrant July 4 program at the State Capitol, the 250th anniversary of the Yorktown Tea Party, the 200th anniversary of Lafayette's Grand Tour, the second iteration of "A Common Cause to All" and hundreds of programs across the state.

As we conclude an eventful 2023, it is clear that Virginia is not just participating in the commemoration of America's 250th; it is leading it. Our actions and achievements have firmly positioned the Commonwealth as a national leader in this historic observance. We move forward with the conviction that Virginia's history IS America's story. This belief will continue to drive our efforts as we usher in another year of meaningful commemorations and celebrations.



Analysis

Awareness and coverage of VA250 saw significant growth in March 2023, when mentions (primarily from "A Common Cause to All") spiked to 169 articles. May saw an uptick again to 53 mentions (primarily from Carly Fiorina being chosen as National Honorary Chair), followed by 41 mentions in November, and 46 in December (primarily from using the Boston Tea Party anniversary to get attention for the Yorktown Tea Party). The upward trend is a positive sign that awareness can be built over time with concerted efforts.

The second project is in-person programming in a special collaboration between Patrick Henry's Red Hill and the Robert Russa Moton Museum. In partnership with the Moton Museum in Farmville, Red Hill will create and offer a public program that honors the many contributions that Virginia's Southside Black communities have made to the fight for citizenship and equity throughout the Commonwealth and the nation's history. Patrick Henry's last home and burial site known as Red Hill is a 1000-acre historical site in Brookneal, VA. Henry was best known for his "Give me liberty or give me death" speech. Visitors to Red Hill can explore the complexities of the man who made this declaration and fought for freedom yet kept people enslaved to serve his family and the property.

Held in 2024, it will further emphasize 1774 anniversaries in the region occurring during the proposed grant period, including the Fincastle Resolutions and Dunmore's War. Through key themes reflecting the latest in Revolutionary War scholarship, our program follows diverse peoples in students' home region in the years preceding and following the signing of the Declaration of Independence. It will culminate in a region-wide art and poetry contest for 4th-and 5th-grade students and a rotating exhibit centering the themes from the program reflecting American history, their region, and in their own lives.

Description: With passage of a resolution from all five counties, the NNK250 Coalition is a regional effort, creating a Signature Speaker Series as one of several special events to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution. Running February to June each year from 2024 through 2027, the Series will be held in a different Northern Neck county each month. Themes will vary by year and are aimed at connecting audiences with the Northern Neck's unique history, diverse people, and

compelling stories. Themes have been developed for all 4 years of the NNK250 commemoration to provide common points of inspiration for all NNK250 programming and activities:

- 2024: Power of Place
- **2025**: <u>We the People</u>
- 2026: <u>American Experiment</u>
- o 2027: Preservation & Commemoration

The 2024 theme is Power of Place: The Northern Neck is a powerfully historic place, home to sites and stories essential to our American story. The 250th commemoration is an opportunity to reexamine our ideas about these sites and stories in the context of both the natural and built environment.

Description: Williams Ordinary is in historic Dumfries, Virginia along the trace of historic King's Highway, now known as Route 1. Originally thought to be constructed in the 1760s, historians now know that the building was constructed circa 1785. A large commercial building, it served as an ordinary tavern, which was a combination of a hotel and restaurant. To entice travelers to stop and to showcase the owner's wealth, the front of the building is made just of the short end of bricks. Known as an all-header façade, it is one of only a handful of examples in North America. The building is listed on the Virginia Landmarks Register and National Register of Historic Places.

In anticipation of the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution, PWC has determined that the permanent exhibit will be about the County's Revolutionary War experience. In the past year PWC has created the Revolutionary War History Trail that connects visitors with the famed campaigns and lesser-known sites of the Revolutionary War by exploring 12 sites within the Prince William & Manassas area. Currently there is no one site that interprets the entire Revolutionary War experience within the county. The Williams Ordinary exhibit is designed to remedy this. New local land uses and developments in the immediate Dumfries area are projected to increase visitation to the area. This reason, combined with Dumfries' historic role as political center in colonial Prince William County, makes the permanent exhibit at Williams Ordinary a natural fit. PWC has worked with Quatrefoil, an exhibit design firm based in Maryland, to provide an estimate of designing a permanent exhibit in the approximate 300 square foot gallery space. The design includes up to ten graphic panels, one artifact label, dimensional elevations, graphic production schedule and specification, one design review/approval step, and a final graphic design and reader proofs.

6. Loudoun Heritage Farm Museum

Description: The Loudoun Heritage Farm Museum and Loudoun County Historic Records Division will use the funds to present an exhibition about the lives of Loudoun's revolutionary tenant farmers. The exhibition will feature 18th century farming tools and equipment, and government records related to the 1775 Loudoun tenant revolt. Visitors will learn about the often-difficult life of poor farmers in the 18th century and how they fit into the narrative of the Revolution. Though not enslaved, they found themselves living uncomfortable between freedom and servitude. The ideals of the Revolution shed light on this paradox and led the farmers to assert collective power against the perceived economic tyranny of Virginia's wealthy elites.

The installation will reuse a semi-permanent 12'x12' exhibition structure, so the cost of this project consists primarily of mounting and displaying artifacts and historic documents, and printing and mounting text panels to the exhibit structure. Further costs support printing the exhibit text on scrolling panels that can travel throughout the county free of charge.

Local leaders such as William Campbell and Walter Crockett and their Virginian Overmountain men defeated British officer Patrick Ferguson and his Tory forces at the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780. This exhibit will focus on the events that took place locally and the locals whose actions had an impact globally.

Funding will assist in production of seasons one and two of Worlds Turned Upside Down, a narrative documentary podcast series about the history of the American Revolution. Hosted and written by Dr. Jim Ambuske, the series draws on contributions from an international cast of leading experts to explore the conflict through the lives of British Americans, Indigenous nations, enslaved Africans and African Americans, Europeans, and other peoples who experienced it as a transatlantic crisis and imperial civil war. We know the story of the Thirteen Colonies; now it is time for audiences to learn the rest.

As we prepare to observe the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution, the podcast Worlds Turned Upside Down strives to meet the public's demand for histories of the American Revolution while challenging their assumptions about it. The Revolution may have given birth to a new nation, but for the people who lived through it, the revolutionary era upended their lives in ways they could never have imagined. The series forgets that we know how the story ends and explores contingent moments to show how the crisis that engulfed the Atlantic world in the late eighteenth century inspired people to question their loyalties, challenge authority, seek freedom, and resist revolutionary change.

Description: Stitching Together History: 250 Quilts Commemorating the Commonwealth of Virginia. The final outputs of this project will be an exhibition and book, both in 2026, featuring 250 quilts that tell the history of the Commonwealth of Virginia through four themes. Quilts will be based around adaptations of four of the themes put forth by the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) for the 250th to create a cohesive and inclusive project. Those four themes are: Unfinished Revolutions, We the People, Power of Place, and Virginia Experiments. Quilters from across the United States will be invited to submit an entry to the project, quilts will be selected by an advisory committee based on both content and technical skill level. Along with the exhibition and book, VQM will offer programming around both the creation of the quilts and the exhibition starting in the fall of 2023 and lasting through 2026. Programming will be both virtual and in person across the state. Additionally, this project will include an artist-in-residence during the run of the exhibition to create a final quilt encapsulating all four themes to act as a capstone for the project.

The significance of this project comes from asking the public to think critically about the history of Virginia, how it relates to the themes of the project, and to create art that represents a part of that history. Together the 250 quilts selected for the exhibition and book will tell an inclusive story of the Commonwealth of Virginia that reflects how the challenges of the American Revolution and the promises of the Declaration of Independence have influenced Virginia throughout history.

The 250th anniversary of Patrick Henry's speech will occur on March 23, 2025. The nation's eyes will be on St. John's when our organization delivers a series of reenactments commemorating the anniversary.

Funding for this request will be used to outfit our cast with new costumes, including wigs and shoes. Many of our actors' costumes are more than 15 years old. Funds would ensure that our cast not only has new costumes for the 250th anniversary but following the big day as we continue to attract new audiences who want to learn about the important historic events that happened at Historic St. John's Church, the oldest church in the City of Richmond and a National Historic Landmark.

We have some research available on the FIWF website; Mount Vernon has some research on their website; and the Winchester-Frederick County Historical Society has some on theirs, too, since they manage the George Washington's Office Museum

However, none of this research is centralized in an online location for audiences to read, explore, and understand. Because of this deficiency, the only people who are finding and using this research are largely historians and other researchers. This project wants to change this limited access by combining existing research along with historical documents and images and building an online exhibit that shares this small but mighty story with the general public.

The increasing popularity of the digital humanities field has underscored the need for an online exhibit that shares the story of George Washington in Winchester, the construction of Fort Loudoun, the French & Indian War in the Shenandoah Valley, and how all these things tied into the American Revolution. It is a quintessential story of cause and effect and teaches the importance of understanding the greater historical context. The American Revolution was not a single event, and there was not just one thing that motivated the colonists to fight. History is complicated, but by using digital tools, we are able to make history a little less complicated by breaking down events and weaving in primary sources that allow for end users to interact and engage with a story. The online exhibit will share the stories from the soldiers and prisoners so that audiences can connect with the fort's link to the Revolutionary War personally.
