<u>Chapters 343 and 344</u> (2022 Acts of Assembly), codified at Va. Code § <u>22.1-206.2</u> directs the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) and the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV) to distribute to school divisions, and post on its website, information that assists high school students in making more informed decisions about their futures and ensures that such students are aware of the costs and benefits of different educational and certificate programs.

This Administration has prioritized the readiness of all Virginia students to enter a pathway on the 3E Readiness Framework to prepare for post-secondary enrollment, careers, or military service. Ensuring the readiness of all students is contingent on a continuum of knowledge and opportunity, bolstered by robust parent communication, strong school counseling services, and consistent conversations about academic and career planning with students beginning in elementary school.

Enclosed is a report of recent updates and actions by the VDOE and SCHEV to ensure compliance with the Code of Virginia and promote postsecondary opportunities to students in the Commonwealth.

#### LEGISLATIVE DIRECTIVE

The 2022 General Assembly passed <u>House Bill 1299</u> and <u>Senate Bill 738</u>, (<u>Chapters 343 and 344</u>, 2022 Acts of Assembly), which require the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) to collect and distribute to school boards, and publicly post on its website, information that assists high school students in making more informed decisions about their futures after graduating from high school, and in doing so, ensure that such students are aware of the costs and benefits of different educational and certificate programs.

The legislation codified at Va. Code § 22.1-206.2, directs the VDOE to consult with the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV) to collect and compile such information annually and update its distribution materials accordingly. The legislation further requires the VDOE to post and distribute the information to school boards, with any relevant updates, no later than October 1 each year, and provide an annual update to the General Assembly on how such information was distributed.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The benefits and positive outcomes for earning a postsecondary degree or credential have been well researched. Graduates with postsecondary education (degree or credential) have higher average earnings for each level of college degree, are more likely to have health insurance, pay taxes, vote, and volunteer, and are less likely to receive unemployment benefits or need public assistance benefits. Out of the 11.6 million jobs created in the post-recession economy, 11.5 million went to workers with at least some college education, according to research from the Georgetown University Center on Education and the Workforce. Of these jobs, 8.4 million went to workers with a bachelor's degree or higher.

While Virginia offers a robust suite of college-going information and financial resources, the disparity in the average college-going rate between metropolitan areas (85 percent) and rural regions (34 percent) highlight the need to improve accessibility and postsecondary educational opportunities and increase the availability of financial resources and overall support for students and families to confront rising college costs. Regardless of locale and socioeconomic status, the process of exploring, preparing, applying, and executing a postsecondary plan is complicated and time-consuming. Through the legislation, students and families will have additional context on the postsecondary options available to students, including costs and benefits, allowing them to make informed decisions on investing in higher education. Additionally, parents and students will have access to information on the several different career options and opportunities available after graduation from high school.

This Administration has prioritized the readiness of all Virginia students to enter a pathway on the 3E Readiness Framework to prepare for post-secondary enrollment, careers, or military service. The 3E Readiness Framework was designed collaboratively with employers, higher education, parents, and educators. Ensuring the readiness of all students is contingent on a continuum of knowledge and opportunity, bolstered by robust parent communication, strong school counseling services, and consistent conversations about academic and career planning with students.

#### STATE AGENCY COLLABORATION

VDOE has partnered with SCHEV to gather data pertaining to Va. Code § 22.1-206.2 to provide students and families with college-going options and support. Using the Virginia Longitudinal Data System and reports released by SCHEV, including the Virginia Student Loan Help resource, stakeholders are provided information and data on the average cost of institutions, student success indicators, financial aid debt information, postgraduate wages, and federal and state programs for financing higher education. Students and families have the option to view much of this information for individual institutions in addition to across types of institutions. The Virginia Student Loan Help resource offers the additional benefit of learning modules to educate students on financing higher education.

In addition to the collaboration to meet the requirements of the legislation, VDOE and SCHEV have also partnered to jointly support a cross-agency position, the Postsecondary Access and Success Specialist (PASS), that facilitates postsecondary access between Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 12 and postsecondary, and create school environments, education policies, staff expectations, resources, and technical assistance that support all students' pursuit of a postsecondary education, including supporting students who have been traditionally underrepresented in higher education. The position, which is currently funded by the 2022 General Assembly budget and the Guidance to Postsecondary Success (GPS) program, is funded and shared jointly by VDOE and SCHEV beginning in Fiscal Year 2024. This role is located in the Office of Advanced Learning at the Department which leads all advanced coursework, college credit opportunities in high school, dual enrollment, and gifted learning. The Office of Advanced Learning is part of a new Division of Innovation, Student Pathways, and Opportunity that is focused on student readiness and student-centered learning models. The PASS position will continue to lead the efforts around the legislation in the future.

State agency collaboration has also occurred between VDOE and VCCS in order to fully implement College and Career Ready Virginia. This ongoing partnership centers around providing support and resources to school divisions and community colleges to ensure all eligible students have access to these dual enrollment credits and parents are aware of these free course opportunities for their child to earn college credit in high school.

#### **DISTRIBUTION OF POST-GRADUATE INFORMATION**

The VDOE has distributed the information on post-graduate opportunities detailed pursuant to Va. Code § 22.1-206.2 in two ways for the 2025-2026 school year: 1) Virginia's Education Update, and 2) Postsecondary Opportunities for High Schools Students webpage. Appendix A contains the resource links contained on the new webpage separated by the required items listed in Va. Code § 22.1-206.2.

VDOE and SCHEV have also distributed the information in a variety of additional methods, including agency newsletters, presentations to school personnel, school counseling state organizations, Virginia college access programs, and the state Career and Technical Education (CTE) Association. The information will be shared with other stakeholders as often as possible.

VDOE and SCHEV also executed a data sharing agreement that will facilitate a parent and prospective student-facing application enhancing awareness of postsecondary opportunities. Version 1.0 should be available late 2025, with additional enhancements coming throughout calendar year 2026. Future releases will create direct admissions opportunities for Virginia students, financial aid and recruiting options for institutions and students, and career pathway information.

#### **CONCLUSION**

The process of preparing, applying, and paying for postsecondary education can be confusing for students, including students who are under-represented in postsecondary programs in the Commonwealth. With information constantly changing, it is important to have a resource available that students can access with relevant information that has been analyzed and updated annually. The legislation provided that vehicle for students.

Annual updates to the required items will be coordinated between VDOE and SCHEV with new and additional information added as needed. Coordination efforts will continue to align Va. Code § 22.1-206.2 information on the VDOE website with Level-Up Virginia, the new statewide college access campaign. The VDOE and SCHEV will continue to coordinate efforts to provide information on postsecondary pathways that provide relevant, updated information, serving to guide students to best-fit postsecondary opportunities, careers, and meaningful lives.
