First Quarter Update: CY 2026 (January – March)

Office of Safer Communities

The Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) is pleased to report on the activities of the Office of Safer Communities (OSC) during the first quarter of calendar year (CY) 2026 (January 1, 2026 – March 31, 2026). The OSC oversees three funding streams: the Safer Communities Program (SCP), the Virginia Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention (FVIP) Fund, and the Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) Fund*.

During this reporting period, OSC explored an online dashboard to improve performance measure reporting, compiled a list of promising practices and models, and began planning an online toolbox to support non-profit grantees. Additionally, OSC connected with university programs to start the conversation on identifying where gaps are and maximizing research efforts.

On January 12, 2026, DCJS presented to the Senate Finance and Appropriations Committee's Public Safety and Claims Subcommittee on the structure, responsibilities, funding, grant programs, and future plans of OSC. The OSC team compiled data from SCP, FVIP, OCG, and earmark funding streams, including totals of awarded and expended funds, examples of grant-funded programs, and the distribution of awards.

On February 3, 2026, OSC hosted the first quarterly convening for 2026 virtually. The team provided in-depth training on the Statement of Grant Award, contract amendments, and grant compliance. Additionally, an FVIP-funded violence interrupter program presented on their approach to reducing gun violence.

OSC hosted a weekly webinar series (February 10–March 10, 2026) in collaboration with Virginia Commonwealth University's (VCU) Center for Public Policy designed to help OSC grantees collect, analyze, and use data effectively. VCU presented on and provided tools for data collection, creating one-pagers, data visualization, prevention evaluation techniques, and using data for growth and sustainability.

On March 4, 2026, OSC provided a virtual training to grantees on programmatic reporting requirements, financial reporting requirements, and compliance requirements for each funding stream.

Safer Communities Program (SCP)

During the first quarter of CY 2026, several Safer Communities Program (SCP) sites prepared budget amendments to take advantage of unobligated state fiscal year (SFY) 2026 funds for programming and staffing needs. Representatives from each SCP site participated in the OSC Quarterly Convening held virtually on February 3, 2026. Additionally, OSC staff assisted the

Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) research team with its ongoing evaluation of SCP's effectiveness and impact in the communities served. Along with interviewing OSC staff, the VCU research team met individually with representatives from each SCP site to follow up on information gathered from the focus group held during the fourth quarter of CY 2025.

Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention (FVIP) Fund

The grant period for 14 new FVIP grants began on January 1, 2026. Throughout this quarter, OSC hosted virtual office hours on the first Thursday of each month, providing FVIP grantees a time and space to ask program specific questions and receive technical assistance from their grant coordinator. Technical assistance this quarter focused heavily on data collection and analysis.

Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) Fund

The grant period for two Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) funding opportunities began on January 1, 2026. The first opportunity supports local law enforcement agencies and local units of government in the implementation of programmatic and technology-based solutions that intercept and eliminate local cycles of violence. The second opportunity supports local law enforcement initiatives to fight violent crime through the use of forensic and analytical technology.

Quarterly Activities of SCP-Funded Grantees

Below is a summary of reported activities from each SCP site for the first quarter of CY 2026.

City of Norfolk

Community Engagement

- The City of Norfolk's Community1ST program maintained a daily presence across five hotspot neighborhoods, de-escalating 27 major incidents and supporting the community after shots-fired incidents.
- Norfolk initiated the Park Avenue Community Stabilization and Engagement Pilot program, focusing on environmental and safety improvements for the community, such as fence repairs to secure alleyway access points.
- Norfolk connected with over 80 families through community outreach activities, such as Coffee with a Cop and weekly grocery support, to deepen youth and family trust with law enforcement.

Program Operations

- Norfolk collaborated with stakeholders to begin planning for the implementation of Norfolk Safe Starts, a high school-based violence prevention initiative that offers conflict mediation, mentorship, and trauma-informed support for high-risk youth and connects their families to counseling, workforce readiness, and community resources.

- Norfolk improved collaboration between recreation centers, food-security providers, schools, and shelters to expand engagement and resident support.

City of Portsmouth

Community Engagement

- The City of Portsmouth hosted community events to introduce the Violence Intervention team, including community pop-ups, festivals, canvassing with anti-gun violence public education, and food distribution.
- Portsmouth coordinated and participated in community-based events, meetings, and collaborative discussions with local organizations, the city's Crime and Gun Violence Reduction Committee, residents, faith leaders, and stakeholders to strengthen awareness of available resources, increase community participation, and support collective violence reduction strategies.
- The Portsmouth Police Department partnered with Help and Emergency Response (HER) Shelter and Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) to launch a Domestic Violence Awareness calendar of events and trainings. During this reporting period, Portsmouth has hosted three community trainings, four community meetings, and two survivor healing sessions.

Program Operations

- Portsmouth launched Pivot4Peace 757, a violence intervention team consisting of four violence interventionists, four outreach workers, a program lead, and a case manager.
- Portsmouth continued to provide oversight and coordination of violence intervention and support service activities, including contractor communication, program monitoring, data tracking, and collaboration with technical assistance providers.

City of Richmond

Community Engagement

- Subrecipients reported 179 program activities were hosted across this reporting period, including prevention and intervention programs, workforce readiness classes, youth development programs, survivor support groups, and community engagement activities.
- The Richmond Police Department (RPD) hosted 15 activities, providing education, conflict-resolution, engagement, and mentoring sessions for youth and young adults on spring break.
- The Teen Summit RVA, a program that advances youth leadership, youth voice, and community-based prevention priorities, engaged approximately 1,000 residents in March.

Program Operations

- The Richmond Gun Violence Prevention Steering Committee convened in February and March.
- Richmond hosted Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) practitioner training.

City of Roanoke

Community Engagement

- The City of Roanoke provided services to 53 youth and 140 families through the Rapid Engagement of Support in the Event of Trauma (RESET) program.
- The Teen Apprenticeship Program graduated 16 individuals who began on-the-job training within the City of Roanoke.
- Roanoke provided 128 programs to youth and families through public libraries.

Program Operations

- The Roanoke Sheriff's Department and Community Response Bureau streamlined the process to refer clients to programs.
- Fifteen staff members completed training.
- The City of Roanoke established three additional partnerships this quarter.

Quarterly Activities of FVIP-Funded Grantees

Hospital-Based Violence Intervention and Prevention Program (HVIPP)

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

Virginia Hospital and Healthcare Association (VHHA) Report

- This quarter, 562 victims of violence were served by the HVIPP sites.
- One hundred eighteen gunshot wound victims were served.
- VHHA reported there were 459 hospital visits by HVIPP staff.
- HVIPP staff conducted 2,556 post-discharge patient contacts.
- Staff made 496 patient-community resource referrals.
- VHHA launched a new quarterly meeting to facilitate collaboration between HVIPP sites.

Local Government Efforts

(Grant Period: January 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026)

Representative Activities

- This quarter, a local unit of government established a team to address violent crime within the community. This team is dedicated to capacity building with various stakeholders, engaging community members, and providing guidance on how to monitor and collect programmatic data.
- A local unit of government had seven youth graduate their 15-hour orientation program that provides life-skills training and a strengths-based assessment to help teens identify their talents, set personal goals, and begin building a successful future.

Community-Based Organizations' Efforts

(Grant Period: July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026; extended with supplemental funding through June 30, 2028)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2027)

Representative Activities

- During this reporting period, an organization delivered weekly mentoring and social emotional learning for 117 students and hosted youth civic activities and leadership events.
- An organization launched two new programs that focus on improving resiliency, self-esteem, peer relationships, and emotional competence, serving 247 youth.
- An organization hosted an annual summit organized by a youth advisory board that explored issues that impact youth in the community, reaching over 100 teens across northern Virginia.
- An organization moved from a church-based program to a neighborhood-based program which significantly increased participation, improved youth trust, and increased family participation.

Public Redevelopment and Housing Authorities' Efforts

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

Representative Activities

- This quarter, one grant-funded redevelopment and housing authority (RHA) hosted a community beautification event where 183 youth participated.
- An RHA collaborated with the local public schools, Parks and Recreation, and a counseling organization to provide more coordinated support for youth and families.
- Another RHA partnered with local schools, Parks and Recreation, hospital, and non-profit organizations to expand access to structured sports programming and team-based youth development initiatives, strengthening community capacity to support at-risk youth.

- During this quarter, an RHA successfully hired and onboarded staff in a variety of roles to launch a new program targeting youth.

Quarterly Activities of Programs Funded Through OCG Fund

Prosecutorial Efforts

(Grant Period: January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2026)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2028)

Representative Activities

- Grant-funded, local prosecutors:
 - Continue to process active and ongoing cases involving weapons, robberies, narcotics, homicides, aggravated assaults, and other violent offenses; and
 - Continue to collaborate with local and federal law enforcement agencies on active investigations.
- A grant-funded investigator within a local Commonwealth's Attorney's focused on community outreach by attending youth violence interruption programs and youth violence deterrence programs.
- One locality expanded their gun violence prevention course to include juveniles on probation as well as those in the local juvenile detention center.

Training, Forensic, and Analytical Technology

(Grant Period: July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026)

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2028)

Representative Training Updates

- A law enforcement agency sent an investigator to Basic Death and Homicide Investigation Training.
- A law enforcement agency provided training on the Mx908 Detection System, a detection device for narcotics and other chemicals, for investigators, narcotics and task force officers, command staff, and patrol officers.

Representative Forensic and Analytical Technology Updates

- Grantees with grant periods beginning on January 1, 2026, are in the process of procuring and installing equipment. The next phase of implementation will be training staff on the new technology.
- A sheriff's department purchased and received Cellebrite technology to assist with extracting and analyze mobile data.

- A locality used grant-funded forensic technology to investigate burglaries, sexual assaults, aggravated assaults, and narcotics cases.
