Background

By September 1st of each year, state agencies receiving any asset as the result of a law enforcement seizure and subsequent forfeiture by either a state or federal court, shall submit a report identifying all such assets received during the prior fiscal year and their estimated net worth, to the Chairmen of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance and Appropriations Committees.

In accordance with the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), U.S. Department of the Treasury (USDT), and Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), at no time will the monies received from forfeitures be used to pay salaries or to supplant our operating budget. The funds are expended in accordance with established DOJ, USDT, and DCJS policies to support law enforcement activities.

Executive Summary

During Fiscal Year 2025, the Department of State Police received \$867,469.68 as a result of law enforcement seizures and subsequent forfeitures. Additionally, the Department was awarded inkind assets, in the form of vehicles/equipment. All assets are listed and accounted for within this annual report.

The Department utilizes asset forfeiture to carry out its mission to combat the trafficking of illegal substances and any other associated criminal activities. Asset forfeiture is not a substitute for traditional law enforcement methods and techniques, and at no time will seizure and forfeiture of assets take priority over criminal law enforcement.

Report of Assets Received as a Result Of Law Enforcement Seizures/Forfeitures

The goal of the Department of State Police is to utilize asset forfeiture in carrying out the Department's mission to combat trafficking in illegal substances and criminal activity. Asset forfeiture is not a substitute for traditional law enforcement methods and techniques and at no time will seizure and forfeiture of assets take priority over criminal law enforcement. Criminal activities that come to the attention of this Department will be investigated to their fullest regardless of whether assets may be seized and regardless of the value of those assets. However, it is recognized that a criminal drug investigation must include the investigation of the accumulation of assets, to prevent the use of those assets in furtherance of other crimes and to disrupt the profit motive. It is the view of the Department of State Police that asset forfeiture is remedial in nature; intended to redress the harm caused to society by those individuals who manufacture and sell illegal drugs.

In accordance with the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), U.S. Department of the Treasury (USDT), and Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), at no time shall the monies received from forfeitures be used to pay salaries or to supplant an agency's normal operating budget. The funds shall be expended in accordance with established DOJ, USDT, and DCJS policies to support law enforcement activities.

During Fiscal Year 2025, the Department of State Police received \$867,469.68 as a result of law enforcement seizures and subsequent forfeitures. Additionally, we were awarded in-kind assets, some of which the value is unknown. Both are listed and accounted for on the following page.
