Dear Senator Lucas and Delegate Torian:

To fulfill the requirement of the 2024 Appropriation Act (Item 1, paragraph V of Chapter 2, 2024 Acts of Assembly, Special Session I), we are reporting on the activity of the Historic Horse Racing Workgroup ('Workgroup") to review the rate and distribution of pari-mutuel pools generated by wagering on historic horse racing at satellite facilities pursuant to § 59.1-392, Code of Virginia.

The Appropriation Act directs the Workgroup to:

- Assess trends in pari-mutuel pools generated by historic horse racing wagering at satellite facilities, including the corresponding distribution of revenue to localities;
- Make recommendations regarding the future distribution of revenue starting July 1, 2025; and
- Provide findings and recommendations no later than October 15, 2024.

The Workgroup met on September 17, 2024 and the meeting's agenda and presentations are attached. The House Appropriations Committee and Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee staff provided an overview on historic horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering and examined the trends in the wagering and revenue generated and distributed to localities.

Following the staff presentation, Rodney Hathaway, New Kent County Administrator, provided an overview of the support delivered by the county to the Colonial Downs Racetrack in New Kent, Virginia. He reviewed the racetrack's public safety needs, and he outlined the county's planned investments in transportation, water infrastructure, emergency services, and other major capital projects.

A public comment period was offered, but none were received at the meeting. However, the Town of Vinton has provided written comments to the Workgroup.

Recommendations for future distribution of revenues were not made at the meeting.

Workgroup Objectives

Appropriation Act directs the workgroup to:

- Assess trends in pari-mutuel pools generated by historic horse racing (HHR) wagering at satellite facilities, including the corresponding distribution of revenue to localities;
- Make recommendations regarding the future distribution of revenue starting July 1, 2025; and
- Provide findings and recommendations no later than October 15, 2024.

Proposed Work Plan


- Provide background on HHR pari-mutuel pools generated at satellite facilities
- Review legislative history of §59.1-392, Code of Virginia
- Examine revenue generated and distributed to localities over time, including expansion of satellite facilities
- Review support provided by New Kent County to the racetrack facility
- Develop findings, work group options, and/or recommendations by October 15th

Overview of Historic Horse Racing

What is Historic Horse Racing?

- Bet on historic horse races:
 - Race results are used without identifying information; and
 - Not limited to any single track or time period.
- Pari-mutuel pool:
 - Players bet against each other;
 - Not a bet "against the house"; and
 - Considered a game of skill.
- Winnings paid out from pool.
- Licensee retains a percentage of each wagering dollar extracted before payoffs are calculated and pays fees assessed by government.

Six States Currently Permit Historical Horse Racing



HHR currently permitted by:

- Alabama
- Kansas
- Kentucky
- New Hampshire
- Virginia
- Wyoming
- Louisiana authorized HHR in 2021, but state courts ruled it unconstitutional in 2024. Court determined that local referendum approval is necessary.

Historical Horse Racing in Virginia


- Historical horse racing was first authorized by the General Assembly with Chapter 811, 2018 Regular Session (59.1-392, Code of Virginia).
- Virginia Racing Commission is responsible for licensing, regulation and oversight of pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing – including historical horse racing – on track and at satellite facilities.
- Code of Virginia authorizes the operation of up to 10 satellite facilities.
- Local referendum must be held and approved before Commission may grant license to operate satellite facility.
- A limit of 5,000 HHR terminals may operate statewide:
 - Up to 700 terminals in a jurisdiction with population of 120,000 or more;
 - Up to 300 terminals in a jurisdiction with population between 60,000 and 120,000; and
 - Up to 150 terminals in a jurisdiction with population of 60,000 or less.

Historical Horse Racing in Virginia

- In addition to betting activities at Colonial Downs in New Kent, eight satellite facilities are currently licensed and operating in Virginia.
 - Six satellite facilities with HHR terminals: Vinton, Richmond, Hampton, Collinsville, Dumfries, and Emporia.
 - Two additional satellite facilities without HHR terminals are operating in Henrico and Chesapeake.

Since Inception, HHR Wagers and Payouts Have Grown Substantially

In FY 2024, net HHR gaming revenue grew 7.5 percent over FY 2023. (\$ in millions)

HHR Wager Distribution (Initial 3,000 Terminals)

1.25 percent retained:

- 0.5 percent to racetrack locality (if at racetrack)
- 0.25 percent each to satellite facility locality and to racetrack locality (if at satellite facility)
- 0.01 percent to Problem the Gambling Treatment and Support Fund
- 0.025 percent each to:
 - Virginia Breeders Fund;
 - VA-MD Regional College of Veterinary Medicine;
 - Virginia Horse Center Foundation; and
 - Virginia Horse Industry Board
- 0.215 percent to the Commonwealth (license tax)

HHR Wager Distribution (Additional 2,000 Terminals)


1.6 percent retained:

- 0.64 percent to racetrack locality (if at racetrack)
- 0.32 percent each to satellite facility locality and racetrack locality (if at satellite facility)
- 0.01percent to Problem Gambling Treatment and Support Fund
- 0.025 percent each to:
 - Virginia Breeders Fund;
 - VA-MD Regional College of Veterinary Medicine;
 - Virginia Horse Center Foundation; and
 - Virginia Horse Industry Board
- 0.285 percent to the Commonwealth (license tax)


HHR Tax Revenue Has Increased

Local Revenue to Host Localities





New Kent County's Role in Historic Horse Racing



1980s – An Idea Develops New Kent is On Board

- Advocates push for a horse racing track in Virginia.
 - ► Concept is a single horse track with 100+ racing days.
- New Kent expresses interest in serving as the location.
- ▶ 1988 VA voters approve horse racing in a statewide referendum.
- ▶ 1989 New Kent approves horse racing with a county referendum.

New Kent optimistic about horse track

RICHMOND (AP)—New Kent officials were upbeat about news that plans are under way to make the county the home of Virginia's first parimutuel thoroughbred track.

Virginia's first commercial betting track "would mean an economic gold mine for New Kent," said David Ringley, one of the county's supervisors.



1990s – A Decade of Delay New Kent is Patient

- ▶ 1989-1992 Developers demand off-track betting (OTB) locations before they will agree to build a track.
- ▶ 1992- General Assembly approves 6 OTBs.
 - Legislation included a revenue split.
 - ▶ 0.25% → OTB locality
 - ▶ 0.25% → Horse track locality
- ▶ 1993 General Assembly requires "not less than 150 live racing days" (with flexibility for the first five years).
- 1994 Developer selected to build track in New Kent.
- ▶ 1994-1996 Litigation prevents construction on racetrack.
- 1999 Colonial Downs finally opens for 30 racing days.



2000s – Steady Progress New Kent is Encouraged

- ≥ 2000 2010 Live horse racing continues at Colonial Downs with 27-45 live racing days.
- 2004 General Assembly expands number of satellite facilities from 7 to 10.



2010s – The Track Shuts Down... Then Re-Opens New Kent is Caught in the Middle

- 2014-2019 Because of fights between the track owner and equine groups, Colonial Downs is closed.
 - ▶ New Kent's major economic driver is shuttered for years.
- 2018 General Assembly approves historic horse racing.
 - ▶ Keeps the pre-existing revenue split that was set in 1992.
 - ▶ 0.25% → OTB locality
 - ▶ 0.25% → Horse track locality
 - ► Ratio of 100 machines: 1 live racing day
- 2019 Colonial Downs re-opens

Racetrack and Community Safety New Kent is Impacted

- New Kent County fire/EMS personnel and units are assigned to the track and cannot leave or training/racing cannot continue
 - ▶ 15 fire/EMS personnel per shift, county-wide
 - Training Days -- 2 personnel, 1 ambulance assigned to the track
 - Race Day 4 personnel, 2 ambulances and a UTV
 - ▶ Premier Race Days & Major Events 6 personnel, 3 ambulances and a UTV





Racetrack and Community Safety New Kent is Impacted

- New Kent law enforcement personnel and units are assigned to the track on racing days
 - ▶ 4-6 deputies per 12-hour shift, county-wide
 - Race Days 2-3 deputies assigned to the track
 - Premier Race Days & Major Events 10-15 deputies assigned to the track
 - ▶ 30-60, including deputies from other agencies, on some event days





Historic Horse Racing Revenue

New Kent is Investing in Critical Needs

- Transportation
 - Projects to enhance safety near the entrance to Colonial Downs
- Water Infrastructure
 - ▶ Including projects to ensure water access at racetrack site
- Public Safety
 - Fire stations
- Other Major Capital Projects
 - Broadband access
 - Economic development & diversification
