Second Quarter Update: CY 2026 (April – June)

Office of Safer Communities

The Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) is pleased to report on the activities of the Office of Safer Communities (OSC) during the second quarter of calendar year (CY) 2026 (April 1, 2026 – June 30, 2026). OSC oversees three funding streams: the Safer Communities Program (SCP), the Virginia Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention (FVIP) Fund, and the Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) Fund.*

On May 5, 2026, OSC hosted the second quarterly convening for 2026 in Midlothian, Virginia. The convening included presentations on Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), Certified Crime Prevention Communities (CCPC), and collaboration between law enforcement and community-based organizations. Additionally, OSC facilitated programmatic and regional discussions with attendees to promote idea sharing and collaboration.

On May 21, 2026, OSC hosted a virtual training for grantees on desk review and site visit expectations. The training covered requirements and special conditions of grant awards, the DCJS Risk Assessment, what to expect during a site visit, and expected documents for a desk review.

In June, the OSC team attended the 2026 Conference on Violent Crime, where the Director of DCJS announced that the Office of Safer Communities, previously housed in the Division of Programs and Services, will become its own division within the agency as of July 1, 2026.

Throughout June, OSC staff attended several grantee events and programs in support of Gun Violence Awareness Month, including community outreach events, positive youth development summer programs, and more. OSC staff also attended the Community Violence Intervention Summit, hosted by the City of Richmond's Office of Gun Violence Prevention.

OSC developed and launched a new reporting system for all FVIP and OCG grantees to improve the type of data collected and streamline the process. This reporting method also allows the OSC team to analyze reported data more easily.

Safer Communities Program (SCP)

During the second quarter of CY 2026, Safer Communities Program (SCP) localities worked to complete their programming and finalize all related expenditures for their fiscal year (FY) 2026 awards. Several SCP cities attended the 2026 DCJS Conference on Violent Crime in June, including Portsmouth, whose SCP leadership team presented on building effective partnerships between law enforcement and community-based organizations.

*The Commonwealth of Virginia's 2026–2028 biennial budget, passed on June 29, 2026, removes the Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) Fund. However, OSC will continue to provide technical assistance and monitor current grants until the end of the award periods. Further, activities previously funded through the OCG Fund will be undertaken with FVIP funds, assuming the submission of successful grant applications.

Additionally, with the passage of the 2026–2028 biennial budget in late June, the Safer Communities Program has officially grown to include five new cities (Danville, Hampton, Hopewell, Newport News, Petersburg) for FY 2027 and FY 2028. These cities will begin program implementation during the third quarter of CY 2026.

Firearm Violence Intervention and Prevention (FVIP) Fund

OSC posted an FVIP funding opportunity on June 18, 2026, for calendar year (CY) 2027–2028. This initiative seeks to reduce violent crime within the Commonwealth by funding effective and sustainable intervention and prevention programming designed to interrupt and prevent local cycles of violence. Applications are due on July 31, 2026, and DCJS anticipates awarding \$2.5M in FVIP funds.

Operation Ceasefire Grant (OCG) Fund

OSC provided data to Virginia Commonwealth University’s (VCU) Center for Public Policy to use in their evaluation on the impact and effectiveness of OCG funding. OSC received a draft version of the report from VCU and will provide feedback.

Quarterly Activities of SCP-Funded Grantees

Below is a summary of reported activities from each SCP site for the second quarter of CY 2026.

City of Norfolk

Community Engagement

- The City of Norfolk’s Community1ST program maintained a strong presence across priority neighborhoods, de-escalating conflicts between youth and conflicts between adults, including youth altercations, school-adjacent fights, domestic violence incidents, and neighborhood confrontations.
- Norfolk’s NeighborCare initiative engaged with over 300 residents across four events in targeted neighborhoods.
- The Norfolk Sheriff’s Office delivered three weeks of high-impact summer camps, supporting over 60 youth per day.

Program Operations

- Norfolk supported the implementation of a program through Project ORF, a non-profit organization that provides weekly, trauma-informed group counseling sessions to teach emotional regulation, healthy coping, self-awareness, and healthy communication to youth and young adults ages 14–24.
- Norfolk Police Department (NPD) launched their Victim Services Unit to expand trauma-informed support for victims of crime. NPD anticipates a capacity of 120–150 victims served per quarter.

City of Portsmouth

Community Engagement

- Portsmouth United successfully hosted Peace Week, a citywide initiative bringing together residents, community-based organizations, faith leaders, youth, and city departments to promote peace, healing, and collective responsibility for community safety.
- The Domestic Violence program expanded its outreach and services by partnering with Genevie Shelter and Regent Law (legal services).
- The Violence Intervention Team began working with participants and implementing case management and intervention strategies designed to reduce violence and support long-term stabilization.

Program Operations

- Enhanced coordination between Portsmouth United, community partners, and the Portsmouth Police Department has improved awareness of available resources and strengthened referral processes to better serve residents in crisis.
- Portsmouth Safer Communities launched the four-week Non-profit Sustainability Training Series designed to strengthen the capacity of community-based organizations participating in Safe Summer and other violence prevention initiatives.

City of Richmond

Community Engagement

- Richmond City and their subrecipient partners hosted 100 program activities across this reporting period.
- YWCA Richmond provided 24/7 hotline access and enrolled 92 survivors of violence in case management, court advocacy, or counseling programs.
- The Office of Immigrant and Refugee Engagement (OIRE) implemented 14 after-school sessions for 32 Latino middle-school students that integrated social-emotional learning, leadership, violence prevention, mentorship, and academic motivation.

Program Operations

- Investments in the Crime Analyst Unit and Capital City Intelligence Center workstations strengthened trend analysis and identification of hotspot curves and deployment windows.
- Richmond Police Department reported a 33% decrease in homicides and a 26% decrease in non-fatal shootings for this reporting period compared to the same period in 2025.

City of Roanoke

Community Engagement

- The City of Roanoke provided services to 158 youth and 156 families through the Rapid Engagement of Support in the Event of Trauma (RESET) program, including nine new program admissions.
- Roanoke hosted 12 community events, bringing the year-to-date total to 70 events across fiscal year 2026.
- The Roanoke Sheriff's Department provided 128 referrals to community services and created 16 new partnerships.

Program Operations

- Thirty-six new staff completed training throughout this reporting period.

Quarterly Activities of FVIP-Funded Grantees

Hospital-Based Violence Intervention and Prevention Program (HVIPP)

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

Virginia Hospital and Healthcare Association (VHHA) Report

- This quarter, 1,344 victims of violence were served by the HVIPP sites.
- One hundred eighty-two gunshot wound victims were served.
- VHHA reported there were 1,051 hospital visits by HVIPP staff.
- HVIPP staff conducted 3,767 post-discharge patient contacts.
- Staff made 810 patient-community resource referrals.

Local Government Efforts

(Grant Period: January 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026)

Representative Activities

- This quarter, a local unit of government delivered community-based violence prevention services to 142 children and 119 caregivers through weekly Learn&PlayGroup sessions, programming, and coordinated referrals.
- A local government graduated 16 youth from their youth apprenticeship program with over 30 hours of training per graduate.

Community-Based Organizations' Efforts

(Grant Period: July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026; extended with supplemental funding through June 30, 2028)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2027)

Representative Activities

- During this reporting period, an organization provided weekly mentoring and youth development sessions to more than 200 youth and young adults through structured programming that focuses on social-emotional learning, cognitive behavioral strategies, conflict resolution, leadership, workforce readiness, and violence prevention.
- An organization held a mental health summit hosted by program alumni, for girls ages 11–18. The summit included workshops, yoga, and coping skills sessions.
- An organization provided after-school tutoring services to 64 students, totaling 8,364 hours of tutoring during this quarter.
- An organization launched the violence prevention education portion of their program, integrating bullying prevention, conflict resolution, and mentorship.
- A violence interrupter program intervened and deescalated three firearm-related incidents, resulting in safe, non-violent resolutions.

Public Redevelopment and Housing Authorities' Efforts

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

Representative Activities

- This quarter, one grant-funded redevelopment and housing authority (RHA) launched weekly group sessions and one-on-one mentoring.
- An RHA provided after-school tutoring services throughout the 2025–2026 school year and hosted a completion celebration for participating students. The RHA noted significant improvements in reading rates among participants.
- An RHA had 27 youth participants graduate from a 15-hour orientation, and they were placed with positive community role models through a mentoring program.

Quarterly Activities of Programs Funded Through OCG Fund

Prosecutorial Efforts

(Grant Period: January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2026)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2028)

Representative Activities

- Grant-funded, local prosecutors continue to process active and ongoing cases involving weapons, robberies, narcotics, homicides, aggravated assaults, and other violent offenses.
- A Commonwealth's Attorney's Office provided programming designed to educate youth on gun violence, which focuses on increasing students understanding of the consequences of gun violence, decision making, and conflict resolution.

- A grant-funded prosecutor introduced a new multijurisdictional grand jury for the local Commonwealth's Attorney's Office.
- A Commonwealth's Attorney attended a training by the National Institute on the Prosecution of Domestic Violence Homicide, which focused on firearms-related domestic homicide.

Training, Forensic, and Analytical Technology

(Grant Period: July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026)

(Grant Period: July 1, 2025 – June 30, 2027)

(Grant Period: January 1, 2026 – December 31, 2028)

Representative Training Updates

- Personnel received training on the safe and proper use of newly purchased Starlink units, which are satellite internet units for mobile command vehicles.
- In one locality, prosecutors went through Forenscope training, which was then used at several crime scenes this quarter.

Representative Forensic and Analytical Technology Updates

- A sheriff's department has used a grant-funded Leica RTC360 3D Scanner on death and larceny cases throughout the reporting period.
- A locality purchased and installed Nightlock Door Barricade systems on every classroom door in the county's schools.
