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Roanoke County Public Schools Accessibility Review Report

1. Executive Summary

In compliance with the mandate of Virginia House Bill 2278, Roanoke County Public Schools (RCPS) conducted a comprehensive review of the physical accessibility of all public elementary and secondary school buildings and grounds within the division. The review focused on identifying physical accessibility barriers and ensuring compliance with applicable building codes and accessibility standards in effect at the time of construction or renovation. The findings affirm that, across the 27 schools reviewed, all facilities met historical regulatory requirements. Current challenges identified were minimal, localized, and primarily relate to stage access in certain older elementary school facilities. Critically, none of the identified issues are currently preventing students with disabilities from accessing required school programs. All identified items are currently being reviewed, and RCPS is developing a prioritized Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) to establish a budget, identify funding sources, and implement full remediation.

II. Methodology and Scope of Review

- A. Facilities Reviewed The review encompassed all 27 public elementary and secondary schools operating within the Roanoke County Public Schools division.
- B. Review Objectives The assessment was designed to achieve two primary objectives, consistent with

the requirements of HB 2278:

- Verify that all school buildings and renovations were constructed and/or renovated in full
 compliance with the Virginia Uniform Statewide Building Code (USBC) and the Americans with
 Disabilities Act (ADA) Standards for Accessible Design applicable at the time of construction or
 modification.
- 2. Identify existing physical accessibility challenges and barriers that may limit individuals with disabilities from fully participating in school activities, services, and programs, considering current best practices for inclusive design.
- C. Stakeholder Consultation The comprehensive review was conducted through collaborative site inspections and planning sessions involving key divisional stakeholders:
 - Facilities and Operations Staff: Responsible for plan review and physical condition assessments.
 - Special Education (SPED) Staff: Provided critical input regarding programmatic access needs,
 student supports, and specific challenges related to IEP and 504 plan implementation.
 - School Administration: Provided site-level feedback, prioritized access concerns, and affirmed current levels of program accessibility.

III. Key Findings and Identified Challenges

A. Historical Code Compliance The review confirmed that every RCPS facility, including its original construction and subsequent renovations, was compliant with all relevant Virginia Uniform Statewide Building Code (USBC) and federal ADA guidelines applicable at the time of project completion.

B. Physical Accessibility Challenges The systematic review identified several areas of opportunity for improved accessibility. The most notable challenges are:

Category	Challenge Description	Scope of Impact
Stage Accessibility (Primary Concern)	Lack of permanent, code- compliant accessible routes (ramps or lifts) to the performance stage area in certain older elementary school gymnasiums/auditoriums.	Impacts five (5) elementary school buildings.
Non-Primary Entrances	Minor issues regarding slopes or pathway materials at select secondary or service entrances that fall below current standards, though not the main, accessible entrance.	Minimal, site-specific issues.

Interior Signage	Opportunities for updating older interior signage systems to current ADA standards for clarity, contrast, and tactile/Braille elements.	Division-wide opportunity for enhancement.
Playground Access	Surface texture issues. Wheelchair access to equipment is limited due to playground mulch and extended travel paths.	Impacts three (3) elementary schools.
Handicapped Parking	Location of handicapped parking in relative proximity to event entrances.	Impacts three (3) secondary schools.

C. Programmatic Access Assessment A critical component of the review was the assessment of whether identified physical challenges currently prevent access to educational programming and student supports.

- Current Impact: RCPS confirms that none of the identified physical accessibility challenges are currently preventing students with disabilities from accessing or participating in school programs, services, or activities.
- Mitigation: Where stage access is required, programs are relocated to the accessible floor to
 ensure full participation in performances and events until permanent solutions are in place.

IV. Action Plan and Recommendations

Roanoke County Public Schools is committed to the full elimination of all identified physical barriers to ensure equitable access throughout the division, aligning with the intent of HB 2278.

A. Remediation Planning and Prioritization

- 1. **Prioritization:** The current focus is on permanently resolving stage accessibility issues in elementary schools, as this represents the most significant, localized physical barrier.
- Detailed Review: Facilities staff members are reviewing possible solutions for the identified
 elementary school stages to determine the most cost-effective and compliant remediation strategy
 (e.g., permanent ramping, platform lifts, or conversion of performance spaces).
- Ongoing Maintenance: Remaining identified items (e.g., non-primary entrance updates and signage improvements) will be addressed through scheduled preventative maintenance and minor capital project allocations.

B. Financial Plan

- 1. **Budget Establishment:** RCPS is currently establishing a detailed, comprehensive budget for the full scope of necessary permanent accessibility improvements, which will be integrated into the upcoming five-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP).
- 2. Funding Identification: The division is actively exploring potential funding mechanisms, including:
 - Dedicated local funding (CIP allocation).
 - Federal grant opportunities (e.g., IDEA or EANS).
 - State capital improvement assistance programs.

C. Request for State Assistance

RCPS encourages the General Assembly to continue exploring avenues through which state agencies can provide necessary assistance, particularly for school divisions facing substantial capital needs. Specifically, additional state funding dedicated to ADA/accessibility improvements in existing facilities would significantly accelerate the timeline for full remediation and prevent such costs from diverting funds away from educational programming.

V. Conclusion

Roanoke County Public Schools is dedicated to fostering an environment of inclusivity where all students and community members can fully and equitably participate in school life. The HB 2278 review confirms RCPS's adherence to historical compliance standards while providing a clear roadmap for advancing accessibility to meet modern expectations for inclusive design. Remediation planning is underway, and RCPS anticipates full compliance with current accessibility standards for all identified areas upon completion of the capital projects.
